Wool Incentive Payments Made

Terrell County ranchmen received \$202,279.16 in production incentive payments on 1966 wool and mohair last week when drafts were mailed from the AS CS office, according to Terrell County Committee Chairman E. E. Harkins Jr.

After promotion fund deductions were made \$114,403.43 was paid to 87 producers to support prices received on 950,645 pounds of shorn wool and the unshorn wool on 29,375 cwt. of unshorn lambs. Payments are made annually in accordance with the National Wool Act of 1954, as amended subsequently. Withheld at the rate of 1 1/2¢ per pound on shorn wool and 7 1/2¢ per cwt. on unshorn lambs, net promotion deduction is \$16,462.86 from this county. This fund is administered by the American Sheep Producers Council, Inc., to promote and increase the woolen market.

Under a new agreement approved recently by mohair producers, the Mohair Council of America, Inc., will receive \$6,277.19 from local growers to promote the mohair market. One and one-half cents per pound withheld on 418,479 pounds of mohair sold left support payments of \$87,875.73 for 70 growers.

The 1966 incentive price for wool was 65 cents; the national average price received by growers was 52.1¢. This necessitated a payment rate of 24.8 percent applied to net returns of ranchmen. The payment on the sale of live lambs that never have been shorn is based on the payment rate for shorn wool and was 52¢ per cwt. The 1967 incentive price level for wool has been set at 66¢.

The national average price received for mohair in 1966 was 53.7¢ per pound in contrast to the desired incentive level of 75.8¢; therefore, the incentive payment rate for mohair was 41.2 percent of net proceeds. The incentive price for mohair during 1967 has been set at 76.4 cents per pound.

Local Group To Sponsor Effort For Swim Pool

A group of local citizens met at the St. James rectory Thursday night of last week to discuss the feasibility of obtaining the funds for the construction of a swimming pool for the people of Terrell County.

The group was composed of L. E. Muller, W. S. Smith, Carlos Dunn, Rev. Dan Dierschke, and Rev. Bob Moon, all of whom were named to a steering committee; and Rev. Maynard R. Rogers, J. R. Hodgkins, Mr. and Mrs. Andres Falcon, and Mrs. Ramona Olivares.

It was agreed to follow the program as presented by the Farmers Home Administration for a loan to finance the project.

A public meeting will be called in the near future, according to Smith.

Henry Bustos Buys Royal Cleaners

Announcement was made this week of the purchase of Royal Cleaners by Henry Bustos. Carlos Dunn was the previous owner.

Bustos has been one of the employees in the business for many years, doing the cleaning and pressing work and is entirely familiar with the processes.

The new owner stated that he would appreciate all the patronage of local citizens and stated that he would do his best in the work and service for his customers.

Dunn stated that he appreciated the business of area people during the time that he was the operator of the cleaning shop and expressed a hope for a continuation of the patronage of the business under the new owner.

Rain Fall Monday Over One Inch

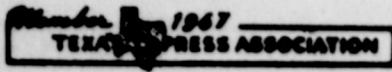

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Public Hearing

The hearing at the courthouse Wednesday morning in reference to a Corps of Engineers study of the needs for flood control for Sanderson was very brief.

After a presentation of the scope of the Corps in such projects, and an explanation of the reasons for their being here, a brief amount of testimony was given for the need of some sort of flood control for Sanderson by Judge R. S. Wilkinson and John Daugherty of the State Water Board. Mr. Fraser, engineer with the State Soil Conservation Service, then explained their proposed methods of flood control.

Following this, Col Hottenroth, CE, Albuquerque, N. M., who conducted the hearing, stated that since the project was under the Soil Conservation Service at the time, and since the plans being considered were sufficient to take care of the needs, and that they were two years into the project with their planning, that he was entering into the testimony, his opinion which was to withdraw the Corps of Engineers from the project to prevent a duplication of work and effort and expense in the making of the study.

Survey Cards For Cancer Crusade To Help in Study

Mrs. Web Townsend, Cancer Crusade chairman, has announced that the annual drive here will begin Friday with a coffee at the Oasis Restaurant. Riley Sloan, district director of the Texas Division of the American Cancer Society, will show a film before the solicitors begin their house-to-house canvass. The Crusade will last through May 1.

Each worker will give to each family a survey card to be filled in by a man and woman in each household and mailed. The card will not be signed and the information will be confidential.

The survey is being made to ascertain the impact of the 5-year goals fixed by the Society and made through several medias.

Nothing shows more forcefully how far out of perspective values of human life have become than the need for the Society's 5-year educational program to drastically reduce unnecessary deaths from cancer.

The Society has selected six sites of cancer, representing over 60 per cent of all cancer cases and some 48 per cent of all cancer deaths, for special educational emphasis.

These sites of cancer - uterus, breast, lung, colon and rectum, oral cavity, and skin - accounted for nearly 150,000 deaths in 1966, many of them due to lack of personal responsibility and personal vigilance.

Take three examples: lung cancer took more than 50,000 lives last year; most lung cancers are caused by cigarette smoking. (Despite intensive warnings more than half of all teen-agers ignore the scientifically proved dangers to their health and become regular cigarette smokers by the time they are 18.) Skin cancer took nearly 5,000 lives; most skin cancers are caused by too frequent over-exposure to direct sunlight. Uterine cancer took the lives of about 14,000 women; yet, due to the Pap test, it should be possible to detect this cancer at a stage when the chances of a cure are virtually 100 per cent.

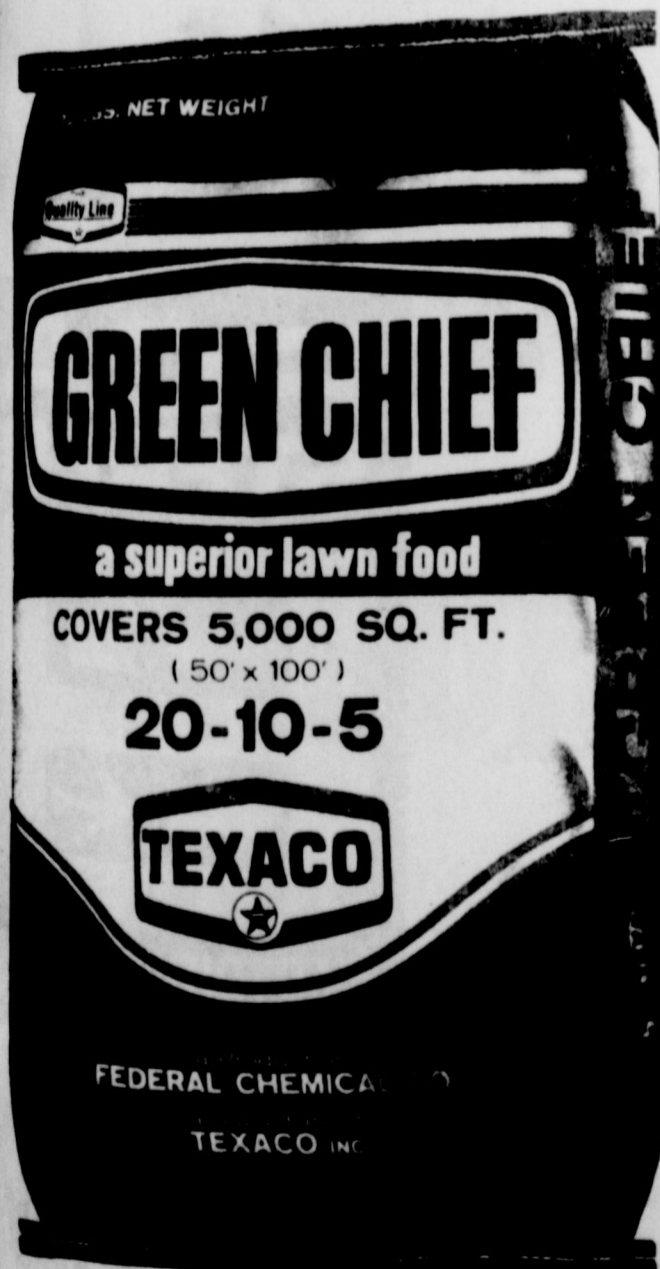
