These boxes were put at the head of the various columns so a person could vote an entire party ticket by making only one "X" in the box at the top of the column.

The Democratic Party is the one which is most complete in detail, but it is not complete in Precinct 3. There is no candidate on the ballot for the commissioner in that precinct.

And from conversations we have heard, we feel sure that many will want to vote in the Republican Party and in the Democratic Party in some of the individual races.

Splitting the ticket" is also one of the heritages of voting and people do not want denied.

## Van Horn Whips Sanderson 30-6; Iraan Braves To Play Here Friday Night

The Van Horn Eagles whipped their Sanderson cousins by 30-6 in the first conference game for both teams. The game was in Van Horn.

In other games in the district, Rankin beat Socorro 33-0 and the outcome of the Iraan-Clint game was not known.

Jesus Valdez sparked the Van Horn attack throwing two touchdown passes, kicking one field goal and booting three extra points.

Jon Means opened up the Van Horn scoring with a 12 yard run in the opening period followed by Valdez' extra point kick.

Valdez passed 14 yards to David Durbin for the second touchdown of the first period.

Valdez' second touchdown strike came in the second quarter on a 21 yard aerial to Manuel Corrallo.

Halfback Nuny Morris scored Van Horn's final touchdown in the second period on a two-yard plunge.

Valdez' 32-yard field goal came in the third period.

Sanderson's lone touchdown came in the final period on a 60-yard pass play from Bill Littleton to Jerry Greenleaf. The PAT was blocked.

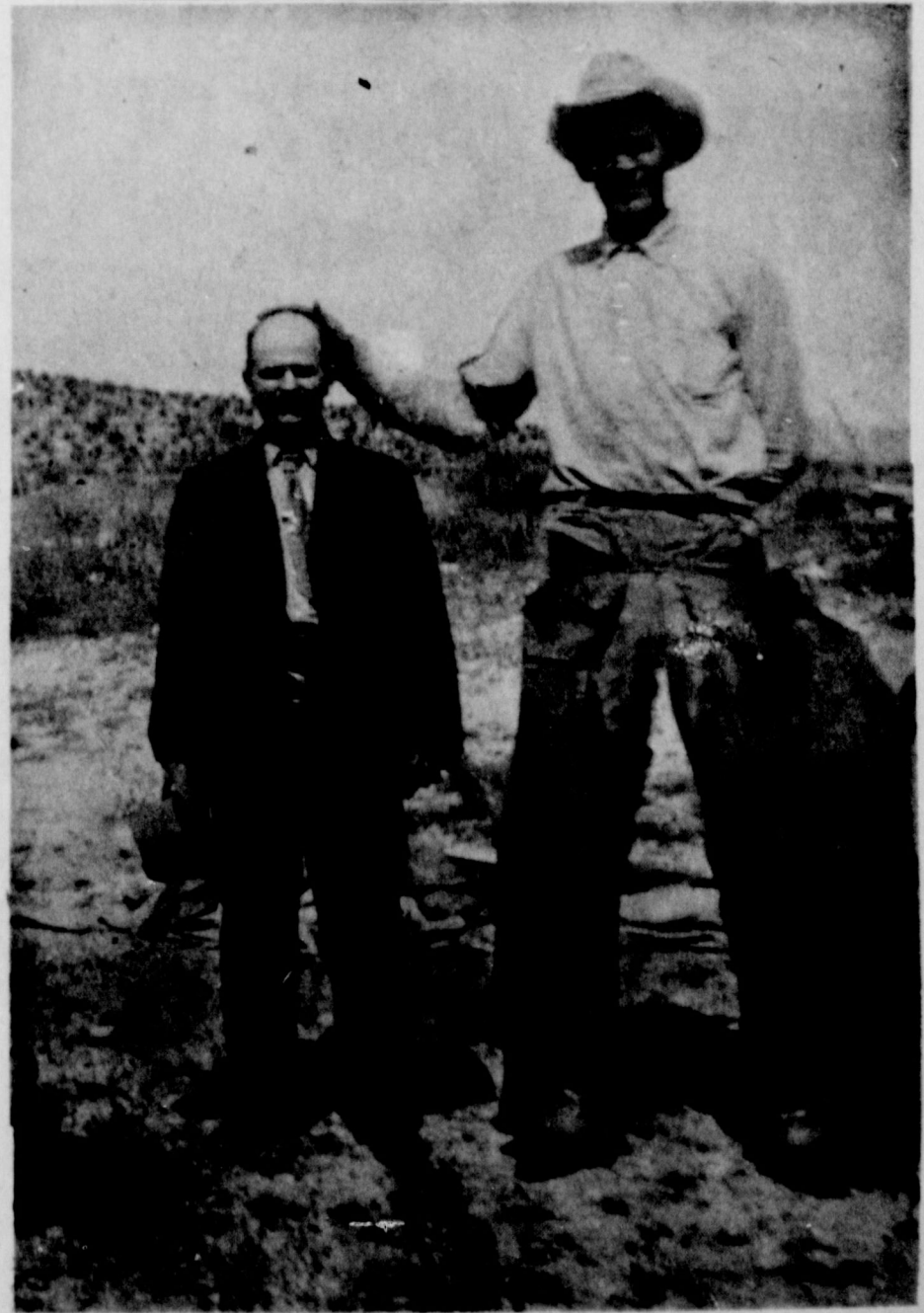
Van Horn goes after its second loop win against Socorro next Friday while Sanderson takes on Iraan.

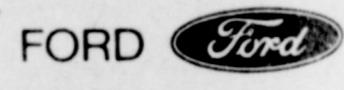

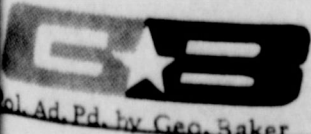

# Applications Available For Free Public Hunts

Anyone wishing to participate in deer and quail hunts on the wildlife management area operated by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department should submit their requests for applications, according to Robert G. Mauer-mann, deputy director of the Department.

Hunters may participate in both the quail and deer drawings but are urged to submit only one application for each since duplicates will be eliminated by computer.

The Department will issue 3,560 hunting permits for deer on eight wildlife management areas Statewide and 880 quail hunting permits on two wildlife management areas in the Texas Panhandle.

Since the number of applicants always exceeds the number of hunting permits available, those permitted to hunt will be chosen by public drawing to be held in Austin Oct. 31. To be eligible for the drawing, applications must be received in the Austin office on or before 5 p.m. Oct. 25. Applications received later than the deadline will not be considered for the drawing.

Mauer-mann stressed that these hunts are conducted primarily as a part of the Department's wildlife research programs and not to provide public hunting. He also said that these hunts are not indicative of high game population and that the Department could cancel the hunts at any time the recommended quotas are met in order to prevent the reduction of game below desired levels.

### DEER

Cherokee Wildlife Management Area, a 16,000-acre unit 10 miles southeast of Alto, Cherokee County, will have 500 permits issued for deer hunts between Dec. 10-15.

Alabama Creek Wildlife Management Area, 12,500-acre unit 15 miles southwest of Lufkin, will have 400 permits for the deer hunts between Nov. 9-13.

Devil's Pocket Wildlife Management Area, a 19,267-acre area 12 miles east of Buna in Newton County, will have 500 permits for the deer hunts between Nov. 16-21.

Engeling Wildlife Management Area, 10,941-acre area 40 miles southeast of Corsicana or 20 miles northwest of Palestine on Highway 287 in Anderson County, will have 300 permits issued for deer hunts between Nov. 9-12, Nov. 16-19, and Nov. 23-26.

Kerr Wildlife Management Area, 6,493-acre area 28 miles west of Kerrville, will have 1,000 permits for deer hunts between Nov. 9-26 and Nov. 30, - Dec. 23.

Black Gap Wildlife Management Area, 100,000-acre area located 55 miles south of Marathon and adjacent to the Big Bend National Park in Brewster County, will have 750 permits for deer hunts between Nov. 30 and Dec. 9. Each hunter drawing out on the deer hunt may also take a javelina.

Sierra Diablo Wildlife Management Area, containing 7,791 acres and located 32 miles northwest of Van Horn, Culberson County, will have 80

permits issued for deer hunts between Nov. 30 and Dec. 9.

Gene Howe Wildlife Management Area, a 5,821-acre area six miles east of Canadian in Hemphill County, will have 30 permits issued for deer hunts to be conducted Nov. 30 - Dec. 1, Dec. 7 and 8, Dec. 14-15. In addition each hunter drawing a deer permit will be permitted to take one turkey of either sex.

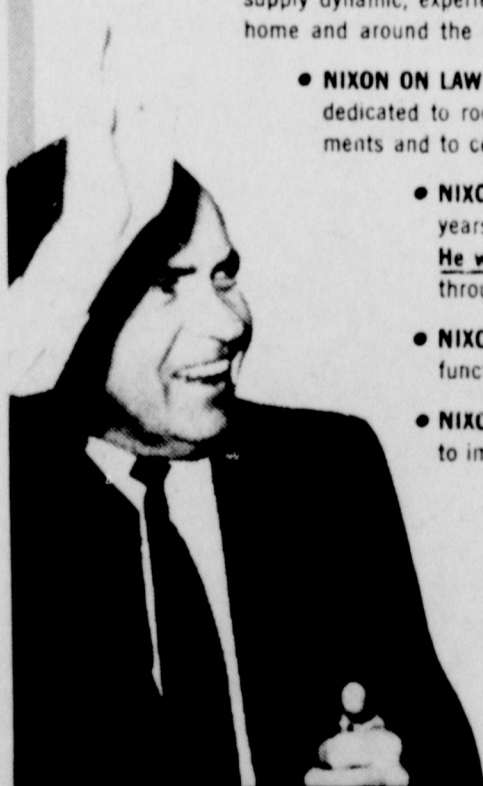

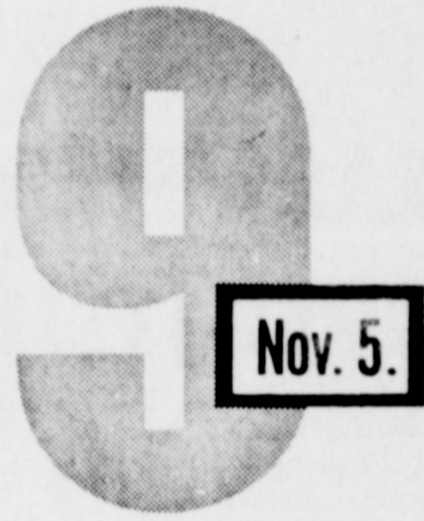

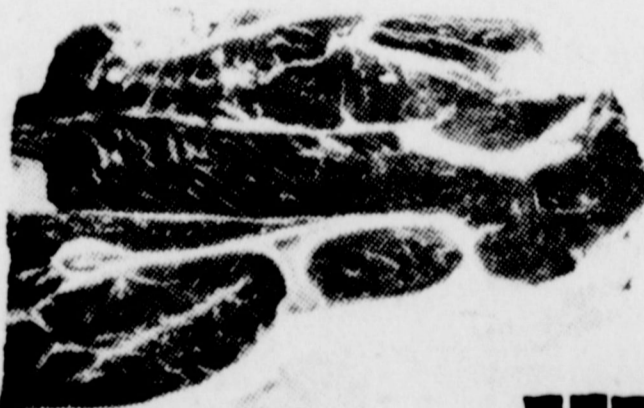

## Election Ballot Change May Confuse Some Voters

Two factors may cause some balloting confusion in the November 5 general election, election officials in Texas forecast this week.

The two factors are:  
1. A new State law has inserted a new top line on the paper ballots so that persons desiring to vote a "straight party ticket" may do so by making one mark. This new line is expected to confuse not only the "straight ticket" voters, but also the "split ticket" voters.

2. "Split ticket" voters are expected to be more numerous than ever before, especially since there is a third party,

the American Party, and it has candidates for only President and Vice-President and no other offices.

Voters are cautioned to be certain that their ballots are properly marked so that their intentions will not be subject to interpretation by election officials.

The "scratch" method of voting, which some people prefer, is still permitted. However, voters using this method are cautioned to be certain to mark through all names in all three party columns for which they do not wish to vote.
