All Number Calling Due In November For Local Phones

Telephone number prefixes in Sanderson will change to all numerals in November, according to Bill Gilliland, manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

The current prefix of Diamond 5 will change to 345. The all-number prefix will be in the same location on the telephone dial as the current combination letter-number prefix.

"This new telephone numbering plan is known as All Number Calling (ANC)," Gilliland said. "It is necessary that we go to this system because of the tremendous growth in the number of telephones."

Gilliland pointed out that telephone companies eventually would run out of suitable numbers if they did not convert to ANC. About 75 per cent of the telephones in the U. S. already have been changed to ANC.

"As an example of the Sanderson number after the change, DI 5-2441 will be 345-2441," Gilliland pointed out.

Telephone directories listing all the new numbers in Sanderson will be distributed at the time of the changeover.

"Persons or firms who use printed material showing their telephone number should keep the number change in mind," Gilliland said. "They may want to order only enough to last until November, 1968."

Gilliland pointed out that within a few years the number of dial combinations using two letters and five digits, such as present Sanderson numbers, will have been exhausted in many parts of the nation.

New Ambulance Put In Service Here This Week

The new ambulance for Terrell County is expected to be put into service this week, according to an announcement by the committee, Judge R. S. Wilkinson, Troy Druse, and Herbert Brown.

The 1968 model Buick, the same body style as the previous one, a 1964 model, has been undergoing some modifications and the installation of equipment by Deputy Sheriff Dalton Hogg for the past several days.

The new vehicle was ordered by the commissioners court several weeks ago, on the advice of the committee, to try to insure the maximum safety and dependability of transporting sick or injured patients to a hospital. The only difference between the old and the new vehicle - other than the year model - is that the new ambulance has an automatic transmission.

The vehicle, purchased by the Terrell County Commissioners Court, is under the supervision of the ambulance committee for maintenance and repairs, billing for services, etc. The drivers for the ambulance are volunteers and are Sheriff Bill C. Cooksey, Deputy Hogg, Druse, Darwin Schrader, and L. E. Muller.

A. Escamilla Dies At Work Tuesday Morning Early

Funeral services were held on Thursday for Alejandro "Hondo" Escamilla, 60, at the St. James Catholic Church with Rev. Dan Dierschke officiating. The body was taken to Monahans for interment.

Escamilla, who was a machinist's helper, died suddenly on the job just west of the SP Depot Tuesday morning about 8:00 o'clock, apparently from a heart attack.

He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Presiliano Escamilla, pioneer Sanderson residents, and was born here March 6, 1907.

On May 11, 1928, he was married to Miss Sara Berlanga of Mexico and they had resided in Sanderson all of their married life. He was employed by J. D. Nichols in the Sanderson Mercantile Co. for many years. He had been employed by the railroad for the past 23 years.

Besides his widow, he is survived by two sons, Mario and Pres B. Escamilla, and a daughter, Mrs. Alfonso Vasquez, all of Monahans; 10 grandchildren; five brothers, Pres and Manuel of Sanderson, Jesus, Felipe, and Dickie Escamilla of California; two sisters, Mrs. Hortencia Morales and Mrs. Eulalia Escamilla of San Antonio.

844 Voters In Terrell County Are Registered

There are 844 registered voters in Terrell County, according to Mrs. Tol Murrah, deputy tax assessor-collector.

This is lower than in 1966, according to Mrs. Murrah, and there are very few eligible voters in the county who are not registered, she concluded.

This is the first year for a registration of all eligible voters in the state as a prerequisite for voting, and the first time that the number of eligible voters could be known, since registering by person over 65 was not required in the past in smaller counties.

Easter Cantata Practice Slated

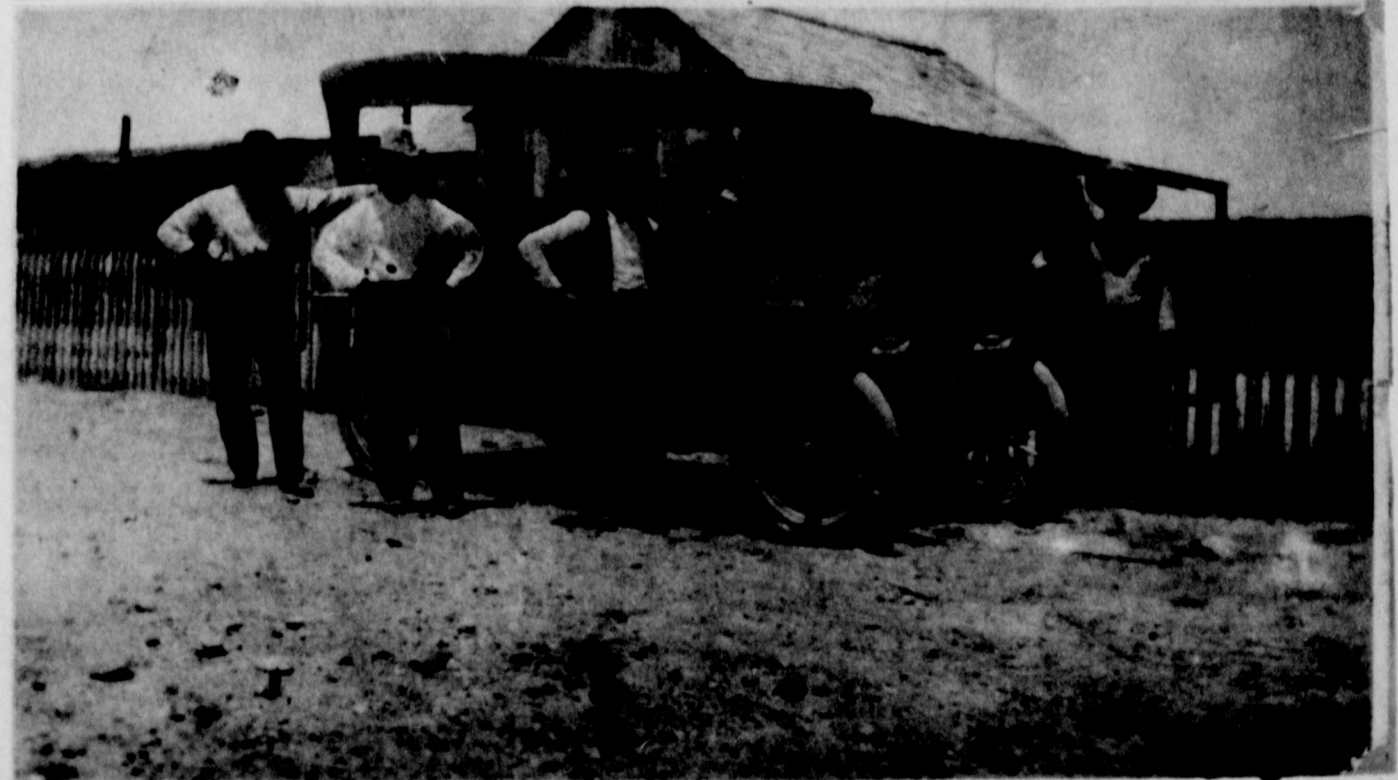
An Easter Cantata is being planned by the community choir to be presented during that season.

7-Numeral Numbers Due in Sanderson in November

EFFECTIVE with the issuance of a new telephone directory in November, all Sanderson telephone numbers will be changed from two letters and five numerals to seven numerals.

Sanderson thus will join many other Southwestern Bell exchanges which have this new numbering system, known as All Number Calling. ANC is already in use in many other parts of the nation.

The present prefix, "DI 5," will be changed to "345"—actually the same in dialing.

The last four digits of each telephone number will remain unchanged. For example, DI 5-2441 will become 345-2441.

Numbers in Next Directory

All the new seven-numeral numbers will be included in the next telephone directory.
