We would hazard a guess that there were more people concerned over the soap operas that they missed last week than were concerned over who was elected to the school board last Saturday!

We have absolutely nothing against the wonderful media of communication of news, entertainment, and commercials, but we wonder sometimes about the place of importance that it takes in the lives of some of the people who have access to it.

Wednesday of next week at 10:00 a. m. at the courthouse is the date, time and place for the hearing by the Corps of Engineers on their bid to do a flood control project in Terrell County.

They are asking that everyone who has anything to add to the hearing, either pro or con, come to the hearing and give voice to the group in charge. The role they play in the future efforts along this line will be determined by the quality and quantity of testimony or evidence that is submitted.

Everyone who has any interest in whether or not the Corps of Engineers comes into the picture, should go to the hearing particularly if you are able to give any testimony to support or oppose the project.

Up to now, the State Soil Conservation Service has been involved with local officials, as well as officials of Pecos and Brewster Counties, in a proposal to build a number of small dams on the watersheds of Sanderson Canyon and Three-Mile, with the idea of controlling the water before it gets to the canyon proper. The planning party for this project is tentatively scheduled to be here this summer to ascertain the needs and make the plans for the fulfillment of those needs. There is, according to our information, almost a two-year head-start on any other proposal, and the Soil Conservation Service proposal is the one that was adopted by a Steering Committee after studying all of the available proposals and taking many things into consideration.

U.S. Government Pays \$12,799 For Flood Repair Aid

Terrell County Judge R. S. Wilkinson received a check for \$12,799 from the U. S. Government as their share of disaster aid as promised soon after the June 11, 1965, disaster.

Sanderson was declared a national emergency area by President Lyndon B. Johnson immediately after the flood, and several days later officials from the state and federal government were here to offer their assistance to local officials. Most of the reconstruction work had been accomplished, but there remained a few costly and time-consuming projects that were on the schedule, and some of the work that had been done was not yet paid for.

The amount submitted for payment by the federal government was \$13,282, but auditors refused to pay some of the costs which were legitimate claims, but not covered under the program of the government's aid.

Terrell County spent about \$40,000 and had received contributed labor and materials that amounted to between \$75,000-\$100,000, Wilkinson stated.

Mrs. Viola Breeding Dies Saturday

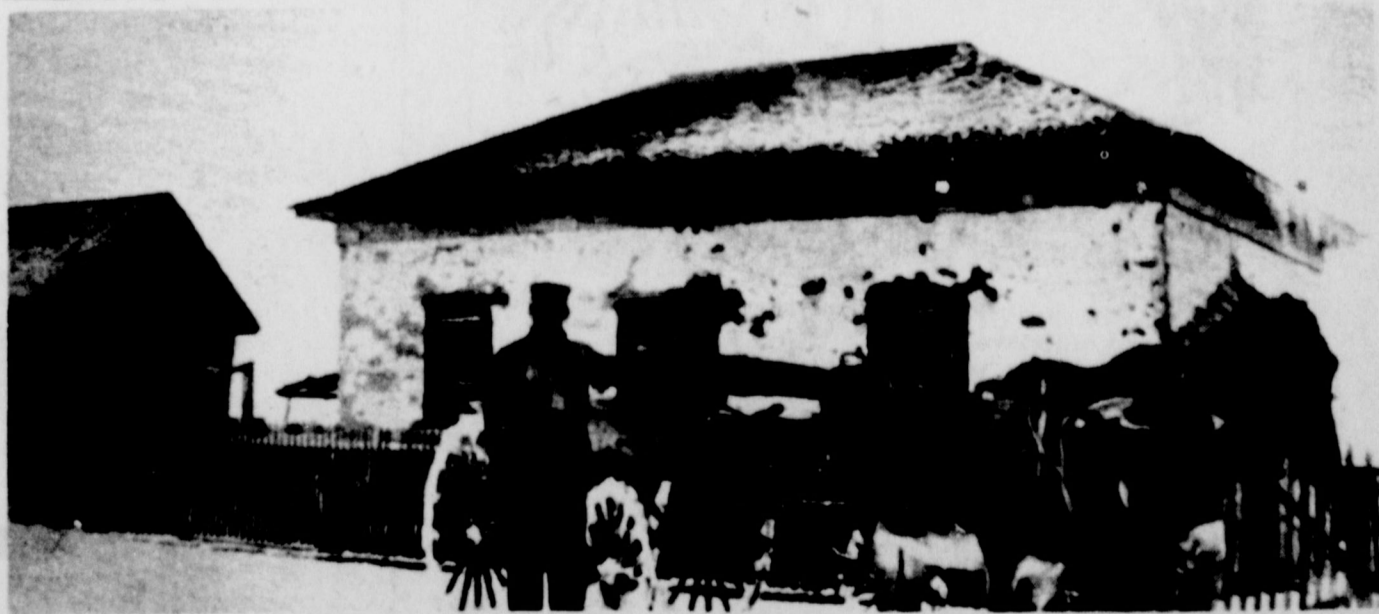
