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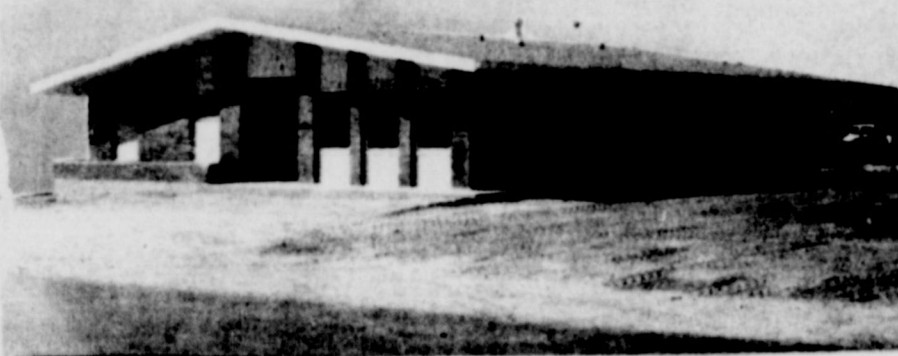

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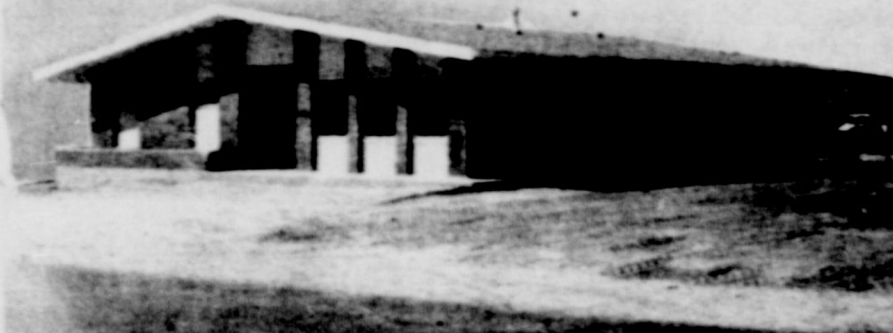
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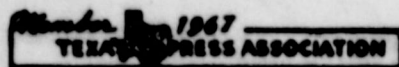

Early Mailing Of Parcels Urged

Postmaster J. R. Hodgkins this week reminded local residents that it is just as important to mail early in the day as it is to mail early during the Christmas season.

By mailing early in the day postal employees can assure that gifts, cards, and letters can be sent on their way by the earliest possible transportation. Often there is only one connection per day for many distant points. If mail is deposited after that, the transportation may have left causing another day in the delivery.

Because of the heavy nationwide Christmas mailing, Postmaster Hodgkins asked that more than ever before, citizens mail early in the season to assure there are no jam-ups in major cities.

According to Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien's predictions, there will be over nine millions pieces of mail delivered during the Christmas rush. If all that mail were to hit at one time there would not be enough workers or space to handle it.

In order for the mail to reach our service men overseas, it is important that it be mailed early. The latest date for mailing surface mail and packages to our armed forces has been set at November 11. The latest date for air-mailing packages and letters has been set for December 11.

Packages weighing under five pounds for our armed forces will be air mailed on a space-available basis and should be mailed before December 1. Mail for overseas will be accepted after these dates but there is little chance of their being delivered by Christmas.

The postmaster also encouraged all mailers to use the Zip code on every piece of mail to assure efficient postal handling.

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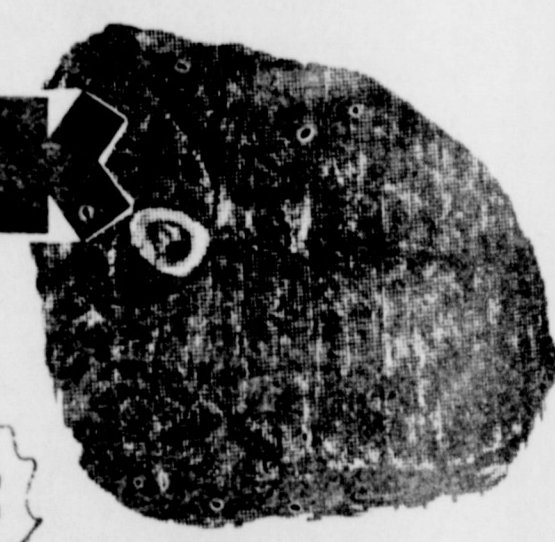
