Miss Elizabeth Clark, daughter of R. R. Clark of Sanderson, is receiving special training in psychiatric nursing at Austin State Hospital, according to Dr. C. R. Miller, acting superintendent.

Miss Clark is a 1962 graduate of Sanderson High School and attended Texas Tech one year. She is currently a student at the Methodist Hospital School of Nursing in Lubbock.

The psychiatric nursing program at Austin State Hospital is designed to train nurses in the recognition of psychiatric disorders, techniques useful in caring for emotionally ill patients and of community agencies established for dealing with social problems arising out of mental illness, Dr. Miller said.

Students spend three months in ward training and classroom instruction under psychiatrists, psychiatric nurses, social workers, psychologists, rehabilitation therapists, dietitians, and chaplains.

Their association with mental ill patients and qualified professional personnel gives the students invaluable training opportunities, Dr. Miller concluded.

## Jack Stovell, Former Resident, Dies In Alpine

Jack Stovell, comptroller of Sul Ross College, Alpine, and president of the Lone Star Conference of Texas, died suddenly at his home in that city last Wednesday afternoon.

Funeral services and interment were in Alpine Friday afternoon. Judge R. S. Wilkinson, Mrs. C. P. Peavy, and Mrs. W. H. Savage attended the services.

Mrs. Stovell was born in Maxwell, N.M., October 6, 1912. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Stovell, former Sanderson residents, and is a graduate of the Sanderson High School. He held both the Bachelor's and Master's Degrees from Sul Ross College where he had been employed since 1946. He had been in ill health for the past two years and apparently died of a heart attack, according to reports.

He is survived by his wife, Mary, a teacher in the Alpine public schools; two sons, John Robert and Bill, and a daughter, Mrs. Jesse Hofack, all of Lubbock; his mother, Mrs. John Stovell, and his grandmother, Mrs. Julia Cordey, both of Alpine; two brothers, Tom of Fort Stockton and Jim of San Bernardino, Calif.; and four grandchildren.

## Devil's River Bridge Is Opened For Travel Monday

Ribbon-cutting ceremonies were at the new Devil's River ridge on US 90 which was opened officially Monday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock. An address of dedication was made by Marshall Formby, Plaiview, a former member of the Texas Highway Commission.

One of the biggest highway bridges in the state, the huge structure spanning Devil's River in Amistad Reservoir area, reaches for more than a mile long — 5,641 feet and 6 inches.

Its floor rises 230 feet above the riverbed. Built on a vertical curve, some portions are slightly higher than the other and at the west side of the canyon there is a two-degree curve.

The big project, costing approximately \$4,500,000 with the approaches was accepted Wednesday by the Highway Department from the contractor, H. B. Zachry Construction Co., and since then Highway Department workers have been putting up the last of the signs and painting the center stripe.

Sixteen miles of highway were built in relocating Highway 90 in preparation for construction of Amistad Dam and its reservoir. Three miles of access road from the present Highway 90 to Amistad Reservoir have been in use more than two years; an additional three miles of highway from the access road to the new bridge were finished several months ago but kept barricaded. These portions of highway are on the east side, the side nearest to Del Rio.

More than eight miles of new highway were built on the west side at a cost of \$1,600,000 and this new thoroughfare was opened to traffic Monday when the bridge was dedicated.

According to G. P. Brown, resident engineer at Del Rio, field surveys on the relocation of US 90 began in January 1961 and the bridge construction was begun in December of 1962.

An additional \$100,000 was involved when two telephone conduits and navigational lights were added to the big bridge, according to Brown. The telephone conduit is on each side of the bridge, one for one big telephone company, the other conduit for a second firm. The red and green lights are for boat navigation, ready for the time when the reservoir will be filled with water.

Some of the "firsts" for the big bridge were new building techniques, including the use of a cableway and of a mechanical screed to make large concrete pouring possible. Use of the screed on the huge slabs made it possible to make one continuous pour, eliminating the ridge that would result if two separate pourings of concrete were required for a large slab. Use of this equipment attracted engineers from all over the nation.

Appreciation was also expressed to those who would play the basketball game for the benefit of the local fund drive.

The Sanderson Eagles advanced to the finals in the consolation bracket at the Ozona invitational basketball tournament last week end. The Eagles lost to Norton for the consolation bracket and Big Lake won the tournament.

John Cates made the all-tournament team.

The Eagles lost their first fray to Ozona 46-38. Cates had high point honors for Sanderson with 27.

Sanderson scored five in the first quarter and 11 in each of the other three quarters. Ozona's scoring was 15-10-7-14.

In the consolation bracket, the Eagles met Junction first and won 72-48. Travis Harkins had 17 points for high-scoring honors, and Cates had 16.

Sanderson lead handily during all of the game.

In the consolation semi-finals, Sanderson met Menard and won 42-39. Cates again led the scoring with 13; Tommy Gray had 10; and Jack Proctor had 10.

In the finals, Norton won 57-47. Sanderson was behind 5 points at the end of the first period and was unable to overcome the deficit. But Jones scored all of Sanderson's points in the first period and Cates wound up high-scoring with 19 for the Eagles. Proctor hit for 9.

Interment was in Alpine following services in the Geeslin Funeral Chapel with Rev. Clyde Chesnut, pastor of the First Methodist Church in Alpine, officiating.

Born in Missouri March 5, 1895, Mr. Oathout had resided in the Trans-Pecos area for 34 years. He was a veteran of World War I and a member of the Masonic Lodge at Dokchito, Oklahoma.

## Eilenburger Test Slated for Terrell South of Sheffield

Great Western Drilling Co. of Midland will drill a 10,500-foot Eilenburger wildcat in the north-east part of Terrell County, six and one-half miles southeast of Sheffield and three and one-half miles northeast of the one-well Mesa Grande (Leonard) field and five and three-eighths miles east and slightly south of the lone Connell production in the east area of the Yucca Butte (Pennsylvanian, Devonian, Ellenburger, and Connell gas-distillate) field of Terrell and Pecos Counties. It is to be known as the No. 1 Della Graham.

Location is 660 feet from the south and east lines of section 29 in Block 1 of the I&G Survey. Elevation is 2,263 feet.

The section is one of those that is bordered on the northeast by the Pecos River.

## District Commander Urges Legionnaires To Protest Action

Joseph Jenkins of El Paso, who is district commander of the 16th District Department of Texas American Legion, met with the local post here Thursday, January 21, for his official visit.

Jenkins outlined the planned changes in closing at least two Texas installations and centering the entire veterans hospital facilities in San Antonio. The existing hospitals have been operating on insufficient facilities and the number of applicants were always beyond their capacity, according to Jenkins. He and the other officers of the Department of Texas judged the move impractical when additional beds and staff could be taken care of at much less cost than the proposed \$17-million installation in San Antonio, besides the \$800,000 to be set aside for the planning of the project.

The Legionnaires were urged to write to the President and the Congressmen insisting upon their reconsidering this "political payoff" and study the more practical solution for the best interest of the veterans of Texas and taxpayers of the United States.

Commander Jenkins went from here to Presidio for an official visit to the Legion Post there.

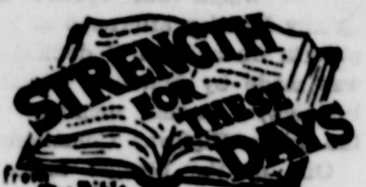

HEADED FOR A LET-DOWN?

Despite its enormous cost — estimated at anywhere from \$1.5 billion to \$3-billion annually in the early years — the Medicare plan under Social Security could prove a keen disappointment to the very elderly people it is supposed to help.

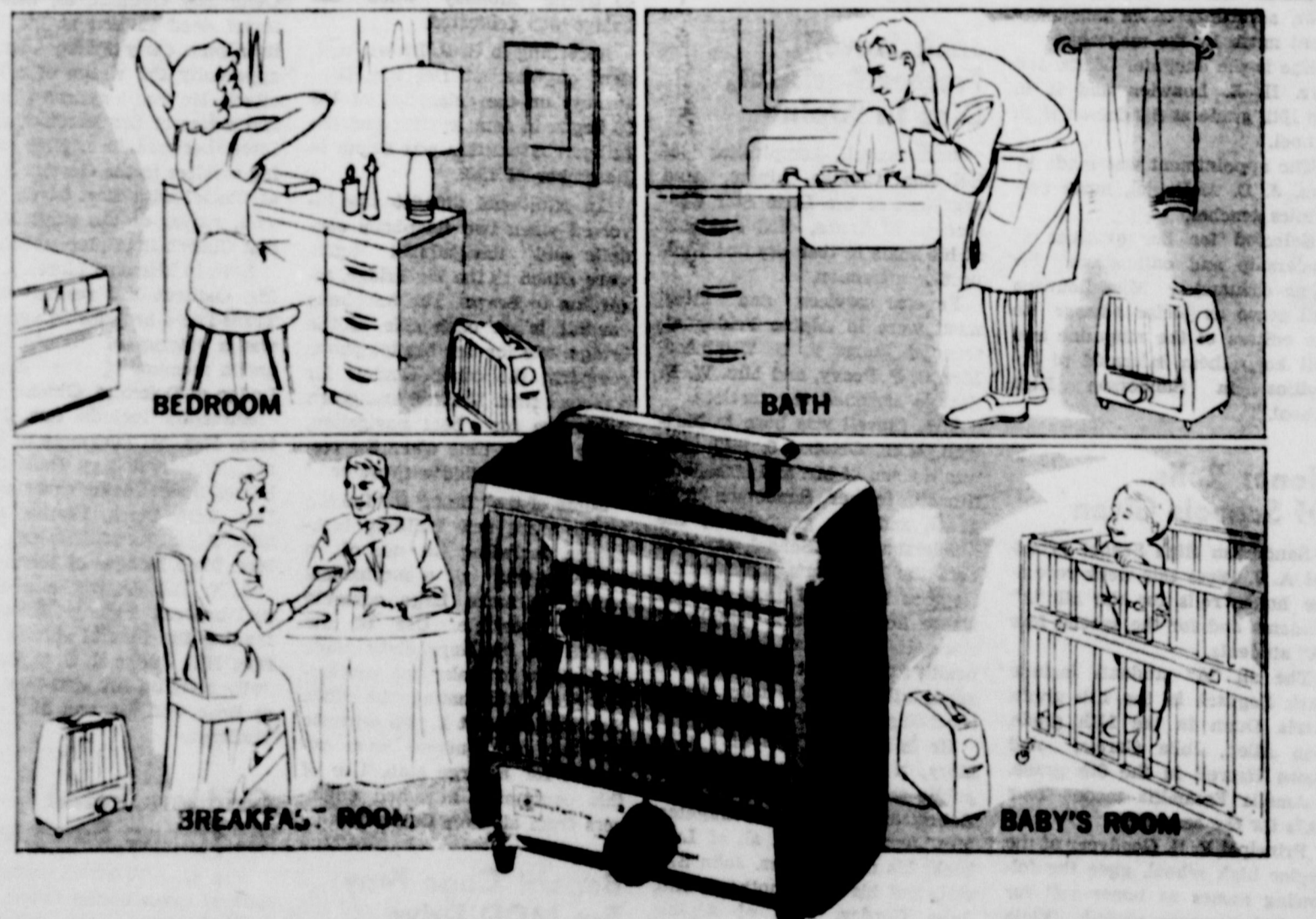
The authority for that statement is Rep. Wilbur D. Mills, chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, which has primary jurisdiction over legislation of the type in question. He has pointed out that the provisions of the plan have been exaggerated to the point that the benefits are wrongfully pictured.

"Contrary to the widespread assumption on the part of many elderly people," said Chairman Mills, "the bill does not cover such items as doctors' visits to the home, visits to the doctors' offices, surgical devices, drugs which many elderly people require, private nursing services except when the patient has come out of the hospital and goes to a hospital-affiliated nursing home."

The heavy volume of mail he has received, the Congressman added, indicates that many elderly people mistakenly believe that Medicare will take care of all their hospital and medical requirements.

"This simply is not true," he said. "Unfortunately, 'Medicare Under Social Security' has become an all-embracing slogan that in my opinion has not advanced the cause of those who need it."

It seems to us that the evident confusion over the extent of the benefits provides another good reason why both houses of Congress should carefully examine every facet of the Medicare proposal before taking action that would impose added burdens on taxpayers and yet disappoint the elderly.



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Mrs. Carruthers Leads Discussion On World Missions

The Presbyterian Women of the Church met in the home of Mrs. A. C. Garner Monday afternoon with Mrs. W. E. Hill, vice-president, presiding in the absence of the president. She led the opening prayer and gave the devotional after the hymn "Jesus Is All the World To Me" had been sung.

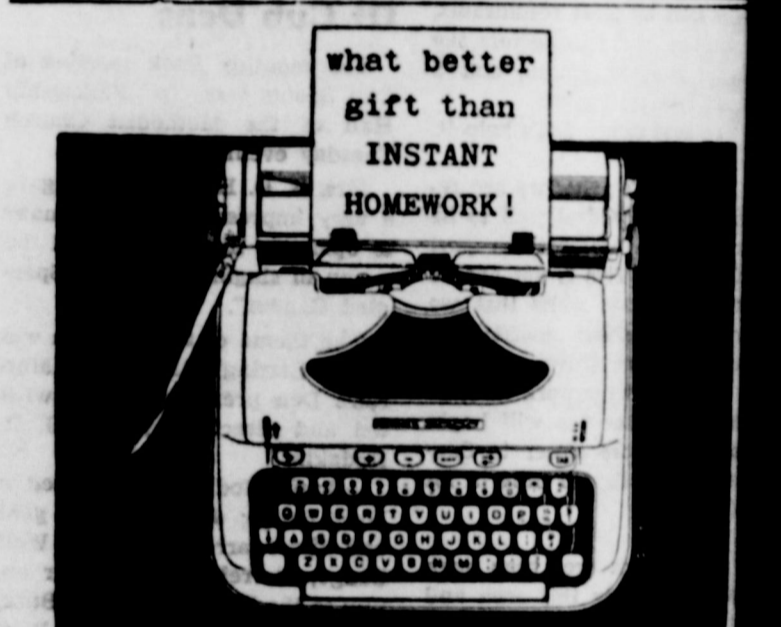

Fry quickly in butter or oil until lightly browned, about two minutes on each side. Spread one slice of bread with light layers of catsup; place each patty between two slices of bread. Beat eggs with milk and salt. Carefully dip each hamburger sandwich into egg mixture and fry in butter on both sides until golden brown. Serve hot. Yield: 6 to 8 sandwiches.

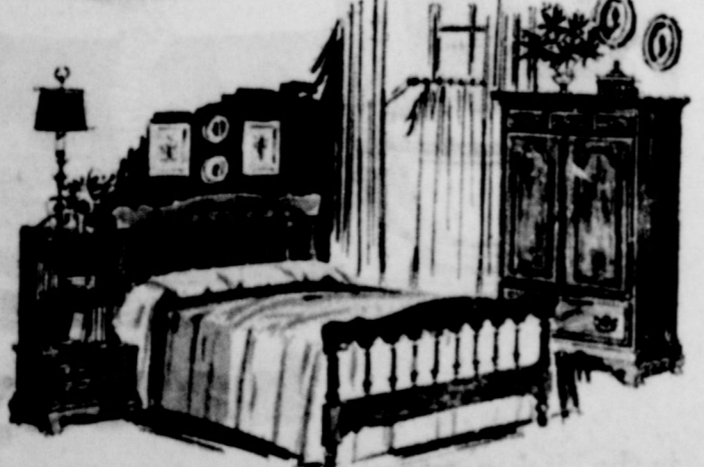

### Methodist Men Raise \$100 At Barbecue Supper Monday

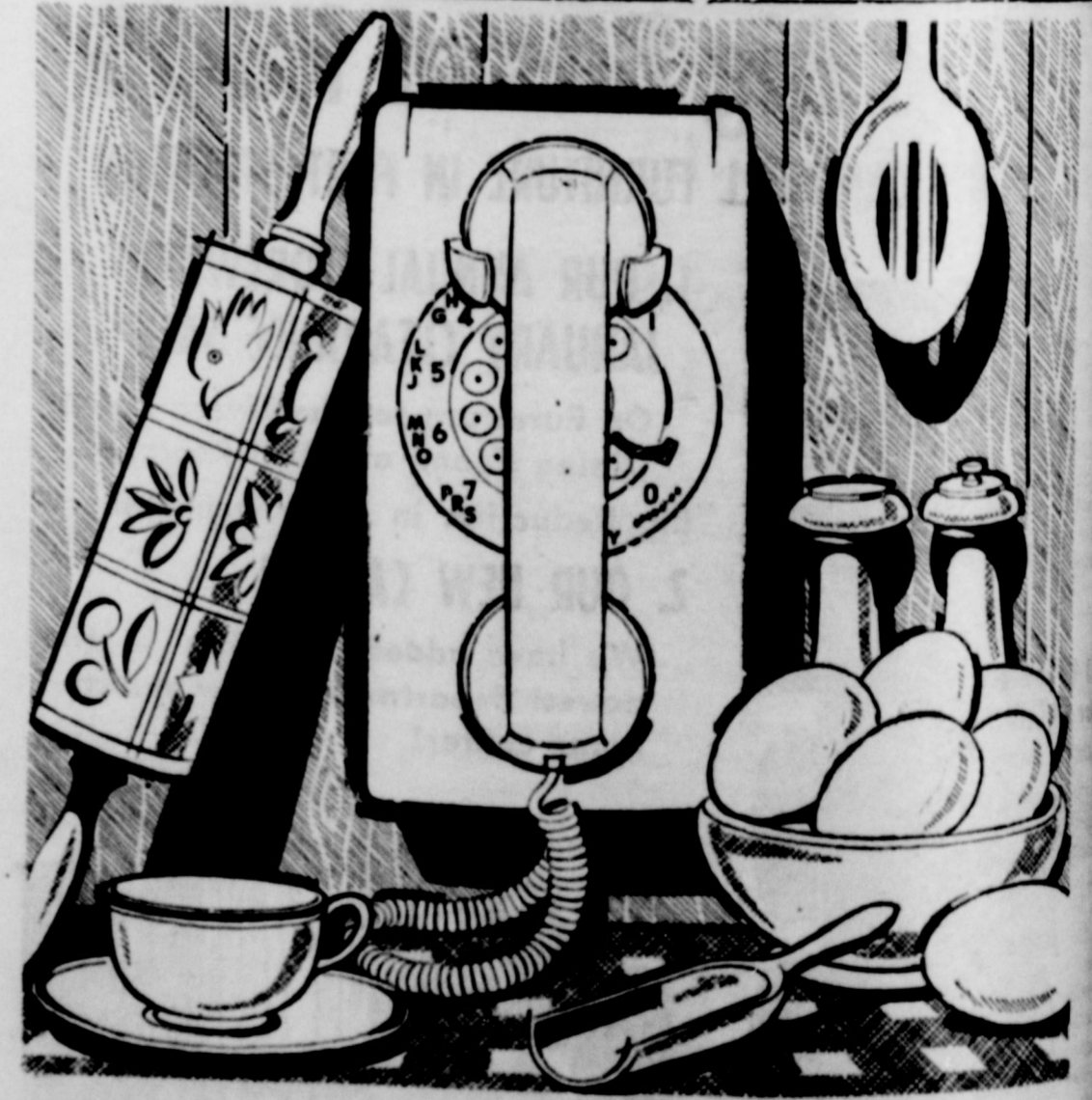
The Methodist Men's Club raised approximately \$100 from proceeds of a barbecue supper Monday night in Fellowship Hall at the church.
