Dogs Responsible For Capture of Youth Escapee

Bloodhounds belonging to Dep-
 uty Dalton Hogg and Texas High-
 way Patrolman Malcom Bolinger
 were responsible for the appre-
 hension of a 15-year-old lad
 who escaped from Bolinger Sun-
 day morning.

Bolinger, who was with Hogg
 following the dogs, said that
 even though it was hot and the
 dogs were sore-footed, one of
 them kept going until the youth
 was taken just south of the ranch
 house of Mrs. Frank Harrell. The
 other dog, a female with young,
 was forced to give up the trail
 because of her condition, Bol-
 inger said. "But she was want-
 ing to go, even though she just
 couldn't do it," he stated.

The youth ran from Bolinger
 after he had been apprehended
 east of Sanderson Sunday morn-
 ing and brought to the courthouse
 for questioning.

The lad had stopped in Dryden
 and tried to sell some hub caps
 and other items to trade for gas,
 and the merchant there called
 Bolinger to tell him of the sus-
 picious actions of the youth. Bol-
 inger went east to await the ar-
 rival of the car and found he had
 no identification of any kind. He
 was brought on in to Sanderson
 and broke and ran as they were
 going into the court house.

Bolinger stated that the boy
 went to the Edward Kerr lot and
 turned back east. He was seen
 going up the hill north of the S.
 J. Burchett home. It was from
 there that the dogs began the
 trail that led to the apprehension
 of the youth.

It was learned and reported that
 the youth had stolen the car in
 Houston and stolen license plates
 in Sabin. He is a native of
 Sherman.

During the chase for the boy,
 Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey was in
 an airplane piloted by Harvey
 Rogers. Border Patrolmen and
 some local citizens were also
 used in the chase.

Bolinger stated that the dogs
 must have gone at least 12 miles
 in the trailing of the youth, and
 it was later verified that the boy
 would run into the brush every
 time the airplane approached
 and not knowing where he was
 going, he did not take a direct
 route to the Harrell ranch.

The officers were high in their
 praise of the ability and willing-
 ness of the dogs, without which,
 they said they probably would
 not have re-taken the youth.

 o'clock.

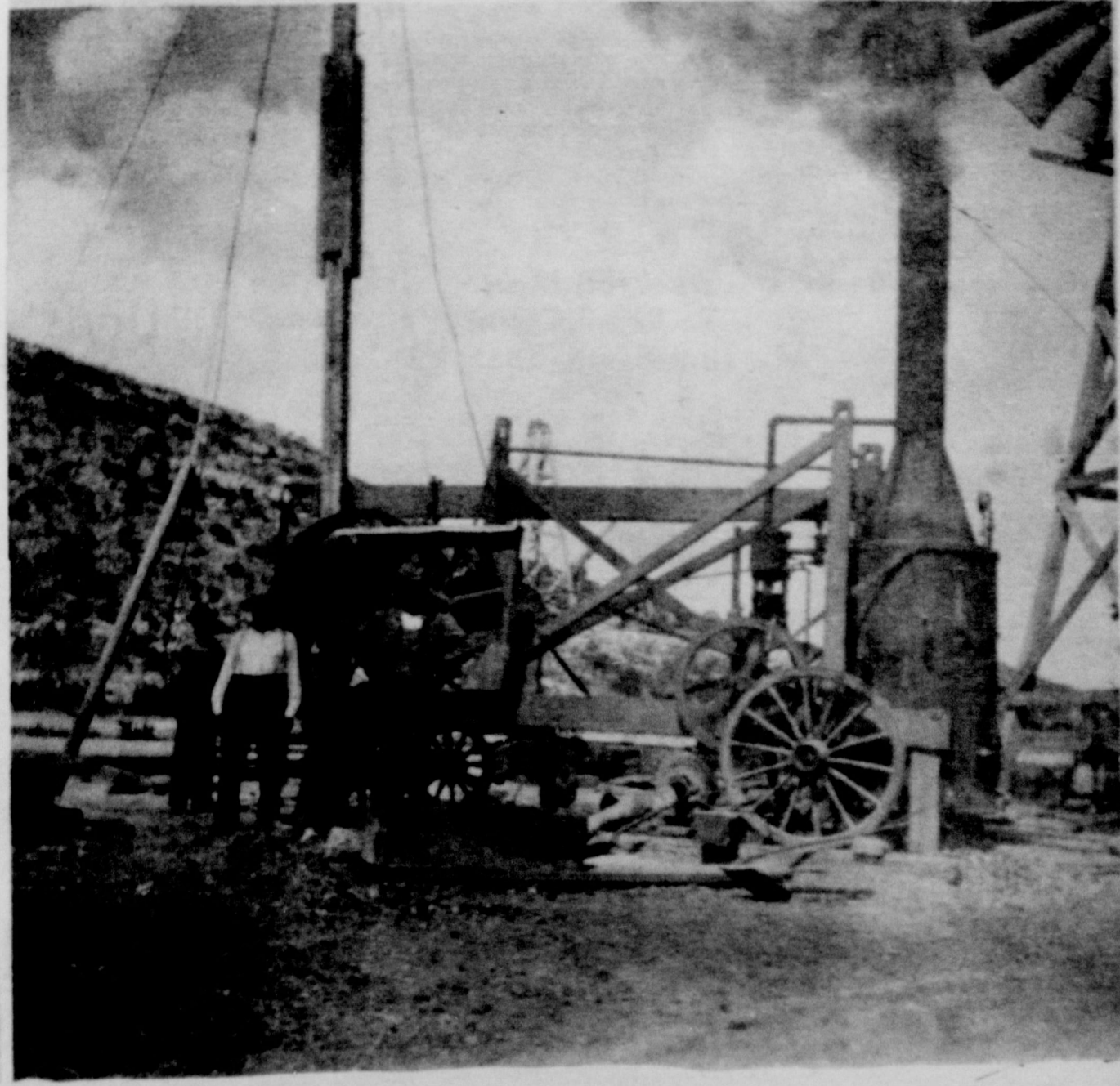
The service will be in remem-

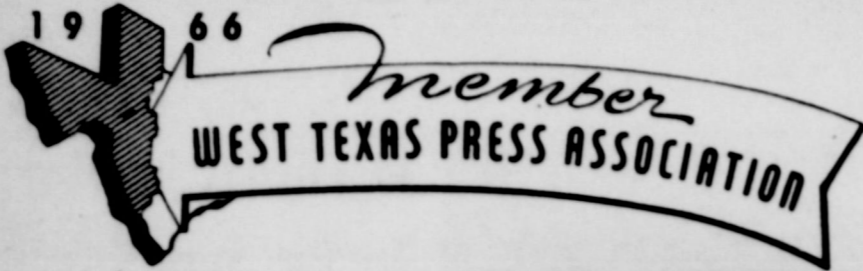

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TV Antenna Being Installed For New Company

A Fort Worth company that builds towers all over the world is now in the process of erecting a troposcatter antenna near Sanderson, according to members of the Sanderson TV Club. The troposcatter is a wire mesh reflector 80 feet high and supported by 19 towers. It stretches 300 feet wide in a parabolic curve around the antenna fixture that is mounted on the head end building. This type of system, newest in cable television, according to the club members, was engineered by John and Jack Threadgill and proven at Marlin and Brady.

Terrell County TV, Inc., a company owned by Wallace I. New of Alpine, is installing the cable system with the aid and support of the Sanderson TV Club. Mr. New has provided cable television in Fort Davis, Valentine, Big Bend Park, Presidio, and Alpine.

The antenna will be located on a ranch about seven miles north of town, and it is reported that he will be using the newest electronic equipment, including solid frame aluminum-shielded cable and all-transistor amplifiers throughout the entire system.

It is reported that the system will provide Sanderson with three major networks and FM radio. The erection of the antenna is expected within a few days and completion of the entire system is expected soon after.

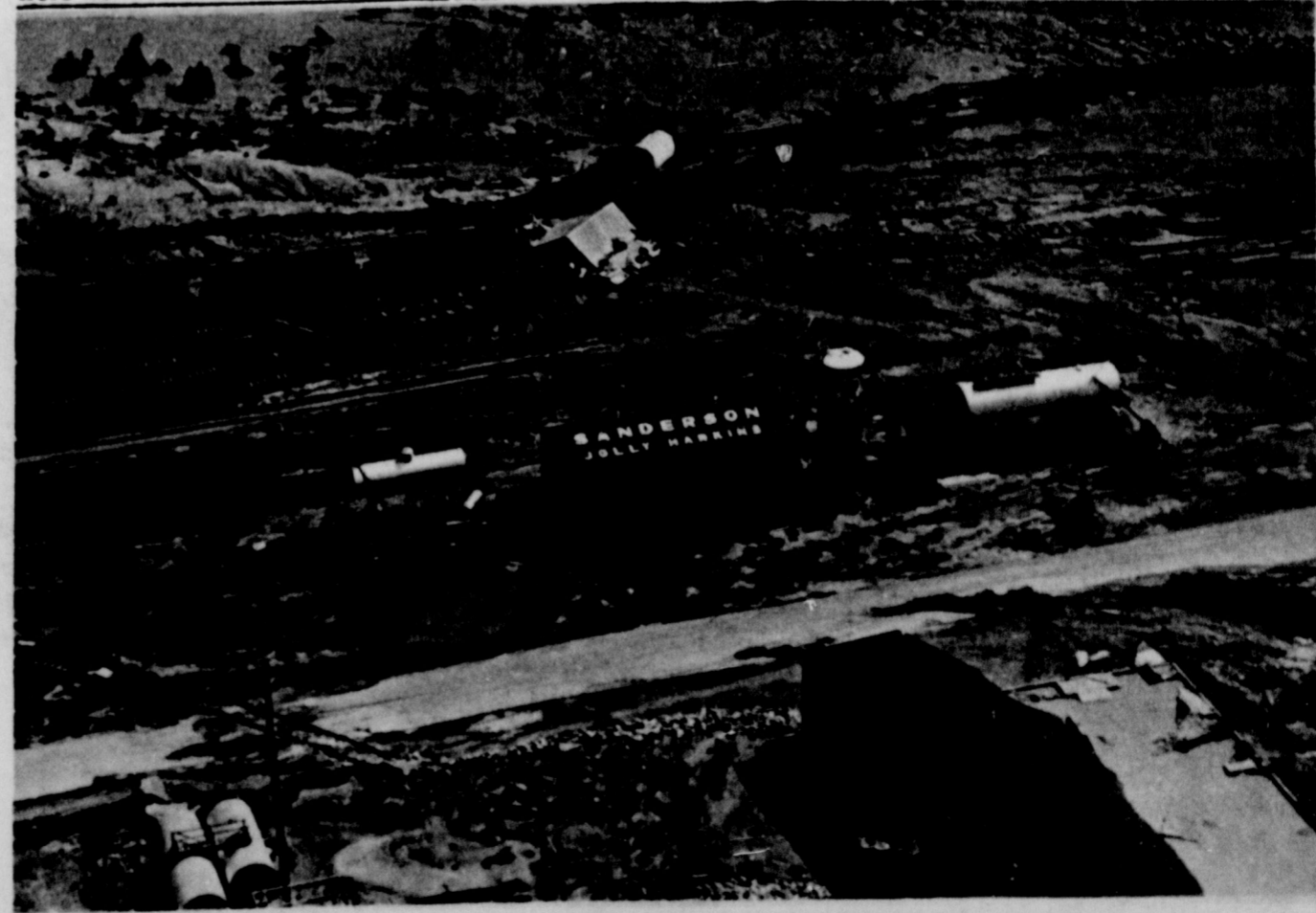

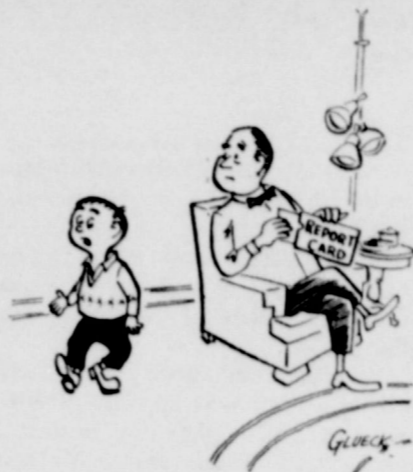

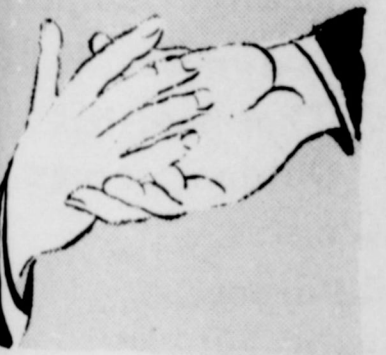

Helping Hand

Has a bus driver barked at you lately? Has a trolley conductor been rude? Complain to the company or write to your newspaper—but don't sue. Bad manners that merely ruffle your feelings are not enough grounds for a lawsuit.

But when bad manners also menace your safety, then the law is concerned indeed. Suppose you need a helping hand getting into or out of a public conveyance. You are entitled to have that helping hand, not just as a matter of courtesy but also as a matter of law.

Consider this case: A young mother, carrying a suitcase, a bundle, and a baby, started to descend the steps of a train. Although two railroad em-



ployees saw her struggling, they made no move to help. She fell, suffered injuries, and—later—collected damages from the railroad. "Where personal assistance is seen to be needed," said the court, "duty demands it should be rendered."

Not only the condition of the passenger but also the condition of the stopping place may create a duty of assistance. Thus, a taxicab passenger won a court case partly because the driver let her off—unaided—at a place where the pavement was broken up.

Furthermore, help that is given must be given with care. When a trolley passenger missed a departing car, the conductor reached down and seized his arm. For 100 feet he dragged the reluctant man along, trying in vain to pull him aboard. When the conductor finally let go, the man hit the ground with a thud. A court held the company liable.

On the other hand, you cannot expect help if your need is not evident. A woman with an arthritic knee, who stumbled while entering a bus, failed to win damages from the company. The court noted that her handicap was not obvious to the bus driver—and that she neglected to ask him for aid.

In short, while the travelling public is entitled to a decent regard for its safety, there are limits. One woman, complaining that a trolley conductor didn't help her alight, based her claim on the undeniable fact that she was fat.

But the court turned her down with this comment: "The mere fact that a woman weighs over 200 pounds cannot make it the duty of the conductor to drop all other duties and help her get off."

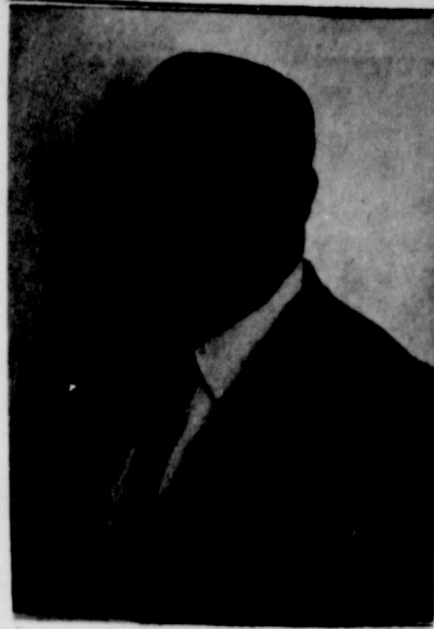

Church of Christ Announces Annual Sheffield Camp

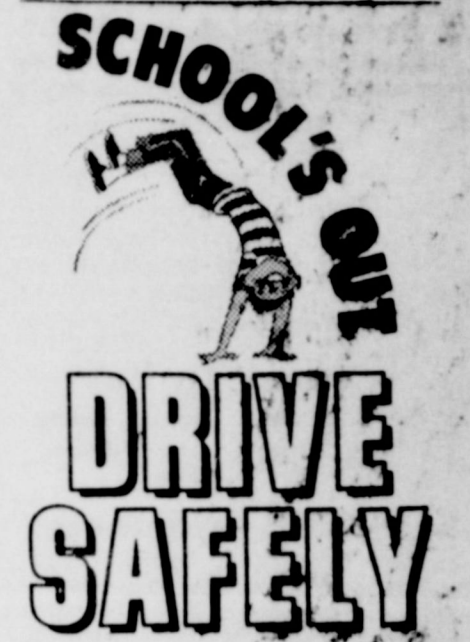
The Church of Christ is extending a cordial invitation to everyone to attend the 23rd annual Pecos River Encampment, six miles north of Sheffield.

Mental Tests Failed By Third Of Texas Draftees

AUSTIN - Nearly one third of Texas' draftees fail their pre-induction and induction mental requirements. The Texas State Teachers Association said the State average of 32.7 per cent compares to a national average of 29.9 per cent. Only 14 other states have worse records. Mississippi leads the U.S. with 68.6 per cent failures. Minnesota and Washington have the best records. Each has only 7.5 per cent of its draftees flunking.

Other states in the low per cent categories are Iowa and Utah with less than 10 per cent failures. California and Massachusetts have records of 18.5 per cent failures while New York is only slightly ahead of Texas with 30.9 per cent.

In the lower rings of achievement with bottom-ranking Mississippi in the draft intelligence tests are South Carolina, North Carolina, Louisiana, Arkansas, Tennessee, Georgia, Alabama, Virginia, West Virginia, Kentucky, New Mexico, Florida and Maryland. All of these states have compiled worse results than Texas.

The rankings were compiled by the National Education Association from data furnished by the Office of the Surgeon General of the U.S. Army.
