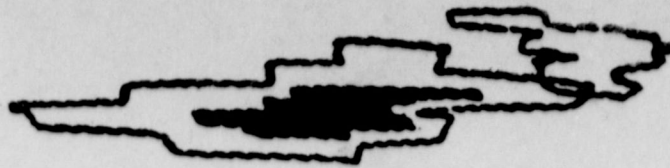

U.S. 90 Is Due Reconstruction In Val Verde

According to information released Tuesday of last week, U. S. Highway 90 is due some reconstruction work in Val Verde County next year.

Proposed reconstruction includes:

From 6.4 miles west of Shumla west to 2.5 miles west of Langtry, 6.9 miles total.

From 2.5 miles west of Langtry to Terrell County line, 11.4 miles.

The 17 miles of reconstruction included grading, structures, and surfacing.

This is the only work scheduled in this area, according to the information received.

Deer Hunting Begins Saturday

Deer hunting west of the Pecos River begins Saturday of this week.

With Thanksgiving holidays just preceding the beginning of the season, a large influx of hunters is expected to begin Friday.

The season runs through Sunday, December 12.

Many ranchmen of this area are leasing out hunting rights this year for the first time and a large group of hunters is expected to headquarter in Sanderson this year. The Terrell County Chamber of Commerce has been serving as a clearing house for ranchmen who are wanting to lease out their country for hunting and a good return has been noted for the ranchmen who have blacktail deer. Some whitetail country is still available for hunting locally.

Local people who have inquiries about hunting are asked to contact Dudley Harrison who expects to have some information on blacktail leases available during the season.

'Cave Man' Sought After Burglaries Continue In Dryden

The hunt for the man who shot Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey three weeks ago is still going on in the rough country south of Dryden.

Officers from this area have used jeeps, horses, worked on foot, and used dogs in an effort to track down the man who shot the sheriff as he was investigating robberies which had occurred in the Dryden area.

Cooksey was shot as he was interviewing a Mexican who was living in a cave east of Dryden after it was learned that there was reason to believe he was a suspect for the burglaries. Cooksey is recuperating from the gunshot wounds in a Del Rio hospital.

On Thursday night, the homes of George Adams and Vic Littleton were burglarized and it is thought that the cave-dweller is responsible for those acts. The burglar took some binoculars, some canned food and some bananas from the Adams home, typical of the previous burglaries. Nothing was reported missing from the Littleton home.

A widespread search of the vicinity was conducted all day Friday with no results. Tracking is said to be most difficult because of the rock and hard terrain.

Explorers To Sponsor Dance

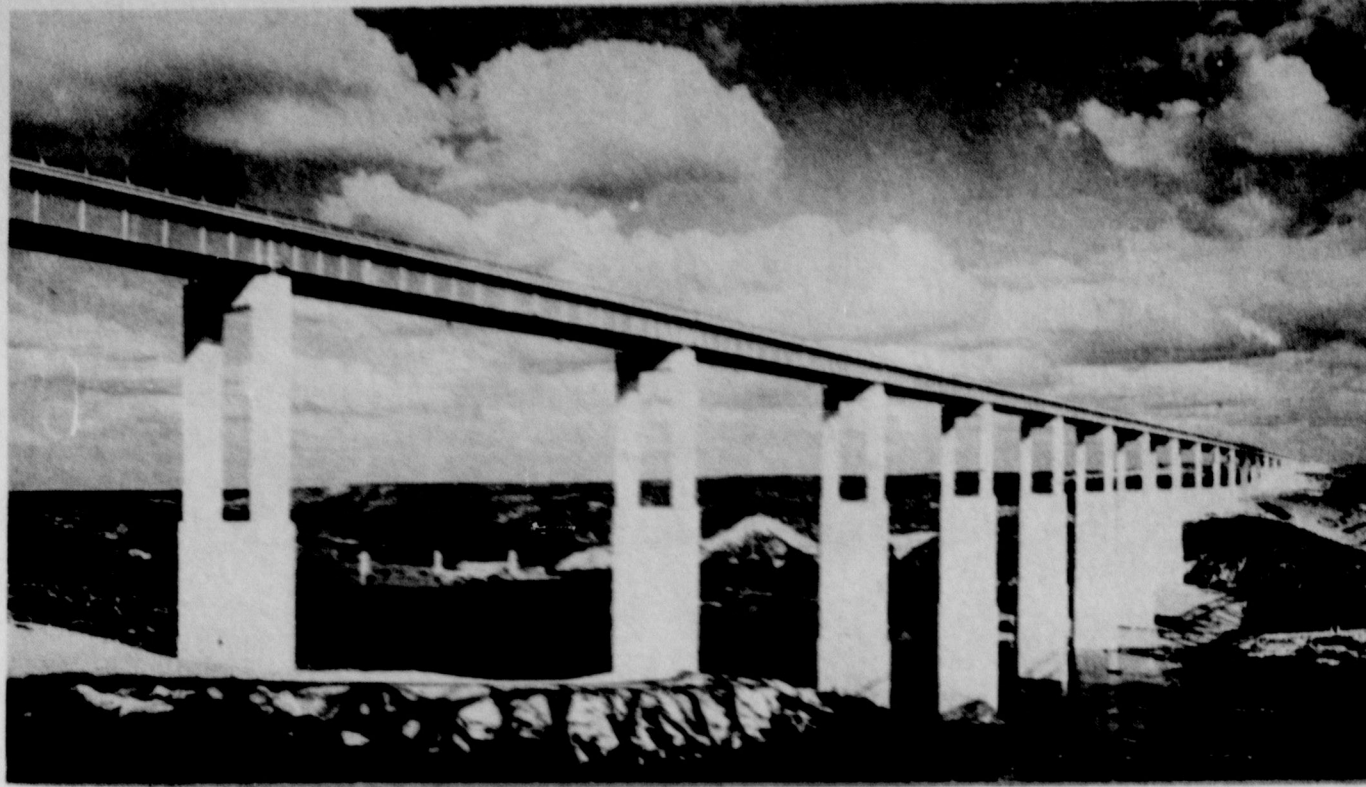
The Explorer Scouts are sponsoring a public dance on Saturday, November 27, in the Sanderson Wool Commission Company building from 8 to 12 p. m.

Medical-Economic SURVEY

SUBJECT COMMUNITY: SANDERSON, TEXAS

The purpose of this survey is to evaluate the community and its trading area as to medical habits, economic potential and ability to support a doctor.

Population Composition

Sanderson is in the southwestern part of Texas, 64 miles south of Fort Stockton. The principal economies are ranching, employment with the railroad, and tourist trade. The religious denominations consist of Presbyterian, Methodist, Baptist, Church of Christ and Catholic.

7.8% of the population is over 60
27.5% of the population is between 40 and 59
21.5% of the population is between 21 and 39
43.2% of the population is under 21.

Hospitalization

In the last 12 months, 14.6% of the people in Sanderson and vicinity were hospitalized. These people visited hospitals in the following towns:

Our survey breaks down the causes for hospitalization into the following categories:

Sickness in the Area

In the last 12 months, there was an estimated 7,836 separate illnesses which necessitated 7,517 individual visits to the doctor. This means that approximately 25 patients a day visited doctors in the following towns:

Distance Traveled

In order to visit out-of-town doctors, Sanderson patients traveled collectively 1,367,000 miles round trip annually. This amounts to a daily round trip distance of 4,500 miles or approximately the same as driving from Sanderson, Texas, to New York City and return every day.

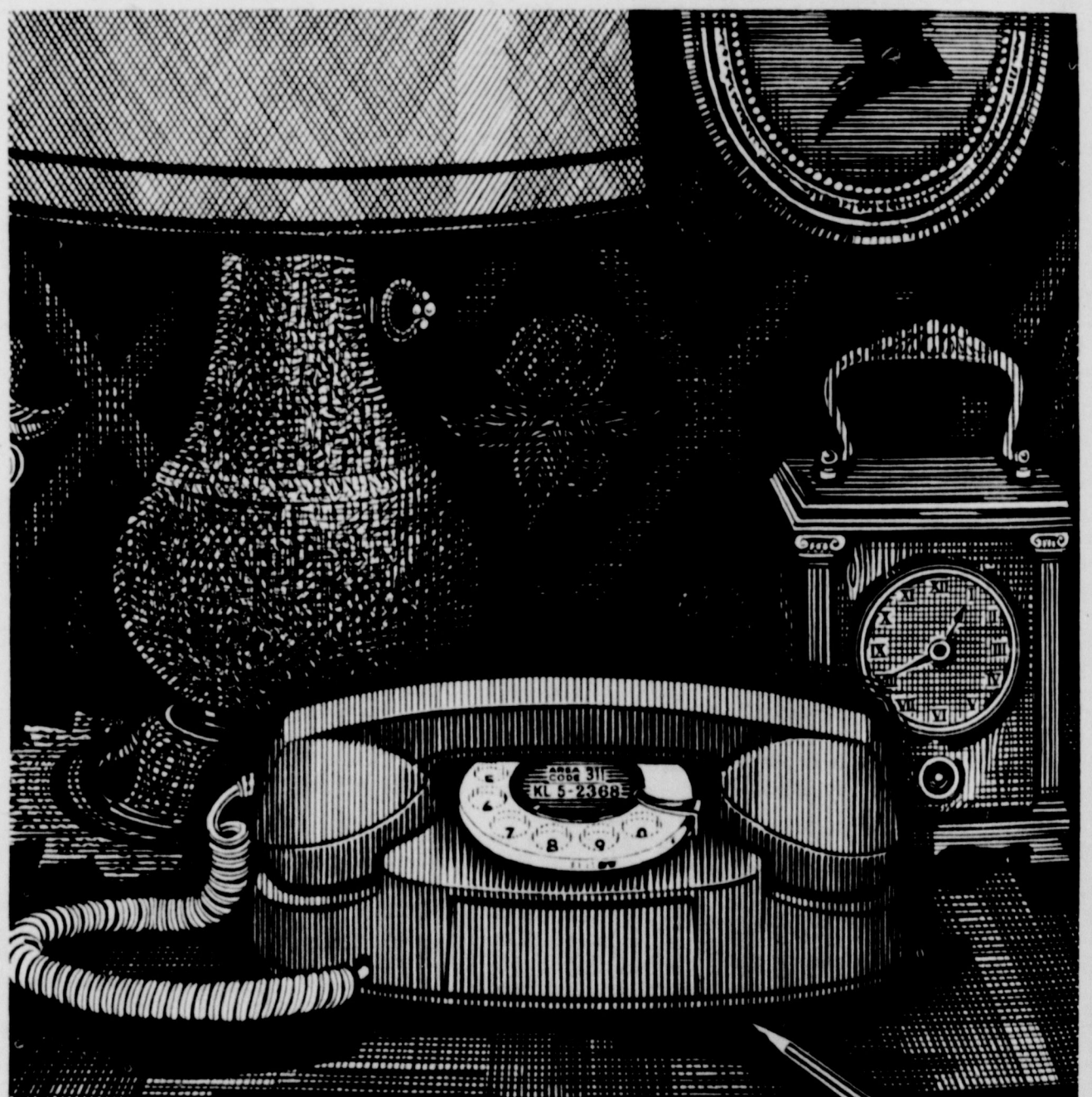

This year more than 200,000 deer will be killed on private lands in Texas and based on 1964 records, landowners will receive approximately \$12 million for leasing hunting and fishing rights.

Extension specialists in wildlife conservation at Texas A&M encourage hunters to consider some basic relations with the landowner to avoid friction for not only this but future seasons.

The hunter should realize that it costs money to produce game or fish and therefore should be appreciative of the part the landowner has had in providing the game.

The sportsman should develop a written lease with the landowner to include such things as rate and date of payment; time limits or duration of lease; boundaries of the lease area; the kinds of game or fish included; names of individuals or families in the lease; guest privileges; associated activities such as fishing, camping, picnicking, etc.; and the use and maintenance of any cabin or shelter included in the lease.

Showing respect for the owner's property is one way to lessen friction. Leaving gates just as they are found and asking about the location and type of livestock in the leased area will improve the hunter-landowner relation.

Wounded game should be followed and the landowner's suggestions, if wounded game crosses a fence, should be obeyed. It is best to avoid hunting near boundary or fence lines.

The hunter should know his gun and ammunition and have the gun "sighted-in" at all times. Use gun and ammunition that is adequate for the purpose. Always make sure of the target and background that it is legal game and not domestic livestock or another hunter.

Obey all game and fish laws and keep the place you camp and hunt clean at all times.

Finally, getting to know the landowner and respecting his wishes are essential to the best hunter-landowner relationship.

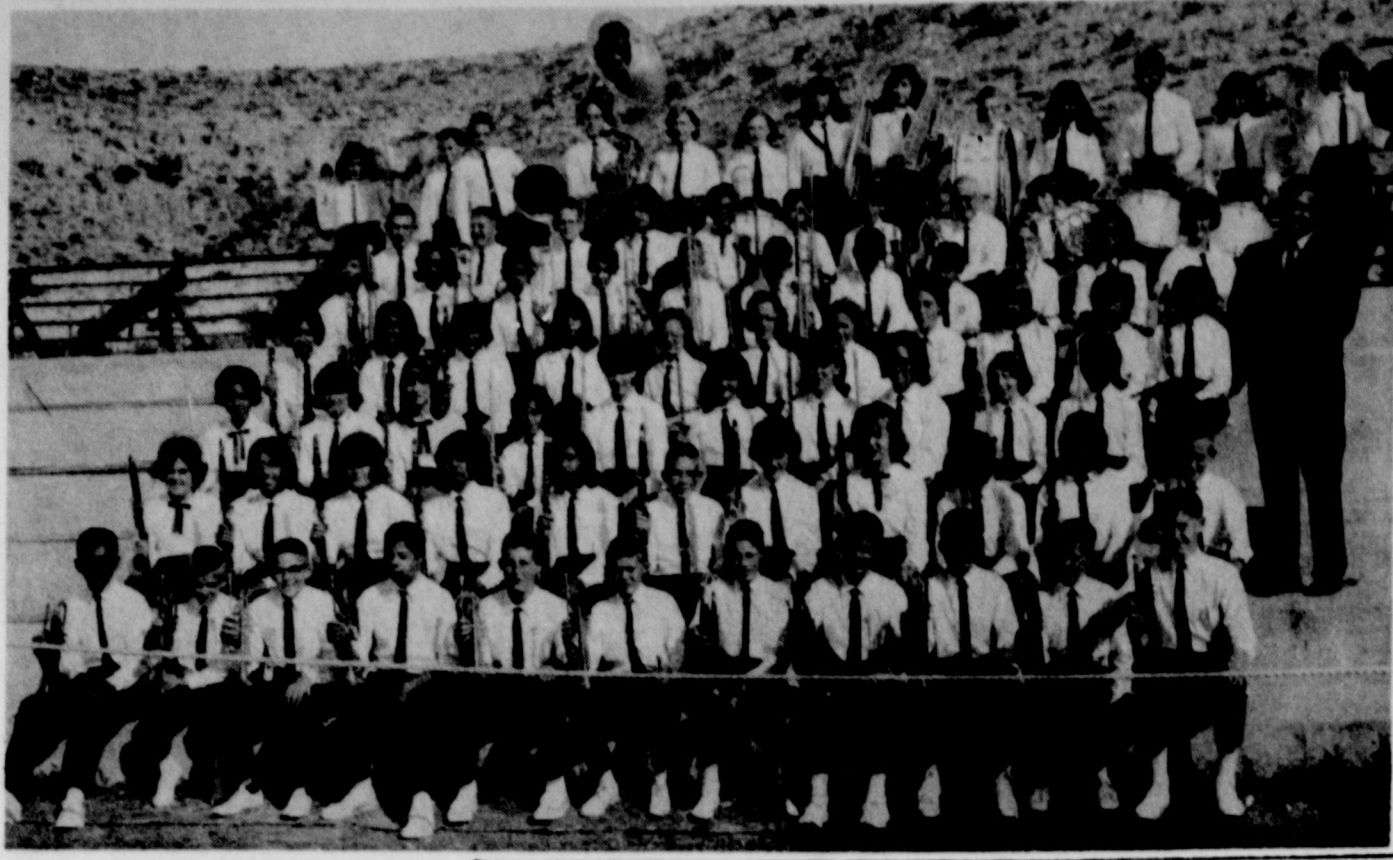

Mailing Early Means Success

"Last Christmas the post office handled more mail than ever before, yet the operation was the most efficient in history," Postmaster J. R. Hodgkins said this week.

"Nationally about 99 per cent of the Christmas mail reached its destination before Christmas Eve," he said.

Zip Code use and the cooperation of the public in mailing early were the main reasons for our success. With the same or better cooperation this year, we expect to handle an even greater volume of mail with less effort than during the 1964 Christmas rush.

Mr. Hodgkins had advice to give which would help mailers prepare for the upcoming mailing season:

1. Up-date last year's address list and include Zip Codes. A book has been placed in the service lobby of the post office for obtaining Zip Codes for all addresses in the United States.

2. Prepare a gift list as soon as possible. Shop early to take advantage of full stocks and get enough boxes, tape, wrapping paper, etc.

3. Use first-class postage on a card to insure its being forwarded if the recipient has moved or to insure its return if undeliverable for any reason.

The postmaster emphasized again this year that poor wrappings on a package are the major cause of parcel post damage.

S. N. Clyde Whistler Jr. Applies for Invention Patent

Clyde L. Whistler Jr., S. N. of the U. S. Navy, has made formal application to the Patent Office in Washington, D. C., for a patent on an oxygen control apparatus for dual gas, a diver's breathing apparatus.

The primary object of this invention is to provide breathing apparatus wherein the oxygen flow is closely controlled by a simple valve unit in direct response to water pressure and with a safe pre-set regulation to assure the correct proportions of oxygen and filler gas.

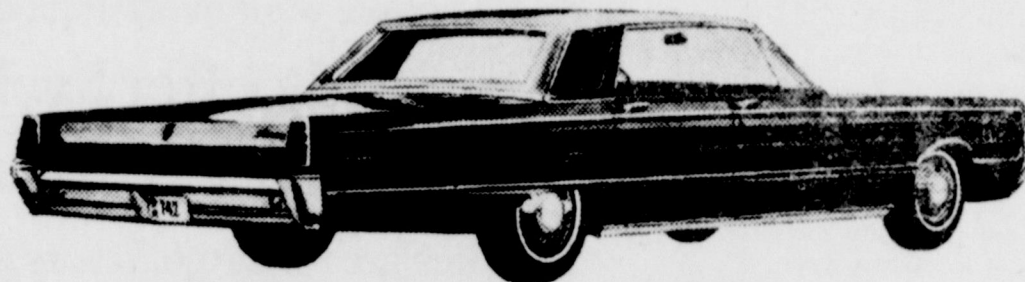

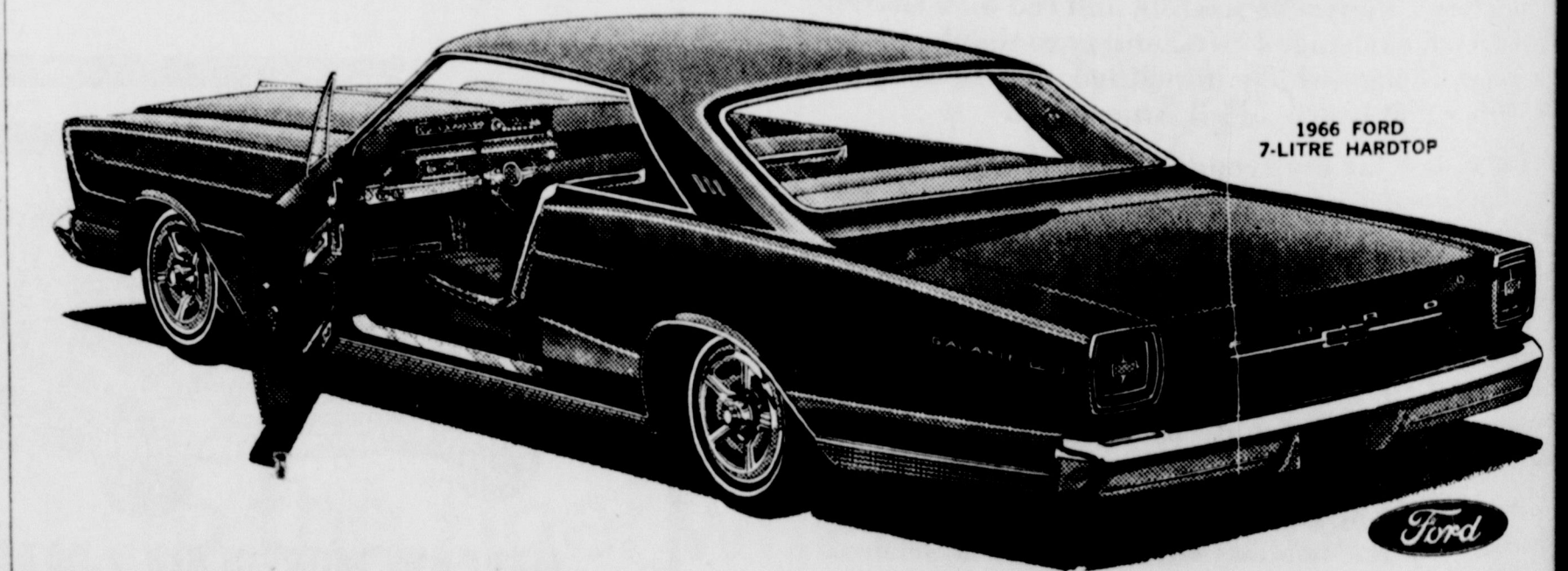
