We have been watching the progress of some of the other minority factions and see how they operate and how they get things done, and all the while, this other group that we have been wondering about, has been sitting there, taking it all in stride.

This minority group has not recognized its strength, or the lack of it, which makes it a minority group. The reason that it used to be a majority group and lost ground so slowly and so easily that it was not aware of its deterioration.

The group I'm speaking of is the group of law-abiding, tax-paying, God-fearing citizens who are the goats, the patsies, and actually the victims of all the other minority groups.

We are footing the bill and responsible for maintaining a society in a country where all can take place in the name of freedom - or an effort to regain it!

The cost to the tax payers to preserve the rights of the poor people's march on Washington, the cost of cleaning up afterwards, even if there is no violence, is going to be a tremendous sum, and this is only a small part of the cost of all of this.

In no other government in the world would these things be possible, and it is possible here only so long as everyone does not join in a march or a demonstration of some kind.

Demonstrations are the acts of indolent people who do not do anything they had rather do. If they have jobs, they cannot hold their work at unprofitable employment and demonstrate. If they do not have work, there is no rhyme or reason for them to be an additional burden on society by forcing us to protect them while they are doing us that they do not have to do.

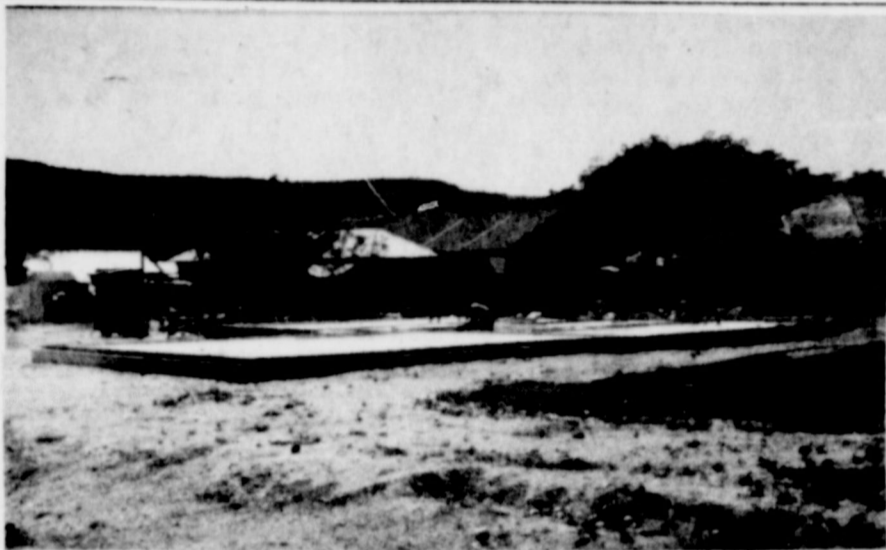
Or cleaning up afterwards! Who is buying the groceries for this huge throng of people during their march? Who is going to pay their rent and utilities while they are away? Are they so different from the rest of us that they don't have the accumulation of expenses even while they are sleeping?

If I had the time and money to take off from my business, I could go to Hemisfair! There is no equality in the way of life of the ghetto and our way of life. There is no equality in our way of life and that of J. Paul Geddes.

But I'm not going to catch up with them off on a demonstration! I'm going to demonstrate by voting, by telling my state and national representatives what I think, and by all other means using my power while in the process of trying to remain a law-abiding, tax-paying, God-fearing citizen.

It is because of us that things are allowed to get in such a mess, and it's going to be because of us that it gets straightened out - if it does!

## Tour Next Tuesday To Show Results Of Conservation

The supervisors of the Rio Grande-Pecos River Soil and Water Conservation District are sponsoring a soil conservation tour beginning at 10:00 a.m. Tuesday of next week. The tour will begin at the ranch home of Ele Hagelstein where coffee will be served and results of brush control, pasture planting, and waterspreading will be shown.

The second stop of the tour will be at the R. N. Allen ranch where the participants can see the results of cedar grubbing, root plowing, grass planting, and grass management.

The third stop will be at the N. Malone Mitchell Jr. ranch where cedar grubbing, root plowing, and grass seeding will be shown and a barbecue lunch will be served at noon.

The tour is being held in recognition of Soil Stewardship Week which is May 19-26, and to give local ranchers and others interested an opportunity to see conservation work which has been done by ranchers of the district.

The theme of the special week this year is "A Time for Initiative" and underscores the responsibilities of soil stewardship.

One of the largest safaris to go into Mexico from Sanderson is pictured below. According to Willis Harrell, who loaned us the pictures, each man had a horse to ride, one pack horse to carry his own equipment, and there were about four or five horses to carry the cooking utensils, groceries, and other equipment for the entire group. There were also some extra animals to bring back the meat. Harrell stated that the group would leave Sanderson one day and ride to the river, camp that night and ride to the area to be hunted on the next day and it was usually late at night when they arrived at their destination. There were no fences on the entire trip and there were no game laws that they knew of in Mexico and game was plentiful. Harrell stated also that there was a small flagtail deer not much larger than a dog and the mule deer were very large. The men killed the meat they needed for camp and brought home what they wanted and killed no more than that. TO THE VOTERS OF TERRELL COUNTY PRECINCT NO. 1:

I wish to thank each of you that voted for me in the primary, I hope you will do me the same favor on June 1st in the run-off election and bring several more to the polls with the same inclination.

I fell that I was remiss in not making known to the voters of this precinct, prior to the primary, the plans and hopes I have for the development of a better community in which to live and raise your children and grandchildren.

I had talked to a few about my plans but for the most part, I had kept my thoughts to myself. Perhaps if I had made my thoughts known to the voters, I may have received more votes.

To bring these thoughts before the public, is the purpose of this letter to you of Terrell County, in the hope that you feel as I do about wanting to better the community and will support me in my endeavor by coming to the polls June 1st and vote for me.

No. 1. In my canvass of the people for votes, I heard many complaints about the picking up of trash at businesses and homes. I will propose that a systematic schedule be worked out for hauling the trash from each home and business. I would also like to see the people agree to refrain from burning trash in town at all, with an orderly pickup it would not be necessary, this would be in order that our air be kept clean and unpolluted, especially during the warm months when people are enjoying the cool breeze from their air conditioners, have clothes on the line, suffering from asthma or just enjoying the fresh country air as the good Lord made it. It is also hoped that a continuous fill process be undertaken to keep the dump-ground more sanitary and as free as possible of bad odors and disease carrying insects.

No. 2. I would propose that the ditches in the lower part of town be cleaned out and opened up to facilitate the run-off of rain water. Build up the shoulders of the streets all over town to help conserve the condition of our paving and keep it from deteriorating through neglect and poor maintenance.

No. 3. I would propose that we investigate the feasibility of building a swimming pool for the enjoyment of our kids and young at heart, (perhaps you too will still look good in a swimsuit), it is believed that the pool is possible and practicable. This community offers very little for our young people in the way of recreation. I believe

the pool could be financed by a voluntary contribution from each family in the community on a monthly basis payable with their water bill. Each family should pay on the basis of their ability to contribute, I would think between \$2.00 and \$10.00 per month. At the end of two years, we should have enough to build the pool. I would suggest that the county purchase the property on which to locate the pool and to see to its operation. School boys in their sophomore year could be given instruction in life saving through the facilities of the Red Cross for Life Guard duty and perhaps one of the teachers would appreciate the opportunity to see to the orderly operation of the pool during the summer months. The charges for swimming and concessions should keep the operation of the pool on a self paying basis. USE YOUR INFLUENCE KIDS!

The list of projects for the improvement of Sanderson is endless, with your help, most of them are possible.

If you are for these things I have mentioned, I will appreciate your vote and support beginning June 1st and thereafter until the end of my term of office, if you do me the honor of electing me to this office.

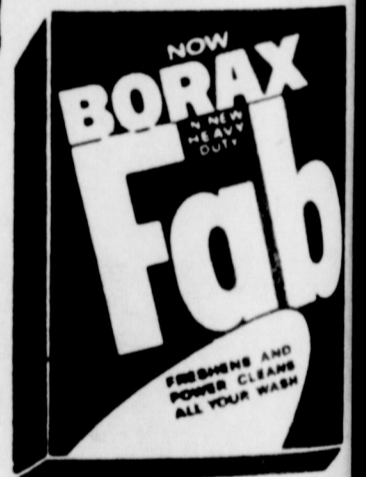
