The space needle, or tower, or oblique, or spire, or whatever they are called, are about to take the nation.

Besides the one nearest us in San Antonio under construction in connection with Hemisfare '68, there is one proposed now for Del Rio, or near there, as a monument of friendship between the United States and Mexico.

The tower would be 680 feet tall and would cost an estimated \$16-million. There has been allocated \$90,000 to study the project by the Economic Development Agency. The study began Tuesday by a representative of an accounting firm in Washington, D. C., who went to the proposed site for the tower and a banquet in Acuna that nite.

The tower would have a motel of 124 units at the 200-foot level, four restaurants, marina, 18-hole golf course, 10,000-foot runway airport. It was stated that even though the tower would be far away from everything, people would make a special trip to see the tower.

This is another attraction to pull tourists to this part of the state. The cost of this type of project seems to be irrelevant.

And maybe the cost is justified, we don't know.

We are seeing more and more articles coming out regarding stewardship of the land, the effects of overuse of the land and the lack of rainfall in relation to the wishes of the operators.

... 53 years as a Mason

Clyde Griffith was the recipient of a 50-year pin Saturday night at a meeting of local Masons and their families at the Masonic Hall. About 30 were in attendance for the salad supper served at 7:00 o'clock and the meeting which followed.

R. S. Wilkinson, secretary and past master of the Sanderson Lodge No. 988, made the award and the accompanying certificate and Mrs. Wilkinson pinned the award on Mr. Griffith. Bob Spence, master of the lodge, and W. H. Savage, senior warden, made brief remarks following the presentation.

Griffith was made a Master Mason May 26, 1914, in Floresville Lodge No. 515. He served as secretary of that lodge from July of that year until 1918 when he was elected senior warden and was named Master of the lodge in 1919. He moved to Marfa during that Masonic year and came to Sanderson in 1924, changing his affiliation to the local lodge. He was named master here in 1929, and again in 1936.

Griffith was the former postmaster here until his retirement several years ago.

School Board Gets Bids On Local Services

The contract for servicing the Terrell County ISD buses was awarded to the McKnight Motor Co. at the regular meeting of the school board Monday night.

The school will pay 29¢ per gallon for gasoline; 45¢ a quart for oil; \$4 for wash jobs; \$2 for grease jobs, and \$2.35 for oil filters.

Mobil Oil Corp. got the contract for diesel fuel at .1256 per gallon; and Big Bend Gas Co. got the butane bid at 10¢ per gallon.

Mrs. Norman Gladson was hired as an elementary teacher.

D. L. "Stump" Duke
... dies in El Paso Monday

D. L. "Stump" Duke, 70, died in an El Paso hospital Monday morning. He had not been feeling well for several days, and had been in and out of the hospital for a week and died in his sleep, according to reports.

Duke was a passenger conductor for the Southern Pacific and had been in their employ for over 50 years. He was twice the master of the Sanderson Masonic Lodge; a member of the Council 342, RESM, a veteran of WWI and member of Clarence Halley Muley Post of the American Legion; lifetime member of the Rotary Club; and the First Baptist Church.

He came to Sanderson in 1922 and in 1923 brought his bride, the former Helen Hulsey of Fort Worth, whom he had married on May 8, to Sanderson and they had made their home here for 44 years.

Survivors are his wife, a son, D. L. Duke Jr. of San Antonio; two daughters, Mrs. L. D. Booker Jr. of Mason and Mrs. Frank Steelman of Houston; eight grandchildren; two sisters, Mrs. Nell Richardson of San Antonio and Mrs. Eula Guynes of Houston; one brother, Dan L. P. Duke of El Paso.

Funeral services were in the First Baptist Church in Sanderson Wednesday at 4:00 p. m. with Rev. Maynard R. Rogers, pastor, officiating and interment was in Cedar Grove Cemetery following Masonic graveside rites.

Scattered Rain Came Last Week

Up to .08-inch of rainfall was reported early last Thursday morning local. The rain fell during the night.

Lighter amounts of moisture were reported from other parts of the county, much of which received some of the rain.

Lightest rainfall has been noted in the Dryden area, particularly to the north and south.

Some of the rangeland near Sanderson is showing some tint of green as a result of recent rainfall.

Wildcat Slated On Circle Dot

Forest Oil Corp. Midland, will drill the No. 1 Circle R. Judkins, a 21,000-foot Ellenburger wildcat, in south central Terrell County, 22 miles northeast of Sanderson and approximately nine miles southwest of the one-well Little Canyon (10,000 foot Strawn gas) field and the same distance from Pan American Petroleum Corp. No. 1 Keith Mitchell, active wildcat.

Location, on a 2,647-acre lease, is 2,280 feet from the south and 1,980 feet from the west lines of 66-1-CCSD&RGNG.

The No. 1 Mitchell, in 7-1-CCSD&RGNG, was drilling below 17,320 feet on an 18,500-foot Ellenburger contract. Unidentified production was indicated when it flowed gas for 16 hours at the rate of 2.7 million cubic feet daily when drilling reached 9,365 feet.

The Little Canyon opener, Mobil Oil Corp. No. 1 George K. Mitchell, was finished Dec. 4, 1964, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 31 million cubic feet of gas per day through perforations at 10,106 to 11,670 feet.

Train service through Sanderson was halted for about two days the first of the week due to the strike of machinists. One freight train ran Monday and was the first train that ran after Sunday night.

Local crews were expecting trains to begin running Tuesday night following the legislation Monday night which halted the railroads' operations.

There was no local picketing or action near the depot in connection with the strike.

County Loader Hit By Vandals

The loading machine owned by the county was hit by vandals last week, causing extensive damage. The machine was parked out in the pasture off of the road south from 5-mile hill where it was being used by Santiago Rodriguez to put dirt on that road for maintenance.

All of the gasoline was taken from the tank, the oil drained and part poured into the stack and part into the radiator, and all of the tires were punctured with a knife.

The cost to the taxpayers to repair the vehicle will run into the hundreds of dollars, according to reports.

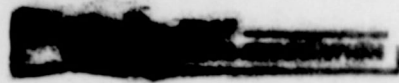

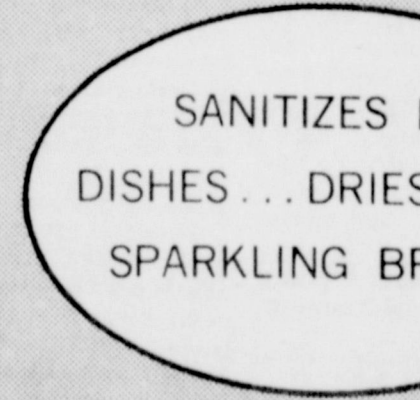
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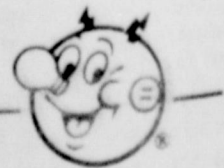


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Mr. and Mrs. Donald Voorhees
