LISTEN TO LUKE

This is just past the time for the payment of the income tax for some people engaged in certain businesses, and just prior to the payment of income taxes by some other people, so it's an opportune time to talk a little about the income tax. Especially since we have just finished with the computing of ours!

Many people do not realize the amount of the tax since it is withheld from wages in many instances and the employee does not ever get the money and his pay consists - to him - of the amount of his check only! Then, too, the housewife seldom realizes the amount of the income tax since often they see neither the paycheck nor the list of deductions.

And, too, usually, after the computation of the tax at paying time for employees on a regular salary, there is either a small amount due or a refund coming and that, to many, is the income tax, either a small amount of payment, or - lucky - a refund.

For the information of those who never see a tax schedule, it is interesting to note that if you make, say \$7,500.00 taxable income, your tax is - if you are man and wife filing a joint return - \$620.00 plus 19% of \$3,750.00, or a total of - can you stand it - \$1,332.50. This is just over 1/5 of your total taxable income, or 20¢ of every dollar.

We think there would be more economy in government if everyone were to get their paycheck at one window and pay their income tax at the next one, then realizing the cost of government, might work harder to keep it down.

But in this, as in most other misfortunes in life, there is a brighter side!

Isn't it nice that we still do not have as much government as we are paying for?

Absentee voting in the election for trustees to the Terrell County Independent School District and county school board trustees from precincts 2 and 4, and a county trustee-at-large will extend through Wednesday, March 29.

The regular election will be on Saturday, April 1.

Three men have filed for the school district trustees, incumbents Herbert Brown and Santiago Flores, and Jack Hardgrave, who previously served on the board.

Ernest Harkins, whose term expires this time, did not announce for re-election due to his increased ranching interests and lack of time necessary to do the school board job properly.

Voting will be in all four precincts for all posts except the county board offices in precincts 2 and 4.

Paul Smetack, Fort Stockton, Low Bidder Of Five on Medical Center Building

Bids for the construction of the Trans-Terrell Medical Center Inc., building were received and the contract awarded to the low bidder Tuesday morning. The action was postponed from Monday due to the inability of the architect to be here Monday.

Paul Smetack, Fort Stockton, was the low bidder on the project with a bid of \$23,605.00.

Other bids submitted were: Harry Mills, \$27,690.97; Hollis Alexander, \$29,141.97; J. M. Patterson, Midland, \$31,746.00; O. T. Sudduth, \$24,994.68.

Items not included in the contractors' bid include \$9,950.00 for the cabinet work, and \$3,950 for the wall products, making the total building construction come to \$37,745.00.

The contractor has agreed to begin work within 30 days and approximately 90 days will be needed for the completion of the building.

Following the awarding of the contract, it was signed by Smetack and Sid Harkins, on behalf of the medical center executive committee.

Dr. Jeff M. Flowers was asked to meet with the committee, the contractor, and the architect and some minor changes were made in the plans of the building interior to meet the desires of the doctor. The change was the elimination of a partition between two of the examination rooms to make facilities available for the delivery of babies and post-natal care until the mother and infant can be moved.

The doctor stated that: "This looks real good to me. It will give me what I want."

The architect, James W. Dipperman, associated with the Medical Facilities, Inc., Iowa City, Iowa, went over the details of the various phases of the building

specifications and details to satisfy the immediate interest of the group assembled and explaining anything pertinent to the design, construction, etc.

All of the building committee members, Edward Kerr, Mrs. J. M. Davis, and Bill Smith, expressed complete satisfaction with the details and design of the building.

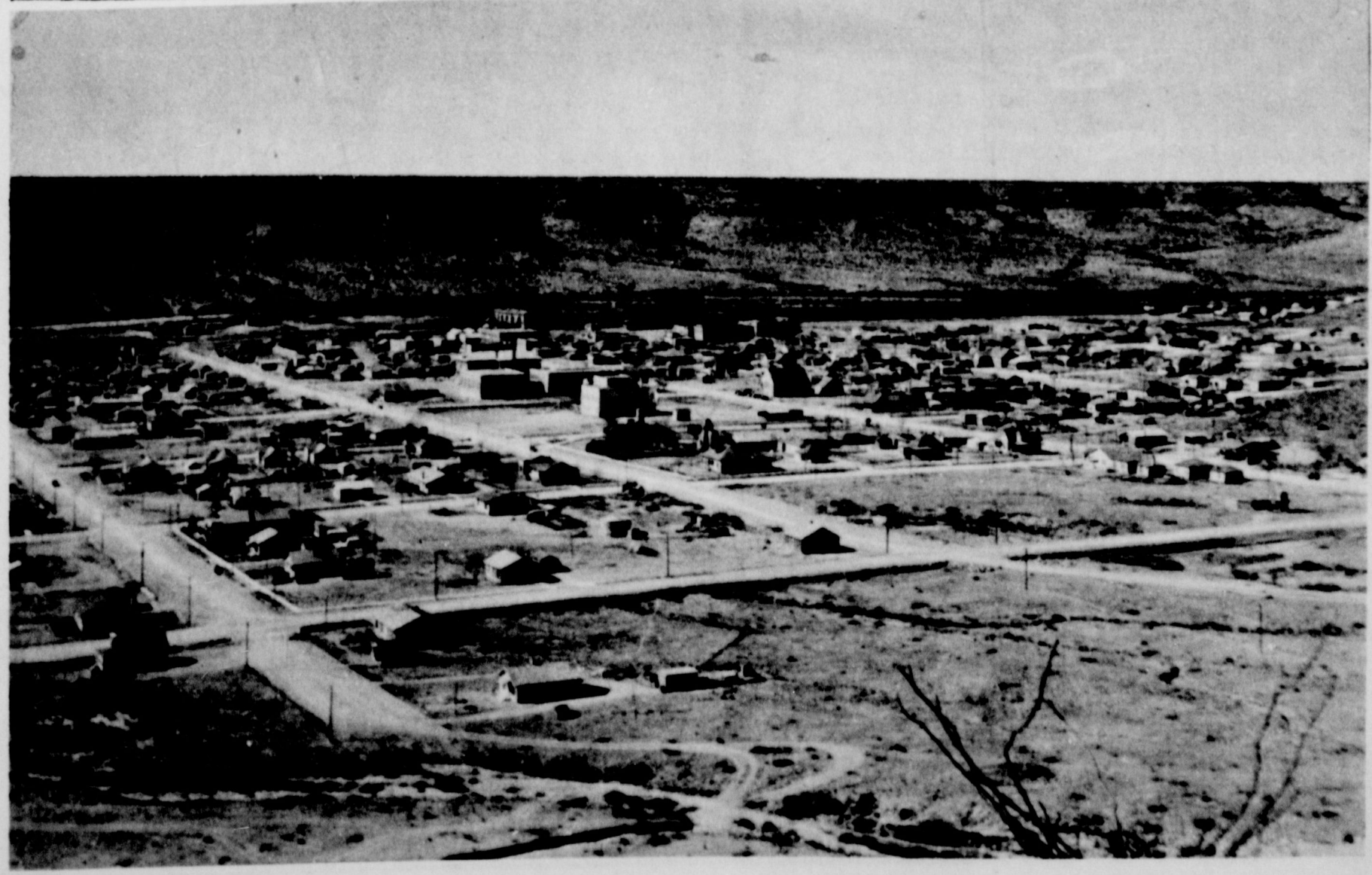
F. C. Bernhard, Del Rio Brakeman Drops Dead Here

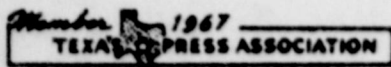

Prompt Filing for Social Security Claims Is Urged

"Filing social security claims promptly has never been more important than it is now," H. P. Thomas, district manager of social security in Odessa, said today.

"While benefit claims may be retroactive for a year or more, the enrollment period for medical insurance is greatly restricted," he said. "Protection under the 'doctor bill' part of medicare can start on the first day of the month you attain age 65 only if you apply for it in one of the three months before the month you reach 65."

"This restriction, incidentally, does not apply to hospital insurance; it applies only to medical insurance," he added.

The first enrollment period set by law covers seven months: the three months immediately before the month of attaining age 65, that month, and the three months immediately thereafter. However, if the application is filed in the month of attainment or later, the effective date is postponed one to three months.

If application for medical insurance is not filed during the first enrollment period, protection cannot be obtained until the next general enrollment period, which will be the last three months of odd-numbered years. Premiums

Phone Company Lowers Rental On Princess Sets

Two Train For Ambulance Drivers

Two Sanderson men participated in an ambulance attendance course at Texas A&M University last week.

First aid, emergency care and transportation and emergency driving were covered in special courses. Instruction and field exercises were conducted by 13 doctors, public health educators and emergency specialists. The topics covered included handling shock cases, unconscious patient, care of dislocations, common medical emergencies, head and facial injuries. Field exercises featured the rescue of victims from simulated auto accidents.

Ambulance drivers, funeral home personnel, fire department emergency crews and emergency personnel from law enforcement agencies and industry were among 53 participants in the weeklong course.

Deputy Sheriff Dalton Hogg and L. E. Muller were in the training program.

Easter Seals Are Mailed Last Week

Easter Seals to raise funds for crippled children went into the mail last week, according to W. L. Card of Fort Stockton, chairman of Pecos and Terrell counties. The seals depict a pajama-clad child in the attitude of prayer, a crutch beside the figure, which is in white against a green background. Rays of golden light are shown descending toward the child and the words "Easter Seal 1967" appear in gold.

"Do you know a handicapped person who needs help and isn't getting it?" is the question being asked by Mr. Card, who is the person to contact for services from the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas.

The Easter Seal Society offers rehabilitation services to help disabled persons and their families to find and make the most effective use of resources which will be helpful to them in developing their abilities and living more purposeful lives, Card said.

This is accomplished in direct treatments, services, education, research, and cooperation with all other health agencies, private, state, and federal.

Mr. Card urged every person in Pecos and Terrell County to increase their support of the Texas Easter Seal Society and its program of services to the crippled children and adults.

He added that anyone who could benefit from rehabilitation services should contact him at the First National Bank in Fort Stockton.

Through his efforts the local library will participate in the "rotating book collection" in the Trans-Pecos area. 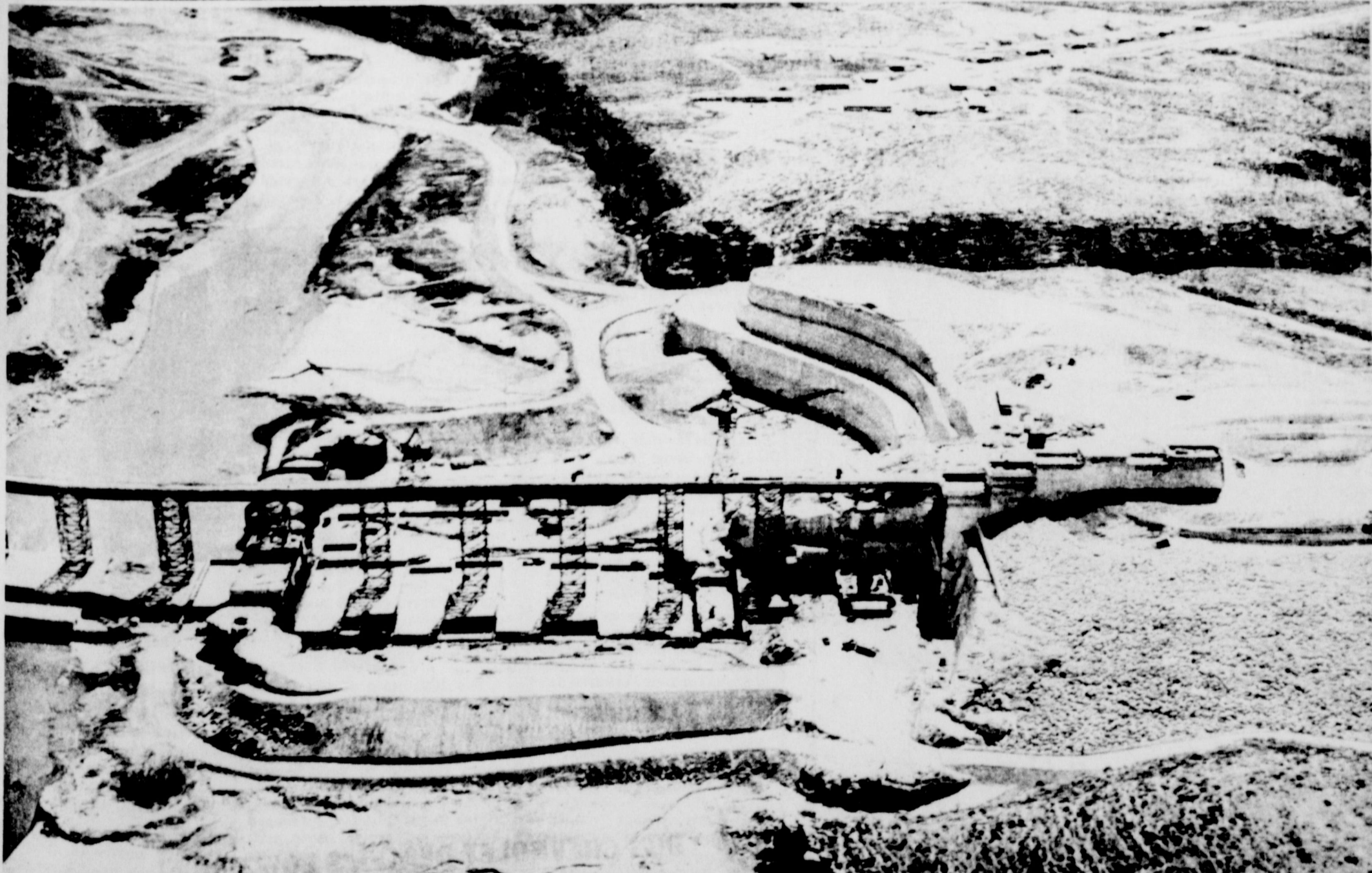

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

The whiffenpoof bird is reputed to fly backward to see where it has been. This skill could prove to be very useful for government in checking the effectiveness of bureaucracy which becomes more complex and overburdened daily.

But it doesn't take much retrospection to see that the government is unprepared to administer the Great Society programs introduced, nor able to control or predict the wildfire war in Asia into which the country has been flung.

Governmental welfare programs have been as abundant and overwhelming as the food stored by a pelican in his bill because the bird is unable to digest it all at once.

The 89th Congress passed 21 new health programs, 17 educational plans, 15 economic innovations, 12 new city programs, 17 plans for new resource development, and 4 programs for manpower training.

Sen. Robert Kennedy, N.Y. recently complained that it is nearly impossible for many civic officials to understand what government money is available, for what purposes it can be spent, and which agency to go to for information.

Sen. Edmund Muskie, Maine, went a bit further in an attempt to break down the departmentalism, noting that there are now 170 recorded Federal aid programs, financed by over 400 individual appropriations, and administered by 21 Federal departments, assisted by an additional 150 Washington bureaus and more than 4000 regional offices relegated to process applications and appropriate funds.

Sec. of Health, Education and Welfare, John Gardner also confessed: "In almost every domestic program we are encountering a crisis of organization. Coordination among Federal agencies leaves much to be desired. Communication between the various levels of government—Federal, state, and local—is casual and ineffective. State and local government is in most areas seriously inadequate."

Gardner asks the American people to remedy the crisis since Washington is not equipped to solve the problem.

There are at present, 80,000 separate local governments in the country, but few are sufficiently strong enough in resources, population, or jurisdiction to get much done.

The 1967 State of the Union Message outlined plans for further juggling of the war with expansion of Great Society programs. Might it not have been more realistic to declare that until still unknown demands of the war are met, it is impossible to administer increased domestic programs, or to estimate costs? If realism isn't soon forthcoming, the country might become as forlorn as the overweight dodo bird, unable to fly, and extinct in a modern world.

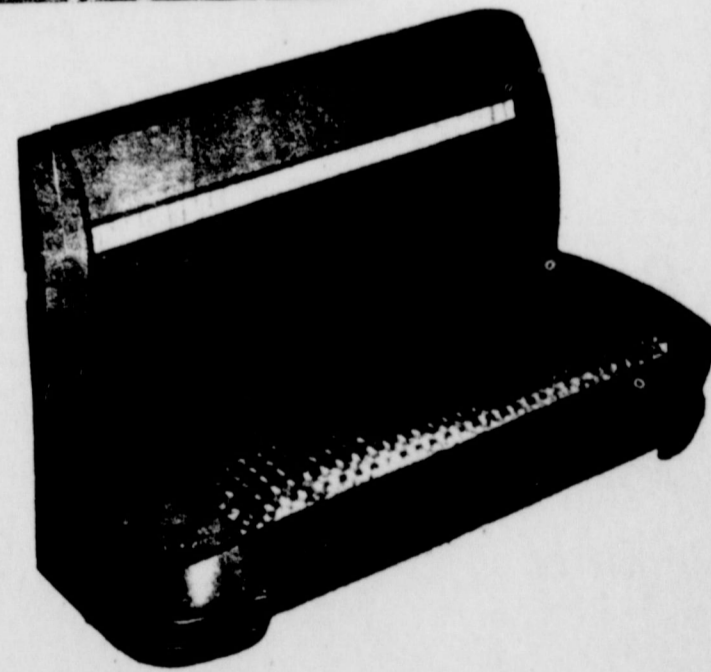

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Livestock Sales Begin Thursday At Sonora Pens

Sonora Livestock Exchange Company is opening its 1967 season with a sale March 16 and auctions scheduled every Thursday through the fall. Sam E. Jones Jr., one of the managers, said that he felt the company could better serve the needs of ranchers and buyers with weekly sales. Last year sales were held every two weeks.

Jones said that all classes of livestock would be sold, and that special sales would be held throughout the season featuring different kinds of livestock. Special goat sales are scheduled for March 23, April 6 and 20, and a horse sale has been planned for May 18.

Special lamb sales and feeder calf sales will be announced in the future. Jones said the feeder calf sales were something new for the company, and that sales would be planned for both early calves and fall calves.

This season a roof will be added to the shearing pen for shearing and shed space, and pens have just been finished to make livestock handling more convenient.

The stockpen facilities were built new in May of 1964 as a community effort to promote marketing of livestock in Sonora. Facilities are among the most modern in this part of the country and are leased to Sonora Livestock Exchange Co. under the management of Jones, Sears Sentell, Bill Whitehead and Gerald Hartgraves. All have livestock and ranching backgrounds.

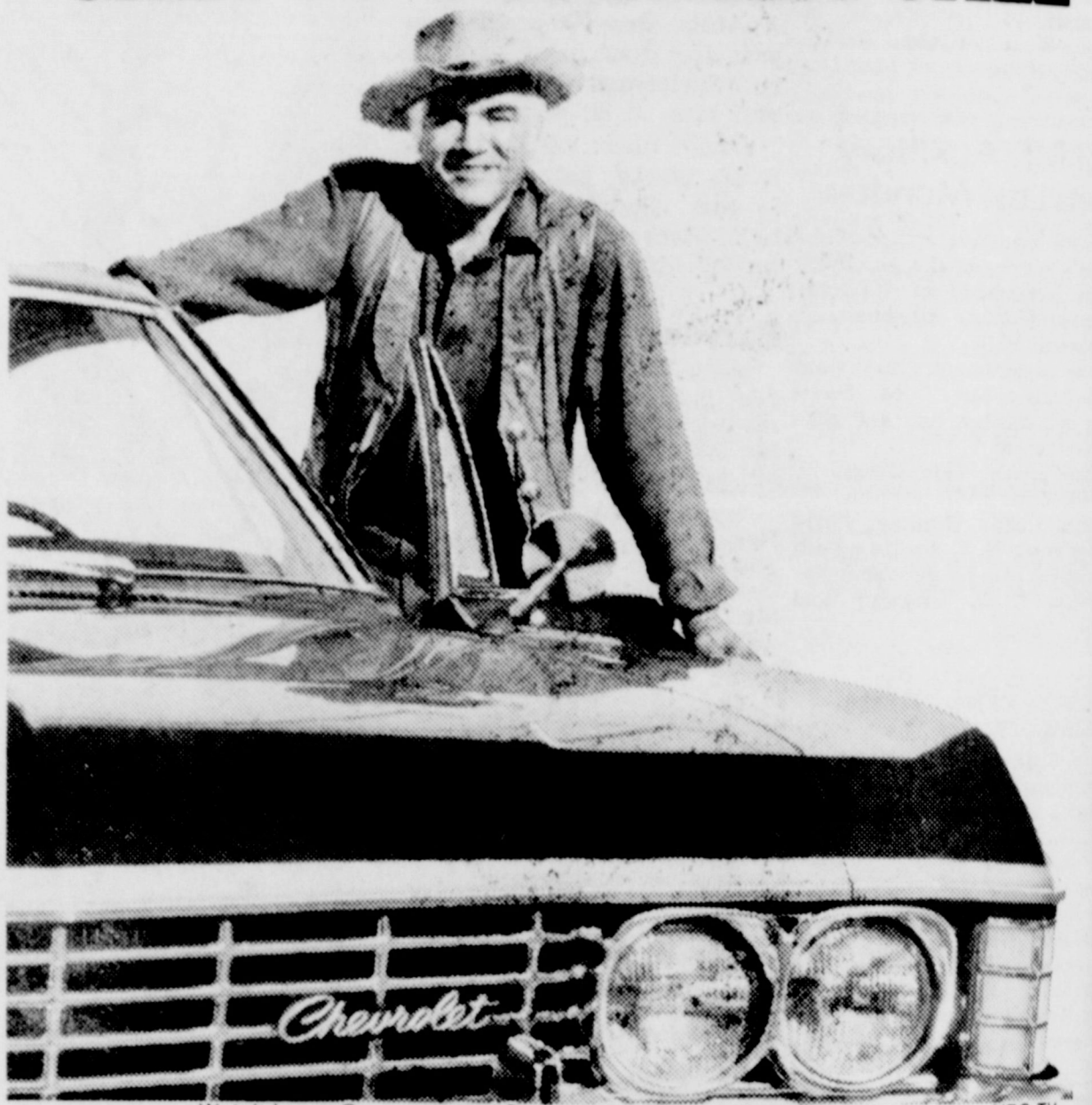

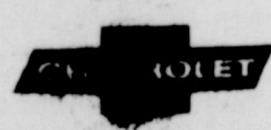
