Cleofas Lopez Killed Last Week In Accident

Retail Services Show Increase In Receipts

Terrell County's 20 service establishments had total receipts of \$262,000 in 1963, an increase of 2 per cent from 1958, according to a report of the 1963 census of business just released by the Bureau of Census, U.S. Department of Commerce. The last previous census of business covered operations during 1958.

The service trades in the census of business included those providing personal services to individuals, miscellaneous business services, auto repair and other auto services, and other repair services. Also included were motion picture theatres, other amusement and recreation services, hotels and motels.

The selected service trade establishments in the county employed 28 persons exclusive of proprietors and had a payroll for the year of \$41,000. The state as a whole included 60,879 establishments with receipts of \$1,879.3 million.

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IRREPLACEABLE SATELLITE

Parents of rambunctious children soon may be paying more attention to the activities of their

offspring. A bill passed by both Houses of the Legislature makes parents liable up to \$5,000 for damages done by their children. Measure now is in the hands of Gov. John Connally for his signature.

It applies to 10 to 18 year olds who damage public or privately owned property.

The sponsors contend that stiffer penalties than the present \$300 maximum will curb vandalism.

Bill was prompted by the number of cases where homes and

schools were being wrecked by vandals, but also it applies to such cases as false fire alarms and other acts of vandalism.

Final approval of the record \$3,600,000,000 general budget bill for state government operation is expected in both houses by week's end. House Revenue and Tax Committee is looking carefully at all the serious revenue proposals in its deck.

Governor Connally has estimated there may be need for a new tax bill as high as \$100,000,000 if school teacher pay raises are approved by the Legislature. One thing is for sure - he's opposed to a hike in the sales tax rate or extension of the present two per cent levy to groceries and medicines.

Among the possibilities, however, are: restoration of the 50 cent corporation franchise surtax (back to \$2.75 per \$1,000 of capital, surplus, and undivided profit) and once more boosting the seven per cent gas production tax. He already has recommended a cigarette tax increase.

Divorce Slowdown A bill that would extend the waiting period from 60 to 180 days before a divorce is granted, where children under 18 years of age are involved, has been approved by the House and Senate Jurisprudence Committee.

Sponsors feel that the bill would provide a check on hasty, ill-conceived divorces and remarriages, thereby giving added protection to children involved. Also it would be effective in reducing juvenile delinquency and the crime rate.

Bill has strong support of many prominent jurists and clergymen.

Program to provide part-time jobs for needy students under the Federal Economic Opportunity Act is growing fast and reaching into many areas of Texas.

Governor Connally reports that office details for handling the project require a staff larger than the crew that handles all the duties of the Governor's office.

Connally has approved nearly a dozen Neighborhood Youth Corps programs, involving federal grants for projects in Rio Grande City, Los Fresnos, Harris County, Beaumont, Dallas County, Galveston County, Laredo, Olton, Lockhart, and San Marcos.

Grants are authorized by the U. S. Department of Labor in Washington, but are subject to

Final approval by the Governor Criminal Code Bill Docketed

House Criminal Jurisprudence Committee has approved a 145-page bill overhauling the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure. It is set for debate next week.

Affecting nearly all citizens, the far-reaching measure is the number one legislative objective of the State Bar of Texas.

Revision was passed by the 58th Legislature, but was vetoed by the Governor because of errors in the bill.

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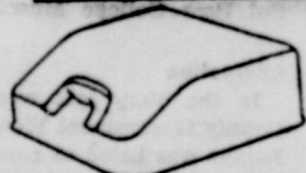

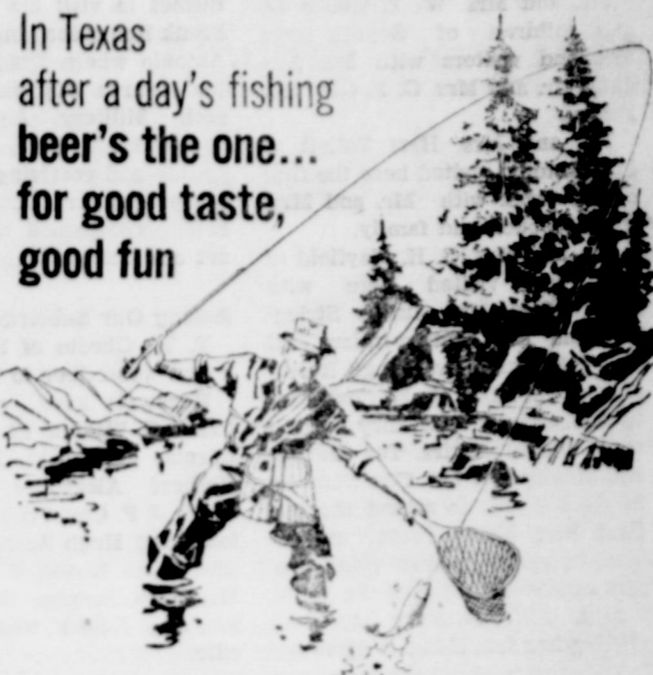

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

There should be little wonder that Washington bureaucrats have trouble understanding Asia. At times they even have difficulty understanding the problems of the U. S. A.

Several months ago, stampered by labor officials and asserted "do-gooders," the Congress made it illegal to continue the importation of farm workers from Mexico, the so-called "braceros."

Labor Secretary Willard Wirtz, who perhaps never saw a farm in operation, stubbornly insists that the American unemployed can do the work. The only problem is that the American unemployed will not do this type of work.

Recently, Phillip Mark, executive head of a big California cooperative cannery operating five plants, announced that they will not attempt to pack tomatoes this year.

In addition, he announced that the directors have authorized a tomato canning plant to be established in Mexico. A large share of the fresh table tomatoes are now being shipped in from south of border.

Thus one California town of about 40,000 population will lose an estimated payroll of some \$400,000 and another million dollars in supplies and service purchased in the area.

This trend will apparently spread, as bankers are showing a reluctance to advance money to develop a crop that may go unharvested.

Tomatoes are the largest canning crop in California. Between 2 and 3 million tons are processed annually.

It is also interesting that this decision was announced by Phil Mark, as he cannot be classified as a dyed-in-the-wool reactionary conservative. Instead, he has long been engaged in what might be termed a liberal school of economics. Before he joined the cooperative canning and built it from three plants to five plants, he was an officer of the federally sponsored Repeley Bank for Cooperatives.

Yet, he and his board of directors, all active growers, do not want to see their members take a chance on producing a crop of tomatoes that may never get to the canneries.

For tomatoes are a critical crop, and must be "babied" by experienced workers from the very moment they are transplanted into the fields from the seedbeds. They are susceptible to many diseases and insects, and when they must be handled promptly before mold develops.

If Secretary Wirtz and his supporting labor leaders and "do-gooders" had ever planted a tomato acreage and brought it to maturity, they would have a different opinion. But as it is, being perfectly ignorant of the problems, they are in a perfect position to tell farmers what they must do.
