Funeral services were held in San Antonio Monday afternoon for Louis Anthony Dickson, 52, who died Thursday evening in Waco after a short illness. Interment was in Fort Sam Houston National cemetery with full military honors.
Mr. Dickson was born in San-

derson and as a lad, after the death of his mother, made his home with his aunt, the late Mrs. W. H. Lemons, and family, and attended the local schools.

He served twenty four years in the U.S. Army, seeing action in World War II, E. T. O. and served three and one half years in Germany with the Army of Occupation. He was also in Korea for eighteen months and was stationed in France when he retired in July 1959 and came to Waco to live. He received his B. S. Degree in accounting from Baylor University in 1963 and was employed as chief accountant for the McAx Corp. of McGregor at the time of his death.

Survivors include his wife Mrs. Helen Dickson of Waco; a brother, Leland Dickson of Luling and a nephew, Jon Anthony Dickson; an uncle Harold G. Dickson of Caldwell, Idaho.

# Joe E. Hill Dies Of **Gunshot Wound**

Joe E. Hill Jr. died about 8:00 p. m. in an Alpine hospital as a result of a gunshot wound in the right temple.

Hill was found in the cab of his pickup shortly after noon on Monday by Mr. and Mrs. Tom Smith of Langtry who were hunting on the Catherine Morgan ranch south of Sanderson. Hill had been trapping on the ranch and Sunday afternoon had stuck the pickup in a canyon and had walked back to the ranch house and Monday morning called his wife to tell her why he had not come home. He then returned to the pickup, about eight miles from the house, it was reported.

Dr. J. M. Flowers was called to the scene and reported that Hill had been shot in the right temple and a pistol was on the pickup seat.

Hill was brought to Sanderson in an ambulance and was taken on to Alpine and died about four hours later.





# Terrell Discovery Is Completed

Pan American Petroleum Corp., Monahans, No. 1 Keith Mitchell, Terrell County Ellenburger gas discovery, 22 miles northwest of Sanderson and 1¼ miles southeast of the Little Canyon (10,000-foot Strawn gas) field, has been completed for a calculated, absolute open flow of 53.6 million cubic feet of dry gas per day.



# Mohair Interest Higher At Mills, Ranchmen Told

Mohair is drawing attention in the Boston and East Coast textile trade, Al Dishman of Uvalde told the Mohair Council of America executive committee in San Angelo. Dishman, Council vice-president, had just returned from a fact-finding trip to mills and fashion centers.

"Mohair is in the clothing lines for fall and winter of 1968, and practically every mill that can use mohair is attempting to do so, " he said.

He found many users "cautiously optimistic" about mohair's possible resurgence from a low-price situation that has brought economic difficulties to mohair producers. A large tonnage of Texas mohair has been sold in recent weeks, but at prices most growers would considered greatly depressed. Dishman said the Council's promotional activities have helped call attention to the quantity and competitive prices

available. The Council's executive committee approved a second \$25,000 allocation to Prodesco, Inc., of Perkasie, Penna., for continued work on two principal product development lines: draperies and floor coverings. It recently entered into a \$39. -000 contract with Chilton Research Services of Philadelphia for a major survey to determine best prospects for new or expanded uses of mehair. Other contracts in force include one with Kairalla Agency of New York to help promote mohair

use among style-setters. The Council's funds come from mohair producers themselves through a 1 1/2¢-a-pound deduction from their mohair incentive payments.

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





Notice is here given as required by Section 4 of the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 (Article 7542a, Vernon's Civil Statutes) that all claims of riparian water rights, all claims under Article 7500a, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, to impound, divert or use public waters for other than domestic and livestock purposes for which o permit has been issued, all claims of water rights under the Irrigation Acts of 1889 and 1895 which were not filed with the State Board of Water Engineers in accordance with the Irrigation Act of 1913, as amended, and all other claims of water rights other than claims under permits and certified filings, must be recorded with the Texas Water Rights Commission. Section 4 does not apply to use of water for domestic and livestock purposes as the same is defined by Commission Rules.

On or before September 1. 1969, every person claiming any water right to which Section 4 applies shall file with the Commission a sworn statement setting forth the nature of the claim of water right. Claims to which the Section applies shall be recognized only if valid under existing law and only to the extent of actual application of water to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1967, inclusive. However, in any case where any claimant of a riparian right has prior to August 28, 1967, commenced or completed the construction of works designed to apply a greater quantity of water to beneficial use, such right shall be recognized to the extent of the maximum amount of water actually applied to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1970, inclusive; provid-ed an additional sworn statement is filed on or before July 1, 1971. Failure to file the sworn statement or statements in substantial compliance with Section 4 shall extinguish and bar any claim of water right to which the Section applies.
