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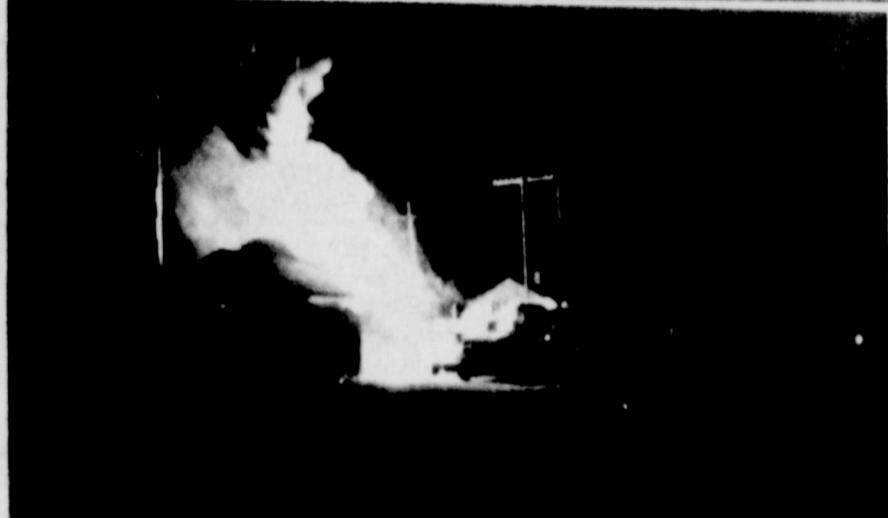
LISTEN TO LUKE

Gasoline Storage Fire Early Tuesday Poses Serious Threat for Short While

What may well have ended up in a terrible holocaust turned out to be little more than a routine fire in the early hours Tuesday morning.
 Local citizens were awakened at about 1:00 a. m. Tuesday by an explosion of gasoline vapor set off by a motor spark at the Texaco bulk plant. Two transports were unloading volatile fuel at the time and neither of the drivers was injured.
 The flames completely consumed a 22,000 diesel and gasoline storage tank and ignited the vapors coming from the filler ports of the transports. About 15 minutes later the pop-off valve on the diesel end of the storage was released and another explosion rocked the night.

Most of the fire was centered above the tank, whose ports had been blown open, permitting the vapor to escape and burn.
 In an effort to save the two transports, Dudley Harrison was joined by W. W. Sudduth and they unhooked the filler hose from the transports and doused the flame above the filler ports permitting the trucks to be driven off without any immediate hazard. They also put water up on the tank where the fire was, and in the cooling, were able to completely douse the flame of the vapor.
 There was some damage to the tank and pumping facilities at the bulk plant, according to Jolly Harkins, Texaco consignee, but he said that only about 1% of the total volatile liquid was consumed in the fire and explosion.
 Spectators feared the rupture of the large storage tank, which would have sent the 22,000 gallons of flaming liquid to the ground to spread to the other storage and no-telling where, eventually.
 There is in storage at the bulk plant, 38,000 gallons of kerosene, diesel, and gasoline, and there was 1,000 gallons in both of the transports, making a total of 39,000 gallons which might have been released to burn, all of which would have resulted in explosions of the vapors upon ignition, and the subsequent explosion of the empty tanks.
 The fire and all existing hazards had been eliminated by about 2:15 a. m.

Tomas Benavides Dies Here Tuesday

Funeral services are tentatively set for Thursday afternoon at 4:00 o'clock for Tomas R. Benavides. Following services at St. James Catholic Church, burial will be in Santa Rita Cemetery with the Owens Funeral Home of Fort Stockton in charge of arrangements.
 Mr. Benavides died in a Fort Stockton hospital Tuesday afternoon following surgery performed that morning, reportedly of a heart attack. He had been in failing health in recent years and retired three years ago. He was a county employee in the sanitation department.
 Born in Corralitos, Texas, on November 1, 1895, he came to Terrell County about 45 years of age. He was married to Ignacia Saenz on March 4, 1942.
 Besides his widow, he is survived by a daughter, Miss Armanda Benavides; a brother, Juan Mercado, Kyle; four sisters, Miss Manuela Benavides, and Mrs. Jose Gomez of Kyle, and Mrs. Albert Moreno and Mrs. Viviana Moreno of San Antonio.

Besides her mother, she is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Harry Rucker of Corpus Christi, and Mrs. M. R. Williams of California.

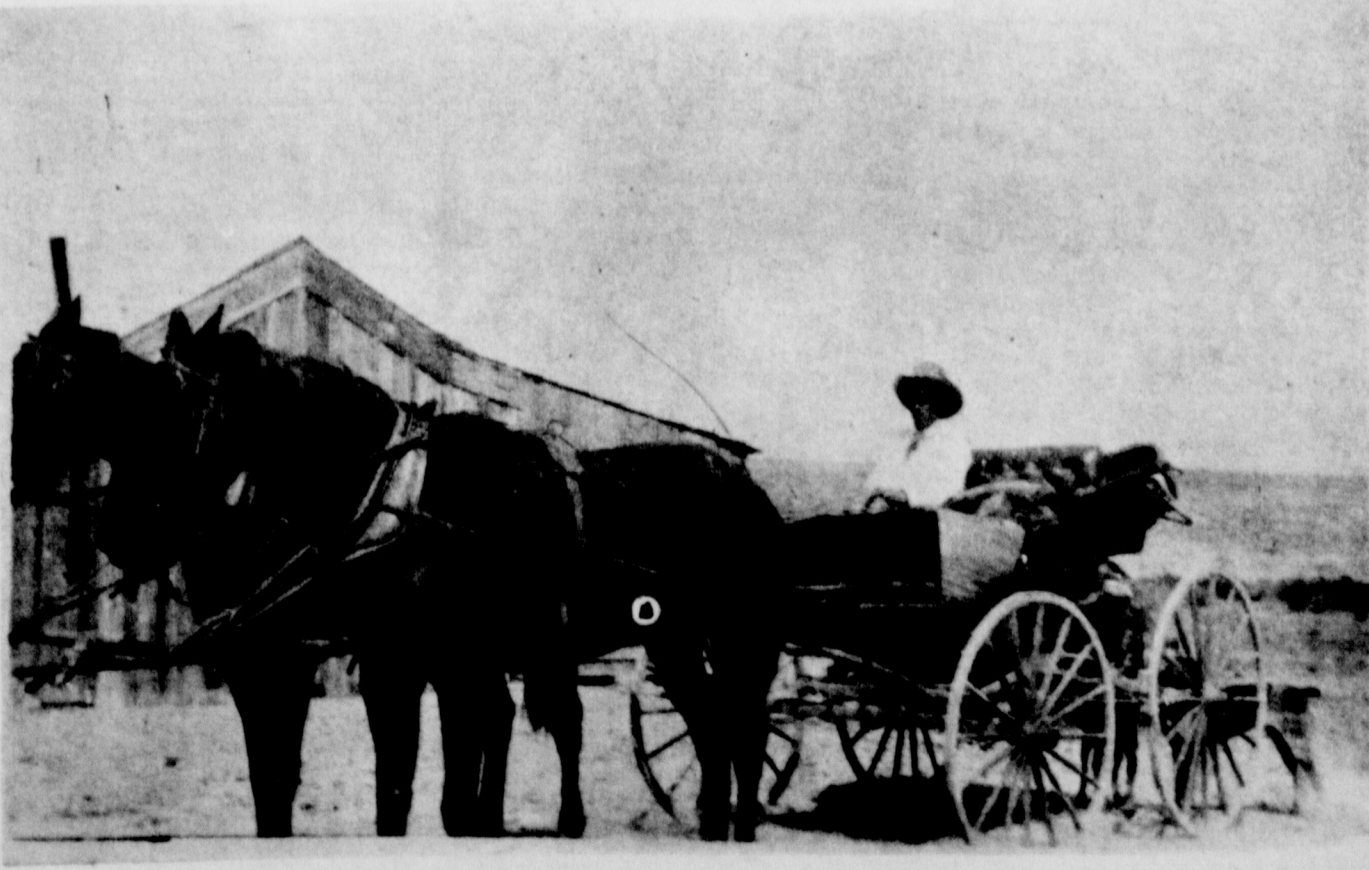
School Election To Be Saturday

Jack Piggs, Charlie Turk, and John Harrison presently hold the offices on the county board up for grabs.

The elections will be in all four precincts of the county and polls will be open from 8:00 a. m. to 7:00 p. m. There will be a separate ballot for the school and county elections, but both will be given the voter at the same time, if he wishes to vote in both elections.

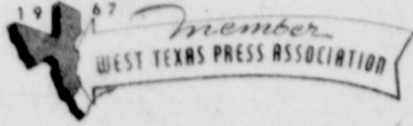
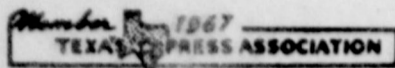

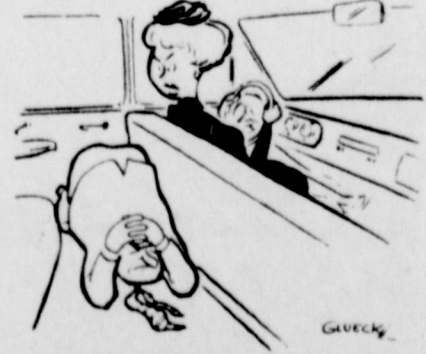

Had the fire been allowed to continue out of control, the storage tanks would have broken open and these 40,000 gallons of fuels would have flowed flaming down the street, setting fire to every building in their path.

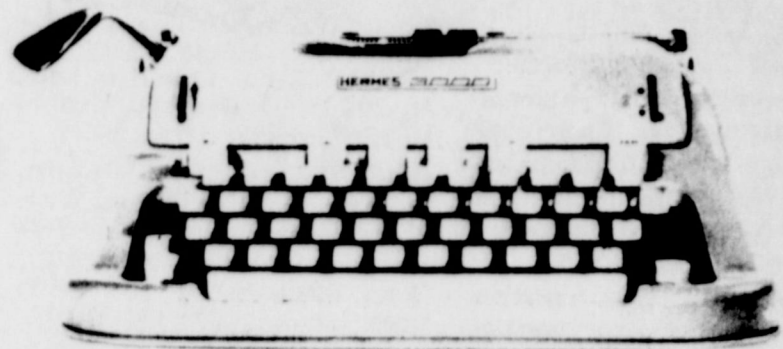
They saved from destruction the product of the life's work of one family, and at the same time prevented a major disaster in our community.

Dog Registration —

continued from front page

control of any dog six (6) months or more of age, to permit or allow said dog to run at large, unless such dog shall have been by such owner or person having control of said dog duly registered with the County Treasurer . . . , and shall have securely fastened about its neck a dog identification tag showing its registration and duly assigned to said dog by the County Treasurer . . . Sect. 4. Each dog so registered shall be subject to a tax of One Dollar (\$1) which shall be paid to the County Treasurer at the time of such registration and shall cover the costs of registration and identification tag, and shall be good for the period of one year from the date of such registration. . . .

Section 2. . . . it shall be unlawful for the owner of any dog to allow such dog to run at large between sunset and sunrise of the following day, unless such dog has securely fastened about his mouth a leather or metallic muzzle as will effectively prevent such dog from killing or injuring sheep, goats, calves, or other domestic animals or fowls.

Section 3. Any dog, whether registered and tagged or not, when found attacking any sheep, goats, calves, and/or other domestic animals or fowls, or which has recently made, or is about to make such attack on any sheep, goats, calves, and/or other domestic animals and fowls, may be killed by anyone present and witnessing or having knowledge of such attack and without liability in damages to the owner of such dog. Any dog, whether registered and tagged or not, known or suspected to be a killer of sheep, goats, calves, or other domestic animals or fowls, is hereby declared to be a public nuisance and

such dog may be detained or impounded by any person until the owner may be notified, and until all damage done by said dog shall have been determined and paid to the proper parties. Any dog known to have attacked, killed, or injured any sheep, goat, calf, or other domestic animal or fowl, shall be killed by the owner of such dog, and upon failure of such owner to do so, any sheriff, deputy sheriff, constable, police officer, magistrate, or County Commissioner is authorized to kill such dog, and such officer, magistrate, or County Commissioner is authorized to go upon the premises of the owner of such dog for such purpose.

The owner of any sheep, goats, or other domestic animals, subject to the ravages of sheep-killing dogs, may place poison on the premises where such sheep, goats, and other

domestic animals are kept, after posting notices of such poison at each place of entrance to said premises.

Section 5. The owner of any dog who shall willfully fail or refuse to register such dog, or who shall willfully fail or refuse to allow a dog to be killed when ordered by the proper authorities so to do, or who shall willfully violate any provision of this Act, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding One Hundred Dollars (\$100), or by confinement in the county jail for not more than thirty (30) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.
