LISTEN TO LUKE

By Albert:---

There have been many opinions expressed during the past week about the assassination of Senator Kennedy, and even the president has appointed a committee to look into the cause of such acts.

We don't know anything about the men on the committee or how long it is going to take them to come to a conclusion, but we have already arrived at our conclusion.

There is no value on human life or property being demonstrated by anyone in any position of authority in this nation, and there is no respect for the life being advocated or exempted.

The permissiveness that is the policy and practice of the law does not, cannot, and will not earn, get, or demand respect for the law or of those who are permissive.

We all want strict law enforcement - on the other hand, we don't want drag racing on our highways, but we want to have a raffle without interference by the law; we don't want someone stealing our merchandise or stock - under certain circumstances; we oppose trucks driving - only after they have had an accident; and we don't want our kids to drive so when they take drivers' education we can make better grades; we don't want to be too closely supervised by the laws and always serve the right to uphold or to break the laws at our pleasure, to enforce or ignore them for the same reason.

The laws, as we understand them, are to take over when our understanding of right and wrong are distorted or incorrect when our consciences fail to control our passions. People act under our most basic teaching of right and wrong - "do unto others" and "love thy neighbor as thyself" - do not break the laws.

There seems to be a general opinion that the Southern Pacific is going to pull off their passenger trains and there is nothing that anyone can do or going to do about it.

The general opinion also is that the railroad company has been desirous of pulling the trains out of service for a long time and created the situation that they claim is the reason for pulling them off - lack of use of that facility.

We don't know - certainly - whether of these facts is true or not, but we have not seen or heard of any formal opposition that is going to be lodged against the company's plans to continue the service.

Such plans, if they were to be considered, should have been considered before Monday of this week - the 15 days prior to the termination of the service.

The 24th of June is the day the company planned to stop service and that day is not far away.

And when it happens on that day, there will go another of those things that had a big place in the history of Sanderson.

The time marches on!

... former Villa soldier dies

Funeral services were held in El Buen Pastor Methodist Church Sunday afternoon for Bernardino Jimenez, about 104, who died Saturday after a short illness. Rev. Moises Yanez, pastor, was in charge of the services and Janes Funeral Home of Ozona was in charge of the arrangements with interment in the Santa Rita Cemetery.

Jimenez was born in Mexico in about 1864 and is said to have been one of the soldiers in Pancho Villa's army. He came to this country in March of 1919 and lived in Langry until 1935 when he came to Sanderson and worked in the rock quarry until it was closed.

Survivors include his widow, Maria Luisa Jimenez; a stepson, Fidencio Ybarra, Casa Grande, Ariz.; two stepdaughters, Mrs. Juan G. Lopez, Andrews, and Mrs. Juan Barron, Sanderson; 19 stepgrandchildren, and three stepgreat-grandchildren.

... medical school graduate

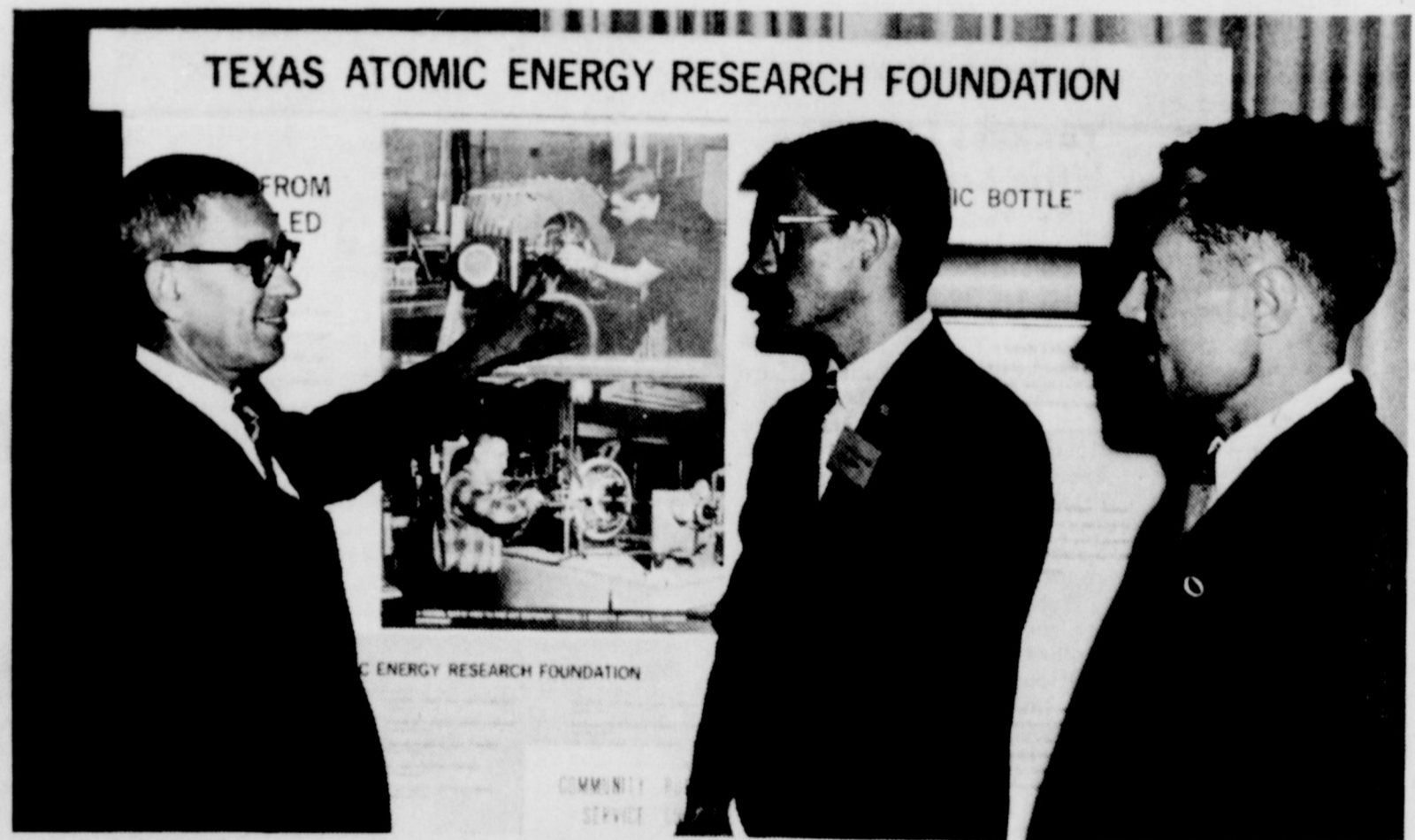
