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One to Three Inch Rains Fall On Most of County

From one to three inches of rain has been reported from the various parts of the county during the past weekend.

Heaviest rains reported were in the north-central part of the county where the three inches of rain was reported as having fallen Sunday night. There was some rainfall in that vicinity on Saturday.

To the west of Sanderson, S. L. Stunberg reported having received four inches of rain in the two days.

A waterspout fell on the Jack Riggs ranch and he reported an inch and a half falling in 20 minutes. Heavy rains were also reported in Dryden.

Rain fell late Saturday afternoon in Sanderson and again on Sunday afternoon and night and about 1 inch of rain was reported in local gauges.

There were also some showers in the early morning Saturday.

Downie Draw and Big Canyon were both running on US 285 and traffic was stopped for a time at Downie where it was reported to be over the bridge.

Three students from Sanderson High School have earned a trip to Austin next week to compete in state competition in University Interscholastic League events.

Travis Harkins and Tommy Gray will play in boys doubles tennis and Carla Dunn will compete in journalism.

The trip to state competition is by virtue of their winning first place in the regional events in Lubbock last weekend.

In tennis, Harkins and Gray defeated a team from Idalou by 6-1, 6-1. They next played a team from Seagraves and won 6-3, 6-1.

In the finals on Saturday, they won over White Deer 6-0, 6-3, 6-2.

Carla Dunn placed first in Class A journalism by accumulating 271 points in four categories. Carla will compete at the state meet in Austin May 5 and 6.

She was first in newsstory, second in headlines, third in editorial, and third in copyreading.

Jodie Tronson, the other member of the Sanderson team, stacked up 90 points by placing second in copyreading and fifth in feature writing. The combined efforts placed Sanderson first in the regional event.

Dudley Harrison, chairman of the fund drive, introduced Rev. J. C. Hancock, who has the details of the plan. A question-and-answer period followed. Rev. Bob Moon, in charge of the details of record keeping, explained that process to the group to assure them that as accurate system as possible would be kept of all the moneys loaned or donated to the fund. 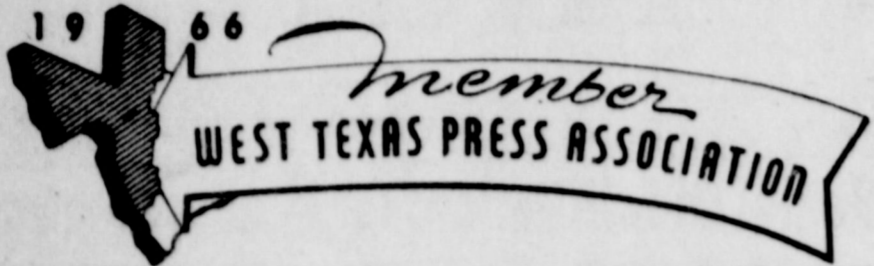

**Sen. Hardeman
Visits Sanderson**

State Senator Dorsey Hardeman of San Angelo was in Sanderson Tuesday morning and spoke to a group of local citizens at the Oasis Restaurant during a period of doughnuts and coffee.

Senator Hardeman is a candidate for re-election in this district. He is chairman of the finance committee of the Senate and holds several other important committee appointments.

Sen. Hardeman spoke of several bits of legislation both passed and pending and gave his views on those issues.

He mentioned that one item that should be of particular interest to the people here should be the increase in tourists due to the recent visit of Mrs. Lyndon Johnson to the Big Bend National Park and Fort Davis and the proposed visit of President Johnson to the Park and to visit with the President of Mexico, Diaz Ortiz.

Hardeman also stated that he has been, and will be opposed to any state income tax. He said that the increase in industry in Texas and the increase in the business economy of the state, along with the increase in business generally, seemed to point to the lack of any need of a new tax measure in the coming session. He stated that there was also a known surplus in the general fund.

Sen. Hardeman lauded the increase in interest in education in the state and said that he was hopeful that the teachers' salaries would be increased next session to equal or surpass the national average.

About 40 were on hand for the impromptu and informal visit.

**Letter Proves
Dam Priority**

The letter from the State Soil and Water Conservation Board to County Judge R. S. Wilkinson is printed for the information and interest of our readers. The letter is the one mentioned last week designating the priority for the flood control dams on Sanderson Canyon.

"This is to confirm that the State Soil and Water Conservation Board in a meeting on April 15, 1966, granted a planning priority to the Sanderson Canyon watershed.

"All priorities are granted contingent upon the local sponsors being able to show evidence that they can meet local responsibilities at the time that planning is actually begun. We believe that you meet these requirements. However, should any question arise, it will be reviewed with you prior to the initiation of the plan.

"As you know the Soil Conservation Service does the planning under this program and the State Board does not set any time schedule when priorities are granted. Representatives of the Soil Conservation Service will be in touch with you when they are in a position to initiate your plan."

The letter came from Harvey Davis, executive director of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board.

New Withholding System For Income Tax Goes Into Effect May 1

"Under the new income tax withholding system to go into effect May 1, employers will need up-to-date information from employees," according to R. L. Phinney, District Director of Internal Revenue. "Therefore," he continued, "employees will be asked to complete for employers a new Form W-4 Withholding Exemption Certificate."

Phinney emphasized that there is neither an increase or decrease in taxes; that the new withholding system was designed so that income tax withheld from wages would more nearly meet a taxpayer's yearly tax bill. Taxes on wages will be withheld under the new system at six graduated rates: 14, 15, 17, 20, 25 and 30%. The present withholding rate is a flat 14% but makes no allowance for the minimum standard deduction or marital status.

Nearly everyone will need to fill out a new W-4 form for the new withholding system. Present income tax withholding is based only on amount of salary and number of lawful exemptions claimed. The new system not only includes these factors but takes into account marital status. Tax will be withheld at different rates for single and married persons.

The new law also requires married persons to file a new W-4 form showing they are married if they want the lower withholding rates which apply to married taxpayers. Otherwise, tax will be withheld at the higher rates for single persons.

Persons with income not subject to withholding, such as dividends or interest, may want to claim less exemptions than they are entitled to or have additional dollar amounts withheld from their paychecks so that enough tax will be withheld to meet their year-end income tax bill.

Document No. 5642, an IRS fact sheet which explains the new tax withholding system, will help employees determine how many lawful exemptions to claim on the new W-4 form. The fact sheet, which includes the new W-4, is available from employers and Internal Revenue Service offices, and contains tables which show the amount of tax withheld on wages up to \$260 a week, under both the old and new withholding systems.

The new system will be in effect for only 35 weeks during 1966. Later this year taxpayers may want to consider filing a new W-4 for 1967.

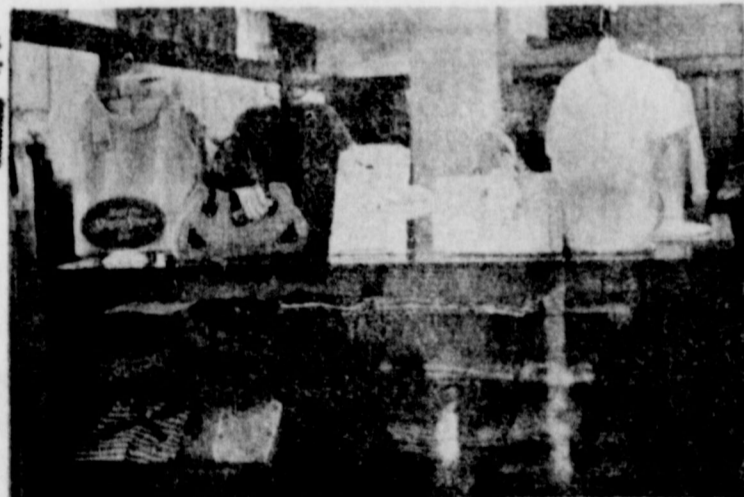

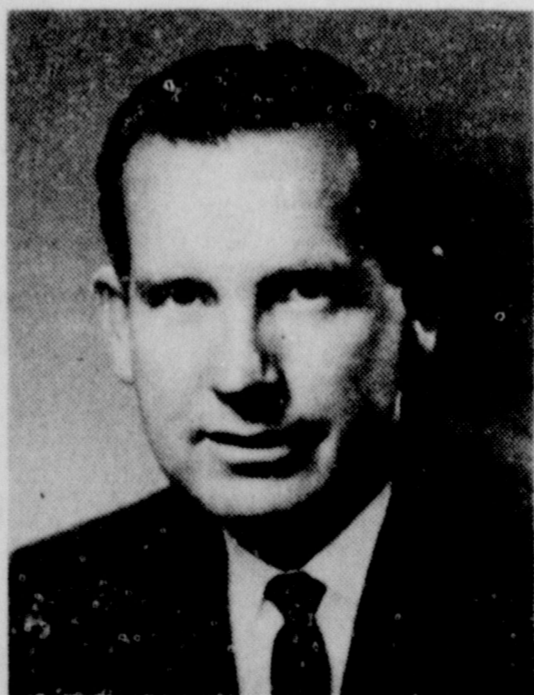

money to the organization, it is with the understanding that it will be returned out of net profits, if any, resulting from rent or the sale of the building, and then at the discretion of the directors; but under no circumstances will there be a profit in the return.

A plan of time payments in the form of a pledge has been worked out by the directors. A pledge may be made for any amount in excess of \$25.00 and payments extended over a period of time not to exceed one year. The pledge may be made in the form of a loan or donation either direct or through an organization.

If a person elects to donate to the fund, it will be an outright donation with no expectation of a return. Application for designation of the organization as one to which contributions may be tax-exempt will be made at the time the permanent organization is formed.

Donations which may be tax-exempt may be made through an organization that is now classified as such - i. e. a church - with instructions that it will be loaned to the medical center fund. In this event, according to the present directors, the person making the contribution to the medical center through another organization will not receive a voting privilege.

It was also specified that no organization would have a vote in the permanent organization.

A certificate of loan would be issued to all individuals or organizations lending over \$25, and a receipt given to all who contributed \$25 or more.

The directors stated that they were hesitant to bring it up because they felt that the project would be a success, but in order to conduct a business properly,

some plans had to be made to take care of all contingencies, and it was decided that the money received in trust would not be held longer than two years from May 1, 1966, and small contributions, for which no receipt was given, due to the cost and trouble of bookkeeping, would be disposed of in a manner determined by the directors.

There will be another meeting on Friday of this week, of the team captains and their workers, outlining the above details and giving selling procedures so that the solicitors will be equipped with the information necessary for the success of the drive.
