Health Certificate Is Needed By Food Handlers

Dr. Jeff M. Flowers Jr., Terrell County health officer, asked The Times to publish the fact that by March 1, 1968, all persons in all public businesses involved in the sale or handling of food or drink would be required to have a health certificate. This involves those working in cafes, bars, food stores,

etc., Dr. Flowers stated. Dr. Flowers stated that examination could be obtained from any M.D., or from him, but anyone getting the examination from another doctor should come to him for the certificate which must be posted in the business in a conspicuous place.

The health examination is required annually, Dr. Flowers stated, as he urged the cooperation of all business operators and their employees in compliance with the law.



Dorsey B. Hardeman ... seeks re-election

State Senator Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo announced today his candidacy for reelection in the 25th Senatoria District for a full four-year

"I am deeply grateful to the people of the 21-county district for electing me in 1966 to a four year term and respectfully ask their continued support,' Hardeman said. He was one of 15 senators who drew a two year term following senatorial redistricting which was done in compliance with the "one man, one wote" decision of the United States Supreme Court. Election this year will give Senator Hardeman a full four-year term.

Hardeman said he will counsel, as he is accustomed to do, with the people throughout the district before the Democratic Primary May 4. "It has been my purpose, at all times, to help maintain a sound, responsible and responsive state government and to handle all legislation of local interest with dispatch, " the senator said. This I will continue to do.

A practicing attorney highly respected as an authority on constitutional law, Hardeman is married and has two sons.

Hardeman is presently vicechairman of the Senate Finance Committee which provides funds for state-supported institutions and educational facilities; is chairman of the Senate State Affairs Committee which reviews all revenue measures, and is serving as a senior member of the Budget Board, the vital legislative research arm on finances to fulfill state needs During 11 regular and 11 special sessions of the Legislature, Hardeman has served as chairman or as a member of all major Standing Committees of the Senate, giving him experience and seniority valuable to the people of the 25th District in particular.

License Plates For Some Vehicles Are Advanced in Price

New Texas auto license plates went on sale last Thursday at the Terrell County tax assessorcollector's office.

This year the local licenses will begin with DBT-675 and the Hemisfair which will be in San Antonio is being advertised with 68-Hemisfair-68 across the bottom of the black plate with white letters and numerals.

Mrs. Tol Murrah, deputy tax assessor and collector, stated that no licenses would be issued unless the applicant had a certificate of title and a 1967 license receipt. All motor vehicles in operation on Texas highways must have a new license tag by April 1.

The cost of registering motor vehicles in Texas has advanced, as has the cost of many other things. A new minimum registration fee of \$5.30 for all vehicles, including boat trailers, has been put into effect.

Others who will feel the pinch of higher registrations fees are the owners of the "bugs". The fee for all vehicles up to 3500 pounds weight has been set at \$12.30, something over 50 percent increase for the so-called compact cars. Motorcycles have also been tapped for a steep increase in registration costs with the \$5,30 minimum applying in their case.

Owners of conventional autos will find little change in their charges for license plates - and in some instances - they will receive a small reduction. About the most any in the category will pay is a 30-cent increase.

Starting with the \$12.30 rate for 3500 pounds, the price for the 3501-4500 class is \$22.30; for 4501-6000, \$30.30; and more than 6000 pounds, \$30.30, plus 55-cents per 100 pounds over that weight.

In Terrell County as in the entire state, registrations are expected to increase over previous years. In Texas, approximately seven million vehicles will be registered in 1968 - the largest number in the state's history.

Of the 7 million Texas figure, 4.75 million will be passenger cars and 1.9 million will be commercial trucks and trucktractors. Trailers and motorcycles will account for the balance.

The most dramatic increase is expected in the motorcycle category, according to the Texas Highway Department, based on the past two year's experience. While passenger car and commercial truck registration will increase about three and one half percent, motorcycle registration is expected to increase 16 percent.

Owners should bring four items to the Tax Collector's office when registering vehicles: certificate of title, 1967 license receipt, current resident address and zip code.

State law requires each owner to register his vehicle in the county in which he resides and to present his certificate of title as evidence of ownership.

A film was shown to local clubs and the schools this week in an effort to emphasize the drive.




