This is the last weekend for hunters to be coming through for this deer season. This season seems to have been the biggest season ever, according to some standards.

The number of hunters, sure, has been the greatest this year. The number of bucks killed on some ranches far outdoes previous kill, and on others does not come up to past seasons by any means.

The weather definitely worked against the hunters this year, according to our way of thinking. It was much too warm during most of the season and the moon was too bright for too long each night.

There is absolutely no way of knowing just what the deer hunting means to this area, but the business men and ranchers are getting some idea.

The way the seasons have been, over 15 days, it makes leasing by the season more difficult and day-leasing more attractive to the hunter.

We found that most of the hunters we talked to were not satisfied with the condition of the animals or the quantity of deer, but only of the weather. Any experienced hunter knows that warm weather and warm night nights does for the deer does not expect too much success in the hunt when it happens that way.

Another producing well has been made in Terrell County and it will help in many ways. The interest in drilling in the county has been fairly constant since the discovery well in the Van-Bassett field over 16 years ago.

It has meant a lot to the county to have producing wells and we hope that the interest continues.

Unidentified Gas Discovery Made In Terrell County

An unidentified gas discovery was indicated in Terrell County with the flowing of gas at the rate of 2.7 million cubic feet daily when drilling reached 9,365 feet at Pan American Petroleum Corp. No. 1 Keith Mitchell, in 7-1-CCSD&RGNG, 22 miles northwest of Sanderson and 1 1/4 miles southeast of the recently designated Little Canyon (10,000 foot Strawn gas) field.

Tested 16 hours on a 3-inch orifice from 9,349-9,365 feet, it flowed the above gauge with casing pressure of 500 pounds.

Operator attempted to pull the bit and pipe started sticking.

Operator pulled the bit to intermediate casing seat, at 7,315 feet, washed with brine to 8,000 feet. It hit a bridge. And pipe started sticking. Shut in for four hours, casing pressure was 900 pounds. Operator bled off pressure and had pulled two stands of pipe when the bit stuck at 7,800 feet.

Operator was still mixing mud to kill gas flow.

The project was contracted to 15,500 feet to test the Ellenburger.

Potential was reported Dec. 3, 1963, for the little Canyon opener, Mobil Oil Corp. No. 1 George K. Mitchell, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 3.1 million cubic feet of gas per day through perforations at 10,106-120 feet and 11,630-670 feet. Official potential was filed Sept. 22, 1966, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 3.1 million cubic feet daily; and field designated, Oct. 15.

Drive Started Last Week For Salvation Army

A drive for funds was begun locally last week for the Salvation Army. One-third of the total amount contributed remains locally; 59¢ of every dollar collected in Texas remains in the state and only 8 to 9¢ is used for administration, according to information received from the Salvation Army Field Representative Joe Moore.

Mr. Moore added that all of the money except that used for administration, is used for welfare. If all of the funds retained by the local committee is used before the drive next year, they will receive an outright grant with no strings attached to carry on their welfare work locally.

Mrs. Sid Harkins is the drive chairman and workers are soliciting local people to contribute to the fund. Any person who is not contacted and who wishes to make a contribution is asked to contact Mrs. Harkins or Troy Druse.

The local committee is comprised of R. S. Wilkinson, chairman, James Caroline, vice-chairman, Druse, treasurer, and committeemen Rev. Bob Moon, J. A. Gilbreath, and Mrs. Harkins.

Man Found Dead East of Dryden On SP Tracks

The body of an unidentified man was found on the railroad tracks about 20 miles east of Dryden late Tuesday afternoon.

The body was discovered by a train crew and reported to Terrell County Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey. Railroad Special Agent H. P. Boyd, Texas Ranger Alfred Allee Jr., and Crockett County Sheriff Billy Mills, who were in Sanderson on business, and Justice of the Peace J. A. Gilbreath went to the scene for an inquest.

The details of the accident seemed to be vividly given in the findings of the officials.

It was evident that the man was partially dragged between the rails for some distance before his body struck the ground and was tumbled by the train for quite a distance before coming to rest. The body was severely mangled making sight identification impossible. Fingerprints were made and sent to Austin for possible identification, and after failure there, they were forwarded to Washington, D. C.

The body was held in Ozona at the Lawrence Janes Funeral Home until Thursday when it was interred there.

Efforts were made to apprehend someone from an east-bound train that left Sanderson shortly after noon Tuesday, but the train had already left Del Rio when the accident was reported here.

Verdict was withheld by Gilbreath pending some further investigation, but foul play was not thought to have had a part in the death.

The man seemed to have been young, was wearing rather new clothing, sandy-haired, and of medium build, judging from the shoes and jacket.

Contract Awarded For Construction On FM Road 1217

A contract for 0.936 miles of construction on FM Road 1217 in Terrell County has been awarded to Kidwell Construction Co., of Dallas, it was announced by the State Highway Commission in Austin this week. The low bid was \$299,512.71.

Bridges and approaches are expected to take 115 working days, according to Archie J. Sherrod, District Highway Engineer at Odessa.

Jack V. Valentine Jr., resident engineer at McCarney will be in active charge of the project during construction.

SP Railroad Plans Big Christmas Party, Santa Claus Visit Here on December 17

The Southern Pacific Railroad Company is planning a big party and visit by Santa Claus, exhibits, displays, prizes, etc., on Saturday, December 17, in Sanderson.

The announcement was made the first of this week by H. B. Carpenter, a former trainmaster here and company official now stationed in San Antonio.

A refrigerated car will be used to transport Santa Claus due to the heat of West Texas, according to Carpenter. In the train will also be displays of equipment used by the various services of the railroad, the office car of the superintendent, a new caboose, etc. The Department of Public Safety will also have a reaction testing device here for use and demonstration to the public. A flat car will have Pessucci-Anne, a life-size rubber doll that is used to demonstrate mouth-to-mouth resuscitation. Disposable plastic mouth covers are used for each person using the doll for demonstration.

Other such demonstrations and exhibits are planned to inform and entertain the people who visit the train.

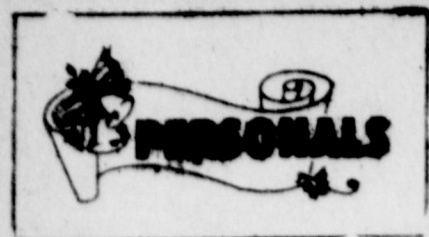
Santa will be stationed at a convenient and cool place in the area to talk with the children and all of them will get a bag of candy and goodies from Santa.

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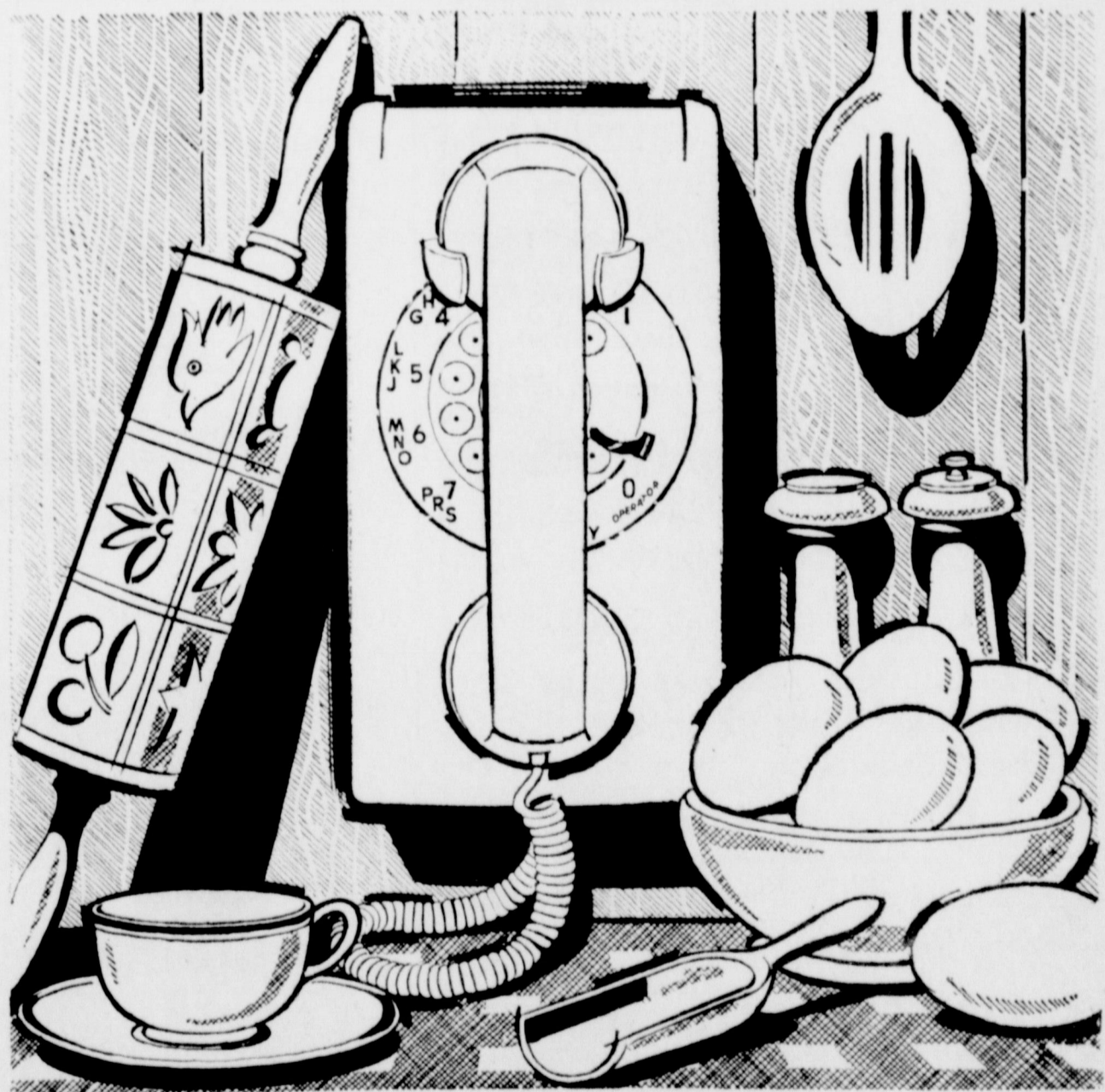

TS&GRA Meet To Be Dec. 12-14 In Fort Worth

The 51st annual meeting of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association will be in Fort Worth on December 12-14.

Among subjects up for discussion will be a proposed three-way cooperative study of the golden eagle problem affecting the lamb and goat kid crops in the West and Southwest, to be made by a Department of Interior team, which would be chosen jointly by representatives of the sheep and goat industry, the Audubon Society, and the Department of Interior. The proposal grew out of earlier conferences which Buchheister had with officers of the TS&GRA. For the last four years the government with Audubon backing, has prohibited airplane hunting of the eagles. Ranchmen contend that this is the only practical control method which they need to use during lambing and kidding season, and in areas actually suffering from eagle depredation.

The TS&GRA is the only organized voice for a Texas industry that numbers about 24,000 wool and mohair producers.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

The possession of a Social Security Card is not a guaranteed passport to a future of abundance and carefree living. Most workers consider deductions for Social Security to amount to money in the bank, and the greater the withholding the better, since the money will return home some day in the form of increased old age benefits.

A new, non-profit, non-governmental organization, Tax Foundation, Inc., is intensively studying the American Social Security program along with other taxes levied on citizens. Some revealing facts are being brought to light.

An average worker who begins employment at 21 and retires at 65 will have paid almost \$33,000 in Social Security tax. If a worker retires at 65 and dies at the average age, he will lose a sum between \$10,000-\$15,000 earned through Social Security. The worker will simply not live long enough to receive his full benefits.

Nor will a deceased's beneficiaries receive guaranteed payment of his Social Security insurance, except under special circumstances. If a parent dies, children can receive only 75% of their deceased parent's Social Security benefits if they are dependents under 18, or completely disabled. If over 18 and

working, children inherit none of the dead parents benefits.

A widow is limited to 82½ per cent of the deceased husband's monthly benefits if she is 62 years of age. If younger, she gets considerably less.

Do these benefit amounts appear stingy considering a worker has had Social Security deductions subtracted from his paychecks all his working life? In all cases, unless the retired worker outlives his contemporaries, Uncle Sam will pocket a substantial portion of his Social Security savings. And, unless beneficiaries meet the rigid inheritance requirements, the Government will completely appropriate the account for its own consumption.

When Social Security was introduced by the Roosevelt Administration in 1936, a tax of 1 per cent for both employe and employer was placed on the first \$3,000 of earnings. In 1966, the same tax has leaped to 4.2 per cent for both on the first \$6,000.

Through their expressed preference for government insurance over more independent and rewarding provisions for old age, apathetic citizens have given the government a vote of confidence. Government in turn has pushed for higher Social Security taxes, and inflationary fires have spread. If government would halt unnecessary spending and consequent tax increases, it would not be necessary to fool workers about abundant retirement rewards.

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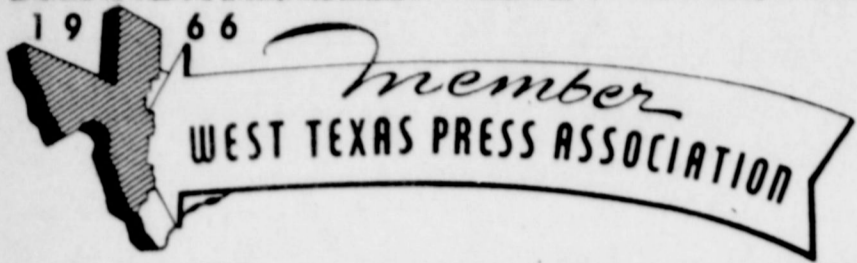

Telephone Rate Reduced

A state-wide reduction in telephone rates totaling \$6 million annually was announced today by Southwestern Bell Telephone Co.

Largest item in the forthcoming reduction is a further lowering of intrastate (calls within Texas) long distance rates, effective Jan. 1, 1967.

With the reduction, most station-to-station calls over 56 miles in distance in Texas will have lower rates, varying from 5 to 15¢ less for three minutes depending on distance. Reductions are

even greater for calls over three minutes.

For example, here is how the reductions will lower rates for station-to-station calls made during the "day" period for a three-minute call, the present rate listed first and the new rate second:

Dallas-Houston, .95, .90
San Antonio-Amarillo, 1.30, 1.20
Austin-Ft. Worth, .85, .80

In addition to the lower long distance rates, there will be reductions of some miscellaneous telephone charges, effective Dec. 1 this year. These include:

A reduction in the one-time charge for a color telephone from \$7.50 to \$5.00;

A reduction in the monthly rate for amplifier telephones to \$1. The rates now vary from \$1.25 to \$2. (This type telephone is most often used by persons with hearing impairments and at noisy locations.);

Introduction of a flat-rate charge for installing residence service, ranging from \$6.00 down to \$3.50, depending on the size of the town. The Alpine rate will be \$3.50.

This flat-rate, one-time residence service charge will replace the service connection charges now in effect and will enable residence customers to have several telephones installed or changed at one time for the single service charge.

Along with these reductions, all intrastate station-to-station calls which are made after 8 p. m. and all-day Sunday will get the lowest night rate. At present only station-to-station calls which are prepaid (charged to the number placing the call) and credit card calls are charged at this low rate.

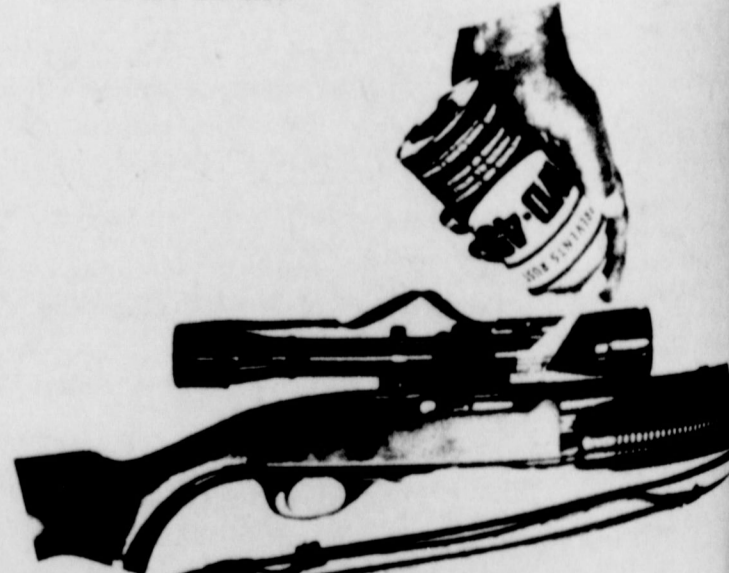

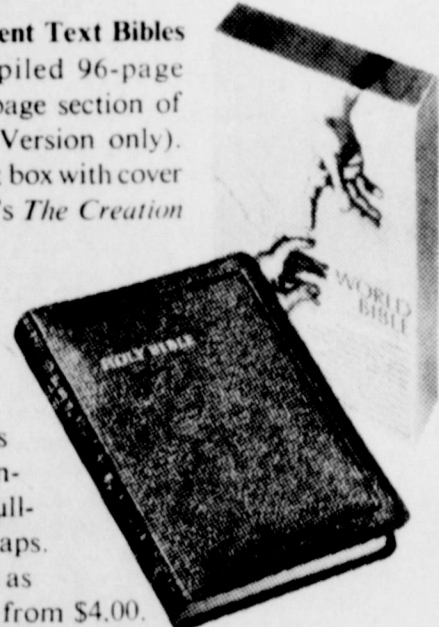
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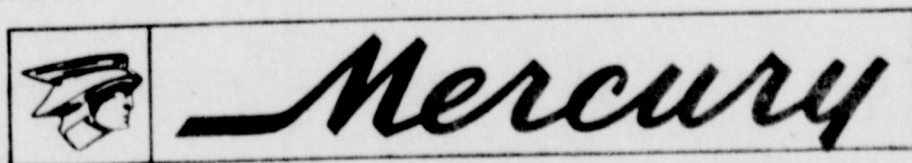

Twenty-five per cent of all people are accident prone and can be detected, according to a 65-year old professor who has spent most of his life looking for people who have accidents... Dr. Hans Hahn of Transylvania College in Lexington, Kentucky picks out those who are prone by administering deceptively simple tests which pinpoint a person's safety margin... In tests with driving simulators, he asks the blindfolded subjects to approach a cliff coming to a dead stop. In a laboratory test, a person must press a button when alternate light flashes and bell signals are mixed...

In others, a subject is asked to point out a specific number from one to 100 in a five-minute period and to add long columns of figures for an hour... The tests reveal the effects of fatigue, strain and boredom and their relationship to accident proneness... Dr. Hahn's ultimate goal is to develop therapy for the accident prone... But, it will not be easy, he believes that the tendency toward accidents "is something you are born with and it may be you can never get rid of it"... In a five-year safety study devoted to traffic accidents, the Harvard Fatal Highway Collisions Project determined that the most common single cause of car accidents involved failure of some part of the car because of maintenance...

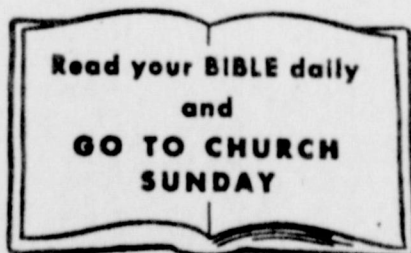
