The sheetrock partitions are being torn out and other damaged portions are being repaired so that some possible use of the building may be made.

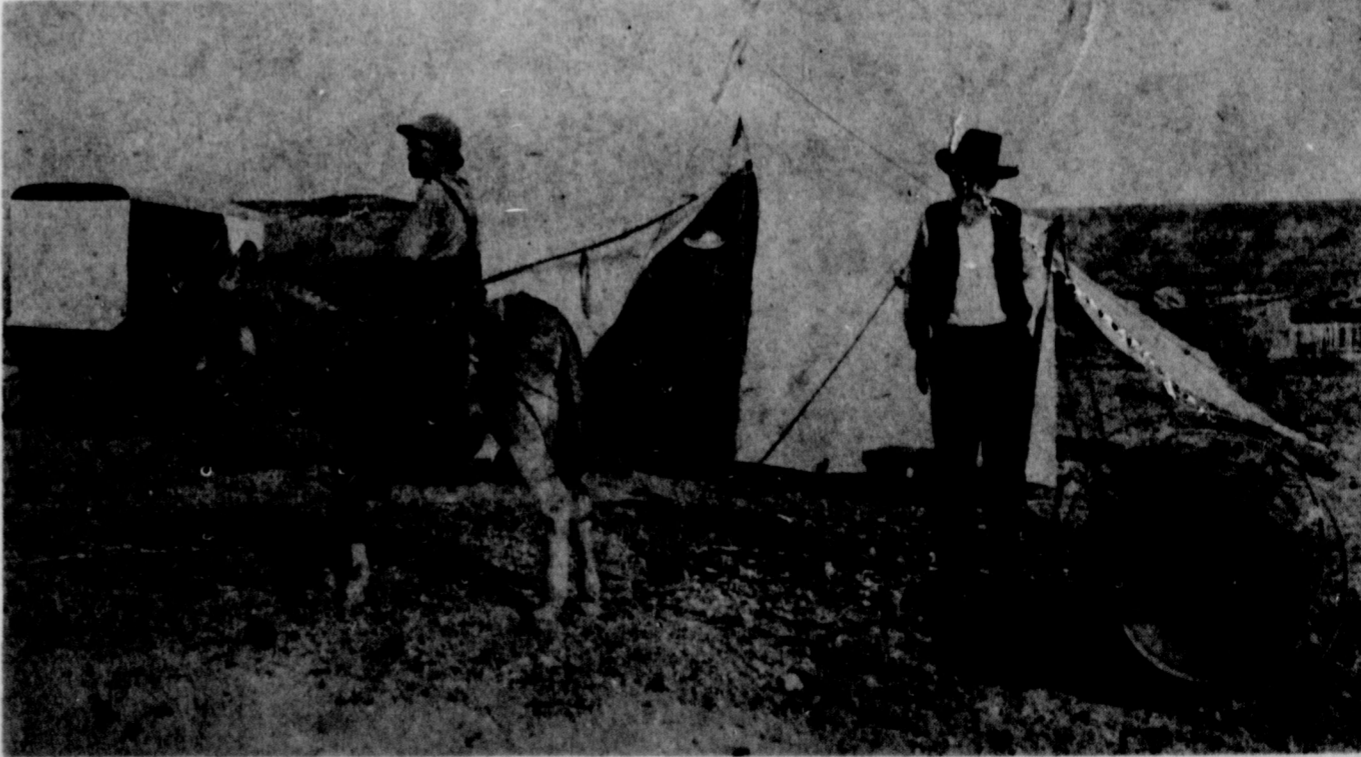
Ruel Adams Seeks Clerk Re-Election

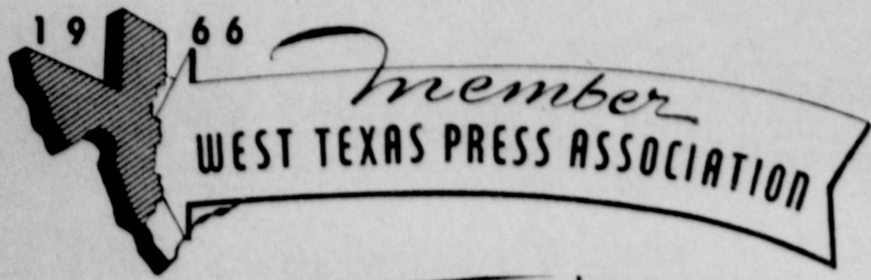
Ruel Adams, county clerk, is seeking re-election to that post again this year, subject to action of the Democratic Primary on May 7.

Also present were Mmes A. D. Brown, J. C. Hancock, Othie Lloyd, James Word, D. L. Duke, and Ernest Couch.

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

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Bonhomie Club Meets In Home Mrs. L. R. Hall
