This seems to be the week that was, or is, or something! It seems strange that so much can be packed into so little time and that so many people can be involved in so many events.

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We finally got the move completed and it was a real relief. We thought for a while that we had no friends and very few acquaintances, but when it was necessary for some manpower to be on hand for the handling of the heavy equipment, they were all here, and it was done with a minimum effort.

My thanks to all who had so much to do with the move to make it possible for us.

We like the arrangement, if we could only find things, and get them in some sort of order. But that will take time, too.

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We went to the hearing last week when Supt. Ken McAllister so ably presented the complete picture of the proposal from beginning to end.

There were not as many people there as we would like to have seen there, but those who were there got the information they came for, or they should have. After the explanation of each phase of the proposal an opportunity was given for any to ask questions they may have had.

Evidently few were not understanding of the problem and of the proposal as indicated by the outcome of the vote Tuesday.

There has been a recognized need for a new junior high school building for a long time and there has also been a lot of talk from time to time about the urgency of replacing the old building. It would seem that this, alone, would have carried this, alone, should have carried the bond issue.

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Supt. McAllister twice, in his presentation of the proposal last week, emphasized the need for parents to be more aware of the actions of children to prevent some of the vandalism or destruction of school property by children. An example was given of the cost of replacing window panes in the schools to the tune of a large sum of money each year. There is also the cost of \$500 for cleaning the rocks out of a vent pipe at the elementary school. The rocks were dropped down the pipe by children who were up on top of the school.

All of this cost to the taxpayers is not really fair to anyone, including the children.

He remarked that some would say: "kids will be kids"! But he would respond that nowhere has he found where kids must be destructive or vandals.

And we would agree!

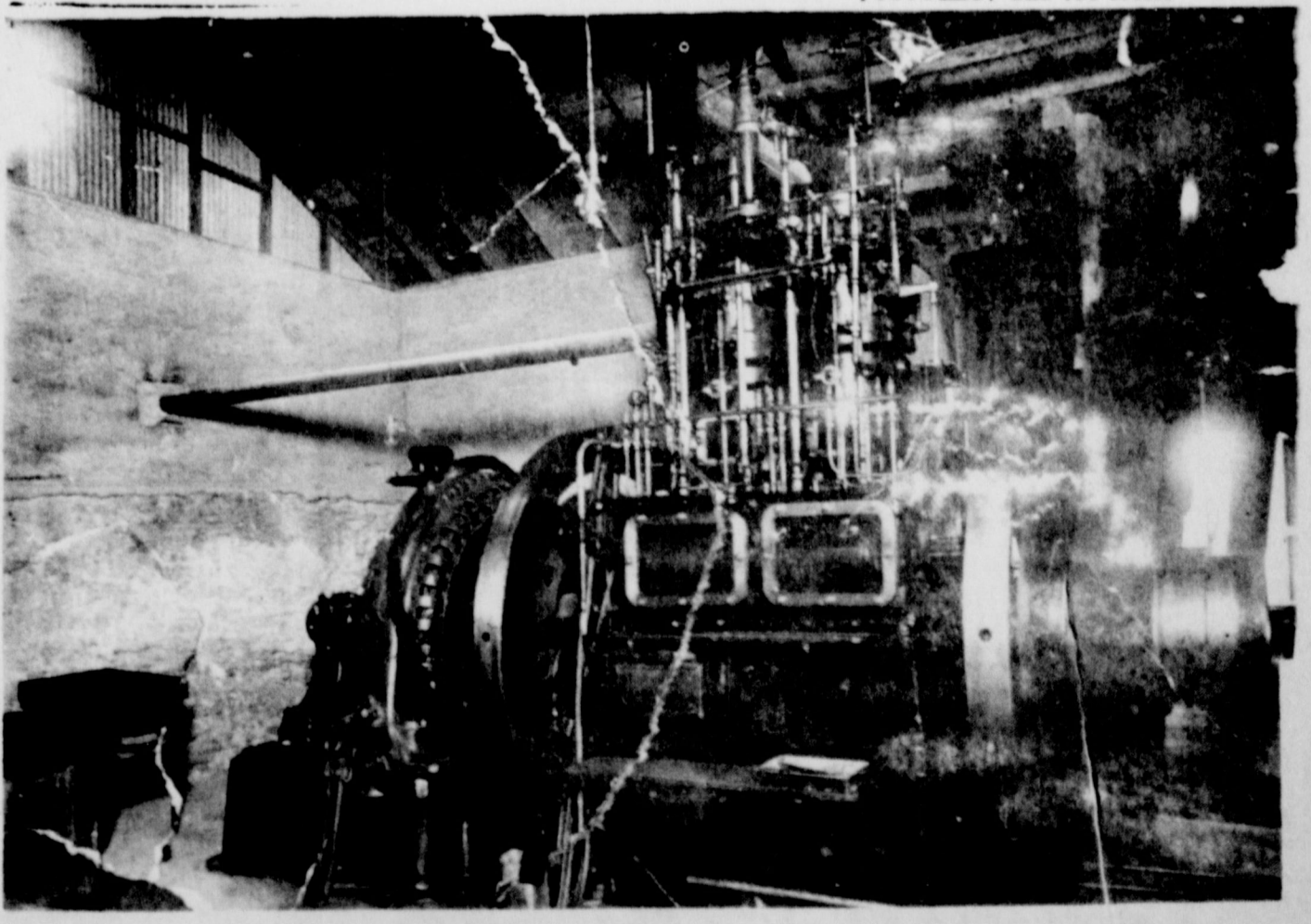
Carroll Lee Eggleston ... new Eagle mentor

Mrs. Eggleston is a registered nurse and the couple has a son three years old and a six-month old daughter.



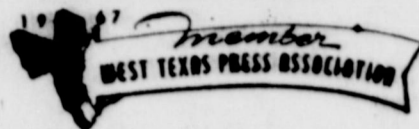
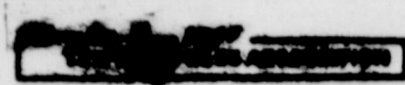

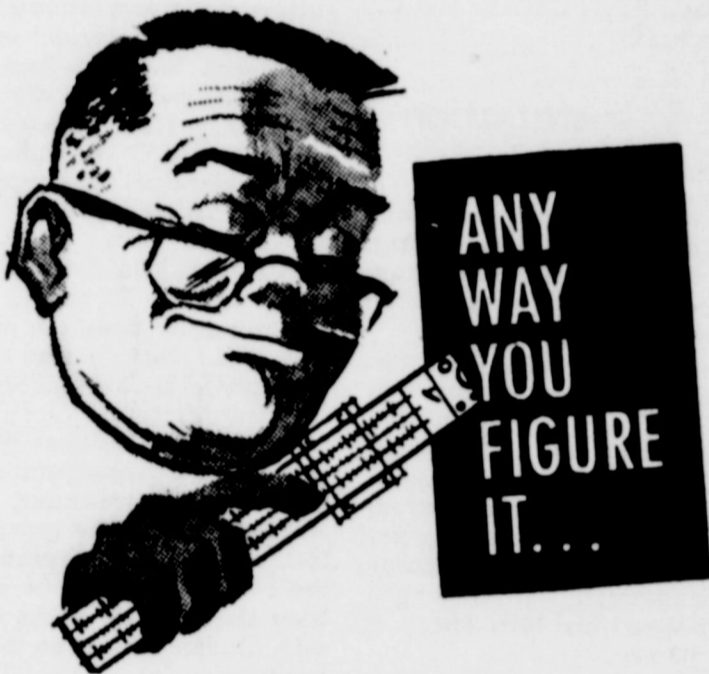
A fountain pen was presented to Mrs. Wandah Alexander, head of the homemaking department, and the FHA sponsor.

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

## GI Loan Right Expires Soon for WW II Veterans

Less than three months remain for veterans of World War II to use their guarantee privileges for a loan to purchase a home, farm or for business purposes. This warning came from P. J. Mims, Manager, Veterans Administration Regional Office, Houston, Texas.

Present statutes provide that the absolute cutoff date for World War II veterans will be on July 25, 1967. This deadline is the result of Congressional action which has delayed the final date of eligibility several times.

The cutoff will not affect veterans of the Korean Conflict or veterans who have served since January 31, 1955, Mims pointed out, as these veterans are covered by different legislation.

Almost seven million loans have been guaranteed by the Veterans Administration to veterans since the beginning of the program following World War II. One out of every five homes constructed in the United States following World War II was with VA guarantee.

The Veterans Administration will guarantee up to 60 percent of the purchase price of a home for a veteran with limitation as to the total purchase price.

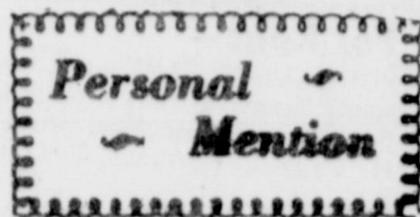

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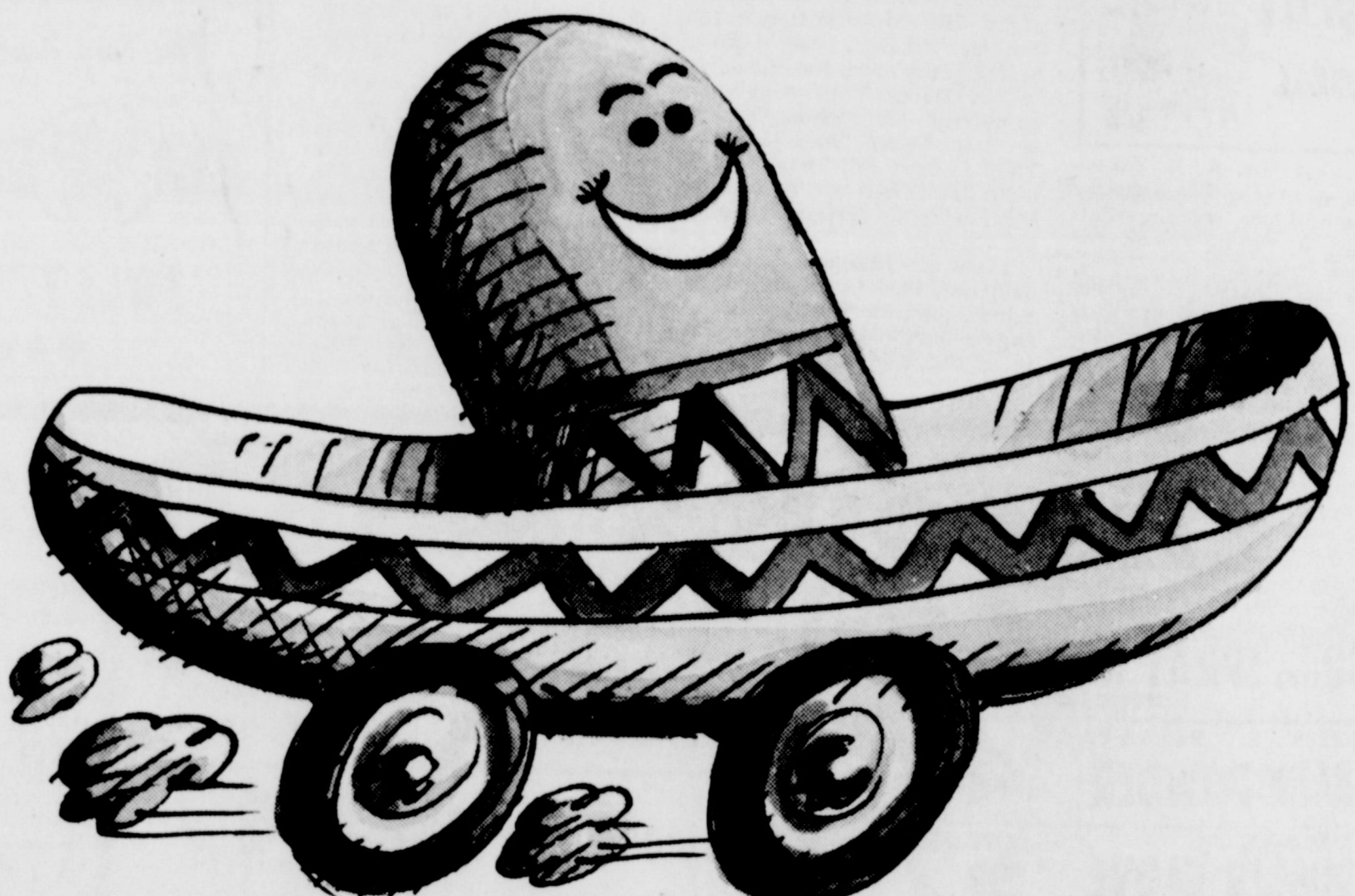
