Absentee Balloting On Amendments Started Monday

Absentee voting on six proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution began on Monday. Necessary forms for casting absentee ballots are available at the office of the county clerk.

The election will be Saturday, November 11 in all four precincts.

Several changes have been made in the voting laws for the state, according to Secretary of the State John L. Hill.

In all primary, special, and other elections where political party columns do not appear on the ballot, the voter is to place an "X" beside the name or issue he favors. In the past, all undesired candidates or proposals were scratched off the voter's ballot.

When voting, any voter may ask for assistance from an election judge so long as the voter does not receive actual preparation help on the ballot. Election officers are required to use the English language while carrying out their duties but may give instructions through another language himself or through an interpreter if requested by the voter.

Weakened Eagles Victims of Ozona; Iraan Braves To Be Hosts Friday Night

The Sanderson Eagles were the victims of the might of the Ozona Lions in a game there last Friday night that ended with the hosts scoring 58 points while Sanderson was scoreless.

Ozona scored 28 points in the first period, 14 in the second, and 16 in the third before taking the liberty of liberal use of their reserves.

In the first period, Ozona's Beto Diaz started the scoring by running 48 yards to pay dirt. He was followed by Rodney Pagan's 3-yard TD, and two tallies by Fleet Coates, one from the 35 and the other a shorty from the nine.

An interception in the second period was returned 35 yards for the fifth Ozona score and a second interception returned 22 yards accounted for the scoring up to the half-time.

Pagan began the second-half scoring on a 22-yard gallop and a third interception touchdown followed when Beto Vargas captured an Eagle pass from 18 yards out. Later in the same period when the Eagles held the Lions, they kicked a field goal to end the night's scoring.

Sanderson was held to 17 yards on the ground and had 29 yards passing by completing 2 of 10.

All three Sanderson pass interceptions were returned for touchdowns by Ozona.

Carlos Garza, who received a leg injury last week, was replaced by Frank Garcia at quarterback.

Jeff Flowers, Eagle end, was injured in the Ozona game and was hospitalized there until Saturday morning when he was taken to San Antonio for observation and tests for a possible head injury. He will be out of play for the rest of the year.

Glenn Haynes, who received a back injury three weeks ago, has not returned to practice as yet and it is not known when he will be able to resume play.

Sanderson will go to Iraan this Friday night.

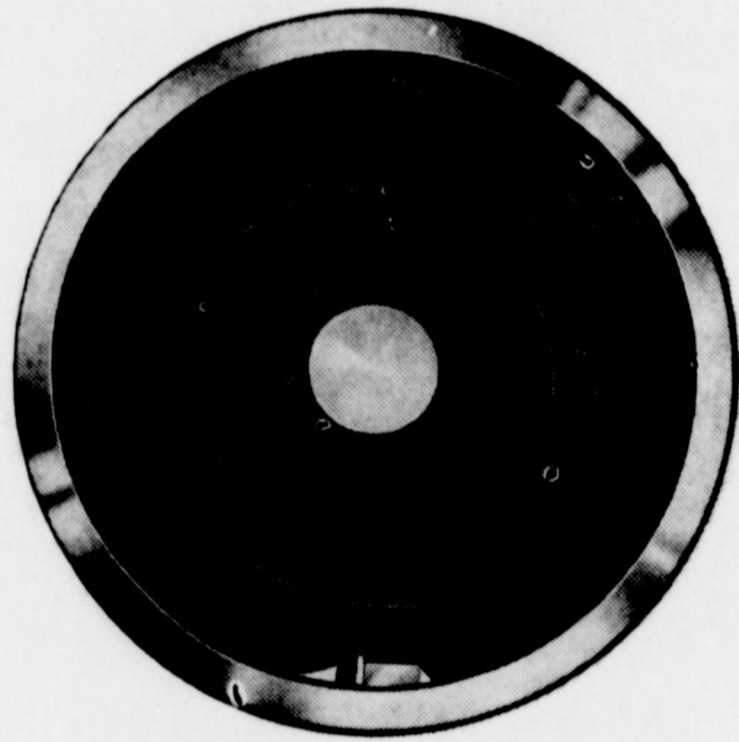

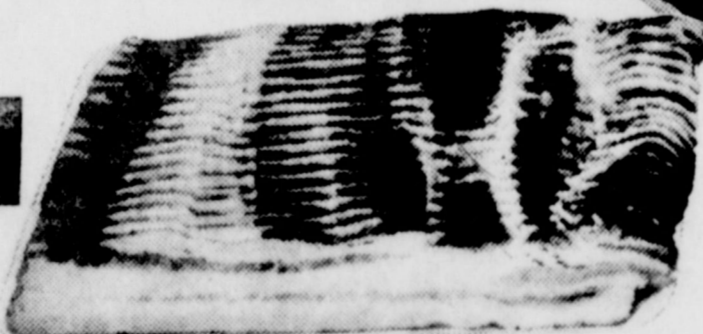

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
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
