Well, the committees are as busy as a bunch of ants planning for the kick-off of the fund-raising drive for the medical center. It is interesting to see the enthusiasm that is expressed in the planning, the talk, and the predictions of those who are working with the project. This same type of enthusiasm will be reflected by the people after the drive begins if things go according to the hopes and plans of those working on the drive for funds. There are a bunch of details that need to be taken care of before the actual solicitation begins, and these details are being worked out now!

West Texas came in for a lot of publicity over the nation and the world when Mrs. Johnson visited the Big Bend National Park and Fort Davis recently. We don't expect either of the two places to ever be the same again after her visit, either. Plans have already been released for additional improvements to be made in both of the national sites. Probably the cost of the trip will be offset in interest in the park and in Fort Davis in years to come.

Secretary of Interior Udall got a chance to hear first-hand some of the gripes of ranchmen concerning the deprivation of the eagles to livestock in West Texas. Cong. Richard White, representing this district, has arranged for a hearing to be held April 19, 20, 21 in the area. Anyone who has evidence or information which would be useful in presenting the case to the Commissioner of Fish and Wildlife, is asked to contact Paul Dionne, Fort Stockton attorney, who is arranging the meetings.

Absentee voting for the Democratic Primary will begin Monday of next week. There is not a lot of opposition indicated on the ballot, but some at all levels. There have been some suggestions made on some of the late offices that certain factions are behind certain candidates and some slight mud-slinging is indicated in some of the remarks being made. We would like to think that in the election year that people of the electorate would not have to listen to a lot of tripe and would be free to elect a candidate to an office on the basis of his ability to do the job to the best interest of the people. We don't have that opportunity often, since with opposition there is always personalities. It then no longer a case of the many and detailed duties of an office and qualifications, motivation, etc., but something that usually has nothing to do with any of these that prompts a person to vote for or against a candidate.

Committees Work Toward Start of Local Fund Drive

The various committees of the Trans-Terrell Medical Center project have been at work during the past week planning the drive for funds to make the project a reality for the county. There has been meetings of the executive committee with all of the other committees and the fund raising committee has had meetings planning the ways and means of kicking off the local drive within the next few days. The lobby of the Turner Hotel has been made available for a headquarters for the drive where office personnel will work with the various details of the drive. A sign is planned for the north side of the building to keep people informed of the progress of the campaign. Workers are being selected and will be instructed in plans for the operation of the fund-seeking operation, some preliminary detail work is under way to help in keeping records of the contacts. Residents of the county may expect an intensified and sincere interest shown on the part of all of the workers on the various committees to be exemplified when the drive gets under way soon.

Good Prices Received For 1966 Wool

The Sanderson Wool Commission Co. held its first sale of the year on Thursday of last week. John T. Williams, manager of the wool warehouse, said there was nearly one-half million pounds of 1966 wool sold at the sealed-bid sale.

A total of 414,899 pounds of both 12-months and 8-months wool was sold. Prices ranged from 3 to 6 cents per grease pound over last year.

A total of 344,782 pounds of 12-month wool was sold of 376,699 pounds offered. Bids on about 31,900 pounds were rejected.

Average price paid on the 12-months fleeces was 61 to 63 cents per pound, grease basis. The prices ranged from a low of 52 cents to a high of 70 cents paid

for a reputation clip of 13,252 pounds. The clip, from the Mrs. J. M. Corder Ranch, was purchased by Nichols and Co. The wool had a real high yield, was extremely light in weight and measured up to three inches in length. Staple wools brought the better prices. Many producers has short wool in the offering.

Top buyer of 12-months wool was Prouvost, Lefebvre and Co. of Boston who took 118,810 pounds. Forte, Dupee, Sawyer Co. of Boston was second high buyer, taking 113,709 pounds. Other buyers included Nichols and Co., 82,626 pounds; J. P. Stevens Co., 22,595 pounds; and Burlington Industries, 7,042 pounds.

Top buyer of 8-months wool was Nichols. The company bought 24,958 pounds. Lobsitz Mills Inc. purchased 24,137 pounds. The total of 70,117 pounds of 8-months wool was sold at prices ranging from a low of 47 1/4 cents to a high of 58 cents per pound in the grease. Average price paid ranged from 52 to 53 1/2 cents per pound.

Other buyers of 8-months wool included Prouvost, Lefebvre and Co., 3,003 pounds, and Forte, Dupee, Sawyer, 18,019 pounds.

Buyers who were here for the sale were high in their praise of the new warehouse Williams built to replace the one that was destroyed by the flood. They said the lighting and the convenience in handling the wool made a big difference in the way the wool was displayed for the buyers.

Lions Broom Sale To Be Saturday

The broom sale, an annual event of the Sanderson Lions for the past several years, will be all day Saturday, April 16.

The Lions will offer for sale brooms, mops, and other household items door to door or from the caravan truck which will be parked at Dudley's Texaco Station. The items are all made by Texas Blind Workmen in Blind Shops or Lighthouses, non-profit organizations and proceeds from the sale will go to help blind and/or handicapped children of Texas.

The Lions are asking that anyone planning to be out of town on that day, please phone orders to 2331 or 2971.

The funds derived from the sale go toward the expenses of the summer camp at Kerrville for handicapped children. In recent years, during the winter months, the adult blind people who are being taught a trade or craft under state supervision are staying at the camp. No charges are made for the use of the living quarters, for the rooms, and the facilities used in the preparation and serving of the meals, or for the workshop. Ruel Adams stated that the local club members considered this a most worthy project and asked for the support of local residents in the broom sale.
