LISTEN TO LUKE

It was about two months ago that we got a letter from Cong. Richard C. White stating that this nation had not ever before enjoyed such prosperity in peace time as it was presently enjoying. We returned the letter to him querying the words "peace time". We got back some kind of an answer of technicalities confused with terms and coumpled with empty phrases that only confused us more on his "peace time" definitions.

These phrases only grow more confusing as we grieve with our friends, the loss of their loved one, Fay "Tink" deBusk Jr. of Odessa, who spent many days almost in our back yard with his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. O. J. Cresswell.

This is the closest to home of a fatality which occurred during "peace time", but nevertheless at the hands of a man who was bearing arms against other men of our nation, who themselves are bearing arms against the enemy.

Cong. White was also a Marine, as was Tink, and he, too, saw action in the East, on Guam in fact. And we are sure that Dick knows the difference between war and peace. Sometimes we become confused because of the circumstances and of our own situation.

War is not a pleasant word or situation, but just because we are not in it officially, or because we are not in it personally, does not change the fact two national and philosophical enemies are trying to annihilate each other.

Dick and I, and many thousands of others offered their lives on the altars of war, but Tink's offering was accepted, as has been many thousands of others.

By the way, due to the nature of a subsequent personal conversation we had with Dick, we are convinced he did not write the first letter, or the second one, but it was done by some one on his staff.

This week will wind up the term of office as JP for us and we are taking this means, unusual though it may be, to express some thoughts.

First, frankly, we did not enjoy one single minute of it. It was bearable because we felt we were doing something that had to be done, it was necessary for the benefit of the people of the county, for law enforcement, for society, for the benefit of friends, and for the benefit of families of those with whom I was associated as JP, whether in the capacity as magistrate, or judge, or coroner, or as keeper of vital statistics.

All of these things I did to the absolute best of my ability without interest in personalities or concern of pressures. There was never an action with known partiality or impartiality, and never any hard feelings on my part that followed any action or decision.

I do not regret any time or effort spent in handling the job, but I regretted sincerely the fact that many times that it was my responsibility, and mine alone, continued to back page

Broombach told Deputy Sheriff Dalton Hogg, who also went to the fire, that the blaze started in a bed and that he fought the fire for some time before calling the fire department. He lost all of his belongings in the blaze and was clothed only in his socks and underwear when the firemen arrived. He was returned to town and some clothes found for him.

INFANT DIES WHILE FAMILY TRAVELING IN TRUCK

Debbra Charlene Duncan, 3-month old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Duncan of California, was found dead in the back of a truck in which the family was moving to Missouri on Monday night of last week. Death occurred somewhere between Sanderson and Fort Stockton.

At the inquest held by Justice of the Peace J. A. Gilbreath, the cause of death was said to be accidental.

No autopsy was ordered, but investigation by Gilbreath and Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey revealed that carbon monoxide could have been the cause of death, since there was no tailpipe on the muffler which was under the front of the van in which several children were riding, all of whom claimed some degree of illness on the trip.

The body was taken to Fort Stockton for burial Tuesday in that city.

Survivors included the parents and one brother and four sisters, all of whom were traveling together.

Mrs. Floyd Kidwell Killed in Wreck West of Dryden

Mrs. Floyd Kidwell, 40, was killed instantly in a one-car accident about four miles west of Dryden Sunday afternoon about 4:00 o'clock when she was thrown from her car as it overturned.

Mrs. Kidwell was pulling a two-wheel trailer loaded with personal belongings making a move from Del Rio to Alpine when the mishap occurred.

Mr. Kidwell was driving a pickup-camper and was the first to arrive at the scene of the accident. Their son, 16-year-old Floyd Jr., was ahead of them in another vehicle.

The Kidwells recently moved to Del Rio from Sanderson and he is a driller with the Globe Exploration Co.

Justice of the Peace J. A. Gilbreath ruled death accidental and Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey and Deputy Dalton Hogg, who investigated the accident, said it was possible that the trailer began whipping and caused the car to go out of control.

The body was taken to Geeslin Funeral Home in Alpine and services were pending at this writing.

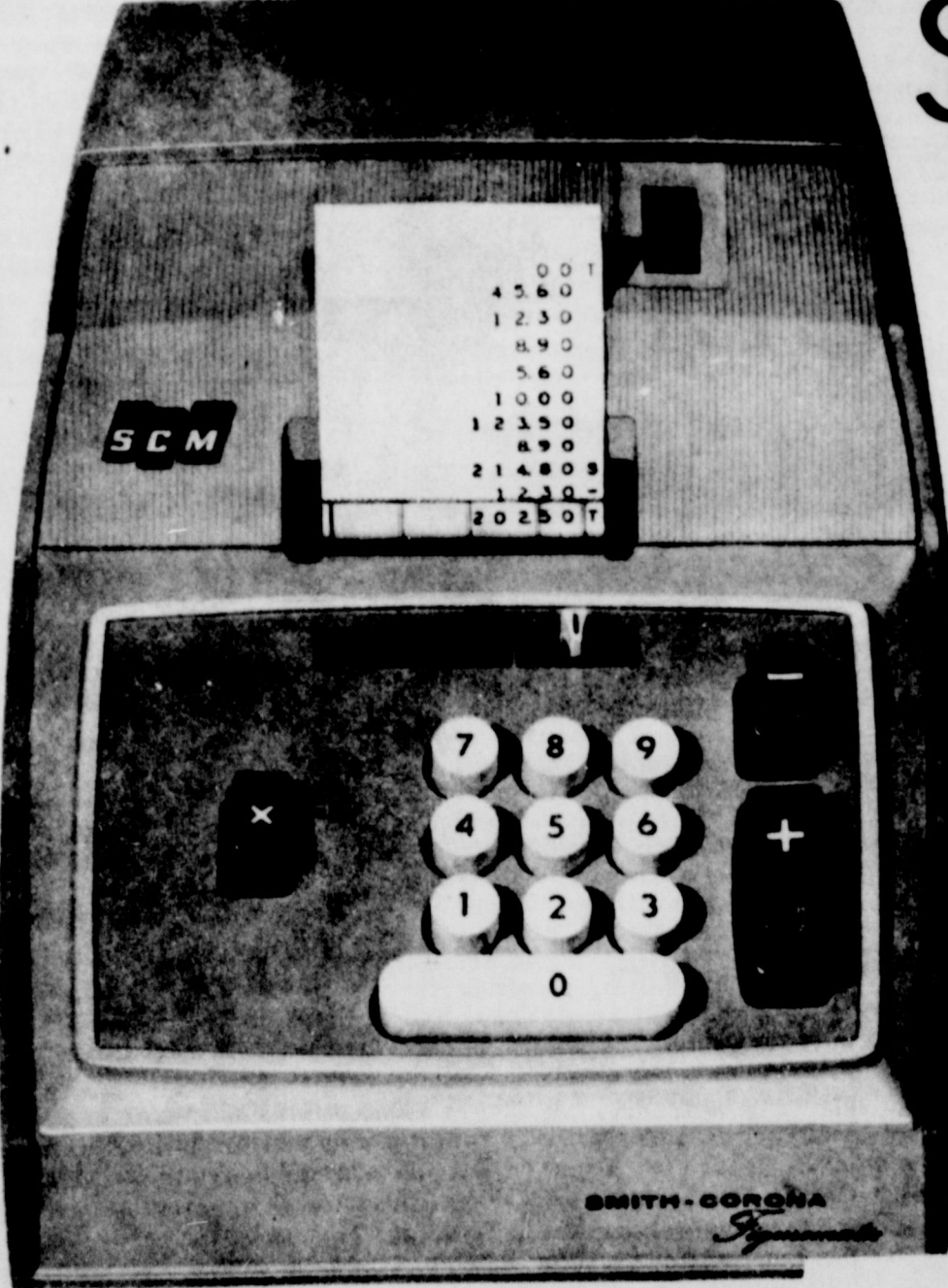

Aid Available For Some Students

Sources of career information for high school students endeavoring to plan their futures are listed in the new 1966 Revised Fall Edition of the booklet, "Need a Lift?", American Legion Auxiliary career and scholastic handbook just received by the Sanderson Auxiliary.

The handbook will be available at the high school and public libraries, according to Mrs. E. E. Farley, education and scholarships chairman for the local organization.

"In the book are the names and addresses of organizations which supply information about careers in many different fields, and I urge all high school students to plan their educational future as early as possible in order to be prepared for higher education," Mrs. Farley said.

She added that in a recent fact sheet, released by the Auxiliary, it was reported that educational allowances of \$171,600,000 have been paid to 91,900 applicants under the Junior GI Bill since its enactment at the request and support of the Legion through June of 1966, and that \$3,200,000 of this total was paid to students during the last school year.

She said that the amendments to the Junior GI Bill during recent sessions of Congress extended benefits to children of permanently and totally disabled veterans in addition to those children where the parent died in service or as a result of disease or injury aggravated while serving in the Armed Forces during the Spanish-American War; WW I, WWII, and the Korean War. Benefits are also extended to children of veterans who died or are permanently and totally disabled while in the Armed Forces during the following periods: Beginning Sept. 16, 1940, and ending Dec. 6, 1941; beginning Jan. 1, 1947, and ending June 26, 1960; and while selective service is in operation from the end of the Korean War (Jan. 31, 1955).

"With the amendments," Mrs. Farley explained, "it is estimated that more than 185,000 children could qualify for the \$130 monthly benefits available for four years of education beyond the high school level."

Other income, including loan programs and funds available as the result of the recent amendment to the Title II of the Social Security Act may be used to supplement Junior GI benefit.

"It is the responsibility of the Auxiliary to bring the facts of the benefits to the attention of the students and urge them to investigate the possibility of their eligibility," Mrs. Farley concluded.

Mother of March of Dimes Patient Teaches Child Braille as Precaution

"When the doctors told me my daughter was probably going blind, I determined to learn Braille and be her teacher. I wanted to cushion the shock of knowing she might lose her sight, and to try to share the experience with her."

Speaking is Mrs. Mary A. Fennell of Archer, Fla., mother of five-year-old Lucille, who has congenital glaucoma (hardening of the eyeballs). The attractive blonde and blue-eyed child is also the victim of another birth defect which consists of malformations of the lymph vessels throughout her body.

"I've been warned," Lucille's mother explains, "that if I make a mistake in her diet—such as using the wrong kind of flour in my pies—Lucille won't be with us very long."

Mrs. Fennell told of her efforts to learn Braille, and why, at the Birth Defects Center at the University of Florida School of Medicine at Gainesville. The Center is one of 77 supported by the March of Dimes across the nation.

At the suggestion of the Florida State Council for the Blind, Mrs. Fennell wrote to the Library of Congress for a book of Braille and teaching instructions. (Available at no cost for anyone declared legally blind.)

"I thought that was all there was to it," Mrs. Fennell says. "I figured I'd just do a little studying and soon I'd be teaching Lucille how to spell by 'feeling' the raised dots. How mistaken I was!"

A person who has normal sight encounters far more difficulty learning Braille than the non-sighted. The reason is that the sighted individual relies on the faculty of sight rather than that of touch.

Lucille will not wrestle with

anywhere near as much of a Braille problem as does her mother. The child's print vision is limited to letters one inch high, so that she will never read book and newspaper type and be confused by memories and associations of the printed letter or word.

Mrs. Fennell is helping Lucille memorize the "feel" of a few letters of the alphabet in raised-dot language, and to recognize how the "feel" sounds when spoken. Mother and child make a game of it. School authorities were so impressed with the child's progress that they permitted Lucille to enter regular kindergarten.

When she enters first grade and moves into a textbook-oriented world, such classic readers as "Dick and Jane" will be unintelligible to her in

conventional type. But her mother will translate such books onto sheets of "raised pinpricks," using a special Braille typewriter.

At the March of Dimes-supported Birth Defects Center, to which Lucille is taken for check-ups every few months, the specialists avoid an unqualified prediction. But if pressure against her optic nerves increases, total blindness is almost certain to result.

Understandably, this is the kind of tragedy that many fathers and mothers find intolerable to face. But Mary Fennell is facing it, the doctors say, courageously and with intelligent compassion. They wish more parents, in similar unhappy circumstances, could summon the same fortitude and sense of realism.


