Mr. Luke says that the things that would say now would only irritate him only more, so he will continue to say off of fussing about the situation in Viet Nam, in Washington, in Mississippi, in Alabama, in Texas, in the White House and in a lot of other places.

He said it was his opinion that the one headed for a one-party system is still in calling this system "Democratic", but his party has called it "dictatorship" when it was in other countries in the past.

Congress has by its passage of the rights bill, and the Department of Justice has, by its speedy action since passage of the bill, done a lot to bring on a totalitarian government in this nation.

The rights of the states to establish qualifications for voters has been set out in the Constitution of the United States, and we feel that those rights are now being taken away without being tested in the courts, without a trial and without anything.

Congress has taken upon itself the authority to say who, for example, can afford to pay for the poll tax — and the poll tax is a legal means of raising revenue, and a prerequisite for voting in Texas in all elections save national elections; Congress has taken the authority to say that a person, regardless of his mental or education, or the lack of it, is eligible to vote.

Congress is saying that all of the rights of the states to determine eligibility for voting as set out in the Constitution will be put aside.

We have seen it happen right here in Sanderson — people interested in other people voting when the only purpose indicated is a controlled vote.

If people have the intelligence to cast a vote, why do they need to be told how to vote?

If a person wants to deny himself the privilege of voting in a local or state election by refusing to pay a poll tax, then whose business is that but his?

Subsidizing votes is about as ridiculous as the plan now to subsidize rent, what about groceries? Are they next? And then clothing? Cars? Vacations?

If the government would take some of the cost of operation off and get down to using a little stretch in their spending, then it would be that people wouldn't need to be subsidized in their rent, their taxes, etc.

The fact of the waste in the anti-poverty program, for example, has been widespread and it is a known and proven fact that one of the first people to receive the job on the "head start" phase of the program in San Antonio was the son of the Congressman from that district.

The move to get the streets of Sanderson re-worked and then seal-coated was timely.

The commissioners jumped on this project as soon as they possibly could and it will be accomplished the same way.

We hope that the financial possibility exists to permit the topping of the streets from gutter to gutter. It would be a nice improvement to the appearance, cleanliness, and life of the streets.

Wildcat Slated Near Sheffield

O. N. Beer, Inc., San Antonio will drill a 4,000-foot Leonard lime wildcat in northeast Terrell County, eight miles southeast of Sheffield and two miles west of the one-well Mesa Grande (Leonard lime gas) field. It is the No. 1 W. M. Allison.

Location is 1,320 feet from the south and east lines of section 3, Block A4, P. L. Kinmon Survey, Abstract 2620. Elevation is 2,302 feet.

It is also one and three-fourths miles southeast of Sinclair Oil & Gas Co. No. 1 Allison, same section, 4,002-foot failure which tested unsuccessfully lime through perforations between 3,726-32 feet. It was abandoned in June.

Sanderson Flood Aid Expenses Published

Red Cross expenditures of \$198,750 in aiding people of Sanderson following the June 11 flood have been reported by Miss Rosemary Englebert, case worker supervisor for the American Red Cross.

Miss Englebert's report shows the Red Cross aided 108 families with four cases still to be completed.

Emergency mass care, given immediately after the arrival of Red Cross into Sanderson, \$5,642; providing food, clothing and maintenance totaled \$15,662, the case worker's report shows.

Largest amount of Red Cross funds spent was \$108,763 for repairs and buildings, with an additional \$51,593 paid for household furnishings for flood victims.

Work On US 285 Finished Except 'Big Hill' Stretch

Work on U.S. 285 is all completed with the exception of the stretch on "Big Hill" 10 miles out of Sanderson toward Fort Stockton.

Work on that part of the road is expected to be completed by October.

The newly constructed area is a wider and better quality road than any other portion of the highway from the standpoint of the driver.

In the Big Hill section a deep cut is being made at the top of the hill and the road will continue straight in a northerly direction from the south approach to the crest, thus eliminating all the curves on both sides of the hill.

Commissioners Seek Bids on Local Paving

The Terrell County Commissioners' Court has authorized the publication of a request for bids for seal-coating approximately eight miles of streets in Sanderson. Work is expected to begin

as soon as the contract is awarded on August 23.

Work is under way at the present in repairing the streets that were damaged by the flood so that the contractor will have only to shoot the streets, thus receiving a saving in the overall job.

The commissioners also have under consideration the possibility of shooting the streets from gutter to gutter in an effort to prevent the edges from breaking. A decision on this consideration is expected after consulting with engineers on the feasibility of the project.

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Vote Procedure For ASCS Officers Is Changed

The election of the Terrell County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee will be held by mail for the 1966 program year, with ballots to be returned by September 8, 1965.

Changes in procedure this year establish that the person receiving the most votes will be elected to a three-year term; the person receiving the second highest number of votes will be elected to a two-year term; and the person receiving the third highest number of votes will serve one year as a committeeman. The persons receiving the fourth and fifth highest number of votes will be first and second alternates respectively, for one year. In succeeding years only one committeeman will be elected.

At the organizational meeting to be held October 6, the newly-elected committee will decide the chairman and vice-chairman. Nominations of persons for a place on the ballot will be by petition. To nominate by petition, six or more eligible voters must sign to nominate one person. Each individual nomination must be made by a separate petition, all of which must be received in

the ASCS office at 112 Persimmon by 5:00 o'clock p.m. August 19. The present county committee will add names to the ballot as necessary to insure county-wide representation.

Ballots will be mailed to all known eligible voters on August 27 and must be returned to the ASCS office in person by 5:00 p.m. September 8 or be postmarked before midnight that date. The county committee will appoint a tabulation committee who will count the ballots publicly at 10:00 a.m. on September 10.

An eligible voter is any person of legal voting age, who has an interest in a farm or ranch as owner, tenant, or sharecropper and who is eligible to participate in any one of the programs administered through ASCS. The eligible voter may be an individual, a partnership, a corporation, a trust, an estate, or other legal entity. In case of joint ownership, each owner is eligible to vote. Since Texas has the community property law, the spouse of the individual is eligible to vote. No voting by proxy is allowed.

To be eligible to serve as committeeman, a person must be an eligible voter, must live in Terrell County, cannot have been a candidate for public office during the past year, cannot have been an employee, officer, or delegate of a political party during the

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" BY C. WILSON HARDER

Due to a recent Supreme Court ruling, postal department must now deliver free all propaganda mailed into this nation from communist nations.

Future historians will undoubtedly be more perplexed in trying to explain this decision than perhaps any other handed down by this tribunal.

Under an international postal agreement made long before C. W. Harder there were communists, cold wars, and other modern manifestations, nations to the agreement are supposed to handle free of charge pamphlets, et al, mailed into a country.

Right after World War II, the communists really took advantage of this situation, mailing in tons of propaganda.

But as President Truman put a stop to this, and the order was continued under Eisenhower. One of the first acts of the Kennedy regime was to nullify this order, with the result that as many as 75,000,000 pieces of propaganda from communist nations poured in.

Then following the Kennedy assassination, when it was learned that his killer Oswald, had previously been active in New Orleans distributing imported communist propaganda literature, a law regulating the matter was passed by the Congress, supported by 82% of the nation's independent business proprietors voting through

the National Federation of Independent Business.

The law provided that if such communist literature was received, addressed to residents of this nation, before delivery the postal department should notify the addressee of the arrival and ask if he wanted it delivered.

But the ubiquitous Civil Liberties Union immediately made an issue over this law before the Supreme Court.

The Court's decision was based on Article I of the Bill of Rights which prohibits interference with freedom of speech, or freedom of press. However, the Bill of Rights in practically all articles continually refers to a clause "rights of the people."

Herein lies an interesting point. When the Constitution was written, was it intended to give rights to the Hungarian people, or give all peoples of the world rights to interfere with the United States?

The Supreme Court in the decision also took the position that if some one engaged in a restricted defense job wanted to receive this communist literature he might be endangering his continued employment.

It will probably be great comfort to the U.S. forces in Vietnam, daily exposed to the danger of slaughter in communist ambushes, to know that people employed in secret defense activity can receive foreign communist propaganda for their leisure reading with no effect on their job security.

Time Short For Application To Service Academy

Congressman Richard C. White announced this week that Monday, August 23, is the final deadline for applicants in his district to register for the Civil Service Examination for admission to the Military, Naval, and Air Force Academies. Two previous examinations have already been held, and 44 applicants from all parts of the 16th district have taken them. Congressman White emphasized that both physical and mental standards for admission to the Academies are high, and that a Congressman cannot vary from these high requirements in making the appointments. The Naval Academy, for example, reports that almost all of its members finished in the top 20 per cent of their classes. While this is not a requirement, those who finish lower than this are seldom able to pass the final entrance examinations. Requirements of the other Academies are equally strict. The Congressman explained: "Much as I would like to help many eager and deserving young men of my district, it is to the interest of all of us that our future leaders in the armed services be of the highest quality. A good high school record, both in grades and extra-curricular activities, plus an outstanding performance in the competitive examinations, is therefore necessary."

Any young man who will reach his 17th birthday, but not his 22nd, by July 1 on the year of admission, and is a resident of the 16th Congressional District, is eligible to apply for appointment. 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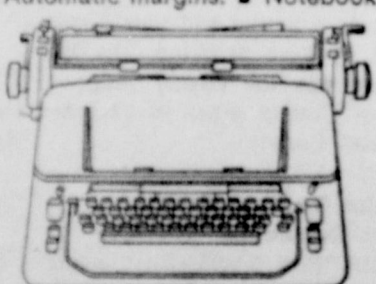

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

Stephen F. Austin State College at Nacogdoches
Sul Ross State College at Alpine
Angelo State College at San Angelo.

"Eighty-five per cent (85%) of such funds shall be allocated to the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas on June 1, 1966, and fifteen per cent (15%) of such funds shall be allocated by said Comptroller on June 1, 1972, based on the following determinations:

(1) Ninety per cent (90%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1966, shall be allocated to state institutions based on projected enrollment increases published by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System for fall 1966 to fall 1978.

(2) Ten per cent (10%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1966 shall be allocated to certain of the eligible state institutions based on the number of additional square feet needed in educational and general facilities by such eligible state institution to meet the average square feet per full time equivalent student of all state senior institutions (currently numbering twenty-two).

(3) All of the funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be allocated to certain of the eligible state institutions based on the determinations used in the June 1, 1966, allocations except that the allocations of fifty per cent (50%) of the funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be based on projected enrollment increases for fall 1972 to fall 1978, and fifty per cent (50%) of such funds allocated on June 1, 1972, shall be based on the need for additional square feet of educational and general facilities.

"Not later than June first of the beginning year of each succeeding ten-year period the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas shall reallocate eighty-five per cent (85%) of the funds to be derived from said Ten Cent (10%) ad valorem tax for said ten-year period and not later than June first of the sixth year of each succeeding ten-year period said Comptroller shall reallocate fifteen per cent (15%) of such funds to the eligible state institutions then in existence based on determinations used in allocating funds during the twelve-year period beginning January 1, 1966, except that enrollment projections for succeeding ten-year periods will be from the fall semester of the first year to the fall semester of the tenth year.

"All such designated institutions of higher learning shall not thereafter receive any general revenue funds for the acquiring or constructing of buildings or other permanent improvements for which said Ten Cent (10%) ad valorem tax is herein provided, except in case of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case an appropriation in an amount sufficient to replace the uninsured loss so incurred may be made by the Legislature out of any General Revenue Funds. The State Comptroller of Public Accounts shall draw all necessary and proper warrants upon the State Treasury in order to carry out the purpose of this Amendment, and the State Treasurer shall pay warrants so issued out of the special fund hereby created for said purpose. This Amendment shall be self-enacting. It shall become operative or effective upon its adoption so as to supersede and repeal the former provisions of this Section; provided further, that nothing herein shall be construed as impairing the obligation incurred by any outstanding notes or bonds heretofore issued by any state institution of higher learning under this Section prior to the adoption of this Amendment, but such notes or bonds shall be paid, both as to principal and interest, from the fund as allocated to any such institution.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TEN ON THE BALLOT

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 47 proposing an Amendment to Section 4, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, to provide four-year terms of office for State Representatives.

"Section 4. The members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of four years; but a new House of Representatives shall be chosen after every apportionment, and the members elected after each apportionment shall be divided by lot into two classes. The seats of the members of Class A shall be vacated at the expiration of the first two years, and those of Class B at the expiration of four years, so that one-half of the members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen biennially thereafter. Representatives shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected, until their successors shall have been elected and qualified. Except in case of an election to fill a vacancy, and except in the first election following each re-apportionment, a person who has been elected to the House of Representatives shall not be eligible to be a candidate again for membership in the Legislature until the term for

which he was elected has less than one year remaining."
"Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to provide for a four-year term of office for State Representatives."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to provide for a four-year term of office for State Representatives."
"Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the constitution and laws of this state."
"Section 4. In the event the Constitutional Amendment proposed in this Resolution is adopted by the people of Texas in the election in November, 1965, the Governor is directed not to issue a proclamation for the election and not to publish notice thereof for the Constitutional Amendment proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 1 of the 59th Texas Legislature since the provisions of said House Joint Resolution No. 1 are included in this Resolution. But, should this proposed Amendment be rejected by the people of Texas in the election in November, 1965, then the terms and provisions of House Joint Resolution No. 1 shall remain in full force and effect and shall be proclaimed and published and submitted to the electorate in November, 1966, as provided in said House Joint Resolution No. 1.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5 proposing an Amendment to Section 49, Article III of the Constitution of Texas so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which have been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finances. One (1) such citizen member shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund, Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for

not less than par value and accrued interest; shall be issued in such forms, denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; shall be issued and sold at such times, places, and in such installments as may be determined by said Board; and shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by said Board but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds may not exceed four and one-half per cent (4 1/2%). All bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser or purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas; and all bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be general obligations of the State of Texas. In order to prevent default in the payment of principal or interest on any such bonds, the Legislature shall appropriate a sufficient amount to pay the same.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 14 proposing Amendments to Section 4, 22 and 23 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office and Secretary of State; and certain statutory state officers; providing for the necessary election and the form of the ballot; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

"Section 4. The Governor shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly installed. He shall be at least thirty years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this state at least five years immediately preceding his election.

"Section 22. The Attorney General shall hold office for four years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the state in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the state in which the state may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the state, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature.

"Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution, shall each hold office for the term of four years, and until his successor is qualified; receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature; reside at the Capital of the state during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not

shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of said moneys shall be paid to the retirement of any bonds hereafter issued and sold and to pay interest thereon, together with any expenses as provided herein, in accordance with the resolution or resolutions authorizing the issuance and sale of such additional bonds, until there is sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds hereafter issued and sold, at which time all such moneys then remaining a part of said Veterans' Land Fund and thereafter becoming a part of said Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein.

"This Amendment being intended only to establish a basic framework and not to be a comprehensive treatment of the Veterans' Land Program, there is hereby proposed in the Legislature full power to implement and effectuate the design and objects of this Amendment, including the power to delegate such duties, responsibilities, functions, and authority to the Veterans' Land Board as it believes necessary.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this Amendment, such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to increase the Veterans' Land Fund by \$200,000,000; said Fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1955; such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law; and
"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to increase the Veterans' Land Fund by \$200,000,000; said Fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1955; such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

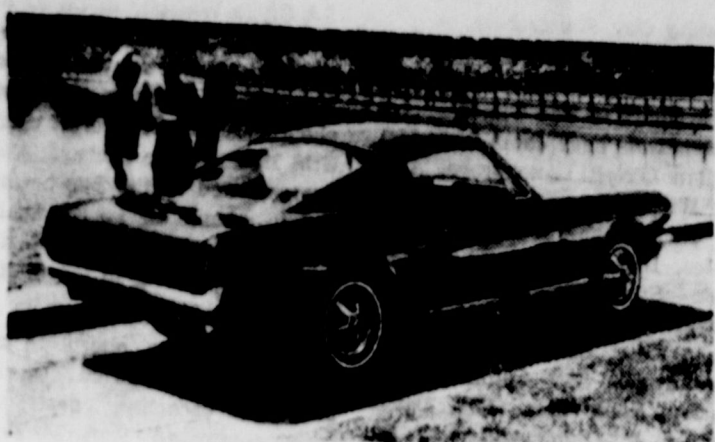

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11 proposing an Amendment to Section 1-a of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding to said Section as presently written, the following provisions: requiring automatic retirement of certain District and Appellate Judges at age seventy-five (75) or such earlier age not under seventy (70), as may be provided by law; creating a State Judicial Qualifications Commission and providing for its composition and the qualifications, methods of selection and terms of office of its members; defining the functions and procedures of said Commission, including the duty to investigate, and hold hearings in respect of, disability and misconduct of District and Appellate Judges and to make recommendations to the Supreme Court of Texas for involuntary retirement or removal of such Judges; empowering the Supreme Court of Texas, in its discretion, to retire such Judges for disability and to remove them for misconduct, upon recommendation of the aforesaid Commission and consideration of the record made before it; defining misconduct for which said Judges may be so removed; providing that the proceedings of said Commission shall be confidential until filed in the Supreme Court with recommendation for retirement or removal; and providing that the removal provisions here established shall be alternative to and cumulative of those provided elsewhere in the Constitution.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 1-a of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that said Section shall hereafter read as follows: "Section 1-a. (1) Subject to the further provisions of this Section, the Legislature shall provide for the retirement and compensation of Justices and Judges of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts on account of length of service, age and disability, and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed. The office of every such Justice and Judge shall become vacant when the incumbent reaches the age of seventy-five (75) years or such earlier age, not less than seventy (70) years, as the Legislature may prescribe; but, in the case of an incumbent whose term of office includes the effective date of this Amendment, this provision shall not prevent

him from serving the remainder of said term nor be applicable to him before his period or periods of judicial service shall have reached a total of ten (10) years.

(2) There is hereby created the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, to consist of nine (9) members, to wit: (i) two (2) Justices of Courts of Civil Appeals; (ii) two (2) District Judges; (iii) two (2) members of the State Bar, who have respectively practiced as such for over ten (10) consecutive years next preceding their selection; (iii) three (3) citizens, at least thirty (30) years of age, not licensed to practice law nor holding any salaried public office or employment; provided that no person shall be or remain a member of the Commission, who does not maintain physical residence within this State, or who resides in, or holds a judgeship within or for, the same Supreme Judicial District as another member of the Commission, or who shall have ceased to retain the qualifications above specified, for his respective class of membership. Commissioners of classes (i) and (ii) above shall be chosen by the Supreme Court with advice and consent of the Senate, those of class (iii) by the Board of Directors of the State Bar under regulations to be prescribed by the Supreme Court with advice and consent of the Senate, and those of class (iii) by appointment of the Governor with advice and consent of the Senate.

(3) The regular term of office of Commissioners shall be six (6) years; but the initial members of each of classes (i), (ii) and (iii) shall respectively be chosen for terms of four (4) and six (6) years, and the initial members of class (iii) for respective terms of two (2), four (4) and six (6) years. Interim vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as vacancies due to expiration of a full term, but only for the unexpired portion of the term in question. Commissioners may succeed themselves in office only if having served less than three (3) consecutive years.

(4) Commissioners shall receive no compensation for their services as such. The Legislature shall provide for the payment of the necessary expense for the operation of the Commission.

(5) The Commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet at Austin at least once each year. It shall annually select one of its members as Chairman. A quorum shall consist of five (5) members. Proceed-

ings shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement or removal of Justices or Judges shall be by affirmative vote of at least five (5) members.

(6) Any Justice or Judge within the scope of this Section 1-a may, subject to the other provisions hereof, be removed from office for willful or persistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any such Justice or Judge may be involuntarily retired for disability seriously interfering with the performance of his duties, which is, or is likely to become, permanent in nature.

(7) The Commission shall keep itself informed as fully as may be of circumstances relating to misconduct or disability of particular Justices or Judges, receive complaints or reports, formal or informal, from any source in this behalf and make such preliminary investigations as it may determine. Its orders for the attendance or testimony of witnesses or for the production of documents at any hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court.

(8) The Commission may, after such investigation as it deems necessary, order a hearing to be held before it concerning the removal or retirement of a Justice or Judge, or it may in its discretion request the Supreme Court to appoint an active or retired District Judge or Justice of a Court of Civil Appeals as a Master to hear and take evidence in any such matter, and to report thereon to the Commission. If, after hearing, or after considering the record and report of a Master, the Commission finds good cause therefore, it shall recommend to the Supreme Court the removal or retirement, as the case may be, of the Justice or Judge in question and shall thereupon file with the Clerk of the Supreme Court the entire record before the Commission.

(9) The Supreme Court shall review the record of the proceedings on the law and facts and in its discretion may, for good cause shown, permit the introduction of additional evidence and shall order removal or retirement, as it finds just and proper, or wholly reject the recommendation. Upon an order for involuntary retirement for disability or an order for removal, the office in question shall become vacant. The rights of an incumbent so required to retirement benefits shall be the same as if his retirement had been voluntary.

(10) All papers filed with and proceedings before the Commission or a Master shall be confidential, and the filing of papers with, and the giv-

ing of testimony before, the Commission, Master or the Supreme Court shall be privileged; provided that upon being filed in the Supreme Court the record loses its confidential character.

(11) The Supreme Court shall by rule provide for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court. Such rule shall afford to any judge against whom a proceeding is instituted to cause his retirement due process of law for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court in the same manner that any person whose property rights are in jeopardy in an adjudicatory proceeding is entitled to due process of law, regardless of whether or not the interest of the judge in remaining in active status is considered to be a right or a privilege. Due process shall include the right to notice, counsel, hearing, confrontation of his accusers, and all such other incidents of due process as are ordinarily available in proceedings whether or not misfeasance is charged, upon proof of which a penalty may be imposed.

(12) No Justice or Judge shall sit as a member of the Commission or Supreme Court in any proceeding involving his own retirement or removal.

(13) This Section 1-a is alternative to, and cumulative of, the methods of removal of Justices and Judges provided elsewhere in this Constitution.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the automatic retirement of District and Appellate Judges for old age, creating the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, defining its functions; and empowering the Supreme Court, upon recommendation of said Commission, to remove District and Appellate Judges for misconduct and to retire such Judges in cases of disability.

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the automatic retirement of District and Appellate Judges for old age, creating the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, defining its functions; and empowering the Supreme Court, upon recommendation of said Commission, to remove District and Appellate Judges for misconduct and to retire such Judges in cases of disability."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Draft Calls Are Up Over State

If draft calls remain high, Texas draft boards will be inducting "a considerable number of 19-year-olds" by fall, Col. Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Wednesday.

"We will induct mostly 21-year-olds in August," Col. Schwartz said. "Those we'll examine in September for future induction will be mostly 20-year-olds."

By October, he predicted, we will be examining a considerable number of 19-year-olds. If calls remain high, we'll be inducting them soon thereafter. We likely will be ordering a few 19-year-olds in September.

The forecast followed receipt of an amended September quota for Texas of 1,459 men and an estimated October call of 1780. Recently monthly quotas have been around 700 to 900.

The state draft director said that the "declining age of involuntary induction during recent months has focused increased attention upon the classification of college students."

"Married men with children, or hardship conditions, will be deferred formally, those who have wives alone will continue to be passed over for the draft for the time being; but those not living with their wives, or wives and children, in a bona fide family relationship will be subject to the draft at once", the state draft director concluded.

From Local Board No. 14, 10 men were ordered to report for preinduction physicals in August. On August 4, five of these men were forwarded to the Armed Forces Examining Station at El Paso. The other four either transferred to other boards or will report at a later date. There was no call for induction in August.

The local board reminds young men they are required by law to register within 5 days after their 18th birthday. Failure to do so could result in immediate induction or prosecution.
