Light Vote Seen In Local Primaries

A relatively light vote was cast last Saturday in the Democratic Primary in Terrell County. It was also a light voting spree witnessed in the Republican Primary, but the first time in many years that a primary has been held by the Republican Party locally. There were 285 votes cast by Democrats and 23 by Republicans.

The returns of both primaries are printed on Page Three of this section.

Mrs. Gene Litton is a newcomer to local politics, having made an uncontested race for county treasurer and winning the nomination; as is W. G. Shoemaker, who won the nomination for Justice of Peace, Pct. 1 over J. A. Gilbreath, the incumbent. All other office-holders were re-elected on the county level and up to the state representative office held by Gene Hendryx of Alpine. Other district and state offices are widely publicized in daily newspapers.

There was a voting strength of approximately 900 in the county.

Funeral services were held in the First Methodist Church Friday afternoon for Mrs. Etta Smith, 79, who died in an El Paso hospital Wednesday. Rev. M. H. Stroup, pastor, officiated at the rites and burial was in Cedar Grove Cemetery.

Mrs. Smith was born in Llano on October 23, 1886, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Kuykendall. She was married to the late Chester Smith in Encinal on June 7, 1907. They had resided in Dryden and Sanderson for 44 years prior to his death here in 1958. Mrs. Smith continued to make her home here for several years and while visiting with her daughter, Mrs. Gus Kercheville, Jr., in Del Rio she fractured her leg in a fall and had been confined to her bed and in declining health since that time. Over \$33,000.00 Collected For Medical Center

The fund for the Trans-Terrell Medical Center has swelled to \$33,371.06 as of Tuesday noon, according to County Judge R. S. Wilkinson, treasurer of the drive. This amount included \$5,446.50 in pledges.

The fund drive committee is sifting the cards of potential contributors to see if further contacts can be made or if someone has been overlooked in the scurry of events during the first days of the drive.

They ask that anyone who has not been contacted, or anyone who has made up their mind to make a contribution or loan to contact Judge Wilkinson if they do not know what solicitor had their name.

There is anxiety for the completion of the drive before the first of June if at all possible.

The doctor procurement committee continues to work in whatever leads that may be given them in the hope that a doctor may be secured for the county within the next few weeks. A letter-type contact has been made with some doctors, and telephone calls with others trying to find an inkling of interest by some doctor in the local facility.

Local citizens are urged to mention our needs and desires in all letters written out of town in hopes that a new contact may be made which might prove fruitful.

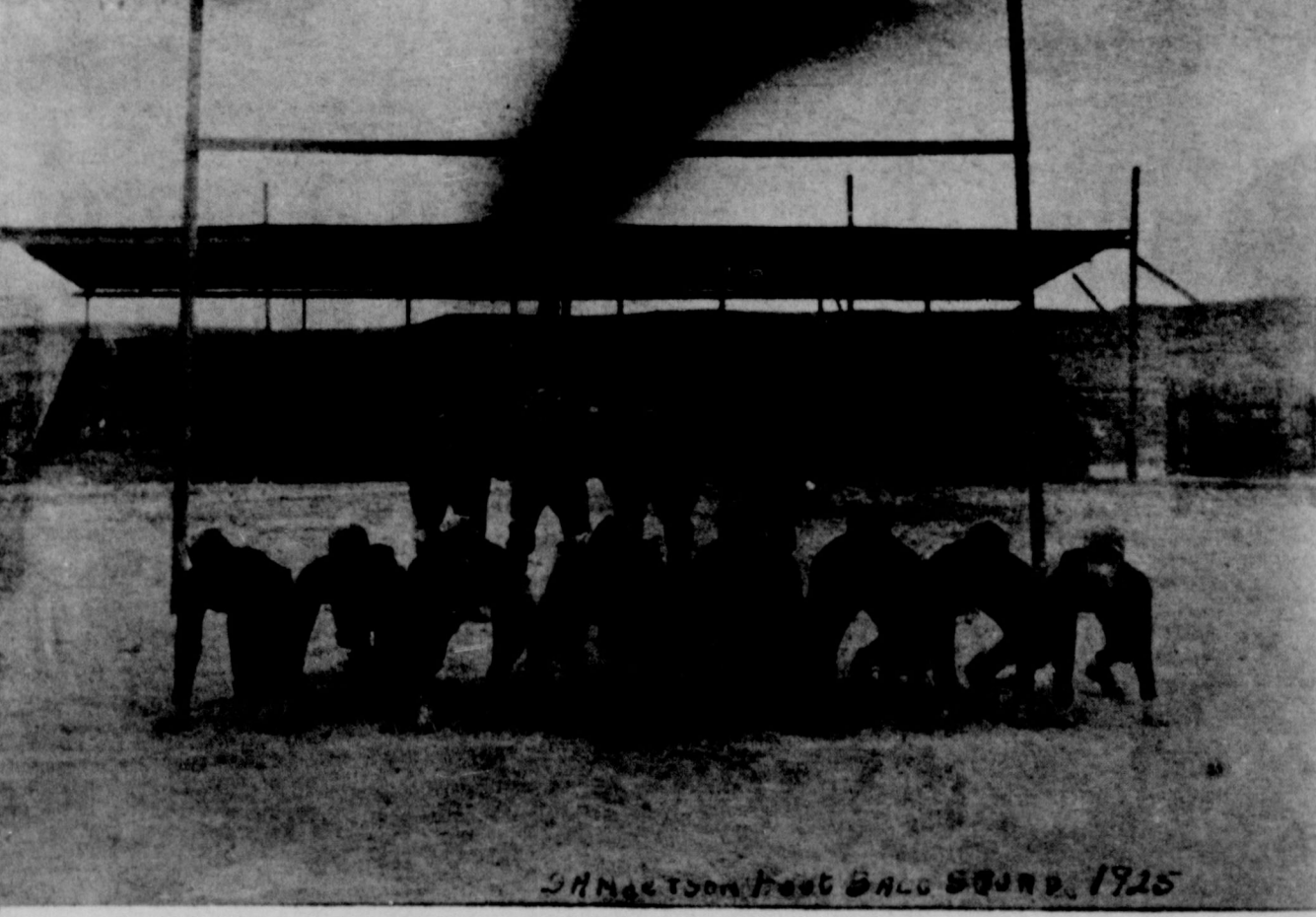
Williams, Downie Win At Tennis

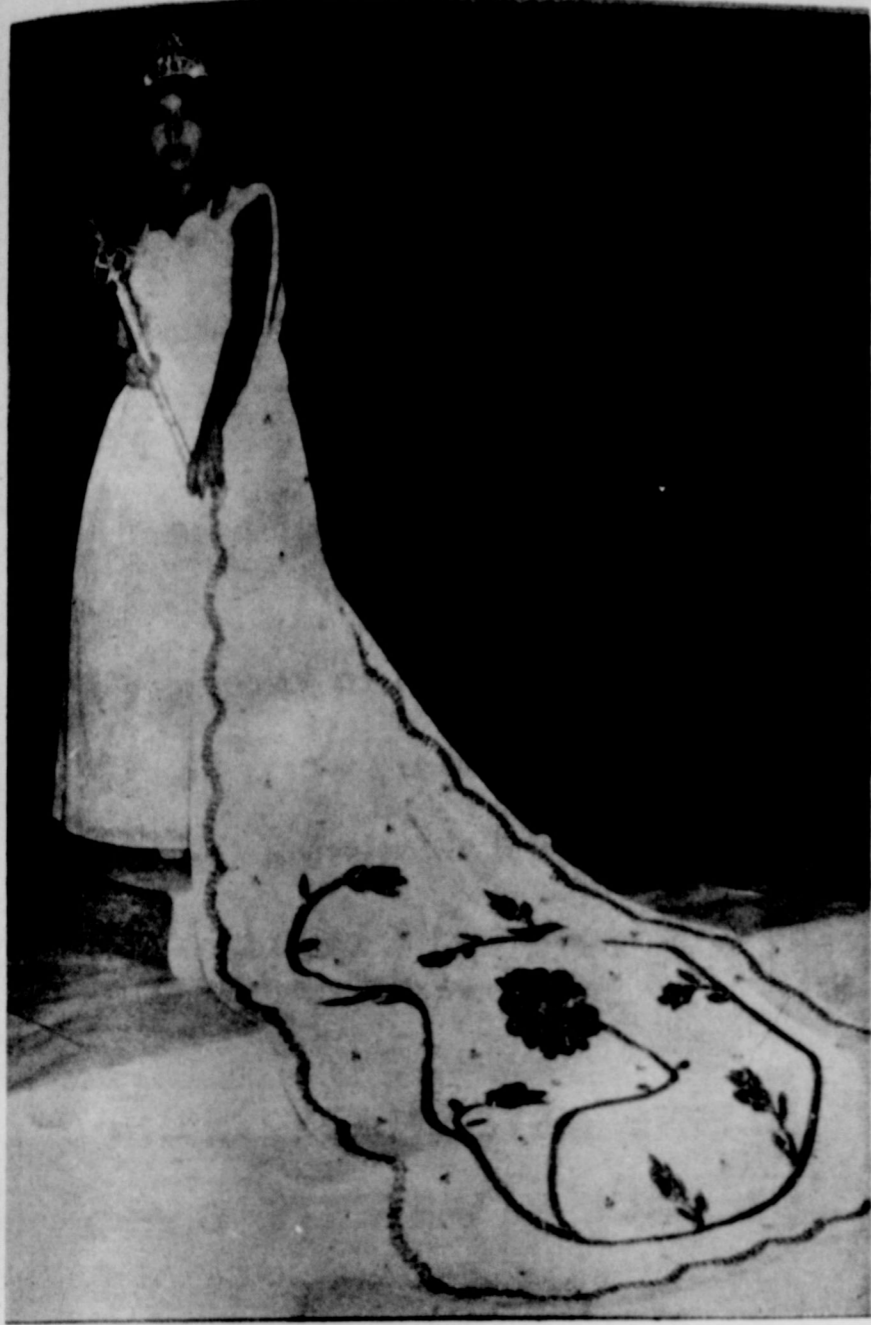

White Asks Funds For Flood Control

Preliminary funds for flood control studies in the Sanderson area were included in the requests for appropriations by Congressman Richard C. White of Texas, before the House Appropriations Committee, Sub Committee on Public Works, on Tuesday.

At the request of Congressman White, the House last year authorized the Corps of Engineers to survey flood conditions in Sanderson, following the disastrous flood of last summer.

The Corps of Engineers has estimated the total cost of the survey at \$125,000, and the bureau of the budget has recommended the appropriation of \$20,000 in fiscal 1967 to begin the survey. In his statement before the appropriations committee Tuesday, Congressman White reviewed the devastation of the 1965 flood, stated that there are no existing works to protect Sanderson from flooding, and asked for appropriation of all necessary funds.

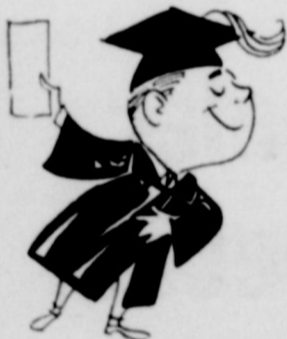

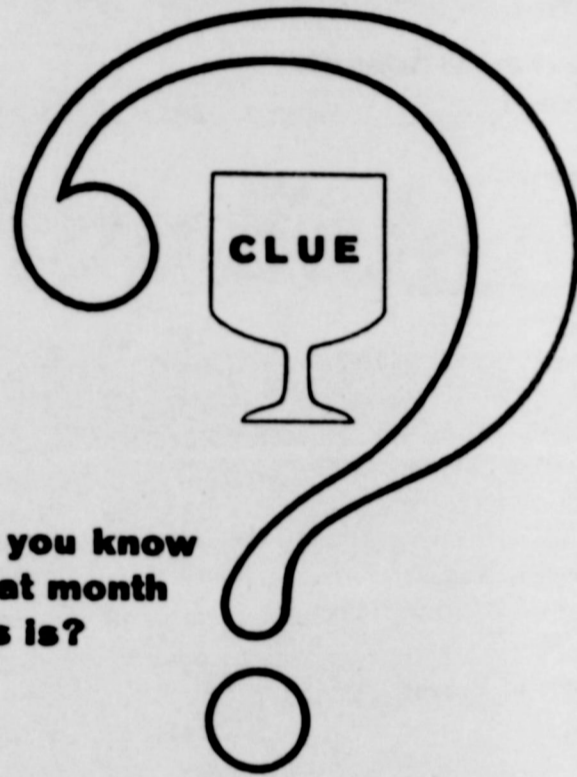
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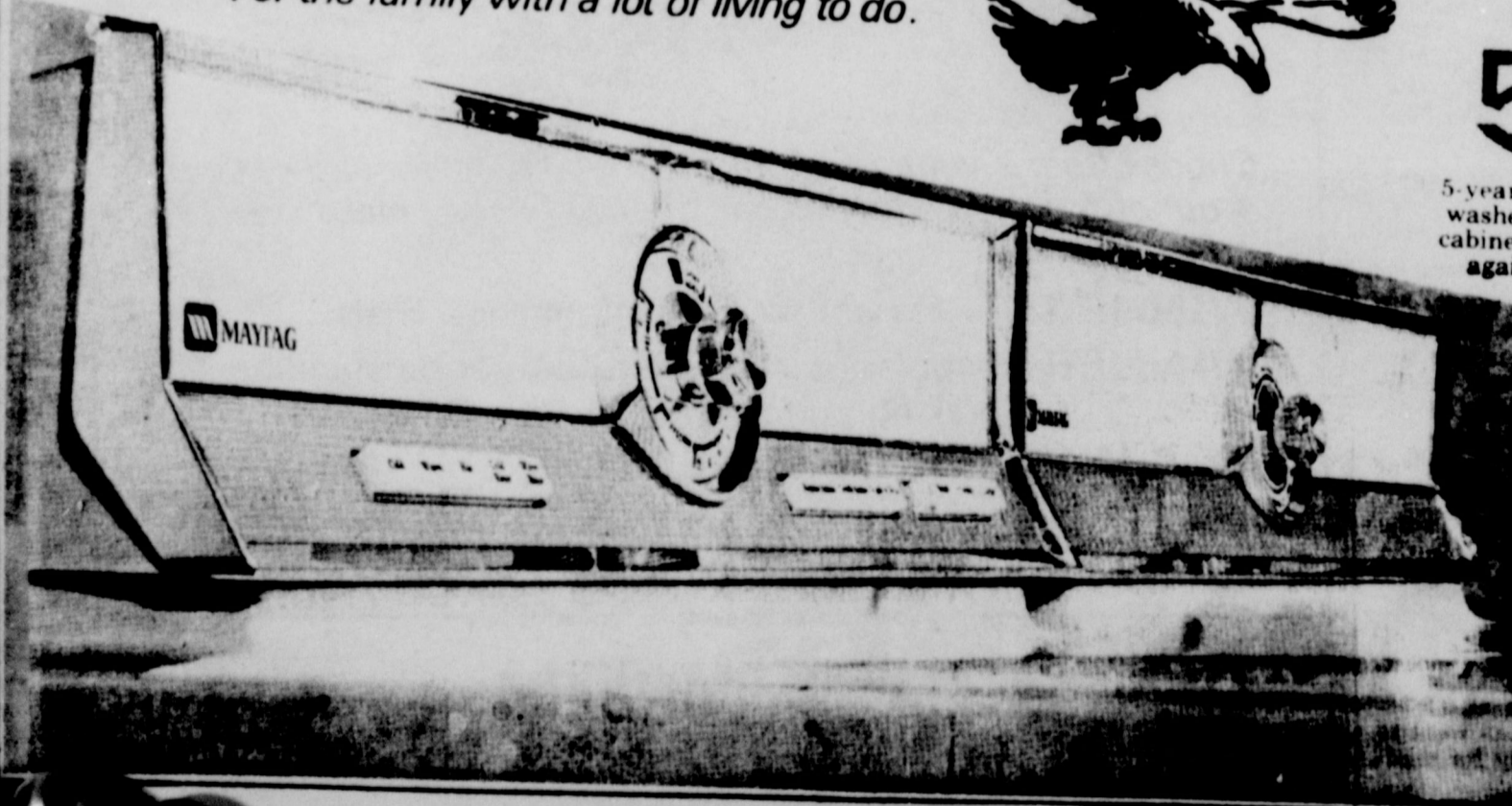

Will of Your Own
 She was a well-to-do spinster, aging and lonely. He was young and affable, ready and willing to give her the companionship she craved. In the declining years of her life, the two developed a close friendship.

Sure enough, when the woman died she left most of her money to him. Promptly her relatives challenged the validity of the will, charging that it was the result of "undue influence."

But the court held the will valid. The judge pointed out that the young man's "influence" consisted of nothing more than simple kindness. Furthermore, the woman had been vigorous and alert to the end, perfectly capable of making her own decisions.



There is nothing necessarily wrong with influence itself, in the making of a will. As one court put it:

"Everyone who is conscious of family and social duties is constrained by the obligations which he thus recognizes. These obligations affect constantly his thinking and his conduct. They assert themselves when he writes his will. Only a hermit or a hobo may be said to possess a free volition."

What the law does object to is influence so strong that it overwhelms the person's independent judgment.

Thus, a court invalidated a will made by a helpless cripple, under threats by his son and daughter-in-law to abandon him. Even though the document was labelled "WILL," it was not truly his will at all but theirs.

The suspicion of undue influence may arise from various telltale signs, such as a bequest that seems contrary to human nature.

For instance, it was held an indication of undue influence by a man's second wife that he left far more money to her children than to his. Or, in another case, that a father left almost nothing to his invalid son and almost everything to his healthy daughter.

Nevertheless, while eccentricity in a will may justify suspicion, it is seldom enough by itself to prove undue influence. A man has the right to make an eccentric will if he so chooses. The law merely wants to be sure that he freely did so choose.
