All industry, large and small, has been served notice that the government holds the big stick one way or another and will whip them in line if they are caught to be getting out of line. This then would reach down to the individuals as well, would it not?

Another wrong that has permeated our society, in our humble opinion, is that we fail to establish the same set of rules for all people at times, and maintain that the old adage "laws were made to be broken" is the rule and is expected and accepted.

The leadership that is exemplified will be reflected directly in those who learn from us. If they are not taught correctly, it is the fault of the teacher, the example. And it begins and ends with the individual and the individual case.

Gun Club To Have Turkey Shoot

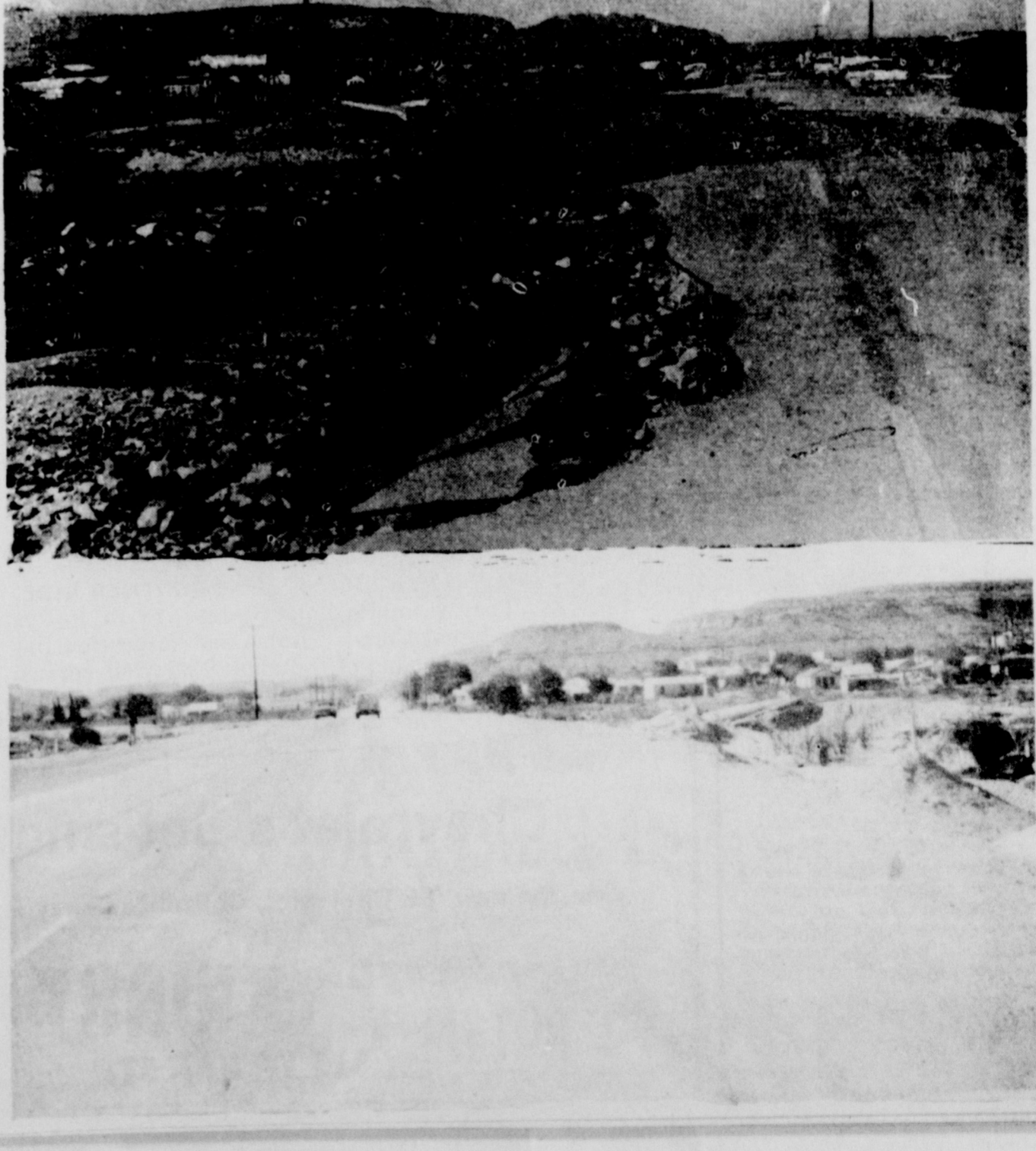

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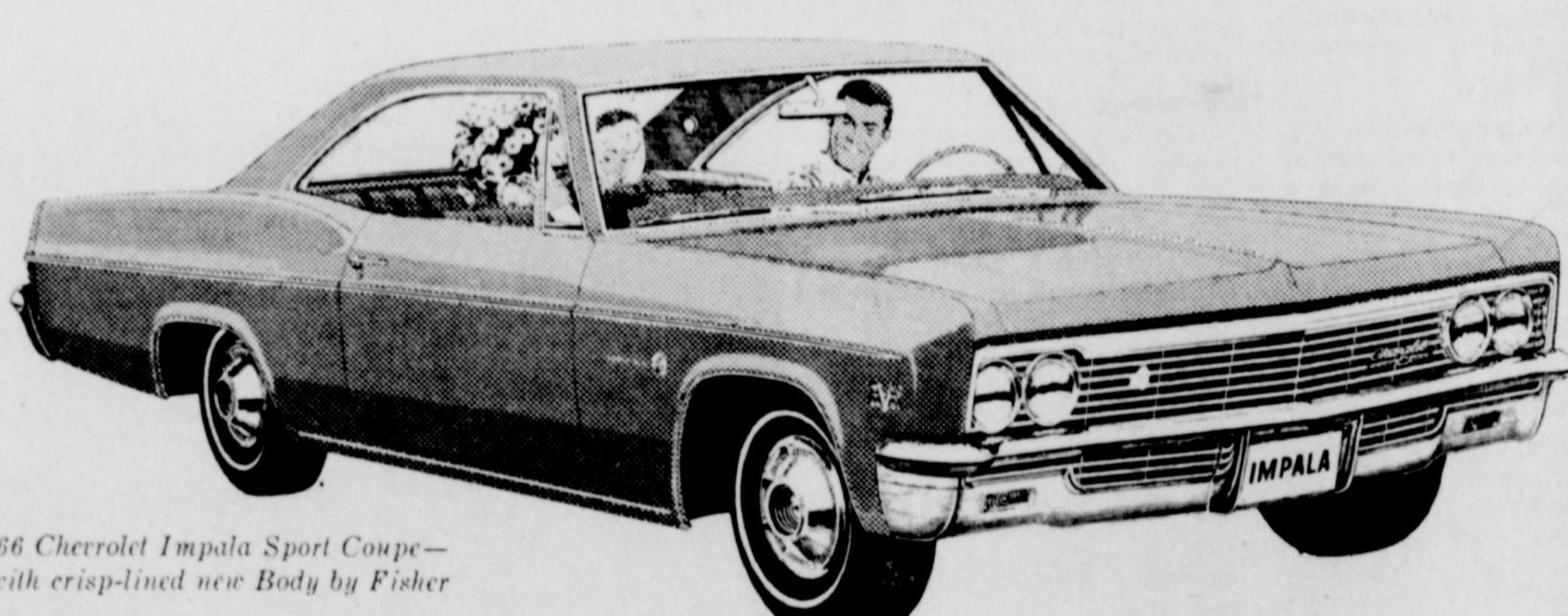

Mrs. Dishman, a former resident of Sanderson, is the mother of Wilton Dishman.

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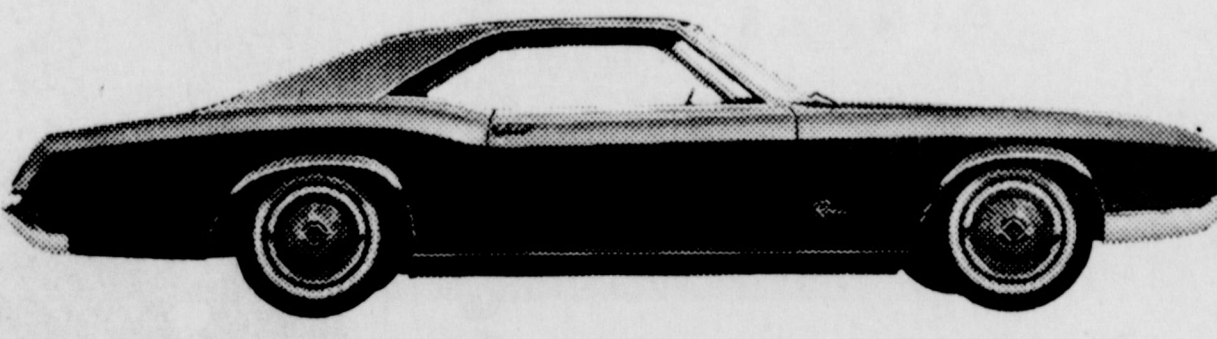
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Duplicate Club Plays Thursday At Rose Ranch
