Miss Stutes was born in Sanderson March 20, 1951, and was a junior in the Sanderson High School. Besides her parents and the brother here, she is survived by another brother, Kenneth Stutes, of El Paso.

**Effort To Keep Suit Against RRC Ruling On Court Docket Is Made by Attorneys**

Residents of the county responded to a call to join forces on Friday in an effort to maintain a situation which could affect the people of the town and the economy of the county.

Word was received Tuesday of last week by County Judge R. S. Wilkinson from Bennett

Smith, an attorney for Community Public Service Co. of Fort Worth, that the suit filed in a District Court in Travis County was subject to dismissal for want of prosecution by the judge of that court on March 14 unless there was reason to continue the matter on the docket where it has been for about 14 years. The possibility of dismissal was not at the instigation of the Southern Pacific Railroad, the Railroad Commission, or of the citizens of Sanderson, but a routine and common decision of a judge who is interested in keeping his court's docket cleared. The suit was to protest the action of the Railroad Commission in their granting approval to the management to proceed with their plans to move the terminal facilities from Sanderson and was filed after three hearings by the Commission. The approval of the Commission was one of the preliminary steps necessary in the procedure of attempting to move a terminal and the suit, as long as it is on the docket, supercedes the Commission's decision.

Miss Downie is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter G. Downie of Sanderson and her escort will be Donald Eugene Huly of Tyler.

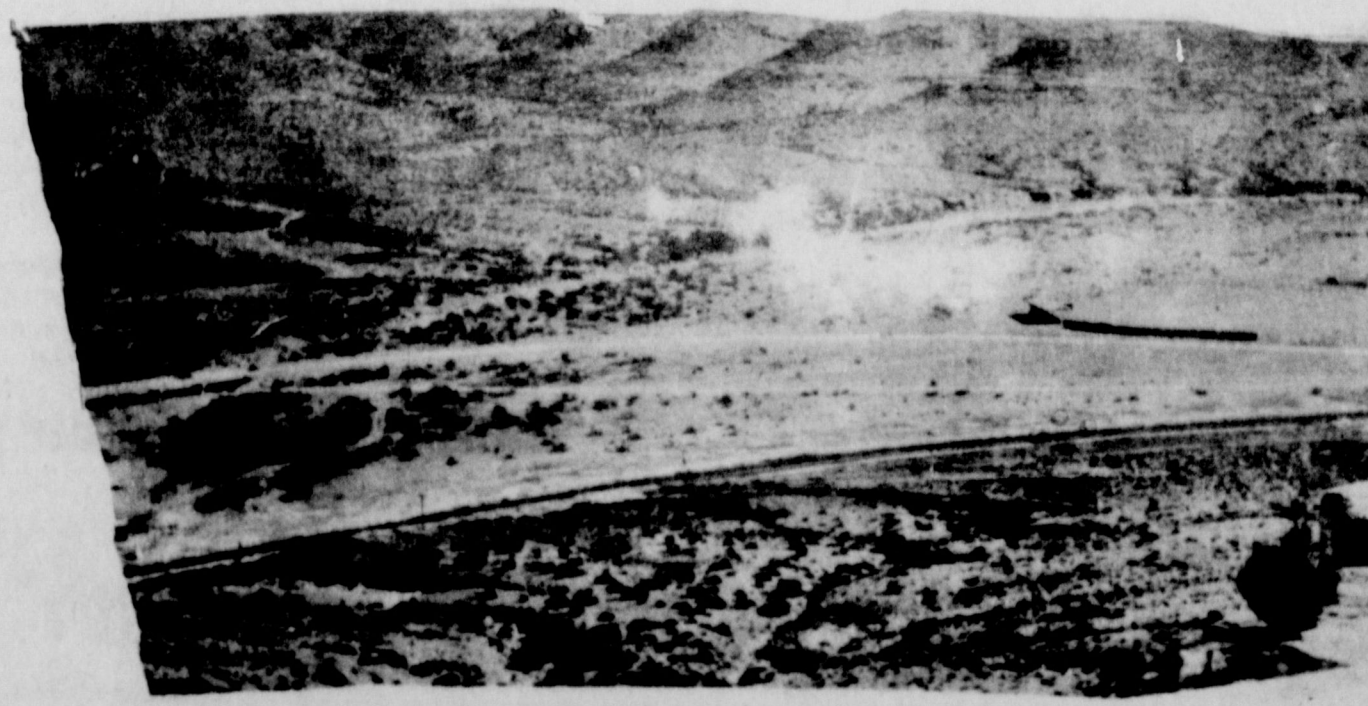

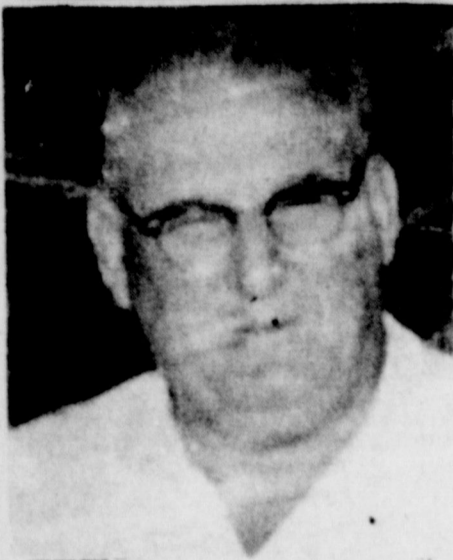

be taken concerning an effort to keep the case filed. ### Seal Coat Due On FM 1217

Two contracts for seal coats were awarded at the February meeting of the Texas Highway Commission, according to District Highway Engineer Paul Coleman. The contracts call for seal coat of 320.8 miles in the Odessa District.

## Dam Project Could Go For Approval By Congress This Fall, Work Plan Shows

The completion of all work necessary for the presentation of the proposed dam project on the Sanderson Canyon watershed could be affected in time to go to the Congress this fall, according to word received last weekend by Darwin Schrader, local Soil Conservation Service

representative. The SCS is in charge of making studies, surveys, plans, and specifications for the locations and construction of the dams for flood control on the watershed.

According to a work progress report issued for February by the SCS, the work plan development was 45% completed.

The report stated that all of the plotter maps for the watershed have been completed by the cartographic section and turned over to the work plan staff. There were 12 sites on which topographic maps were developed. The basic design data has been completed on the possible site locations selected and it is estimated that all surveys except the final centerline and spillway layouts will be completed by the time this story appears.

Sediment storage requirements have been completed for all 12 sites.

All geological dam site investigations were completed the first part of this month.

During the first part of April, a team of specialists from the related departments within the planning work will be in the watershed to assist the work plan staff in the development of the project.

"If," Schrader stated, "the plans are completed in time for Congressional approval in the fall, and if approval is granted within the hoped-for time, then there was a possibility that the letting of the contracts for the actual construction work could be in the early part of 1969."

But Schrader stated that there were some "ifs" involved that certainly were a consideration.

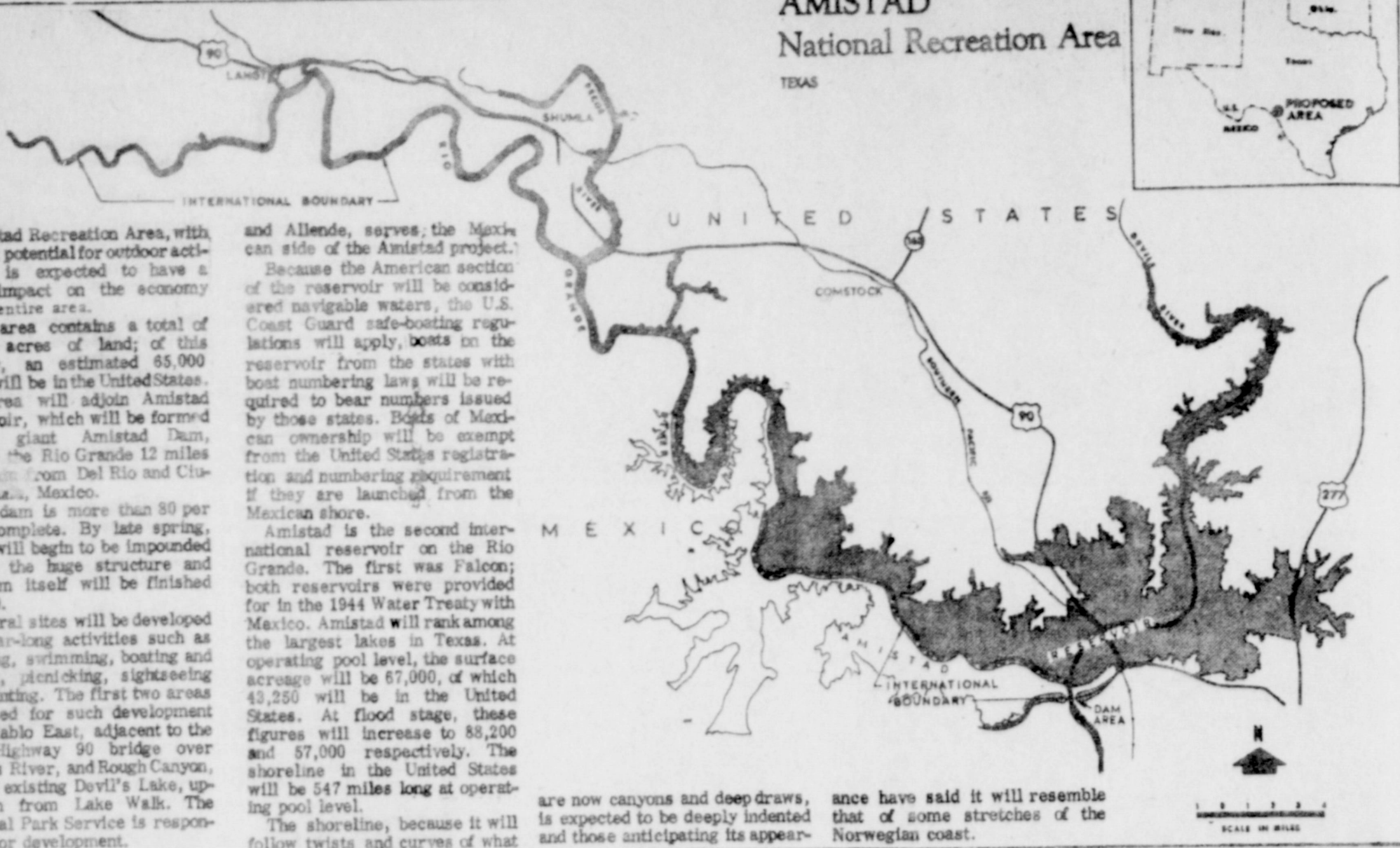
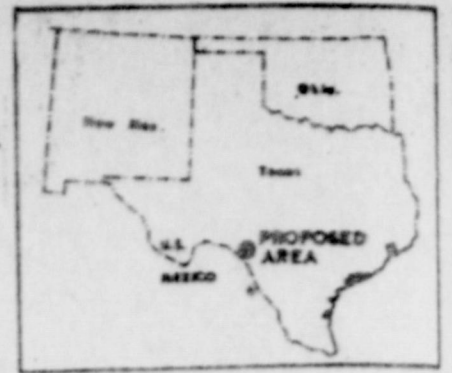

**AMISTAD**  
National Recreation Area  
TEXAS



Amistad Recreation Area, with its vast potential for outdoor activities, is expected to have a great impact on the economy of this entire area.

The area contains a total of 96,000 acres of land; of this number, an estimated 65,000 acres will be in the United States. The area will adjoin Amistad Reservoir, which will be formed behind giant Amistad Dam, astride the Rio Grande 12 miles upstream from Del Rio and Ciudad Acuna, Mexico.

The dam is more than 80 per cent complete. By late spring, water will begin to be impounded behind the huge structure and the dam itself will be finished in 1969.

Several sites will be developed for year-long activities such as camping, swimming, boating and fishing, picnicking, sightseeing and hunting. The first two areas proposed for such development are Diablo East, adjacent to the new Highway 90 bridge over Devil's River, and Rough Canyon, on the existing Devil's Lake, upstream from Lake Walk. The National Park Service is responsible for development.

Work now includes reviewing plans for construction in Diablo East and Rough Canyon, making plans for zoning for skiing, working on aquatic resources, mainly for fishing, and studying types of buoys to be used to mark various areas of the reservoir. The State Parks and Wildlife Service is assisting with the work on aquatic resources.

The National Park Service will construct boat ramps, road systems, trailer facilities, utility systems, camp grounds, picnic areas, trails and parking areas. The projected government expense for total development will probably exceed \$12 million and will be programmed over a period of years.

In addition, concessionaires will be responsible for financing construction relating to docks, storage for boats, bait shops, boat rentals, boat sales and repairs, motels and restaurants.

All construction below elevation 1144.3 will be for public use by the National Park Service or a designated concessionaire. No part of the reservoir area will be for private use.

Amistad Dam, at maximum operating pool elevation, will impound water extending up the Rio Grande for approximately 80 miles, up Devil's River for about 26 miles and up the Pecos River for some 14 miles. The reservoir will be seven miles wide at its greatest width.

In addition to providing boat docks, marines, navigational aids, beach developments, comfort stations, picnic shelters, visitor contact station and camp grounds, various interpretive exhibits are planned by the Park Service.

Many significant archeological sites that lie above the flood zone will be made easily accessible by boat when the reservoir is filled. Many cave shelters containing fragile and colorful arrays of ancient pictographs will be exposed and will require proper protection from vandals as well as appropriate interpretation for visitors.

Since Highways 90 east and west and 277 north and south intersect at the Y four miles north of Del Rio, access to Amistad National Recreation Area from all directions in the U.S. is easy. Within a radius of 250 miles on the United States side is a population of approximately 2,680,000, based on the 1960 United States Census figures, with the great metropolitan centers of Dallas-Fort Worth and Houston 450 and 250 miles away respectively.

A new highway from Ciudad Acuna, Mexico, to the interior of Mexico by way of Zaragoza

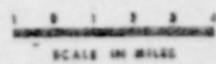
and Allende, serves the Mexican side of the Amistad project.

Because the American section of the reservoir will be considered navigable waters, the U.S. Coast Guard safe-boating regulations will apply, boats on the reservoir from the states with boat numbering laws will be required to bear numbers issued by those states. Boats of Mexican ownership will be exempt from the United States registration and numbering requirement if they are launched from the Mexican shore.

Amistad is the second international reservoir on the Rio Grande. The first was Falcon; both reservoirs were provided for in the 1944 Water Treaty with Mexico. Amistad will rank among the largest lakes in Texas. At operating pool level, the surface acreage will be 67,000, of which 49,250 will be in the United States. At flood stage, these figures will increase to 88,200 and 57,000 respectively. The shoreline in the United States will be 547 miles long at operating pool level.

The shoreline, because it will follow twists and curves of what

are now canyons and deep draws, is expected to be deeply indented and those anticipating its appearance have said it will resemble that of some stretches of the Norwegian coast.

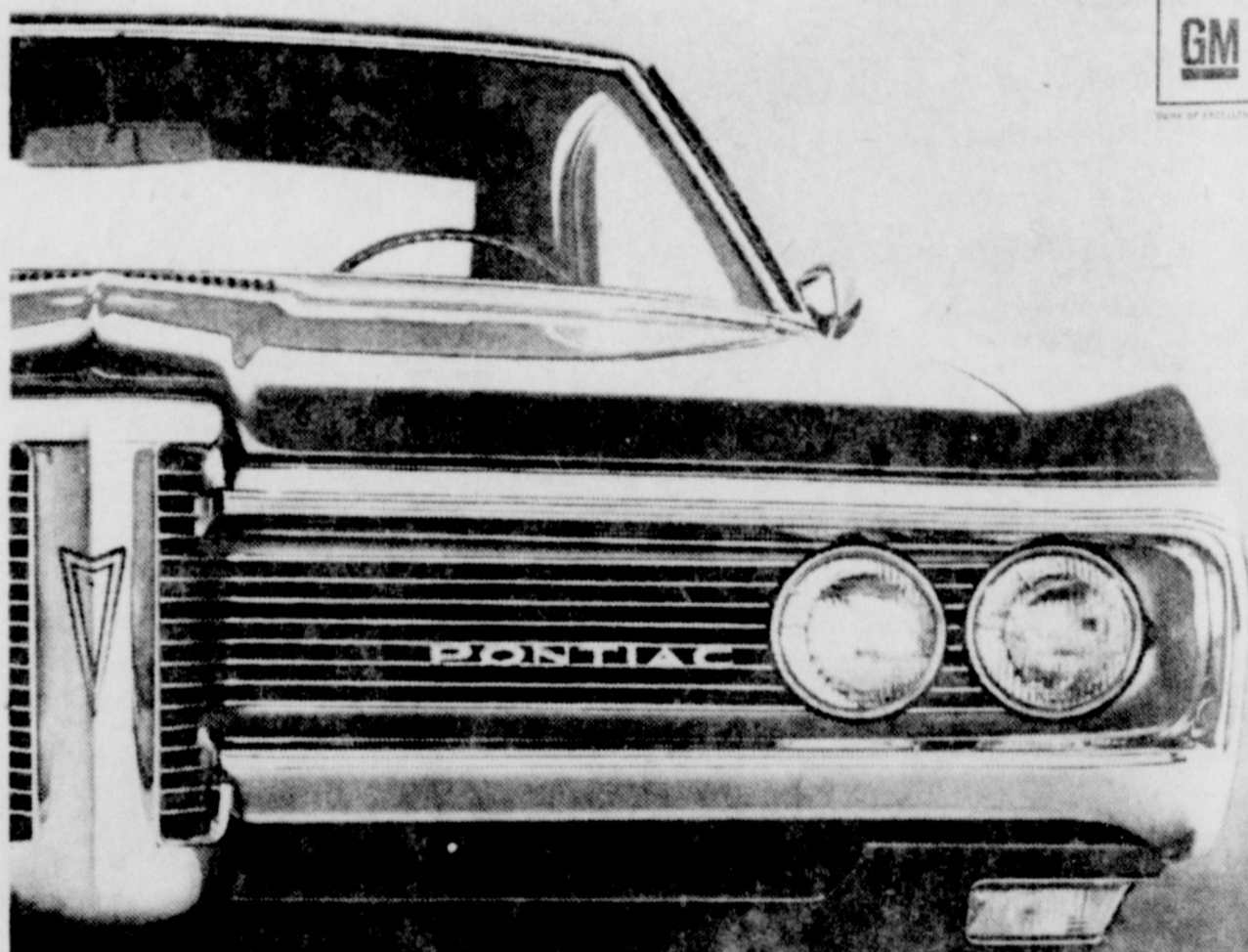
