LISTEN TO LUKE

There was some disappointment for many deer hunters who came to this country to hunt black tail deer. The disappointment was not restricted to this area, however, as it was prevalent as far west as Sierra Blanca, where we heard there was more grass and more deer than there ever had been, and less deer killed than in poorer seasons.

Most of this can be blamed on the weather, in our opinion, and on the fact that the deer were in good condition, and because of this were not up hunting for food all of the time during their waking hours.

Then, too, the bucks were not in rut in all areas and were still pretty much to themselves.

We heard that this area received some bad publicity in the Houston area on account of the poor deer "finding", and this is most regrettable, but there is little that one could do about it.

On the opening day of the season a man came into the office asking about day hunting available in the area, and when we told him of the places we knew about, he said that he had been hunting on one of them and was wanting to move to a new location, hoping that he would find more game. As he put it: "I've been hunting all morning and haven't killed a deer yet". This hunter, in his lack of knowledge of what deer hunting is or is supposed to be, certainly was disappointed and maybe even the source of some of the bad publicity from the Houston area, or some other area. Many hunters come out here thinking there is a deer behind every rock or bucks behind every bush.

We know of several ranchmen who were most disappointed in that their hunters did not get near their limit of deer, and we know that those ranchmen were out hunting with their guests, doing their best to get something for them to shoot at. Things were just not right, in many instances, for a good kill.

We saw some of the trophies that came in, however, and they were nothing to be ashamed of by any means. All of the deer were in good shape, except one we heard of that had a bone hanging in his mouth and was about to starve to death as a result. There was also the report of heavy ticks on many of the bucks, which may or may not mean something.

Jim Nance, who was a former sheriff here, and now a Texas Ranger living in Sierra Blanca, called us Sunday night and asked that we relay to all his friends his sincere gratitude for their calls, letters, cards, flowers, etc., during the time that he was in the hospital having a large portion of his stomach removed. He said that he is feeling much better now than he did for a time, was getting some of his strength back, but weight was coming back slowly and his appetite was still not real good. He is at his home and says he hopes to come out here soon during his recuperation for a visit with friends. He said, as many others have told us, that

Miguel Garcia Buried Sunday

Funeral services were held here in St. James Catholic Church Sunday afternoon for Miguel Garcia with Rev. Daniel Dierschke officiating. Burial was in Santa Rita Cemetery with Janes Funeral Home of Orona in charge of arrangements.

He was born in Mexico on September 16, 1882, and came to Sanderson in 1928. He was employed on the section gang of the S. P. Railroad for many years and had been caretaker at the cemetery for the past nineteen years. He died here Friday at the home of his son, Amulfo Garcia, after a short illness. Justice of the Peace J. A. Gilbreath ruled death to be of natural causes after relatives found him dead in his bed Friday night late.

He is also survived by his widow, Mrs. Sotera Garcia, and five grandchildren.

School Board Interviews Two For School Plans

Supt. Ken McAllister reported last week that the School Board of the Terrell County Independent School District had interviewed two architects concerning proposed building programs now under consideration by the board.

No commitment has been made with anyone as yet concerning the buildings or the plans and as soon as definite information is available, it will be released to the public for their information.

Complete and condensed information concerning the recent evaluation program that was made of the school system will also be available soon, according to Mr. McAllister. He stated that the evaluation was one sought by the local board and was made by school men over this area. One of their findings, he stated, was the inadequacy of the present junior high school building and the need for new facilities for that group.

This is one of the considerations being made in the proposed building program, according to Mr. McAllister.

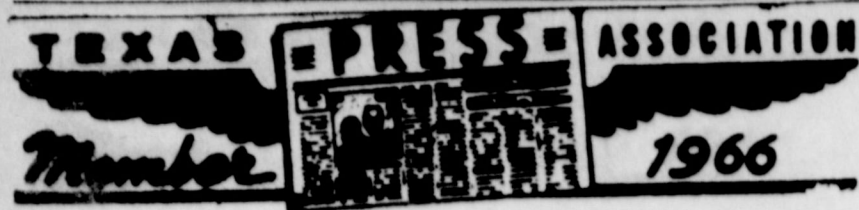
Besides her husband she is survived by a son, A.E. Murray of Houston and four grandchildren.

Two men were hospitalized in Fort Stockton Sunday night after the car in which they were riding was demolished in an accident at the McKnight Motor Co. about 10:30.

Coley Russell is the only one identified at this writing, but all three were employed by the Globe Exploration Co.

The car was going east and ran into the rear of a car parked in front of the motor company. It was knocked into the pillar supporting the canopy, moving it over on its footing, and then both cars ended up near the front west corner of the Sudduth Building east of McKnight's. The parked car was also demolished.

The two who were passengers in the car, one of which was Russell, had severe head injuries as a result of butting the windshield and Russell and the driver both had mouth injuries.

Texas Highway Patrolman Malcom Bolinger, who investigated the accident, stated that charges of driving while intoxicated would be filed against the driver of the car.

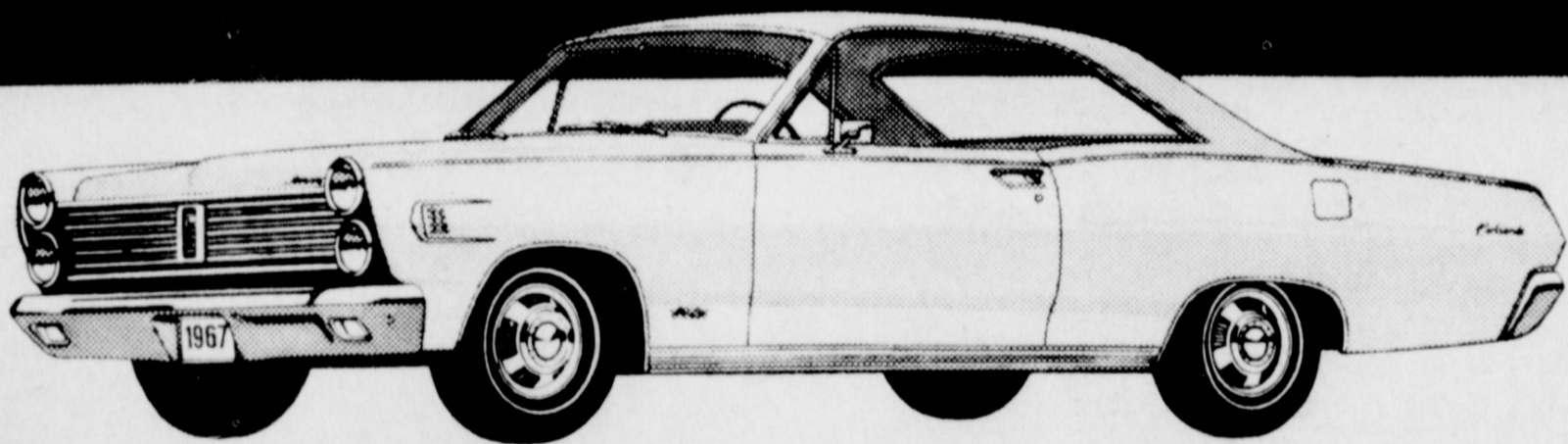
