If there is nothing else done in a constructive way this year our Representative Richard White, his efforts to get a "pay as you go" bill through on the government's financing program is worthy of note.

This is a simple and sensible program that has our support.

Another one that we thought goes along with the general government's way of doing things --- would be for the people, the taxpayers, to match the money to the federal government, all that is saved by the government from duplication, waste, elimination of unworthy unneeded projects, saved by the elimination of globe-trotting excursions for vacation purposes by legislators and those on their staff, elimination of family subsidization by the government to some legislators who put their wives, children, etc., on the payroll; etc., etc., etc.

We feel that if the people see a purposeful and plausible effort on the part of the legislature to save money, that there would be an easier effort in raising taxes, the budget, or whatever.

And, too, when we turn the incentive payment program in reverse, it puts the government back in the hands of the people where it belongs.

The incentive program seems to work pretty well in establishing a ceiling on the wool market, and it could very well do the same thing for our government.

It has been said that we only get what we pay for - and there is no greater truth! But we pay for some things that some other people get sometimes without our knowledge or consent.

We wonder, if and when action is taken in the hallowed halls of Congress to unseat the congressman from Harlem, if the words "Let him who is without guilt cast the first stone." will come to the minds of those who are confronted with the issue?

This is not intended to imply that all who are in our legislature are guilty of similar acts, or kindred acts, but there have been some runblings of some things-ons that might not stand close scrutiny lest it bring severe censure on others.

Nor do we intend to imply that just because others may be guilty but as yet do not stand accused or found guilty, that one who does stand accused should be punished though found to be guilty.

If this were so, there would be no jury ever seated, because one of us stand completely guiltless!

Two Local Ladies Are Named To Culture Study

Mrs. S. D. Harrison, president of the Sanderson Culture Club, and Mrs. N. M. Mitchell, member of the Cultural Affairs Committee of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, have been designated as the local coordinators for a cultural resources inventory to be taken in Sanderson as a part of an official statewide survey now being conducted by the Texas Fine Arts Commission, according to Mrs. Ted Johnston, president of the Western District of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs.

John Ben Shepperd of Odessa, chairman of the newly-created Fine Arts Commission, said, "We are indeed grateful to Mrs. Harrison and Mrs. Mitchell for undertaking the completion of our survey in Sanderson. This is a unique project in Texas; nothing of its kind has ever been undertaken in the state of Texas before."

The purpose of the survey is to determine both the quantity and quality of cultural activity both by organizations and individuals now going on in the towns and communities in our state. "We plan not only to catalogue the various organizations active in the fine arts field in Texas, but to identify individual artists, authors, craftsmen, and the location and identification of local public and private works of art and collections," Shepperd said.

When tabulated, the results of the statewide survey will be used by the Commission to develop an over-all plan to utilize the cultural resources of the state to meet the needs of the greatest number of persons possible. The survey results will also permit the Commission to publish a "Who's Who" in the arts in Texas, a calendar of cultural activities and events, and a list of available talent, performing arts groups and exhibits, and to develop pilot projects that would assist in the development of the arts in Texas.

Voter Registration Until February 1 For 21-60 Year-Olds

All persons between the ages of 21 and 60 in Terrell County who wish to vote in elections after February 1 of this year are required to register at the office of the sheriff in the county court house during January.

Voters may sign the registration either in person, or send it on the prescribed blanks by mail. The voter must sign in person with the following exceptions: husband and wife can sign for each other, parents can sign for sons and daughters and children for parents - but brothers and/or sisters may not sign for each other, nor any other relatives or agents.

The poll tax, formerly a prerequisite for voting in Texas, has been outlawed by federal law, but persons still must register to be eligible to vote if between 21 and 60. Persons over 60 are not required to register except those living in incorporated towns of 10,000 or more by federal census.

The information required of voters registering is the same which formerly was required on poll tax receipts: name, age, address, occupation, citizenship, and length of residence in the county and state.

Funeral services were held in Del Rio Tuesday for Pedro Gonzales, 77, a World War I veteran, who died in Brooke General Hospital in San Antonio on last Thursday. He had been undergoing treatment there for a short time.

He worked for years as a ranch hand in Terrell and Val Verde Counties.

Besides his widow, Mrs. Hortencia Gonzalez, of Ciudad Acuna, Mexico, he is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Eligio Bustos of Sanderson and Mrs. Raul Yanez Sr. of Merced, Calif.; a son, Eutimio Gonzales of San Antonio; and two grandsons.

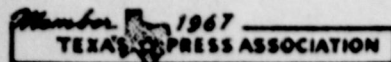

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TSTA Hits New Peak in Membership: 116,000

AUSTIN - Membership in Texas State Teachers Association for 1967 has boomed past 116,000, TSTA Executive Secretary Charles H. Tennyson announced this week.

Last year's TSTA rolls numbered 102,500. Tennyson said final totals this year might reach 117,000 before the counting is over.

Tennyson said the big membership jump shows Texas educators are united in their desire to build the state's educational offerings into "the very best."

Tennyson said: "This new membership record shows Texas Teachers want a strong professional organization. The states with strong and active professional associations are the states which make progress in their schools and colleges."

"It is not coincidence that California, whose schools are rated at the top, is the state with the largest professional education association," he said.

"Among the 50 state professional education associations in the U. S.," said Tennyson, "TSTA ranks second."

Tennyson said that 1942 has been the only year in TSTA's existence when membership records were not surpassed.

"Today, even when Texas is in the midst of the worst teacher shortage since 1942," he declared, "the teachers of this state are continuing to

band together in the cause of better education."

Texas' ranking among the 50 states in average salaries paid to classroom teachers has fallen to a new low, the Texas State Teachers Association announced last Wednesday.

The annual salary of a classroom teacher in Texas, according to new statistical data, is \$6,025 compared to the national average of \$6,821.

The \$796 deficit places Texas in the 33rd rank among the 50 states.

Last year, Texas ranked 29th in the nation. But the state dropped to 33rd because other states moved ahead with improved teacher salaries.

Texas fares worst in the new rankings with average salary increases granted in 1966. For Texas this amount was only \$95.

This puts Texas 49th in this category. Only Wyoming, with a \$46 average increase, is lower.

The rankings were prepared by the Research Division of the National Education Association and published in "Estimates of School Statistics 1966-67".

TSTA has a proposed teacher pay increase platform in its 1967 legislative program.

If the Texas Legislature approves the pay increase proposed this year, according to a TSTA leader, the new boost would "just barely" bring Texas up to the pre-

sent national average "and no higher."

The official, Dr. Joe B. McNiel, Superintendent of Wichita Falls Schools and Chairman of TSTA's Legislative Committee, said the TSTA program envisions an average increase in Texas classroom teacher salaries of \$775 in the minimum salary schedule for Texas classroom teachers.

"Compare TSTA's \$775 average increase with the difference of \$796 in our present salary schedule and the national average and you can see that TSTA's program is indeed a must," McNiel stated.

"At best," said McNiel, "the TSTA pay program is an interim measure preparatory to action on salaries we hope will be granted two years from now."

A study committee set up by an act of the Legislature in 1965 is expected to recommend higher salaries for Texas teachers in 1969.

"Texas can't wait until 1969 for action and we think the Legislature knows this," McNiel said.

"The TSTA program," he added, "is an interim measure needed now to prevent our present shortage of 5,000 teachers from becoming a deeper crisis."

Hospital Board Raises Rates to Increase Pay

Members of the Pecos County Hospital Board in their January meeting Monday voted to adjust salaries in the Fort Stockton and Iraan hospitals to allow for increases in living costs and to bring them more nearly in line with prevailing rates in surrounding communities.

To finance the increases in pay for employees, deemed necessary to keep help and obtain replacements as needed, they voted an increase in room rates.

At Iraan the increase will be a flat \$3 per day for all rooms. In Fort Stockton the private room fee was upped from \$20 to \$22 and other types of patient care were raised in proportion.

New board members appointed were Kenneth Swetnam, replacing Wendel King at Imperial, and Jimmy Rooney, replacing M. S. Calhoun in Fort Stockton. Reappointed were Mrs. Herman Saenger and A. E. Ivy, in Fort Stockton, and Walter W. Hensley, Iraan.

The board plans to name its officers for 1967 at the February meeting.

Many Texas Cars Still Need New Inspection Tag

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, has reminded Texas motorists that most vehicles have not yet been inspected for their 1967 vehicle inspection sticker.

"The inspection period is two-thirds over and only about one-third of the vehicles have been inspected," said Garrison. "This means that during the 14 weeks remaining before the April 15 deadline for inspections, more than twice as many persons each week must have their car inspected to avoid long lines forming at the end of the period."

In urging motorists to have their vehicle inspected at an early date, Garrison pointed out, "time will be saved for the motorist as well as for the inspection station."

"And if you have not had your vehicle inspected, take it to one of the 5,500 authorized inspection stations

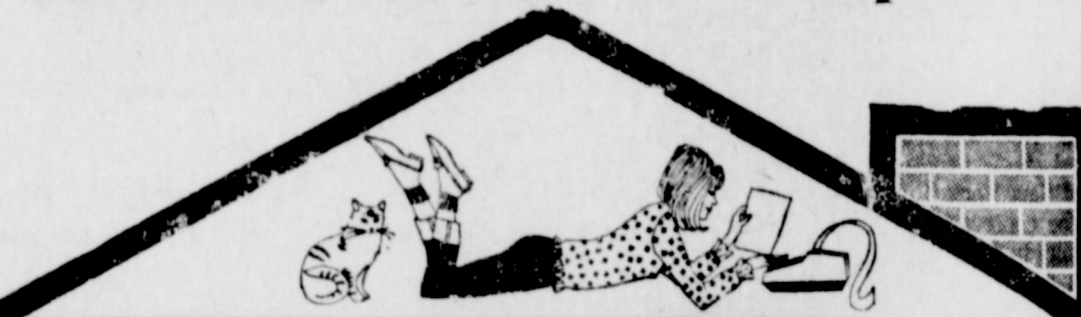

An estimated two and one half million older people will have received hospital treatment under medicare by the end of the year. Some of these people will be eligible for extended care benefits when the second step of the medicare program goes into effect January 1.

Starting January 1, persons 65 and over who have been hospitalized for at least three days since the hospital insurance part of medicare began operation on July 1st and whose doctor had them transferred for further treatment, may be eligible for payment of the costs of such continued treatment in a skilled nursing home or other institution that qualifies for participation in medicare.

Medicare can pay all the basic costs of up to 20 days in an extended care facility certified to participate in medicare, and all but \$5 a day for an additional 80 days.

To qualify, the person must have entered an extended care facility for continued treatment within 14 days of leaving the hospital, following his hospital stay.

This extended care benefit of medicare is a special kind of benefit that will be needed by only a limited number of those who are hospitalized. It is designed to provide skilled nursing care at less cost than hospital care for those who no longer need the intensive care of a hospital. Only this skilled nursing care, generally needed for a short period, will be paid for by medicare. Long-term custodial care in a nursing home is not covered.

Thomas also indicated that many existing nursing homes will not qualify to provide this special kind of benefit to medicare beneficiaries, because they provide mainly custodial services or residential care rather than skilled full-time nursing care.

About 4600 nursing homes across the country had sent in applications to participate in medicare by the middle of November. State agencies are now surveying these institutions to see if they meet the quality standards in the medicare law. The Public Health Service, on the basis of its review, will determine whether each institution meets the nondiscrimination requirements of the Civil Rights Act.

The Odessa Social Security Office has free informational leaflets covering this part of medicare.

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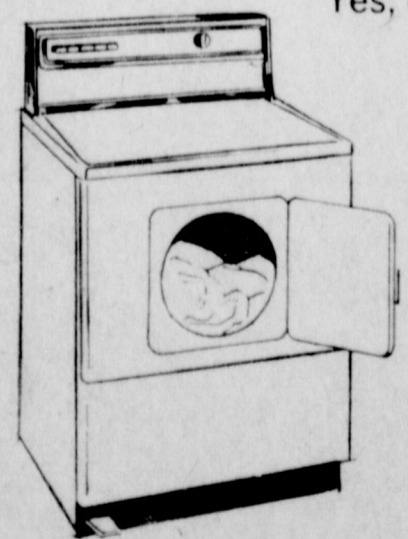


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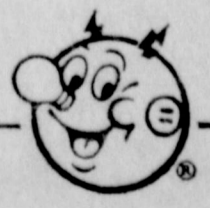
