LISTEN TO LUKE

Probably enough has been written about the death of Dr. Martin Luther King to fill several books, but there has been little said that seems should have been said a long time ago.

We think that what should be said, or should have been said, is that lawlessness is violence in whatever form lawlessness is practiced by whoever.

Some people, somehow, have gotten the notion that if they don't like someone or their ways, they have the right to kill that person. And some people think that they have the right to loot, rob, rape, steal, burn, or otherwise destroy if they become unhappy over a situation. Or if a certain law doesn't suit them, they have the privilege of breaking it and determining which laws they are going to obey or break.

So far as we are concerned in Terrell County, Memphis, Tenn., or wherever, no official or citizen has the privilege of picking out persons or laws and using his own interpretation on the laws that he will obey. It is the law of the jungle when we deteriorate to this level of degradation and no longer a system of laws.

And somewhat on the same subject --- the efforts of the legislature to pass the open-housing law now as a tribute to and memorial for Dr. King is more ridiculous than anything that august body has done in a long time. If the law had merits, it should have passed regardless of the death or life of Dr. King.

And the same thing is true of the surtax proposal forwarded by LBJ and now being considered as a tribute to him. When are we going to - as a nation - put things in proper perspective? If the surtax was needed, pass it, if not, to heck with sentiment and all other excuses or reasons.

There has to be something more than mere whims that guide the actions of all of our people and the quicker we get back to some absolutes rather than continuing to go along with some notions there are no absolutes and that right and wrong is determined by the doer and on his evaluation of the situation, then the sooner will we as a nation begin to realize what freedom and liberty are!

And it appears that someone should set some sort of a standard to regulate when the U. S. flag is to be flown at half-mast.

If national figures' deaths is the standard then that is all inclusive according to a person's attitude. For example, Dr. Jonas Salk is a national figure, so is Mickey Mantle, Oscar Robinson, Liz Taylor, Rap Brown, Ed Sullivan, John Glenn, Nancy Richey, Cassius Clay, Amy Vanderbilt, Johnny Carson, and on and on and on....

It was our opinion that in the past the flag at half-mast was for national heroes, presidents, and other such very important people. It would be impossible for any nation to retain dignity and respect for their flag if it was flown at half-mast for every nationally-known figure. Bonnie and Clyde fitted into this category also.

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April 15th Is Deadline For Vehicle Inspection

The Texas Department of Public Safety reminded motorists today that less than a week remains for obtaining the 1968 inspection sticker with more than two million cars still in need of being inspected.

"Lines are already beginning to form," a DPS spokesman said, "and they will get longer as the final date approaches. Many drivers may find it difficult to obtain necessary repairs if they continue putting off the inspection until the last minute."

The DPS pointed out that only about 3,500,000 vehicles have been inspected for the 1968 sticker through March 31, and that estimates indicate more than six million vehicles will be registered during 1968.

US90 May Turn North at Van Horn

A proposal is pending to designate a highway from Van Horn north to Carlsbad, N.M., as US 90. The proposal was originated by State Senator Dorsey B. Hardeman and a group of legislators and sent to the Texas Highway Commission who in turn referred it to the American Association of State Highway Officials following the approval of the change by the Commission.

The newly-designated US90 would turn northward from Van Horn over the route of State Highway 54 to intersect with US Highway 180-62.

The copy of the Minute Order of the Texas Highway Commission follows:

"WHEREAS, U. S. HIGHWAY 90 begins at Jacksonville Beach, Florida, and terminates at Van Horn, Texas; and

"WHEREAS, the Texas Highway Department has been requested to petition the AASHO Route Numbering Committee to extend U. S. Highway 90 northward from Van Horn over the present route of State Highway 54 to the junction of U. S. Highways 62-180; and

"WHEREAS, the extension of U. S. 90 from Van Horn northward to the junction with U. S. Highways 62-180 will provide a U. S. numbered route serving as a connection between Big Bend National Park, Davis Mountains State Park, Fort Davis National Historic Site, Guadalupe Mountains National Park, and Carlsbad Caverns National Park;

"NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS ordered by the State Highway Commission that the State Highway Engineer petition the AASHO Route Numbering Committee to extend U. S. Highway 90 northward from Van Horn over State Highway 54 in Culberson County to a termination point with the junction of U. S. Highways 62-180.

"FURTHER, that, contingent

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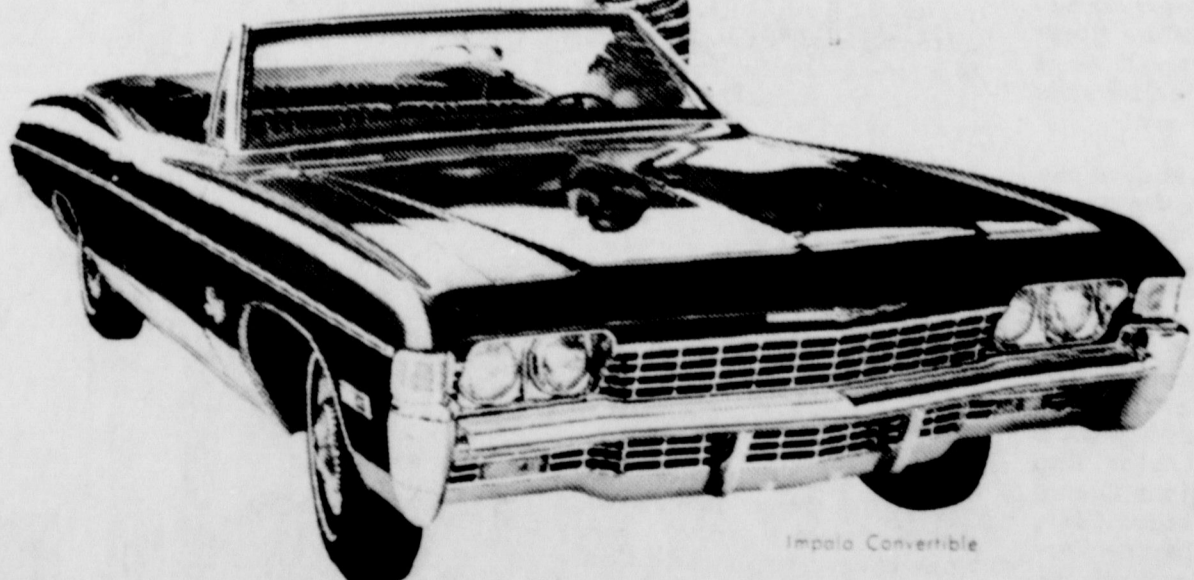

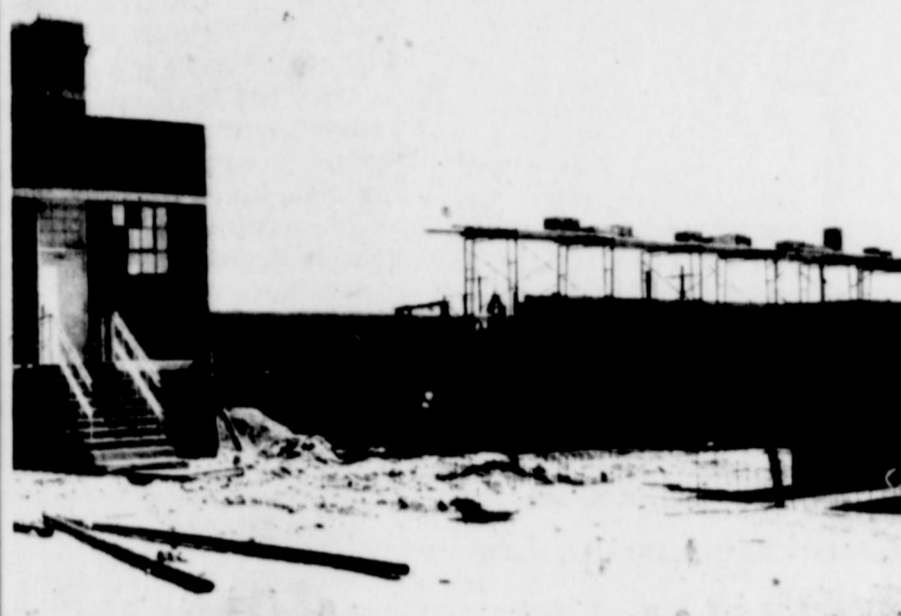

Park Daggers Are Blooming

All indications point to an excellent bloom of the Giant Dagger Yuccas at Big Bend National Park this spring, according to Park Supt. Luther T. Peterson Jr.

As of the first of April, several dozen of these unique lilies are beginning to send their tall, flower-bearing stalks skyward. Superintendent Peterson said that, barring an unforeseen freeze or heavy wind that could break the stalks, Easter Week or the week following should see the Giant Dagger's huge white flowers at their peak.

Rainfall during the first three months of 1968 amounted to about three inches, a considerable increase over the average of the last several years. If the Big Bend area should receive its normally warm April days the park's wildflowers should produce floral displays that will outdo those of many years.

Already the Big Bend lupine, verbena, and mustards line the highways from Persimmon Gap to Boquilla and Santa Elena Canyons, and the Torrey Yuccas are in full bloom. The huge variety of annuals will probably reach their peak in April as well.

Superintendent Peterson said that although a few of the smaller varieties of cacti are already blooming, the bulk of the desert strawberry, pricklypear, and hedgehog cacti likely will reach their peak along with the other desert flora.

If all of these plants produce flowers as is expected this year, Big Bend National Park should be a spectacular desert flower garden during the last half of April, he said.

Easter Seal Sale Aids Handicapped

"Do you know a handicapped person who needs help and isn't getting it?" is the question being asked by W. L. "Dub" Card, who is Pecos & Terrell County's Easter Seal Representative and the person to contact for services from the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas.

The Easter Seal Society offers rehabilitation services to help disabled persons and their families to find and also to make most effective use of resources which will be helpful to them in developing their abilities and living more purposeful lives, Mr. Card said.

This is accomplished through direct treatments, services, education, research, and cooperative efforts with all other health agencies, private, state and federal. The Easter Seal Society does not duplicate services, but strives to fill all unmet needs of the disabled, he added.

Mr. Card urged persons in Pecos & Terrell County to increase their support of the Texas Easter Seal Society and its program of services to the crippled children and adults.

He added that anyone who could benefit from rehabilitation services should contact him at First National Bank in Fort Stockton to request services from the Easter Seal Society.
