

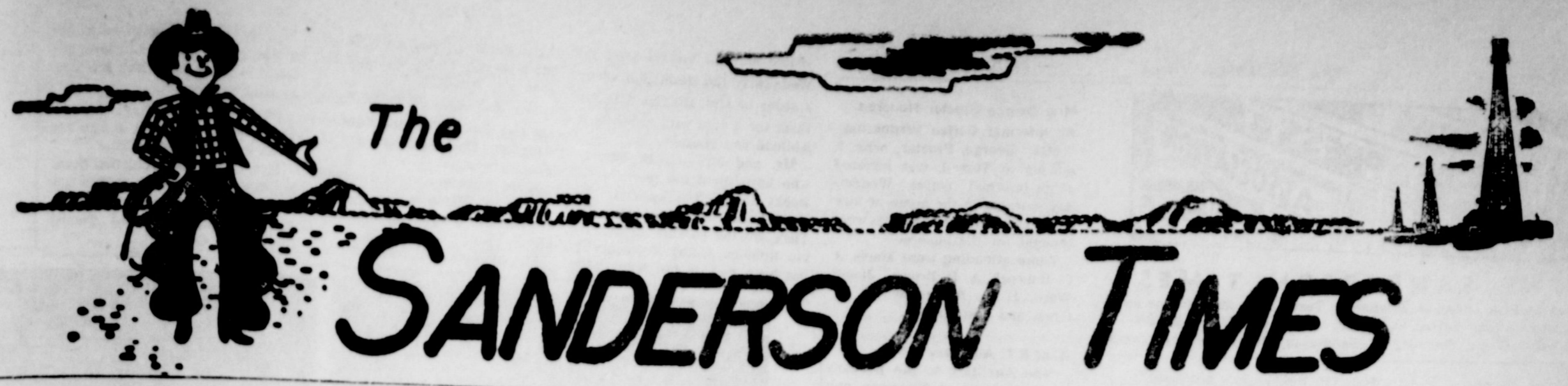

We don't know what this nation is coming to, but we know that it is in a mess right now. The pseudonym "land of the free" or "a Christian nation" is not applicable at this time.

Some day, somewhere, someone is going to have to take the blame for the things that are happening now in Selma, Ala.

We believe one thing to be completely true — that one side or the other is completely wrong — and steps should be taken immediately to stop the wrong.

Since things have gotten into such a mess, we have no idea as to the outcome, but we know that it cannot be good. Too many people are going to have to eat crow for it to be palatable to either side.

But we cannot help but feel that the trouble should be stopped and stopped immediately.

Either the Negroes have a right to demonstrate or they don't. The officers of the law either have the obligation to prevent demonstrations or they don't.

The thing has gotten to the point now where votes are a consideration. The people who were so strong "civil rights" now are in the position of losing votes — and a lot of them whichever way they go. But that was the case during last summer when some people took a stand then, wasn't it?

Where are the champions now of the "civil rights" cause? They are hiding behind the draperies of their robes of sanctity — where they always are when the trouble starts. How much trouble would there be in the world today if the trouble-makers were in the frontal assault?

Why not put the instigators of the "civil rights" movement under the clubs of the policemen? Or how about putting the "civil rights" champions in front of the marching legions of Negroes.

Where is the justice?

It just happens that most of the people we know who oppose the actions of Martin Luther King and his followers were doing most of the talking for giving equality to the Negroes.

This is like some of our other philosophies — we favor them — morality, Christianity, brotherhood, law abiding, etc. — until they begin to touch us, and then we start cawing.

We are too human!

One of the rights that we have lost as citizens of this nation — is the right to move about freely without the danger of being off —

### Slabbing Victim Crawls To Safety

A Mexican national survived 17 stab wounds in his body after walking and crawling about six miles last Friday morning. He was in this country illegally, according to Terrell County Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey, who took the man to Fort Stockton after he was found by the road. R. G. Crump, butane transport driver for Big Bend Gas Co., saw him as he was driving along Farm Road 2400 Friday morning and brought the man to town.

Gonzalo H. Lopez, 30, stated that he had been stabbed by his traveling mate while they were walking down a path. He was robbed of about \$38, his shoes and left in a clump of brush for dead, according to Sheriff Cooksey. He and his companion were on their way to Midland, according to Lopez, who said that the will to live to see Mexico again is the thing that gave him the strength to make it to the highway.

The stab wounds were in the back, chest, and head, according to Cooksey. He was in good condition in the hospital after receiving treatment there.

Search was begun for the companion of Lopez immediately. It was learned the next day that the companion had gone back south and was reported to have been south of Dryden and going toward Mexico.

Lopez will be turned over to the Border Patrol on his release from the hospital to be returned to Mexico.

### Retail Trade Here Shows Decrease On Census Report

Terrell County's 37 retail establishments had \$3.1 million in sales in 1963, a decrease of 1 per cent from 1958, the U.S. Bureau of the Census has just reported after tabulating data gathered from all firms in the 1963 census of business. The last previous business census conducted by the Census Bureau, an agency of the U. S. Department of Commerce was in 1958.

Retail trade in the county meant jobs (exclusive of proprietors) for 122 men and women and a yearly payroll of \$320,000.

For the state as a whole, the Census Bureau reported an increase of 18 per cent from 1958.

### Antelope Die-off Reported This Year

A dieoff of prong-horned antelope southeast of Marfa in the Trans-Pecos region has been possibly accelerated by recent severe weather, including more than a foot of snow in places, according to Pierce Uzell, wildlife coordinator for the Parks and Wildlife Department.

Uzell said the tragedy occurred in one of the better antelope ranges in Presidio County and involves an area opened to antelope hunting last fall despite severe harvest restrictions West of the Pecos.

"Collections of tissue, food materials and parasites, submitted to laboratory analysis, have tentatively attributed the cause of the deaths to toxic plant poisoning," Uzell said.

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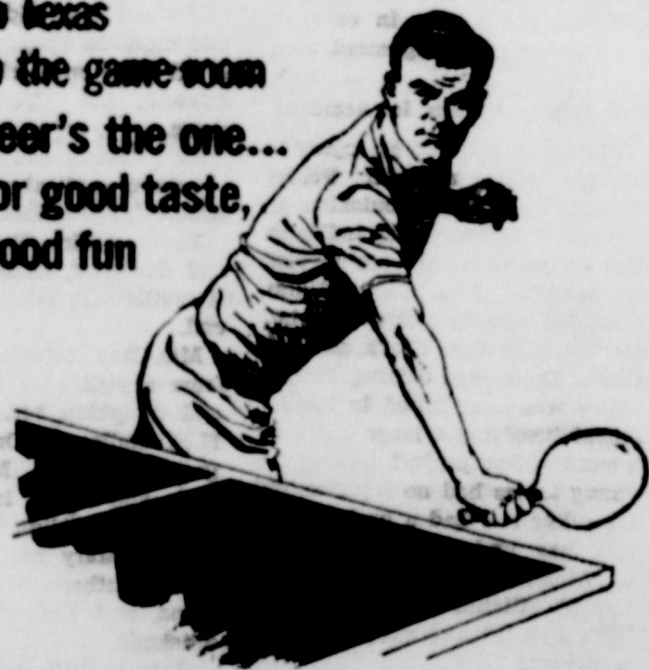

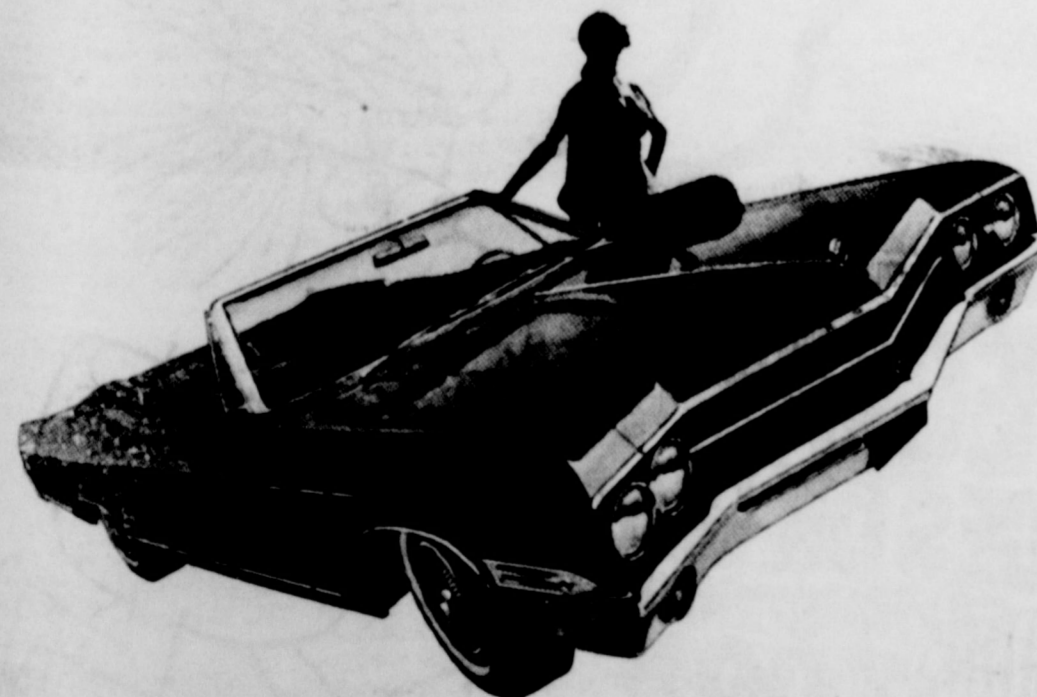

 We have little freedom in traveling the highways of our nation without the hazard of a drunken driver, a faulty automobile, a tired and sleepy driver, or a plain careless driver. We have little freedom to walk down certain streets in certain towns in our nation after dark without the danger of being robbed or beaten. We have little freedom in choosing our neighbors any more. We have always had the liberty of choosing our friends, but never the liberty of choosing our relatives.

We do not have the liberty of exercising our initiative in the pursuit of earthly gain due to the tax structure of our nation.  
 We don't believe that a nation can produce wealth, any more than it can legislate happiness. Wealth is produced by a free man with a free mind producing things in a free economy. When our government enters into a project of producing wealth or happiness then it must destroy the elements

under which wealth and happiness can be produced.  
 We are not intentionally linking the two words "wealth" and "happiness" because we don't believe there is a relationship. It just happens to be two of the fields which our government has gotten into in an effort to woo our people into a deeper apathetic state of governmental domination. The "Great Society" is set up
