Everyone or anyone who has any questions to ask about the pending bond issue to be voted on May 23 should go to the court house tonight to hear the presentation of the facts concerning the proposed building and remodeling program for the local schools, including a new junior high school building.

The elimination of the red brick building is something that has been recommended, advocated, suggested, demanded, and otherwise treated for the past several years - over 20 - that we know of.

Parents of children, friends of parents of children, and friends of the children have long felt that the building was unsafe, a fire hazard, and should be eliminated for the sake of the children.

It has taken the school board a long time - and not those on the present board - but all those who have served on the school boards over the years - to decide to do something about the building. And it must have taken a good deal of consideration, because the present board has been working for some time on it.

We are going to find out at the time of the election just how much some of our taxpayers want the new, safer, more modern building.

We believe that the board has done enough research, investigation, looking, planning, adjusting, cutting, revamping, and otherwise lining up the program sufficiently to warrant a passage of the bond issue and a vote of confidence for those who have worked so hard in the planning.

There should be a large turnout of the taxpaying voters on the day of the election to indicate the will of all - or the majority of the taxpaying voters.

Everyone feels better about any election when it is the will of the people, rather than the will of only a handful.

Preliminary Plans Being Made For Flood Control Work

There has been no planning approval that has been received by the Soil Conservation Service for the Sanderson Canyon Watershed project. It is hoped that the approval will come soon after July 1, according to local SCS representatives.

Three men from the SCS planning party in San Marcos were in Sanderson last week making a reconnaissance of the Sanderson Canyon Watershed. This trip was to obtain information from the local SCS technicians and to see the watershed.

When approval is given, the information will be used to order maps of possible places to install dams, estimate the cost of planning the project, and to bring the information they have on the watershed up to date.

Livestock Survey Cards Are Mailed

Postmaster J. R. Hodgkins reminds rural patrons of the Sanderson Post Office to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey cards. Next week survey cards will be placed in a sample of boxes belonging to farmers and ranchmen.

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Mr. Hodgkins explained. "It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the letterdrop. This way, USDA gets a true sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings".

After adding and analyzing the cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the state's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets.

S. D. THOMPSON DIES

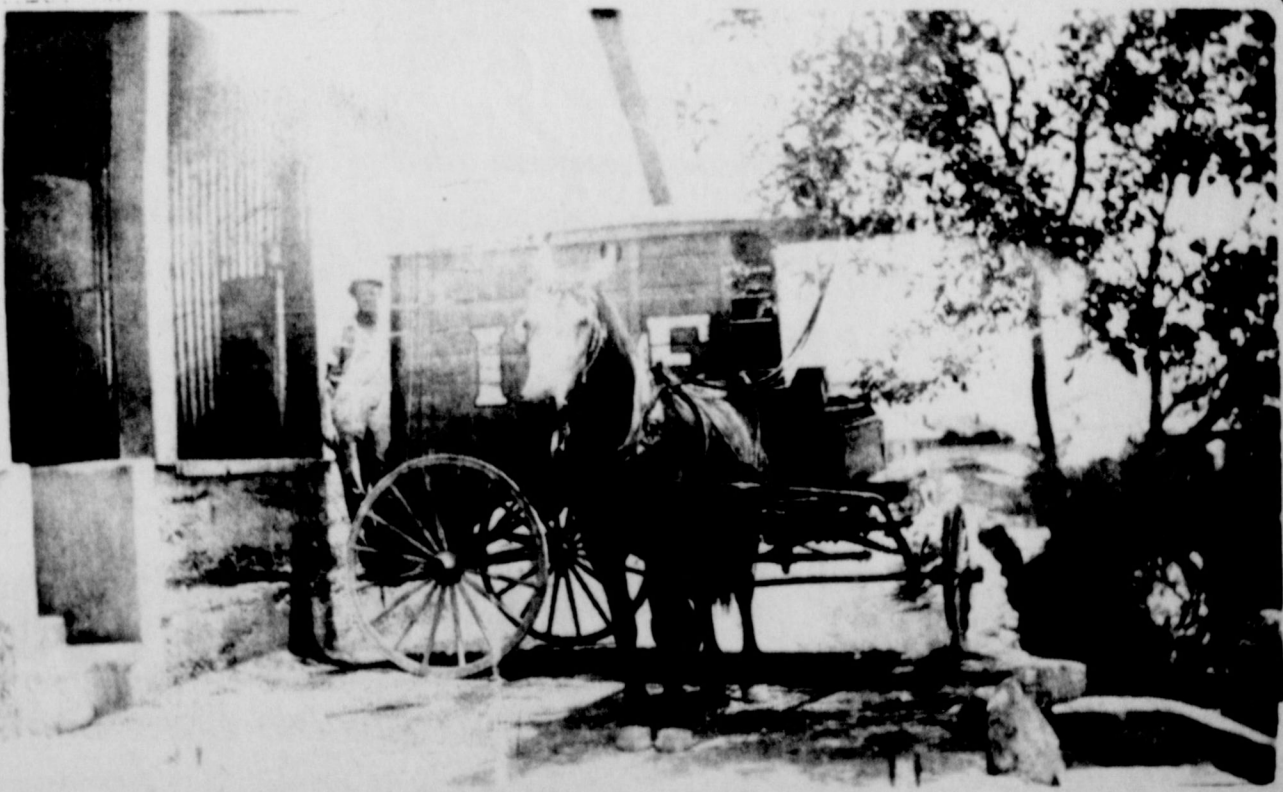

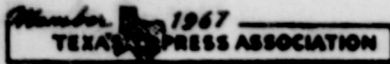

The Eagle Band played six numbers to close the concert program. The John Philip Sousa award band pins were presented. The graduating seniors who are members of the band were also

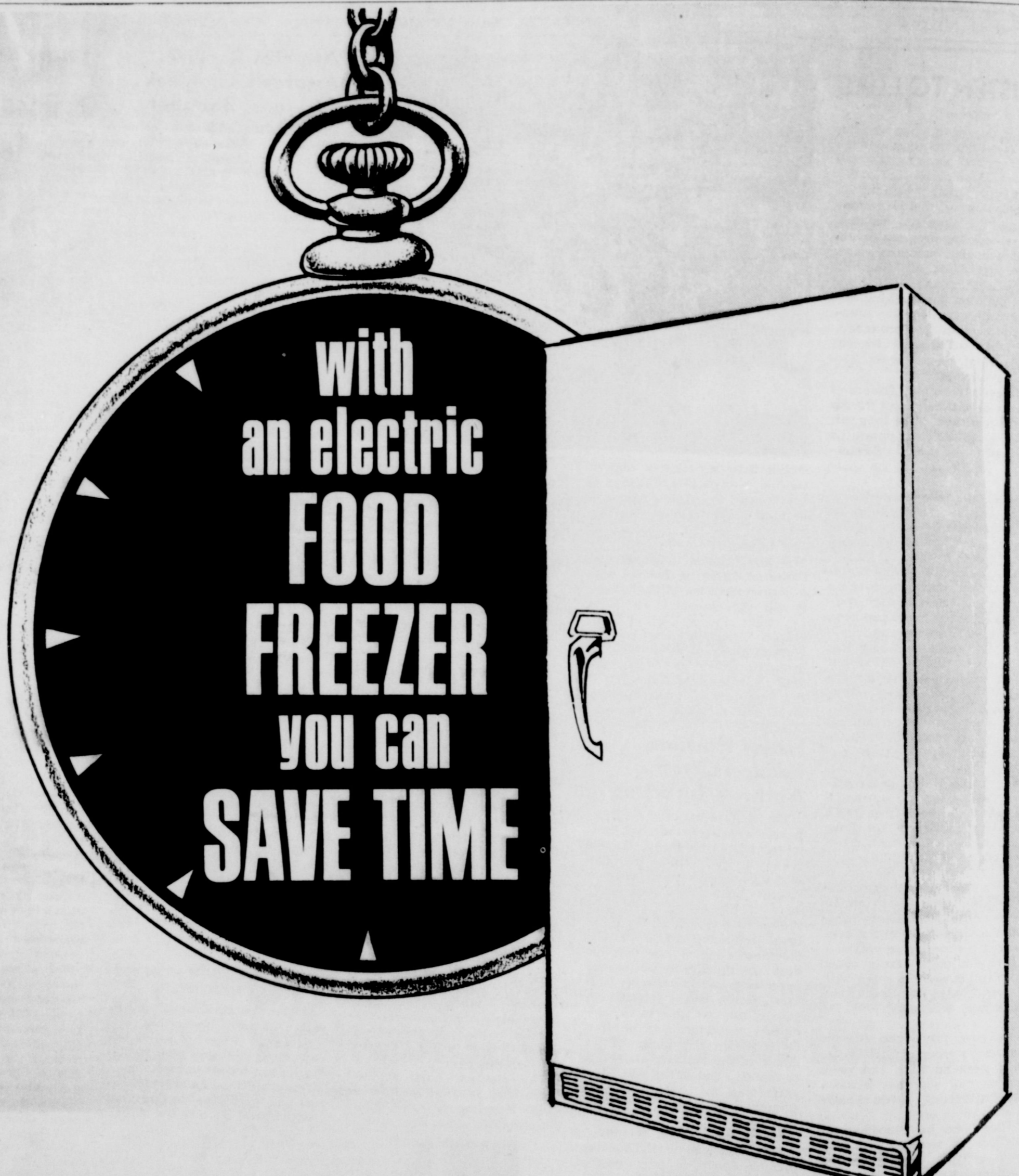
recognized at the last appearance they will make with the band. The audience joined in the singing of "For Sanderson, We Will" in closing.

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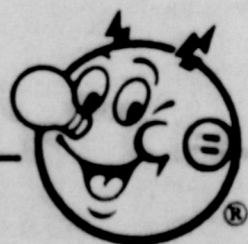

TO THE RESIDENT, QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID DISTRICT, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY IN SAID DISTRICT AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in said District at the time and places, and on the Proposition, as provided in the Order Calling An Election, duly passed by the Board of Trustees of said District, which Order is substantially as follows: ORDER CALLING AN ELECTION THE STATE OF TEXAS) COUNTY OF TERRELL) TERRELL COUNTY INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT)

WHEREAS, there has been presented to this Board of Trustees a petition signed by twenty or more persons praying that we order an election in said District, to be held within 30 days after the order of election, for the purpose of submitting the proposition hereinafter stated, in accordance with law; and

WHEREAS, this Board of Trustees officially finds and determines that said Petition is signed by twenty or more resident, qualified electors who own taxable property in said District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, and that said Petition conforms with law in all respects.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF TERRELL COUNTY INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

1. That an election shall be held in said District on the 23rd day of May, 1967, and that for the purpose of said election each Commissioner Precinct of Terrell County, Texas, is hereby constituted as a voting precinct:

(a) Precinct No. 1 at the courthouse in Sanderson, Texas;
(b) Precinct No. 2 at the Methodist Church in Dryden, Texas;
(c) Precinct No. 3 at the Sid Harkins Ranch Headquarters;
(d) Precinct No. 4 at the El Paso Natural Gas Co. gas plant.

The business manager of said District is hereby appointed as the Clerk for absentee voting for said election; and the Office of the business manager, Terrell County courthouse, is hereby designated as the place at which absentee voting shall be conducted for said election. For the period absentee voting is permitted by law, the hours designated for absentee voting shall be from 9:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. on each day except Saturdays, Sundays, and official state holidays; and the aforesaid clerk shall keep said absentee voting place open during such hours for absentee voting.

2. That at said election the following Proposition shall be submitted in accordance with law:

PROPOSITION

Shall the Board of Trustees of said District have the power and be authorized to issue the bonds of said District, in one or more series or issues, in the aggregate principal amount of \$500,000, bearing interest at rates not to exceed 5% per annum, with said bonds to mature serially or otherwise in such installments as are fixed by said Board of Trustees, for the purpose of the construction and equipment of public free school buildings in said District, and the purchase of the necessary sites therefor; and shall said Board of Trustees have the power and be authorized to levy and cause to be assessed and collected annual ad valorem taxes sufficient to pay the interest on and principal of said bonds, as authorized by Chapter 528, Acts 1955, 54th Legislature, Regular Session, as amended?

3. That the official ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

Mrs. Cook served white cake with lemon sauce, punch, and coffee.

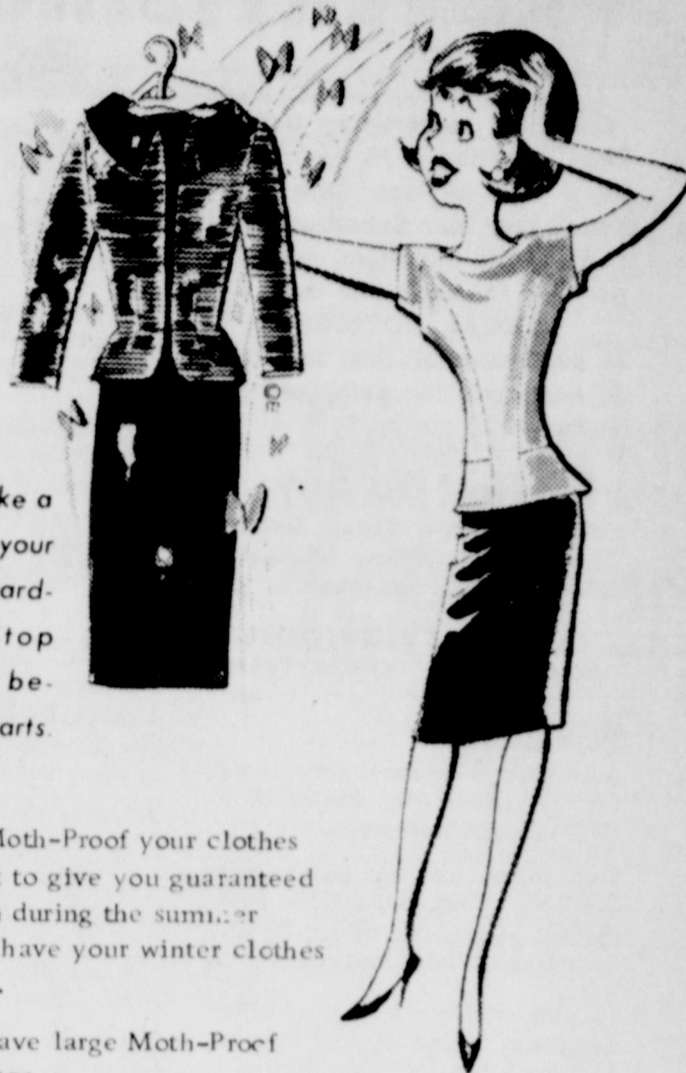
