New Airport For Sanderson Planned

New airports for Sanderson, Big Bend National Park, Fort Davis, and Dell City, plus improvements to all existing airports in the 16th Congressional District, are included in the 5-year National Airport Plan for the fiscal years 1968 through 1972. The plan, published by the Federal Aviation Administration, Department of Transportation, was delivered to Congressman Richard C. White by the office of FAA Administrator William F. McKee.

The plan makes recommendations as to what new airports should be constructed and which airports need improvements to keep pace with the rapid advancements of the aviation age. While the report makes no pledges of government funds, it sets up goals toward which the Administration would like to work as necessary funds, local and federal, are available.

The report proposes a basic-utility airport for Sanderson, with maximum runways of 3,800 feet.

Local Flood Control Committee Active In Project Plans

The Sanderson Canyon Watershed steering committee, composed of members of the sponsoring organizations, are taking every avenue to keep the local activities up to date.

The steering committee has been obtaining written permission from the ranchers in the watershed for the planning party to make their surveys for possible sites for the flood water detention structures. The steering committee is also maintaining contact with the State Soil Conservation Service on how the steering committee can be of assistance.

The application for the Sanderson Canyon Flood Prevention project is in Washington, D. C., awaiting approval for planning. It is expected that approval will be received after July 1, in the 1967 fiscal year.

W. H. Savage To Get 50-Year Masonic Award

W. H. Savage will be awarded a 50-year Masonic membership pin Saturday, April 29, at a meeting in Alpine.

J. D. Tomme, of Fort Worth, Texas Masonic head, will be in Alpine for the occasion and five Masons from that city will receive similar honors.

All of the men have been members of only one lodge during their 50-year tenure.

Mr. Savage is a past-master of the Sanderson Masonic Lodge and a past district deputy grand master of this Masonic district.

Following the opening of the lodge in Alpine at 6:00 p. m. on the 29th and the reception of the Grand Master, dinner will be served at 7:00 p. m. at the Alpine Community Center with the Alpine lodge and the Alpine and Sanderson O.E.S. chapters as hosts.

Smetak Dropped as MC Contractor; New Contract To Be Awarded Soon

Paul Smetak of Fort Stockton, lowest bidder for the construction of the Trans-Terrell Medical Center building, forfeited his opportunity to construct the building by his failure to begin construction within the specified 30 days and his ability to produce a performance bond, according to the building committee of the Medical Center.

At the time the contract was awarded, Smetak was advised that the performance bond was

a requirement of the contractor as advised by the Sears Roebuck Foundation, and he had asked for 30 days to begin the job, which was approved by the committee.

The executive committee, composed of Sid Harkins, Troy Druse, Jack Hayre, R. S. Wilkinson, and Darwin Schrader, met Monday afternoon with the building committee - Edward Kerr, W. S. Smith, and Mrs. J. M. Davis to take action on the Smetak contract and to consider the other bids submitted previously.

The awarding of the new contract is expected this week.

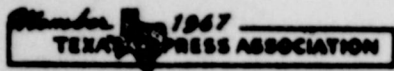

These were the first words Mrs. Myrtle Allen heard when she answered the call on her switchboard. A telephone operator in Dallas, Mrs. Allen tells what happened next: "He could hardly talk," she recalled, "but it was evident he was stricken, on the floor helpless and had managed to dial 'Operator' for help. I told him to stay on the floor and not to worry because I wouldn't leave him."

With practiced efficiency, Mrs. Allen swung into action. Using another line, she called for an ambulance, alerted the man's next-door neighbor and notified his nearby relatives.

All the while, she kept the man on the phone, cautioning him not to move.

An ambulance arrived and rushed the man to a hospital. After being assured he was taken care of, Mrs. Allen returned to her normal work routine.

Later, the man, who had suffered a heart attack, called

the telephone company and told how he had been helped. "Had it not been for that operator, I would have died," he said. "She was insistent that I keep quiet on the floor. The doctors told me it saved my life."

"It was thanks enough to me that he got help on time," said Mrs. Allen. "Any operator would have done the same thing."

We're proud of Mrs. Myrtle Allen. Her actions in a time of trouble exemplify the highest ideals of the spirit of service of telephone people.

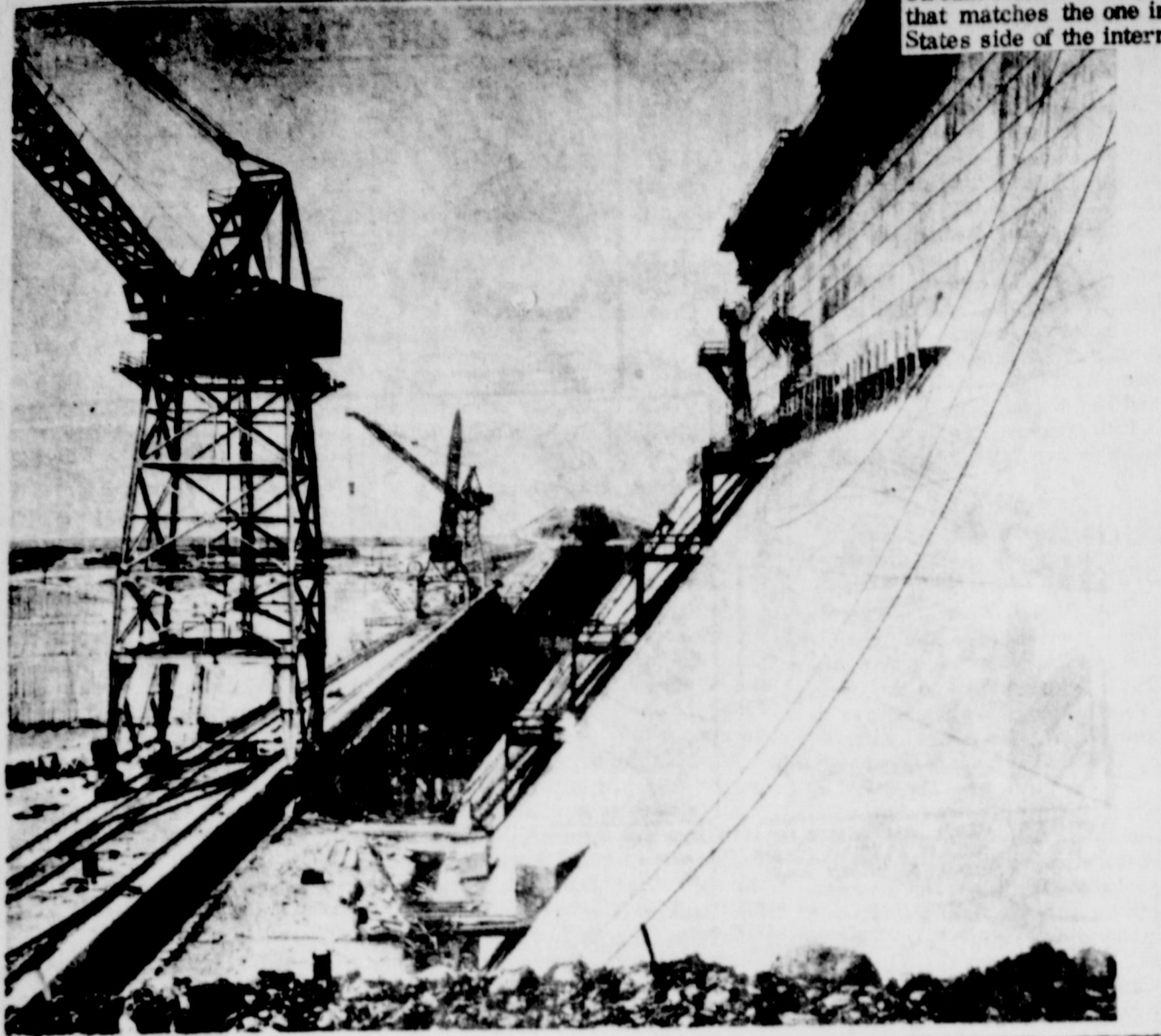

Approved financial statements, approved student handbooks, and a contract with Sul Ross College for practice teaching next year; the Sanderson State Bank was approved as a depository.

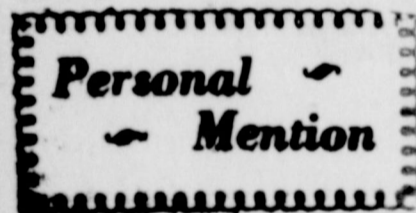
The building and renovation program was discussed and a special meeting was called for Monday, April 24, for further discussion.

Jose Flores Dies Monday Morning

Funeral services were held at the St. James Catholic Church Tuesday afternoon for Jose Flores. He died at his home early Monday morning. He had been in failing health in recent months and had been home from an Alpine hospital for only a few days.

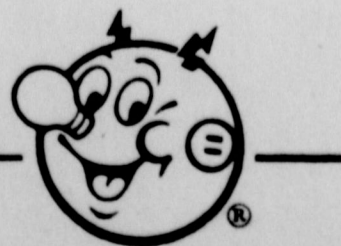

Only Half of Students In US Taking Driver Ed

Despite the proven effectiveness of driver education, only 50 percent of eligible high school students are taking such training because of lack of funds and facilities for teaching the courses, according to the American Automobile Association.

The AAA Club reported that out of 2,994,653 eligible students, a mere 1,509,917 were enrolled in accredited driver education courses last year. It added that 12,771 or 71 percent of U. S. high schools offered the approved course of 30 classroom hours plus six hours behind-the-wheel.

In Texas 49,707 students out of 182,731 eligible high school youngsters were enrolled in an accredited driver education course. Out of 1366 high schools in Texas, a total of 961 offered such training.

The latest statistics on high school driver education were summarized by the Insurance Institute for Traffic Safety and released by Texas Division AAA.

The AAA club said that participation in driver education by U. S. high schools and enrollment by students have shown a steady increase in the past six years, but that far too many youngsters of driving age do not have this opportunity to improve their skill behind the wheel.

During the 1959-60 year, 9,629 U. S. high schools offered driver education to a total of 771,194 enrolled students. By 1962-63, the figures had increased to 10,756 schools and 1,087,479 students. Last year's totals

reached on all-time high.

The AAA predicted that the recently passed Federal Highway Act would drastically change the entire driver education picture. It explained that the new law virtually required the states to support effective traffic safety programs through its provision to penalize uncooperative states by withholding Federal-aid road funds.

Only six states offered accredited driver education courses in all of their high schools — Delaware, District of Columbia, Illinois, Michigan, North Carolina and Utah.

Two states, Michigan and North Carolina, reported 100 per cent enrollment of its high school students in such classes.

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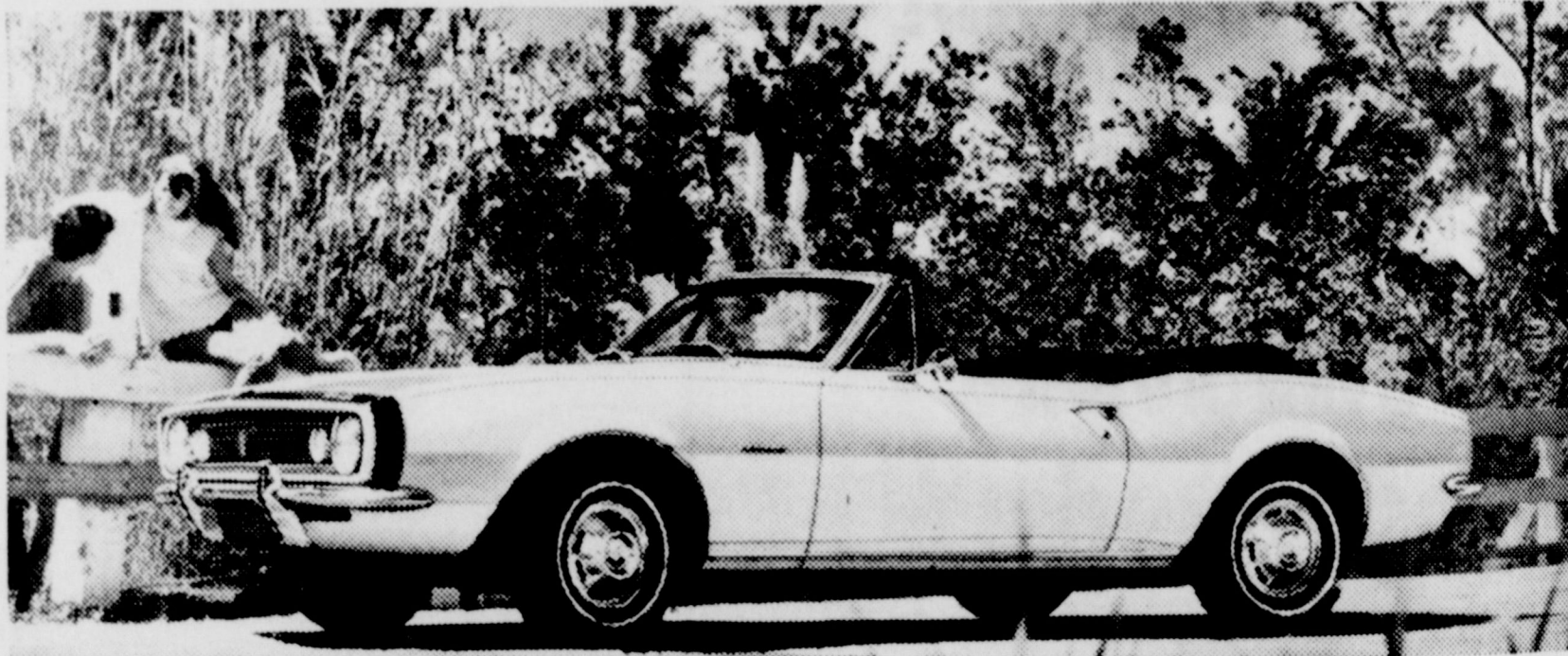
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
