

## 2 Men, 2 Boys Killed In Plane Crash Near Dryden Saturday, Found Monday



The picture above shows the largest piece of wreckage of the airplane crash which took the lives of four local residents last Saturday morning. The right wing and wheel, the back portion of the fuselage, and the vertical stabilizer is all that remained together. The picture was taken from the direction of the impact of the plane.

The point of impact of the airplane, about 2 miles northeast of the Milton Holmes ranch house west of Dryden also shows a portion of the airplane in the center background and the light



spots at the extreme right in the brush are reflections from the portion of the airplane shown in the other picture. The dark spots at the right and the greasewood show the effects of the explosion which occurred when the plane

hit the ground. The crash was east of the site of the airplane crash that occurred in January of 1939 that took the lives of S. A. Darr Jr., Dan Farley, and Ed Hampton, also on the Holmes ranch.

All four occupants of a local airplane were killed instantly when the craft hit the ground about five miles northeast of the Dryden airport Saturday morning. The airplane exploded when it hit the ground and the debris and bodies were scattered along a path approximately 150 yards from the point of impact.

The craft seemed to be heading in a southwesterly direction according to the path of the debris and the Civil Air Patrol pilot who spotted the debris stated that there seemed to have been a spiraling motion of the plane as it hit the ground, judging from what he could see.

The plane disintegrated upon impact and parts were found as much as 200 yards from the site of the impact.

The wreckage was found just before noon Monday.

The Janes Funeral Home of Ozona picked up the bodies and returned them to that city.

Occupants of the plane were the pilot, C. D. Carroll, 36, Clyde Whistler, 56, and his son,

Jack Whistler, 17; and Walter Shoemaker, 16. Carroll and the elder Whistler were employees of the Southern Pacific Railroad and the two CAP cadets are students in Sanderson High School.

The airplane, a Piper Cherokee 235, left Dryden Saturday, according to reports, enroute to Ozona for fuel before going on to San Antonio to aid in the search for the plane reported to be lost in that area. The plane was not reported after it left Sanderson about 7:00 a. m.

Sunday morning Civil Air Patrol officials in Odessa sent two planes to Dryden to make the flight from there to Ozona and search for the missing plane, but no sighting was made. A full-scale search was ordered to begin Monday morning by Joe Johnson, commander of the Odessa CAP unit.

Clyde Lewis Whistler was born in Del Rio August 19, 1911, the son of Mr. and Mrs. John J. Whistler, and the family moved to Sanderson shortly after that time. He was married to Miss Naomi Eve Avant in Del Rio on December 24, 1938.

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


