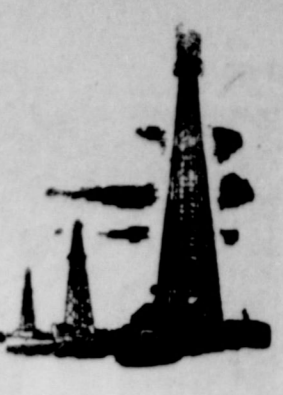

LISTEN TO LUKE

Well, we have seen a new era come into existence. Now, if there is some reason to be disgruntled about something, get out and take a long walk — say 50 miles. We don't know if you will be guaranteed protection from the federal government, and we don't know what earthly good it will do to take the walk, but that seems to be the fad nowadays.

We would suggest making a toll road out of something like the Selma-Montgomery highway so that the federal government may get back some of the money that is costing to permit the march. We think that anyone is entitled to protection while traveling along the highway, but we don't know about such elaborate protection. Our highway death toll every year is far greater than the number of marchers to Montgomery, but we don't have the protection in every day travel that those people do, and we might consider ourselves a police state if we did.

We think that one sure way for us to get more and more federal intervention in the state of Alabama, Texas, or Michigan, is for us to fail to meet our obligations and invite federal intervention. And we wonder why there was no protection to the business men in eastern metropolises when demonstrators were looting, pillaging, etc.

The denial of a right to vote for any other right is not rectified by other illegal acts or such silly means as marching to Montgomery. And too, we have a right to question the Christianity in the acts of so-called Christians who are staying out of church and keeping many others out of church on a Sunday morning so they can prove that they can walk.

The International Bible Lesson this last Sunday was on the condemnation of the Pharisees who paraded their piety before men that they might be seen by men, and further condemnation of those who had no chance of going to heaven themselves, but were, by their actions, keeping others from heaven.

Our relating the above is in no ways intended to show any piety on our part. We happened to know about the lesson and wondered about its application.

There is a story elsewhere in these columns explaining about a tax raise that is proposed for the maintenance of the schools. We would have no more quarrel with that than we would the raise in the price of a loaf of bread. Bread is no more essential to life than is money to the schools. We have to have it! That's all there is to it! We do not question the merchant's integrity and honesty in this.

Producer Confirmed In Graham Wildcat

A discovery was assured in Terrell County with the flowing of 68 barrels of new oil in 12 hours at Great Western Drilling Co., Midland No. 1 Della Graham. The Wolfcamp discovery is in section 29 of Block 1, I&NG Survey, 6 and one-half miles southeast of Sheffield and three

and one-half miles northeast of the one-well Mesa Grande (Leonard) Field. Flow was through a 36-64-inch choke and perforations between 6,216-32 feet, which had been acidized with 500 gallons. Tubing pressure was 190 pounds. It then flowed six hours on a 36-64-inch choke, making oil, plus a trace of water, at the hourly rate of 4.64 barrels and then flowed one hour on a 16-64-inch choke, making five barrels of oil, no water. The project is shut in to build tank battery.

The project was drilled to 10,450 feet and plugged back to 6,575 feet. Packer is set at 6,172 feet. Further tests revealed a flow of 41.44 barrels of oil, no water in four hours. Flow was through a 16-64-inch choke and perforations between 6,216-32 feet with tubing pressure of 250 pounds. Operator was still building tanks.

Tuesday Last Day For School Trustee Absentee Voting. Tuesday is the last day for casting an absentee ballot for the coming school trustee election scheduled for Saturday, April 3. A. H. Zuberbueller, school tax assessor and collector, stated Tuesday that 17 absentee ballots had been cast to date.

Tax Raise Eminent For County's Schools

A raise in taxes to increase the revenue of the maintenance funds for the county school system is eminent, according to information given by the board of equalization for the Terrell County Independent School District and the Board of Trustees. They state that a minimum of \$4,000 is need for local maintenance for next year, and there is a possibility that the money needed will be more, depending on the legislation concerning the teachers' pay raise.

This information and explanations were given to meetings of

the board of equalization with groups of ranchmen and Sanderson residents last week. It was explained that their advice would be to raise local valuations and lower the tax rate to obtain the needed additional resources. They stated that the tax rate of \$1.50 per \$1,000 valuation is the maximum that can be set and that is the figure now being used which leaves no alternative but to raise the valuations to get additional financing and then lower the tax rate to adjust to the needs. It was also pointed out that the valuations placed on local and ranch property for taxes was not a true picture of the actual value of the property, but would approximate 1-10th of the fair and equitable value.

The economic index and the minimum foundation fund were explained to those who attended the meeting in an effort to show how they related to the local maintenance fund revenue. These two things, it was noted, affected the revenue from the state as did the average daily attendance of pupils, and that without any raise in budgeted items, that the need for the additional \$4,000 was already eminent.

It was pointed out that the board of equalization was endowed with adjusting and equalization of taxes, but it was the school board's responsibility and obligation to set the tax rate.

The board of equalization is composed of Dudley Harrison, Lee Dudley, and Carlton White. They with A. H. Zuberbueller, school tax assessor and collector, advised the groups that it was entirely possible that the raise in taxes might have to go as high as a near-\$10,000 figure, depending on the teacher pay legislation, but that they had no control over the amount budgeted or spent for the operation of the schools.

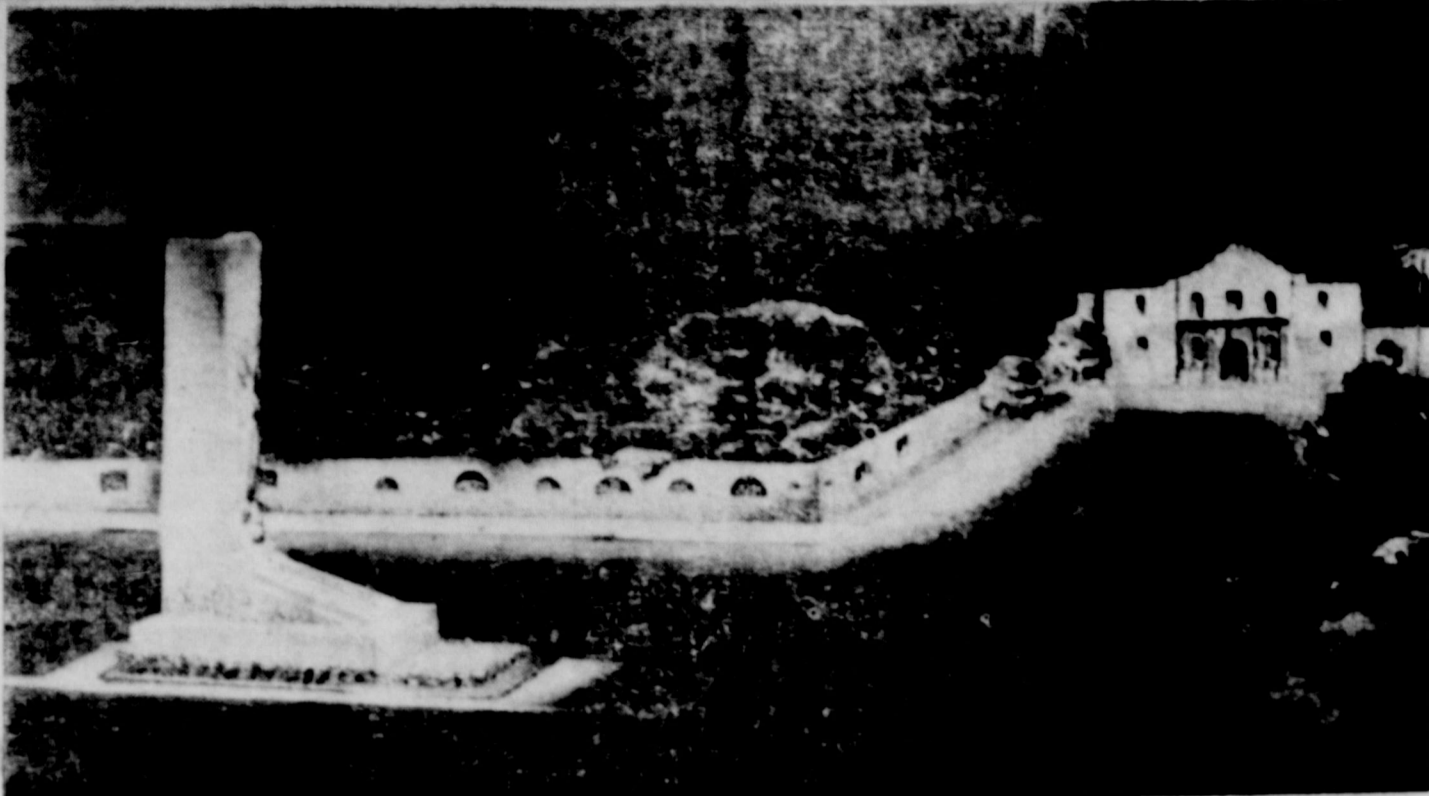

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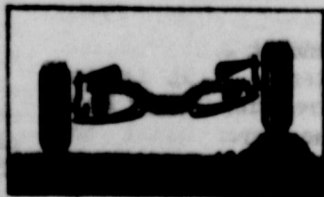
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Former Sanderson Youth To Wed California Girl

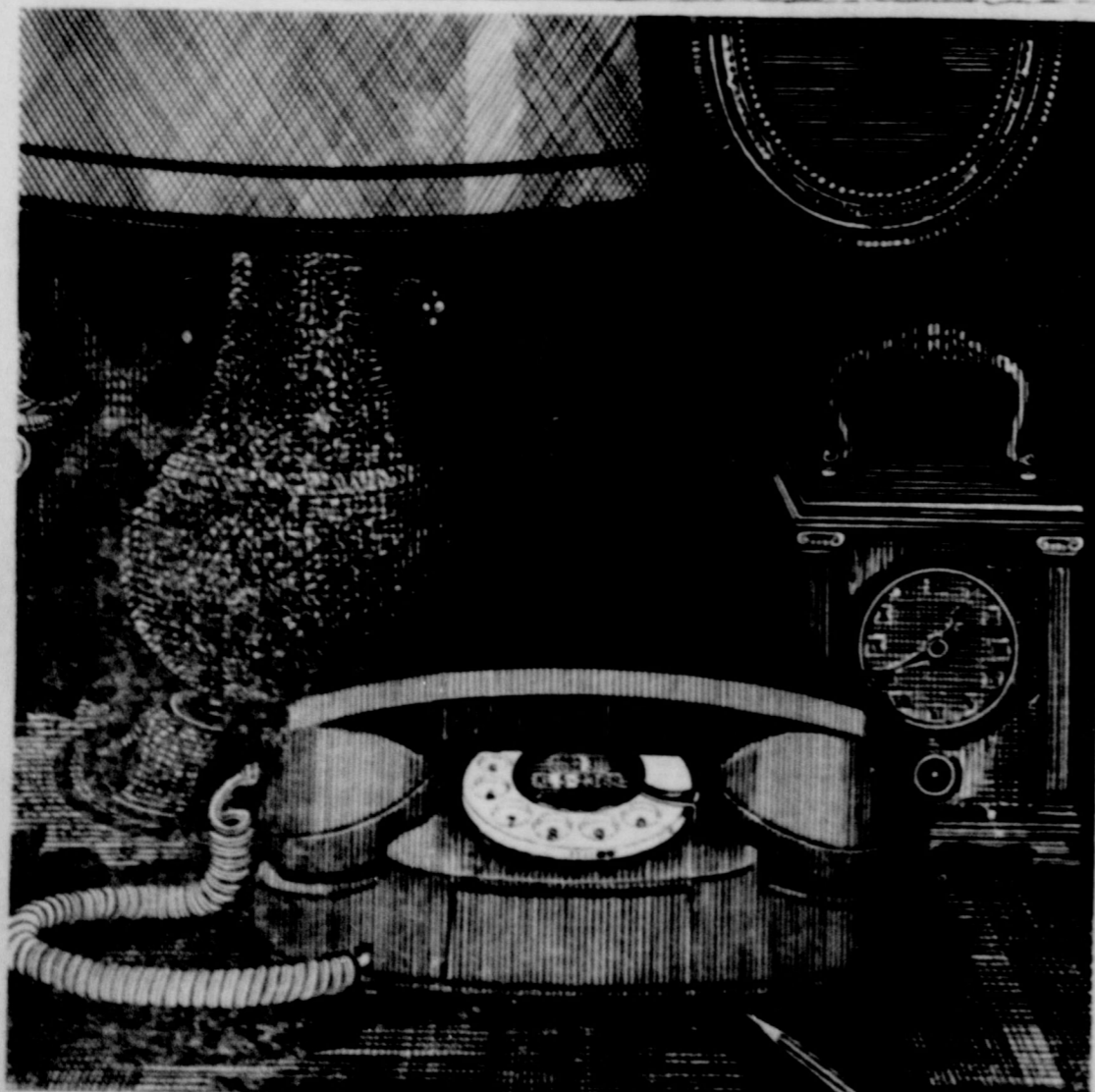
