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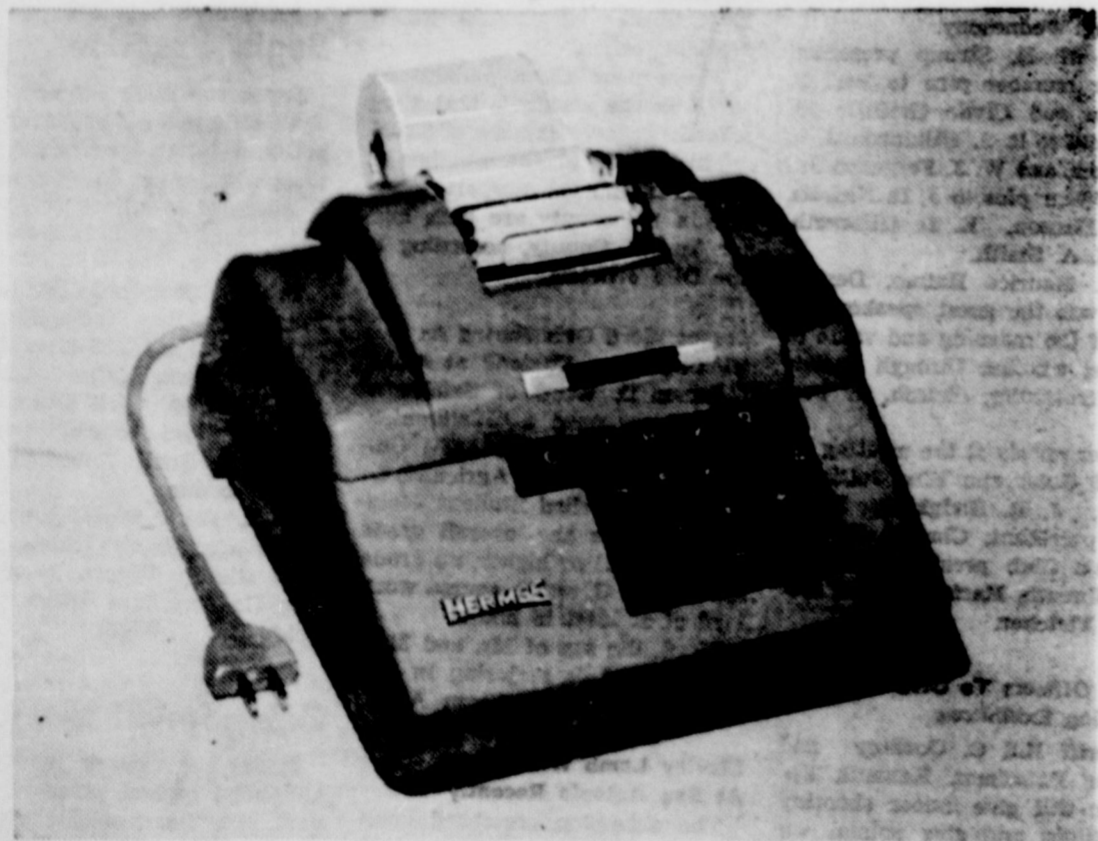

Richter, deputy Grand Matron of District 5, Section 4, Order of Eastern Star, was here to make her official visit to the local chapter Number 136.

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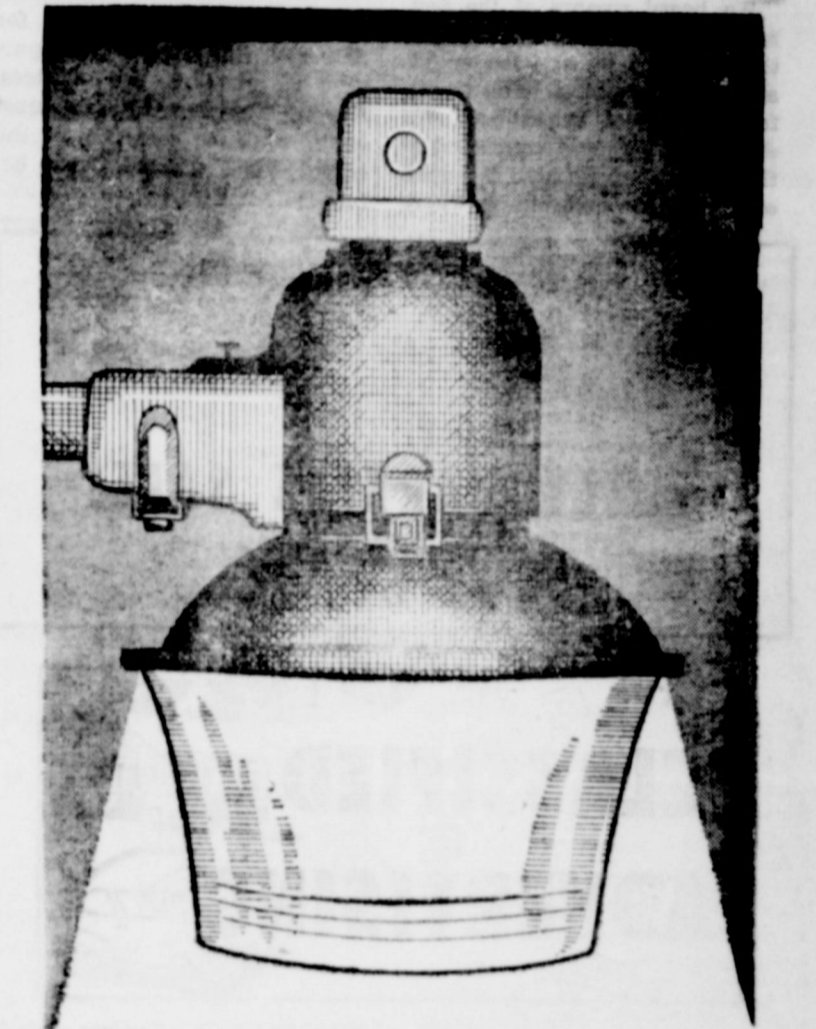
