The word is out on him, as it was on Billy Sol Estes, that there were many people in Washington who hoped that there was not too much of an investigation about his activities, as some of them might become implicated and it could lead to some embarrassing situations for some of them.

We don't know who all he was friendly with, but his two children are named Linda and Lyndon.

As usual, it doesn't take long for rumors to spread in Sanderson and some of those going by lately are real good. From petitions to politics and back is the subject that is now making the rounds.

It would be well to check out some of these rumors before you believe any of them. Some of them are pretty wild.

The much-talked about Code of Criminal Procedure went into effect on January 1st and it has not caused a great deal of difference in anything more than an additional expense to the county for forms, books, etc., to take care of the changes.

One of the good things about the new CCP is that it abolishes the fee system for JPs, Judges, County Attorneys, Constables, etc.

All of the local officials who have anything to do with the new CCP have gone off to seminars, meetings, and otherwise tried to be "up" on the changes as they affect each individual office.

We learned last weekend that there was some vandalism to the school property over the holidays at the football field and at high school building.

Every adult in the county has the obligation to be anxious to see this stopped. It is a waste of money and the waste of morals and possibly the waste of some lad's character for it to be permitted to continue.

Within the next few days each house in Sanderson will receive a letter from the local Volunteer Fire Department. The letter is self-explanatory and pretty simple in its request—50¢ per month from each householder to maintain the fire department.

Now, before reading any further some will say, "Yes, but I'm paying as much as so-and-so and I don't even own the house I live in."

Maybe you are asked to pay as much as some person who owns 3 houses or 5.

But is fire protection for your belongings worth 50¢ a month? Or is it worth 50¢ a month for you and your friends to have fire protection?

This emergency equipment is a lot like all other emergency equipment. When you need it, you need it badly.

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Senator Dorsey B. Hardeman ... seeks re-election

State Sen. Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo has announced his candidacy for re-election in the 25th Senatorial District which now includes 21-counties.

"I am grateful to the people for their confidence and respectfully ask their support," Senator Hardeman said. "My record in office has been predicated on a deep and abiding respect for the principles of our Constitution. It has been my purpose to help maintain a sound, responsive state government and to handle all legislation of local interest with dispatch. This I will continue to do."

Elect ed to a four-year Senate term two years ago, Hardeman is running for re-election in 1966 as a result of the redistricting law enacted by the last Legislature which re-aligned the state's senatorial districts to comply with the U.S. Supreme Court's "one man, one vote" decision.

The 25th District includes 15 of its previous 20 counties: Brewster, Crane, Crockett, Edwards, Irion, Jeff Davis, Pecos, Presidio, Reagan, Schleicher, Sutton, Terrell, Tom Green, Upton and Val Verde. The six counties of Ector, Kinney, Loving, Midland, Reeves and Uvalde were added to make up the new 21-county district.

## Poll Taxes Are Due By Jan. 31st

January 31 is the deadline for paying a poll tax for the upcoming elections in 1966 and so far there has not been a very enthusiastic response, according to Mrs. Tol Murrah, deputy tax collector.

According to the count Monday there were only 139 poll tax payments and only 14 days left in which to pay the tax.

Those eligible for exemptions are those who have reached their 60th birthday before January 1, and those who have had their 21st birthday after January 1st of last year. Exemption certificates are necessary here for the 21-year-olds, but not for the over-60s, as the population of Terrell County is under 10,000.

## County Ranchers Qualify For Emergency Feed

The Times was advised by Congressman Richard C. White Monday morning that the Department of Agriculture had placed Terrell County among others in the state eligible for emergency feed for 1966.

The program makes available government-owned feed to the ranchmen at a cheaper price than available elsewhere, Cong. White stated. He said that feed for all dairy cattle, sheep, and goats would be available at 75% of the support price and all other feed at the support price.

Applications for the feed or information about the program are available at County ASC offices, White stated.

## Fire Department Asks 50¢ Month For Maintenance

The Sanderson Volunteer Fire Department is putting letters in the mail in the next few days to every householder in Sanderson asking for cooperation in a new method of raising money for the maintenance of the department and the possibility of purchasing a new truck sometime in the future.

The letter explains that both the trucks now in operation are more than 20 years old and that since the purchase of the second truck right after WWII, the only equipment that has been bought is new hose, nozzles, extinguishers, etc.

The letter states that the directors of the Terrell County Water Control and Improvement District #1 approved the addition of a 50¢ per month charge to be added to each water bill and collected by them and turned in to the fire department for its maintenance.

This plan is now used in the collection of "sanitation" fees and has proven to be very satisfactory, according to reports.

The payment, is was pointed out by the fire department officers, was not mandatory, but it would be appreciated and used as wisely as was possible in furnishing the needs of the organization.

The directors of the fire department are: Carlton White, S. D. Harrison, and Greene Cooke.

# Medicare Insurance Plan

## SOME OTHER IMPORTANT CHANGES IN THE SOCIAL SECURITY ACT

(In addition to Medicare, the new law makes several important changes in the basic Social Security and public assistance programs. Some of these changes are described here.)

**How Much Are Monthly Cash Benefits Increased And When Do They Start?** Monthly cash benefits are increased 7% a month, across-the-board, with a minimum increase of \$4. The increase is retroactive to January 1, 1965. The minimum for a retired single worker now over 65 will be \$44 a month, up to a maximum of \$135.90. For a retired worker and his spouse, the new minimum would be \$66 a month and the new maximum \$203.85.

**How Does The New Law Liberalize The So-Called "Earnings Ceiling"?** Effective January 1, 1966, you will be able to earn up to \$1,500 a year without any loss of benefits.

**What About Early Retirement?** Under the new law, a widow may elect to receive a reduced benefit at age 60, instead of 62 as in the past.

**How Have Survivor's Benefits Been Changed?** It continues payment of benefits for a surviving child up to age 22 if he is a full-time student in an accredited school. This benefit is retroactive to January 1, 1965.

**Are Self-Employed Doctors Covered Under The New Law?** Yes, for taxable years ending on or after December 31, 1965. This is an improvement I have been advocating for years.

**Does The New Law Change The Kerr-Mills (Medical Assistance To The Aging) Program?** Yes. The new law makes several important improvements in the Kerr Mills program, but action by the State Government is required before they become effective.

The new law establishes a single and separate medical care program for the needy, extending the ad-

vantages of an expanded program, not only to the aged who are indigent, but also to needy individuals who are on the aid-to-dependent children (ADC), blind, and totally and permanently disabled programs, financed in large part by Federal matching funds. Other medically needy children also may be included.

Many of the improvements in the Kerr-Mills program adopted by the Congress have been advocated for several years by the Special Senate Committee on Aging on which I serve.

## Final Income Tax Installment Due

Deadline for paying the final installment on estimated income tax returns for 1965 is Monday, January 17, 1966, C. E. Mangelsdorf, administrative officer of Internal Revenue Service in Pecos, reminded taxpayers today.

"If you have previously filed an estimated return and events occurring in the last quarter of 1965 indicate that your income will be substantially more or less than your original estimate, you should file an amended declaration by January 17," he said.

This declaration should be marked "amended" and filed with the same District of Internal Revenue who received the original declaration. A blank amended declaration is printed on the back of the notice of payment due which the taxpayer received by mail.

An original declaration of estimated tax for the year 1965 should be filed by January 17 on Form 1040ES by taxpayers who first became liable for filing an estimate during the fourth quarter of 1965.


There's one exception to these rules! If the taxpayer finds it necessary to file an amended declaration on January 17, or if he becomes liable for filing a declaration for the first time on January 17, he need not file or pay on that date if he files his final return for 1965 and pays in full the balance of tax he owes on or before January 31, 1966.

Many questions about your estimate or your tax return can be answered by telephoning the local IRS office.

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**Social Security Amendments**

The Social Security Amendments of 1965 made several major changes in the social security disability program.

The most important of these is a change in the definition of "disability" under the social security law. Under the new definition, you can be eligible for monthly benefits if you have a disabling condition which has lasted or is expected to last at least 12 calendar months.

Under the "old law" you could get disability benefits only if you had a disability which prevented you from doing any substantial gainful work, and the disabling condition was expected to last indefinitely.

But the new law now states that the illness or injury must have lasted or be expected to last only 12 calendar months or longer. Only people who cannot do any substan-

tial gainful work can receive benefits.

However, two important disability provisions were not changed by the 1965 amendments. A person can receive benefits only if he has social security credit for at least 5 years of work in the 10-year period just before he became disabled. And, cash benefits do not begin until after the first 6 full months a person is disabled.

There are a number of other significant changes in the disability

provisions of the social security law. These are explained in pamphlet No. 8, available free at your social security office in Odessa, telephone numbers FE 2-9423 or LO 3-0027. The office is open Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., and for a limited time, on Saturdays, from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.

### Beautification Survey Due For Texas Highways

AUSTIN--Texas second phase of Texas' initial plan of compliance with the recently-enacted Federal Highway Beautification Act will get under way Monday (January 3) when field parties from the Texas Highway Department begin the actual count for inventories of billboards and junkyards along Texas highways.

The act, as approved by Congress and signed into law by the President, envisions the control of billboards and junkyards and scenic enhancement along the nation's federal-aid highway systems.

In Texas this will cover more than 3,000 miles of Interstate highway system and more than 14,500 miles of the primary system.

The Texas inventories were ordered last month by State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer.

At that time Greer said information obtained in the inventories will be used in studies that will be made relative to possible state legislation to implement the provision of the act, including the zoning of industrial and commercial areas along the State highway system.

A Highway Department spokesman said May 15, 1966, has been set as a target date for

completion of the inventories. The Highway Department field parties will travel over every mile of federal-aid highways in Texas gathering information for the inventories.

The number of junkyard in the state is considerably smaller than that of billboards.

On billboards, Highway Department personnel will record such information as size, ownership, subject displayed and location.

The signs will be classified as in rural, industrial or commercial areas.

Signs directly related to the property on which they are located, such as "for sale" signs, will not be surveyed.

The first project in Texas' plan of action under the Federal act was launched earlier this month when the Texas Highway Commission approved plans for the first landscape planting project to be financed in Texas under the act.

This project is to be on section of Interstate Highway 45 adjacent to the downtown business district of Houston.

The Federal act calls for an expanded program of landscaping and scenic enhancement.

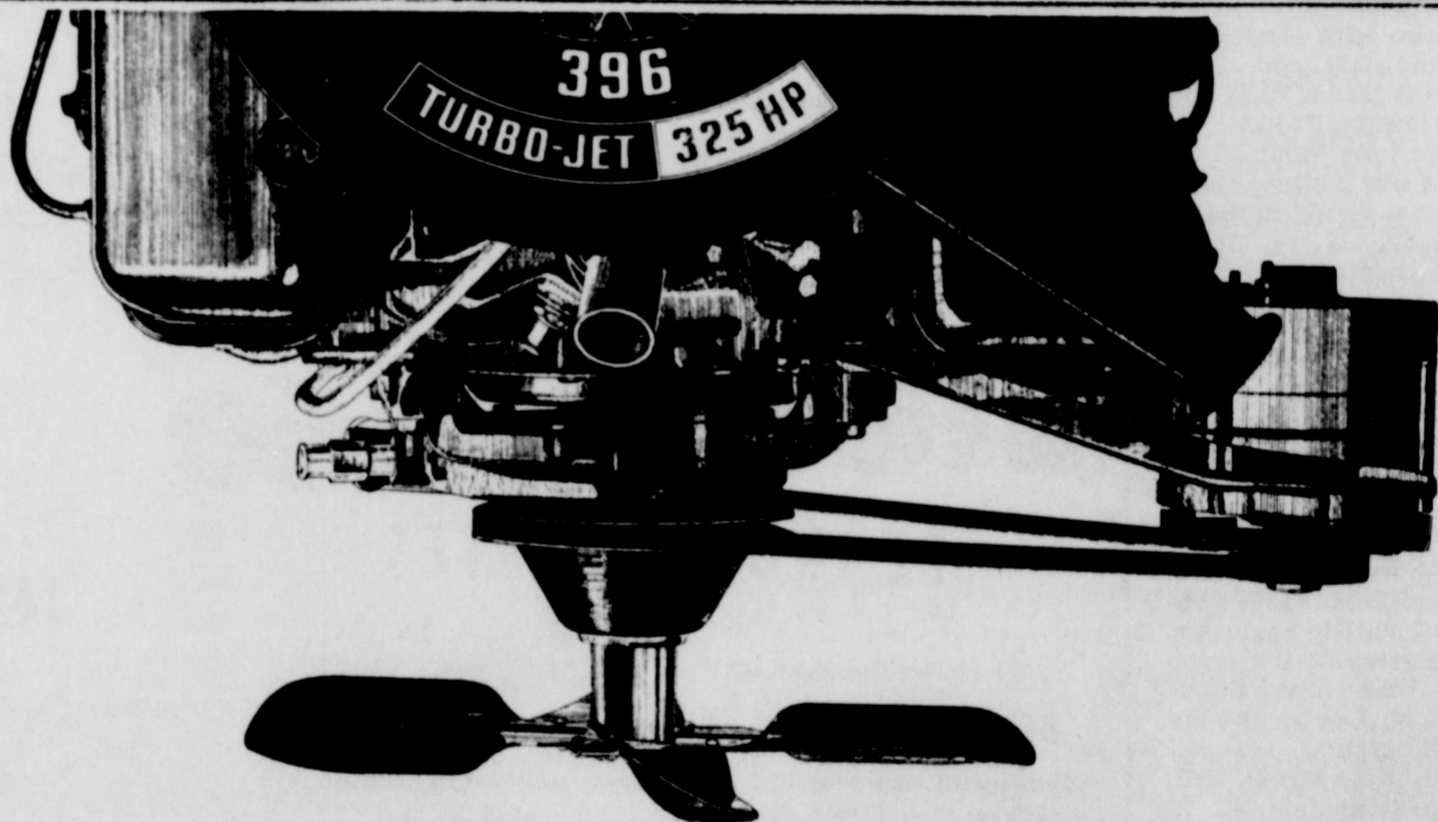

### Boat Registration Due March 31

More than 200,000 motorboats are subject to registration by April 1 under Texas new Water Safety Act, so warns State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer.

Present certificates expire on March 31.

New law authorizes the motor vehicle division of the Texas Highway Department to issue certificates for boats operating in state waters. Same division handles license and title procedures for autos.

Renewal notices covering boats already registered now are being mailed out, along with a brochure outlining the Water Safety Act. Under its provisions, state game wardens now have full authority, for the first time, to enforce water safety statutes.

New registrations will cover a two-year period. Fees range from \$3 for boats less than 16 feet long, to \$12 for those 40 feet and larger.

Safety equipment requirements include lighting, horns, bells, fire extinguishers and flame arresters. Also required are rear view mirrors on boats towing skiers.

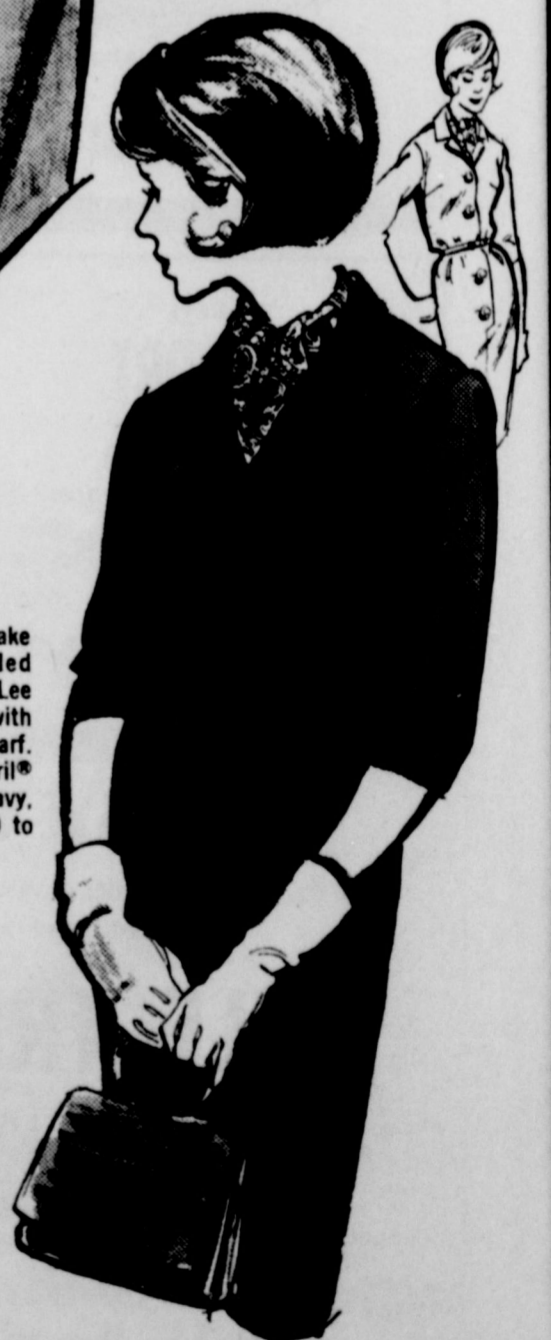
