James L. Haley, 81, Dies In Refugio, Is Buried Here

James Lemuel (Jim) Haley died in a Refugio hospital Thursday night. His body was brought to Sanderson Saturday and funeral services were held in the First Presbyterian Church that afternoon with Rev. Bob Moor, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Cedar Grove Cemetery.

Pall bearers were eight grandsons, including T. E. Henning, Fred Henning, Clarence Henning, Jack Henning, Jimmy Haley, Clyde Haley, Bobby Haley, and Bill Mitchell.

Mr. Haley would have been 81 years of age April 5. He was born in Kinney County and came to Terrell County to be employed as a ranch hand in 1907. The following year he was married to Miss Gertrude Musgrave, who preceded him in death in 1929.

In 1914, the Haleys moved to Big Spring for him to work as a car inspector for the Texas Pacific Railroad. They returned to Dryden in 1922 and he operated his own ranch for about eight years. After that he was employed on various ranches over the county, being on the Clyde Higgins ranch when he had a heart attack during the holidays. He was in failing health after that and left two weeks before his death for Refugio to make his home of his son, James Haley, and family. He had been hospitalized there for a week when death came following a heart attack Thursday.

Besides that son, he is survived by another son, A. W. Haley or Marathon; two daughters, Mrs. W. A. Haynes, Sanderson, and Mrs. Paul Ritter of Baltimore, Md.; 22 grandchildren and 27 great-grandchildren.

Fly Program Money Is Due On April 5

April 5 is the deadline for the funds to perpetuate the screw-worm fly eradication program, according to N. M. Mitchell, Terrell County chairman of the fund drive. All ranchmen are urged to send their contributions to Mr. Mitchell or Troy Druse, treasurer, before that date.

Only 10¢ an animal unit is being asked this year, according to Mitchell. That means that each ranchman will be asked to contribute only 2¢ for each sheep and goat, and 10¢ for each horse and cow.

An effort is being made to raise \$300,000 from Texas livestock producers. The program is said to be one of the greatest accomplishments of the livestock industry.

April 15 Is Deadline For MVI Stickers

"Many motorists are going to be caught in long lines before April 15," said Major Leo E. Gossett, commander of the sprawling West Texas Region of the Department of Public Safety this week. With only two weeks left during the present Motor Vehicle Inspection period, over 208,000 vehicles remain to be inspected within the 49 county West Texas Region, Gossett stated.

"The period set by law for securing the 1965 inspection sticker ends at midnight April 15, and there can be no extension of the deadline," Gossett pointed out. "Any Texas motorists whose vehicle does not display the new sticker after April 15 is subject to arrest by any officers in the state."

### WHY CHANGE HORSES IN MIDSTREAM?



**UNNEEDED AGENCY**  
In its search for added regulatory power the federal government has turned from new fields to conquer to new waters to navigate.

This is evidenced by the Administration's insistence on the creation of a new federal agency to take over water pollution control despite the fact that the effectiveness of present state and interstate controls has shown that intervention by the national government is not needed.

As the National Association of Manufacturers testified before a Congressional committee, the remarkable success of water pollution control efforts attained by the eight-state Ohio River Valley Sanitation Agency provides convincing proof that the administration of such activities should be left to the state and regional authorities.

Under the Ohio program, 99 per cent of the sewage emanating along the 1,000 miles of the river

and from the 1,300 communities along the tributaries are being pumped into purification plants. And over 90 per cent of the 1,700 industrial plants in the area are complying with the interstate requirements for pollution control.

There is ample evidence, too, NAM pointed out, that industry, on a nation-wide basis, is cooperating in the drive to eliminate, or at least control, water pollution. Industry is spending over \$100 million annually and has invested \$1 billion in pollution control equipment.

The governors of 24 states have testified that the U.S. Public Health Service is doing a completely adequate job of protecting the nation's health in the water pollution control field and that its jurisdiction should be continued.

In our view the establishment of an unneeded new federal agency would result in chaos and could hamper, rather than improve, water pollution control.

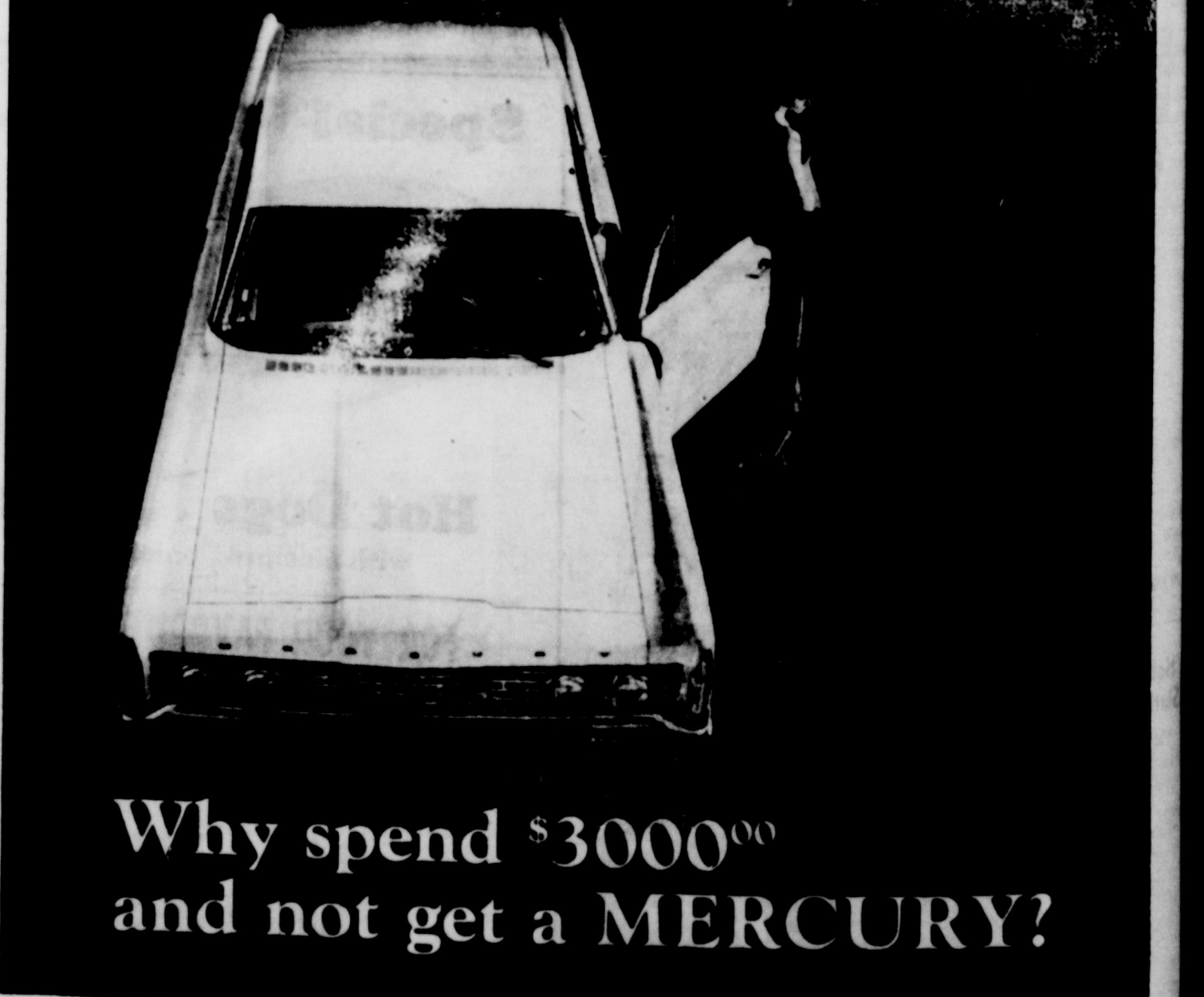
