Aliens Required To Report 1967 Addresses Soon

R. C. Haberstroh, district director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service at El Paso estimated that more than 70 thousand aliens will report their addresses in the district during January under the federal alien address report.
He added that any alien who willfully violates the address report requirement may be subject to serious penalties. In addition, aliens who are not in the United States during January must report their addresses to the service within 10 days after their return.
The district director said that address report cards will be available at the local United States Post Offices beginning January 1, 1967.

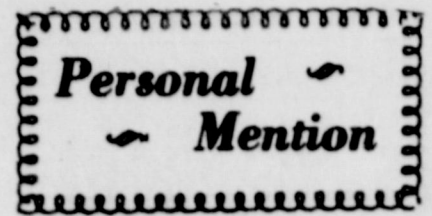

LONG DISTANCE RATES NOW REDUCED

on most station-to-station calls within Texas

ON January 1, long distance rates were reduced on most station-to-station Long Distance calls within Texas.

The reductions, which apply on most calls of more than 56 miles, vary from 5 to 15 cents for three minutes, depending on the distance. Reductions are even greater for calls over three minutes.

In addition, all station-to-station calls within the State of Texas which are made after 8 p.m. and all day Sunday get the lowest night rate—a maximum charge of 80 cents, plus tax, for three minutes to any point in Texas. In the past, only station-to-station calls which were prepaid (charged to the number placing the call) and credit card calls got this low rate.

Much of the credit for making possible these reductions in Long Distance rates goes to telephone users themselves. The cooperation of customers in placing calls by number, using area codes, and taking advantage of Direct Distance Dialing where it is available has helped to make possible the operating economies that led to the reductions.

THREE-WAY BUTTERSCOTCH PIE

1 baked pie shell, 9-inch	3 egg yolks
$\frac{3}{4}$ cup firmly packed light brown sugar	3 tablespoons butter
$\frac{1}{2}$ cup flour	1 teaspoon vanilla
$\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon salt	3 egg whites
2 cups milk	6 tablespoons sugar

In 2-quart saucepan combine brown sugar, flour and salt; mix well. Blend in milk. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until thick and smooth. Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon colored. Add a small amount of the hot mixture to egg yolks. Return to mixture in saucepan. Cook, stirring constantly, 3 minutes. Remove from heat; add butter and vanilla. Cool slightly. Pour into baked pie shell. To make meringue, beat egg whites until they begin to stiffen. Add sugar, a tablespoon at a time, and continue to beat until stiff peaks form. Spread over warm filling being sure meringue touches crust all around. Bake in preheated 350 degree oven for 15 minutes or until meringue is lightly browned. Cool, then chill before serving. Serves 6-8.

CHOCOLATE BUTTERSCOTCH PIE: Grate 2 squares (2 oz.) semi-sweet chocolate. Sprinkle over warm filling. Spread meringue carefully over chocolate and bake as above.

PECAN BUTTERSCOTCH PIE: Add $\frac{1}{4}$ cup chopped pecans to pie crust dough before rolling out. Bake as usual.

ORANGE BUTTERSCOTCH PIE: Sprinkle 3 tablespoons grated orange rind over warm filling and carefully spread meringue over orange rind. Bake as above.

Mailboxes are protected by Federal law, and pranksters or vandals who damage or destroy the boxes and their contents may be in for a heavy fine or imprisonment, Postmaster Les Fulewider warned yesterday.

The Postmaster noted that some 23,000 mail receptacles were damaged or destroyed in the past year. It was also noted that 2,641 persons were arrested in the year up to June 30 for damaging or destroying

Postmaster Fulewider quoted from the law: "Whoever willfully or maliciously injures, tears down or destroys any letterbox or other receptacle intended or used for the receipt or delivery of mail on any mail route, or breaks open the same or wilfully or maliciously injures, defaces or destroys any mail deposited therein shall be fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisoned not more than three years."

"This applies to all mail receptacles and the mail in them even though the boxes are bought by citizens and are their personal property," Postmaster Fulewider emphasized.

"Pranksters — and especially children who do not know any better — should be made to realize the seriousness of their actions," the Postmaster said. "A \$1,000 fine or a term in jail is enough to take the humor out of any prank."

Careless Customers

Five-year-old Billy, on his own, took energetic command of a shopping cart. For about 15 minutes he trotted along pushing the cart in front of him. But at last, veering around a corner, he rammed the cart into an unsuspecting woman shopper. Painfully injured, the woman sued the management and won a substantial judgment. The court said there was plenty of time for the store employees to have noticed Billy's antics and brought him to the attention of his parents.

Case No. Two:
A woman shopper was standing at the checkout counter, her arms full with groceries, when a heavy box of peaches slipped from her hands. It landed squarely on the head of a man behind her. And he sought to collect from the management for his pain and anguish.



At this time, the victim's claim was denied. The court said this was a kind of accident that not even the best supervision by the market could have prevented.

It is not rare, on a store's premises, for one customer to carelessly injure another. For several reasons, the victim may sue the customer who injured him or the management.

In the above cases illustrate, the store may indeed be held liable—only when the danger could have been reasonably foreseen and prevented.

What if there is some inherent danger in the merchandise itself? This adds an extra dimension to the store's policing responsibilities.

A gun shop that allowed a patron to manipulate a loaded shotgun was held liable when he accidentally shot another customer.

A sports shop that let golfers practice swings in an unenclosed area was held liable when a man's club hit another man's.

Suppose the customer is not careless but reckless or even negligent. As a rule that is not considered foreseeable, so the store is not to blame.

For example, a store was held liable when a man suddenly deliberately shoved a woman through a plate glass window. The court said the management need guard against an act that, in ordinary experience, simply does not happen.

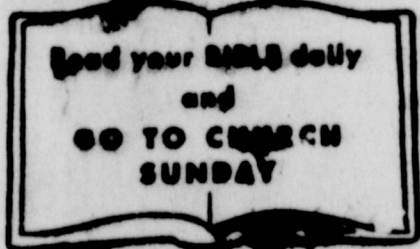

Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Marquez Jr. were hosts to a Christmas dinner at their new home in Del Rio on December 25.

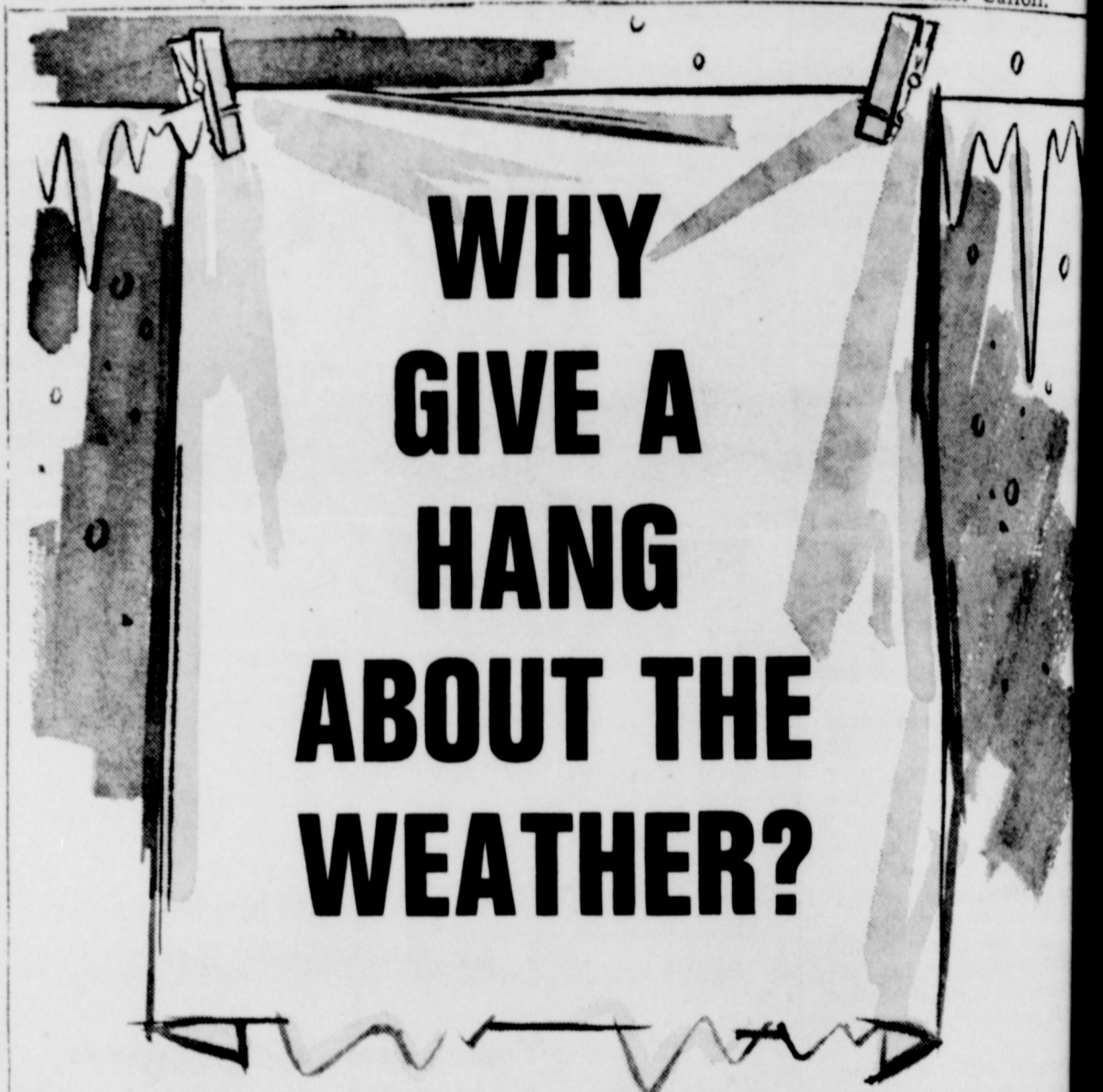
