## LISTEN TO LUKE

The medical center committees have been named and the project is getting off to a running start. That information is printed in other columns of The Times.

Mrs. Clyde Higgins made a tentative promise of the Legion Auxiliary's donation or loan of at least \$500; Mrs. A. J. Hahn stated that the TB Assn. would probably be in a position to lend \$1,000.

This kind of enthusiasm and ability is the thing that is going to put the project over in good order.

In a weeklies this week we noticed two different ones had editorials of a similar nature and both were completely within our school of thought. It is this kind of effort that may put people to think and avoid what many feel is an inescapable trap that will lead to destruction.

We are taking the liberty of using the one printed in The Fort Stockton Pioneer, to which we say "Amen and Amen".

"The present emphasis on federal assistance to local communities in solving their many problems--and in some cases in adding the whipped cream and red cherry on the top--reminds us of the principle of the quail trap.

"The bait is there--a clear trail of benefits, almost free for the asking. A little trouble and initiative is necessary, along with certain preliminary applications. From that point on, much of the planning even can be done with federal grants.

"The project is ready. The funds are obtained in part as an outright grant and the rest as a long-time loan at low interest rates -- or in some instances by locally issued bonds sold in the open market.

"The project gets built and life is wonderful. The community has a facility of which to be proud, important to its future growth and beneficial to health and economy. It begins the payoff.

"And what's so bad about this wonderful new type of help from heaven? Nothing, except that the community has been tied to federal controls along with the help, has taken on obligations to conduct local affairs in the old and pattern prescribed by theorists in the nation's capitol, and -- most important of all -- has surrendered its independence and community responsibility, and in future situations which are difficult to solve, is inclined to think primarily in terms of federal aid funds, rather than relying on local resources.

"The quail are trapped, alive and unhurt. But the trap is none the less real or confining -- and freedom no longer has its full meaning. In spite of ourselves, we become subjects of and dependent upon a powerful central government, kindly and well-intentioned though it may be."

## Incentive Checks Of \$225,164.47 Are Paid Ranchers

Incentive payment to Terrell County sheep and goat raisers under the national wool program were made Monday totaling \$225,164.47, according to E. E. Harkins, chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee.

Payments on wool of \$151,714.56 went to 86 wool growers. In addition, one cent per pound was withheld as a self-help promotion deduction to be used by the National Wool Growers Council for advertising wool, and for research in improving wool and its uses. This promotion deduction was \$10,646.61.

Payments on unshorn lambs were made to 67 producers in the amount of \$27,584.60 to compensate them for leaving the wool on the lambs when selling. The promotion deduction of 5¢ per cwt came to \$2,507.60.

Seventy-one producers received \$32,711.10 for their mohair. There is no promotion deduction on mohair.

The payments on wool and mohair represent the percentage necessary to bring the producers' sales returns up to an announced support level.

The wool payment program was first authorized by the National Wool Act of 1954. It was extended by the Food and Agriculture Act of 1965 to cover marketings through December 31, 1969. There is a continuing need for growers to keep a complete record of their sales of wool, lambs, and mohair. The 1966 support price for wool is 65¢ and for mohair is 75.8¢.

## Committees Named To Head Project For Trans-Terrell Medical Center Push

The heads of the four sub-committees for the local medical center project were named last Thursday night at the meeting of the general committee.

The nominations of the executive committee were read and as they were read they were accepted by a unanimous vote of the general committee present.

The committee heads are: S. D. Harrison, Jolly Harkins, Rev. J. C. Hancock, fund raising; Bill Smith, Edward Kerr, Mrs. J. M. Davis, building; M. W. Duncan, Herbert Brown, Mrs. David Mitchell, doctor procurement; J. A. Gilbreath, Mrs. Carlos Dunn, publicity.

The group voted to name the facility Trans-Terrell Medical Center. Other suggested names were Sanderson Medical Center and Terrell County Medical Center.

It was also voted to form a non-profit corporation and the group elected the existing executive committee as the directors of the corporation. A minimum contribution or loan of \$25 was chosen to designate a voting member, and each member allowed only one vote, voting being also restricted to persons 21 years of age and over.

The directors of the non-profit corporation are Sid Harkins, Jack Hayre, Troy Druse, R. S. Wilkinson, and Darwin Schrader.

Prior to the naming of the committee heads, Mr. Hayre told the group of the things the executive committee learned on the trip to Dell City Monday of last week to investigate and look at the Sears-Roebuck Foundation planned medical center there.

He explained that all of the people there were well-pleased with the help and cooperation given by the Foundation in the construction of the facility there.

Harkins asked the continued cooperation of the group in all phases of the project and stated that it was this kind of cooperation that would make the project a success, as was the case also in Dell City.

Balloting was light in the vote Saturday for trustees of the Terrell County Independent School District and county trustees.

Carlos Dunn was re-elected to the school post and W. E. Ten Eyck was elected to fill the vacancy created by L. W. Welch.

An Easter Sunrise Service is scheduled for Sunday morning at the elementary school at 6:30.

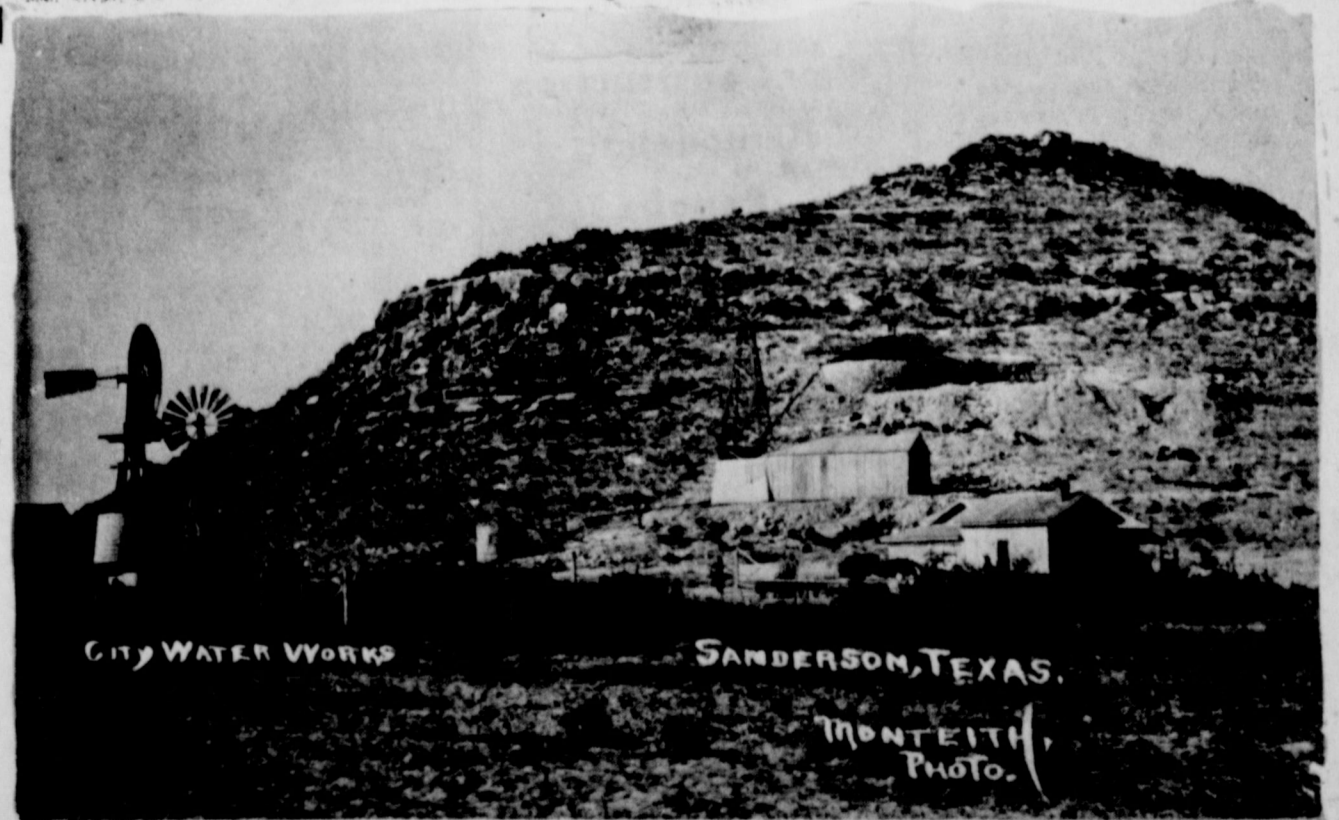
Rev. J. C. Hancock, pastor of the First Baptist Church, will deliver the sermon and there will be special music by the community choir.

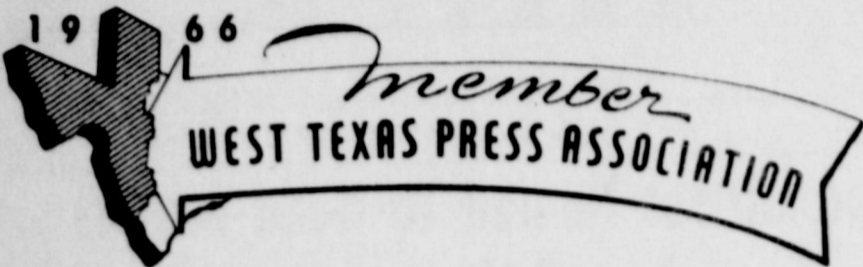

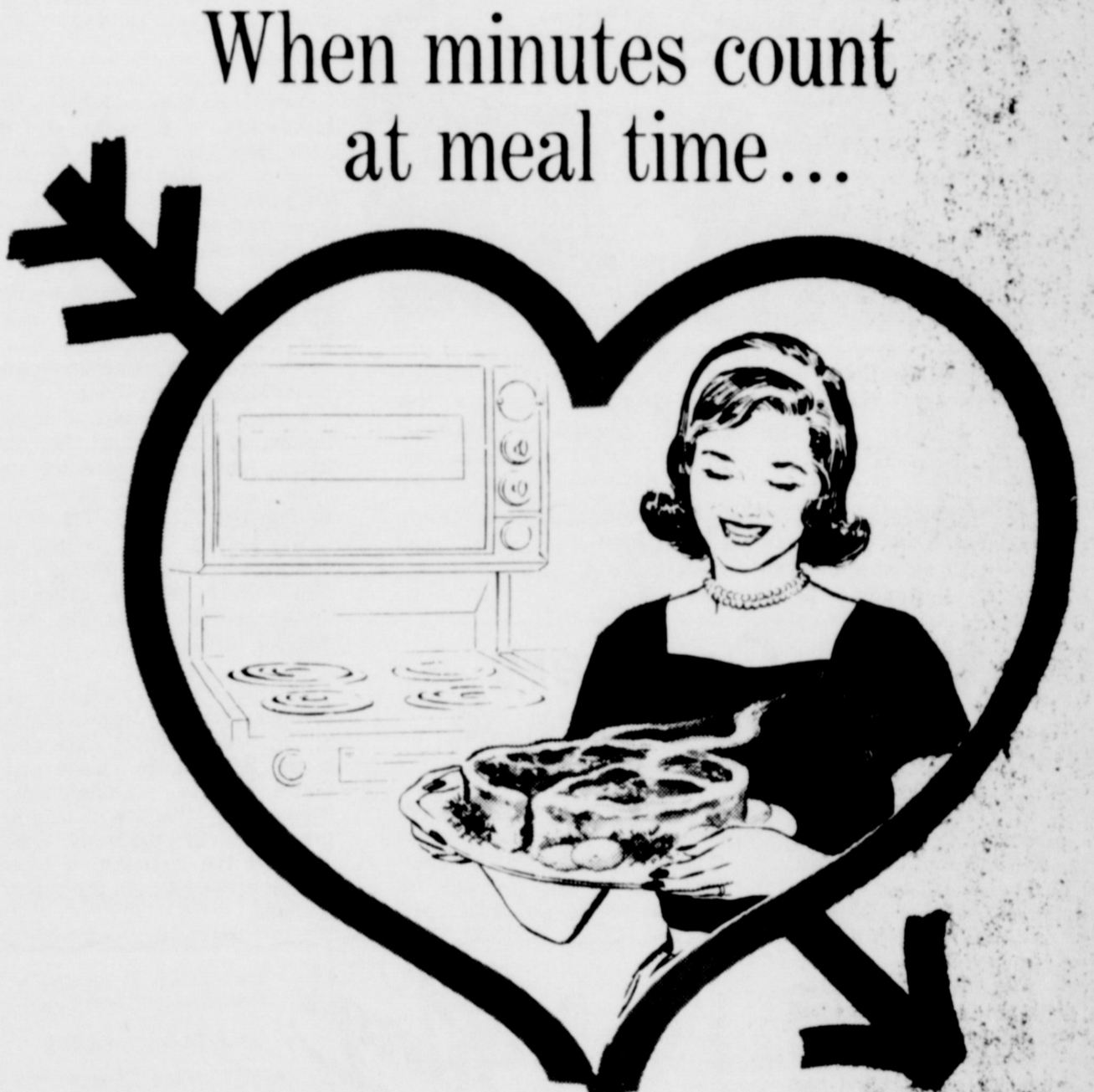

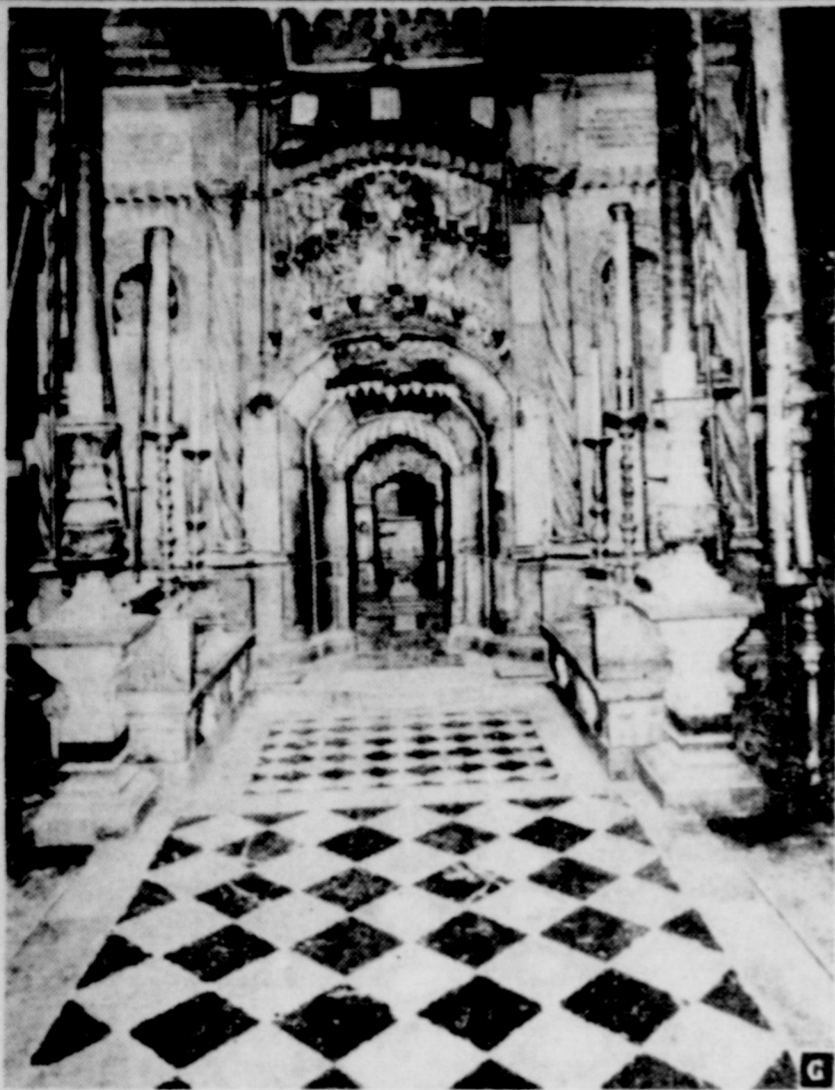

The eyes of the world will again be on Old Jerusalem, in Jordan, this Easter as more and more of the 200 million Christians in North America fulfill a lifelong dream to visit the Holy Land.

Easter ceremonies in Old Jerusalem are colorful in Oriental pageantry and unforgettable in their moving solemnity. Highlights are the Maundy Thursday Washing of the Feet ceremonies, the processions along the Via Dolorosa (Way of the Cross) on Good Friday with groups of worshippers carrying heavy

wooden crosses, the Greek Orthodox Holy Fire ceremony in the Church of the Holy Sepulchre on Saturday, the colorful Abyssinian Church ceremony under the stars on Saturday night on the roof of St. Helena's Chapel, and the Protestant sunrise service early Easter morning.

One factor giving impetus to Easter pilgrimages this year is the new low 21-day round-trip excursion rate of \$535 on many airlines from New York to Old Jerusalem, enabling more Christians to visit and worship in Jerusalem at Easter.

## Big Bend Campers Must Pay Fee Now

**BIG BEND NATIONAL PARK**  
Commencing this week, all campers in the Chisos Basin and Rio Grande Village campgrounds of Big Bend National Park will be charged for the use of the facilities.

Park Supt. Perry E. Brown has announced the fee schedule approved by Secretary of the Interior Stewart L. Udall under the provisions of the Land and Water Conservation Fund Act.

The law authorizes entrance and user fees at federal recreation areas and dedicates money from those fees, plus the revenue from the sale of surplus federal real estate and the federal tax on fuel used in pleasure boats, to the purchase and development of public recreation lands and waters.

Big Bend National Park is one of more than 7,000 areas where there has been a significant federal expenditure for recreation and, consequently, where an entrance fee to campgrounds will be charged, park officials said.

Five types of permits will be available to campers in the designated campgrounds of Big Bend.

A wallet-size, \$7 "gold passport" has replaced last year's "conservation" bumper sticker. It is to be signed by the purchaser and is valid for entrance to the Big Bend Park campgrounds as well as to all designated federal recreation areas in the nation. It entitles him and all persons accompanying him in a private noncommercial vehicle to enter these areas.

Persons who plan to camp only in Big Bend over a short period of time may purchase a

blue permit good for 30 consecutive days in the two campgrounds. Like the "golden passport," it is valid for the individual or the carload of per-
