## LISTEN TO LUKE

We were elated to see the discovery of an oil and gas producing strata in the northeast part of the county last Sunday. It is as far as we know, the first oil production that is up to close to that magnitude.

The gas flow was slight compared to some of the gas wells in the county, but it is a productive quantity.

The well is on one of the sections that runs up to the Pecos River and is in the extreme northeastern part of the county. The discovery was made below 7,000 feet and the well is scheduled to go an additional 9,000-odd feet to the Ellenburger.

It will be interesting to watch how the search for oil or gas continues within the county.

Again, the location of the well is such that about the only way the county will benefit will be in the tax revenue and in the possible future drilling motivated by this find.

It is an unfortunate truth that the county could be as rich as two feet of chocolate fudge tax-wise, and still be as poor as church mice in business economy.

District court has kept a lot of people busy during this week and we see some faces around that are seldom seen except when a jury is called.

There are two trees that we have seen locally that have burst out in full bloom. Both are peach trees and we could not help but sympathize with the owners of the trees.

## Commissioners Make 2 Purchases Monday At Court

The Commissioners Court Monday accepted the low bids on two projects: installation of a suspended ceiling and the purchase of a new maintainer for precinct 2.

The Kerr Mercantile Co. was awarded the contract for the installation of the ceiling at a cost to the county of \$1,581.10.

The Plains Machinery Co. of Odessa and Lubbock received the contract for furnishing a grader for precinct 2, at a cost of just over \$14,000.00.

The new machine is all hydraulic operated and has a cab and heater, and a special device on the blade circle to facilitate the digging of ditches.

Other routine matters were disposed of by the court.

## 'Pooling' Bill Is Of Interest To Terrell County

Citizens of Terrell County, the producer of some \$3.3 million worth of oil and gas a year, have a special interest in the "pooling" bill now before the Texas Legislature. James L. Sewell, Dallas, president of Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association, reported this week.

"Although Terrell County has production, the oil men who operate here, as well as the landowners and governmental officials, are interested in securing maximum development," Sewell said. "A pooling law will encourage a more efficient and more equitable approach to development of our oil and gas resources."

A measure, supported by all segments of the Texas petroleum industry after two years of intra-industry conferences and study, was recently introduced as Senate Bill 2 by Senator Galloway Calhoun Jr., Tyler, and as House Bill 2 by Rep. Wayne Gibbens of Breckenridge.

Sewell stressed that the measure does not affect normal leasing voluntary pooling, arrangements between landowners and operators, nor does it affect in any way reservoirs discovered and produced before March 8, 1961 (date of Supreme Court decision that wells on small tracts could not produce at rates disproportionately higher than adjoining tracts).

"The pooling bill is designed to make it possible for mineral owners — regardless of the size tract of land they may have — to get their fair share of the oil and gas that may underly their acreage," he said.

## Oil and Gas Strike In Northeast Part Terrell

An oil and gas discovery in an unidentified strata was indicated in northeast Terrell County with the flowing of gas at the rate of 1,385,000 cubic feet daily and 15 to 30 barrels of 37 gravity oil in 30 minutes at the Great Western

Drilling Co., Midland, No. 1 Delia Graham. The strata is thought to be Wolfcamp.

The hole is on section 29 in Block 1 of the I&GN Survey and is 6 1/2 miles southeast of Sheffield and 3 1/2 miles northeast of the one-well Mesa Grande (Leonard) field.

While drilling with air at 6,227 feet gas started to flow through the annulus rated at the above gauge. While the crew was waiting for the gas flow to subside oil began surfacing, flowing to pits through a discharge line off the blowout preventer at the above gauge.

The prospect continued to flow gas and oil by heads Monday and throughout Monday night. The project did not blow out and was never out of control.

Operator killed the flow with heavy mud early Tuesday and was preparing to cut a 50-foot core. Drilling then continued on a 10,500-foot Ellenburger contract.

Surface casing was set earlier at 1,826 feet. The casing was 8 and 5-8ths inches.

Gov. John Connally's alternate teacher pay proposal has drawn fire from the Texas State Teachers Association. And Connally has reciprocated!

Connally wants less of an immediate pay raise than the \$45 a month the teachers ask. He wants to set up a 10-year program for steady and regular increases which in time would amount to greater rewards for more experienced teachers.

House Speaker Ben Barnes and Rep. George Hinson of Mineola, who is sponsor of the TSTA-backed "\$45 in '65" program both called for a "cooling off" period. Compromise seemed unlikely due to strong feelings on both sides.

Sen. Jack Strong of Longview and Rep. W. S. Heatly of Paducah, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, introduced the Governor's 10-year pay plan — with substantial support. Among sponsors of the two bills are 17 House members who endorsed both measures.

Teachers complain the Connally program offers too little too late. They charge it would put 70 per cent of raises on local

school districts.

Connally believes his program would maintain the 80-20 cost ratio between state and local districts.

Meanwhile, teachers launched a campaign for their \$85,000,000 salary adjustment program (geared to an additional \$68,000,000 state out-lay for the biennium).

Pressure is intense on legislators, both from the Governor's office and from the teachers at home. Mail is piling high on the lawmakers' desks.

Speaker Barnes said it will be three months before the Legislature can even consider a teacher's pay raise, since it has to pass the complicated appropriations bill first.

An all-out war now would injure all educational efforts under consideration.

Redistricting Resolution Passed

Both Houses of the Legislature overwhelmingly adopted a resolution calling for a federal constitutional convention to permit one legislative chamber to be apportioned on factors other than population.

Thirty-four states must adopt the identical proposal before Congress has to consider calling a convention on a specific amendment. Three-fourths of the states must ratify any amendment thus submitted.

A least half a dozen proposals for congressional redistricting have been filed so far, plus bills for Senate redistricting and House redistricting.

House members are trying to

work out cooperative House redistricting plan, taking into consideration those who do not plan to run next time and those who plan to run for other offices.

Bills To Governor

The Legislature acted fast on two emergency budget requests by Governor Connally.

One called for \$702,785 in emergency appropriations to run some dollar-short agencies and programs. Included were \$250,000 for carrying on the state's share of the screwworm eradication program for three months after April 1 and \$290,000 for speeding up the Texas Water Commission's planning program.

Other bill set up procedures and a library plan by which libraries can take advantage of a \$7,500,000 library building appropriation voted by Congress for Texas.

Both were granted in a matter of days.

Tax Bill Pushed

Rep. Ben Atwell of Dallas, the chairman of the House Revenue and Tax Committee, is pushing a bill to raise \$15,300,000 under present tax laws.

Bill would repeal sales tax exemption on farm machinery and telephone and telegraph service; revise inheritance tax laws; repeal chain store tax (\$7,200,000 loss) and theatre admissions tax (\$1,200,000 loss); and grant a tax exemption for natural gas used in exploration and production in the same field where it is produced.

Governor's Program Told

Most of the governor's program already has been introduced in some form in one or both houses.

Bills or constitutional amendments filed would:

Set up an 18-man coordinating board over the state system of higher education;

Repeal state property and poll taxes;

Establish a state Department of Mental Health;

Tighten driver license laws;

Provide four-year terms for state officials;

Combine the Migrant Labor Council with the Texas Good Neighbor Council;

Insure equal legal rights for women;

Establish a \$10,000,000 college building fund;

Set up a college student loan fund;

Create a Fine Apts Commission;

Revise the Texas election code; and

Free the Texas Water Commission for water rights administration and make Texas Water Development Board responsible for all water planning, financing and development activities.

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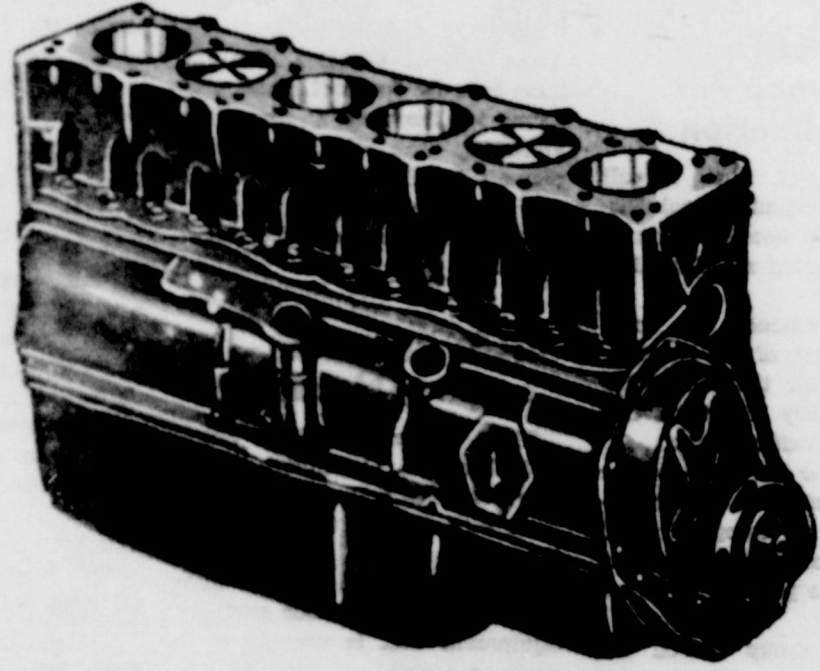


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**Baptist W.M.U. Mission Study**

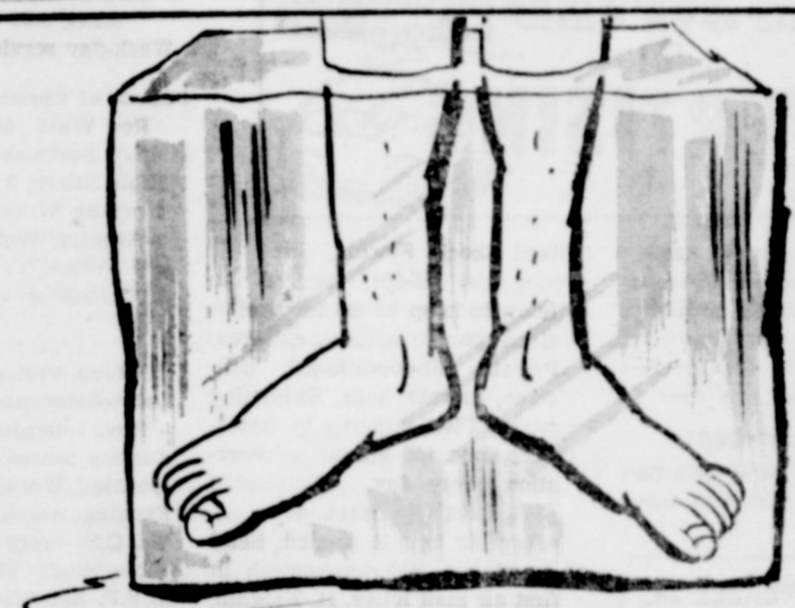

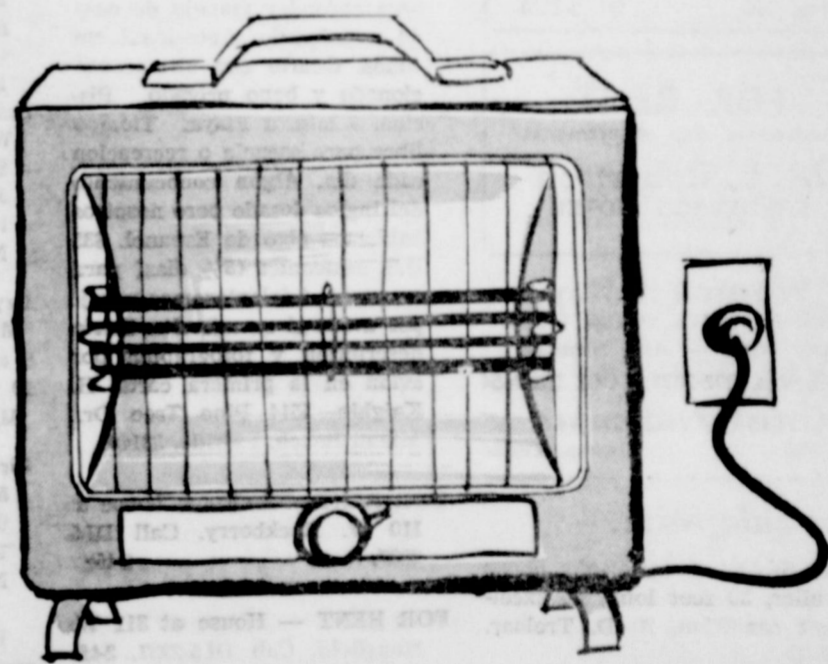

To prepare white sauce, melt butter or margarine, blend in flour, milk, salt and pepper. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until thickened. Remove from heat. Arrange layers of sliced potatoes, sliced eggs, cubed cheese, pimiento and white sauce. Sprinkle each layer with salt and pepper. Sprinkle shredded cheese over top. Store in refrigerator until ready to bake. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 20 to 40 mins. or until brown and bubbly. Garnish with hot, seasoned green peas, if desired. Serves 8 to 10.
