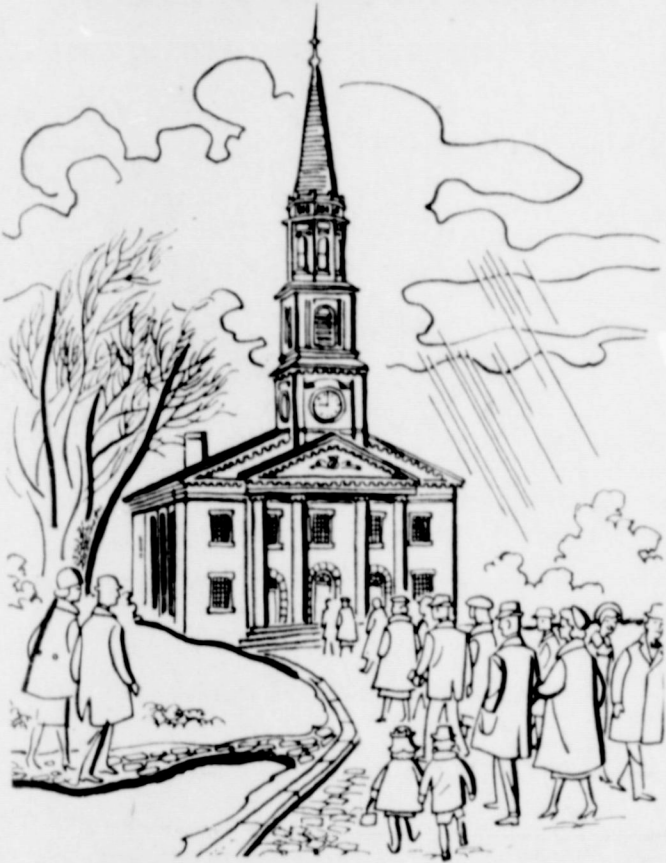

THANKSGIVING



Of the dozen or more holidays which are quite universally observed, Thanksgiving Day is one that is altogether American in concept and observance. It ranks with the Fourth of July in this respect and in national importance.

A day set aside for giving thanks was the first holiday instituted on the American continent. Each year our thoughts go back to that intrepid little band of Pilgrims who, having survived the rigors of a bleak New England winter and reaped the results of their summer toil, gathered to thank God for the bountiful harvest.

We have strayed somewhat from the significance given to the day by those God-fearing ancestors of ours, and are inclined to emphasize the delights of a well-laden table, family reunions and the festivity of modern sports.

It is altogether fitting that Thanksgiving should be one of the happiest days of the year, but its true significance should be ever present in our thoughts.

In November of each year, as we give thanks for blessings received, let us remember that among them is a system of personal initiative which these Pilgrim Fathers instituted and which became the basis of American free enterprise.

They tried the communal method of putting all their stores into a single warehouse and rationing out supplies and services — and they didn't like it. It was then that they set up a system in which each man was free to reap the rewards of his own enterprise. Each family was given its own plot of land and made dependent on its own work to provide food and clothing.

Governor Bradford noted in his diary that under the new system each family succeeded in supplying its own wants, and some had a surplus to sell. There were no more famines in the colony.

Having found that the free enterprise system worked best, the Pilgrims stuck to it. They handed it down to their children, who left it to each succeeding generation as an American heritage.

Beset as we are by all the confusion of today's alien ideologies, let us, on this Thanksgiving Day, remember well our Pilgrim legacy.

"Lord God of Hosts, be with us yet,
Lest we forget — lest we forget."

... to preach here Dec. 15

Dr. David L. Stitt, president of Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary and professor of pastoral theology at that institution, will be the speaker at the morning worship service at the First Presbyterian Church in Sanderson December 15.

Dr. Stitt is a native of Fort Worth. He graduated from TCU in Fort Worth and the seminary he now heads; did graduate work at the University of Texas; Princeton Theological Seminary, and the University of St. Andrews in Scotland. He received a D. D. Degree from Westminster College in Missouri in 1942 and from Davidson College in North Carolina in 1964. An L.L.D. Degree was awarded by Austin College in 1950, and by TCU in 1966.

He held pastorates in Haskell, Texas; and St. Louis, Mo. He is a member of the executive agencies of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church, U.S.; fraternal delegate to the General Assembly, United Presbyterian Church, USA, and to the Church of Scotland; guest minister of St. Andrews, Scotland; American Church, Paris, France; representative to the World Council of Churches; Moderator of the Synod of Missouri; continued to back page

Miss Patricia Thomas is the director of the Sanderson High School Band.

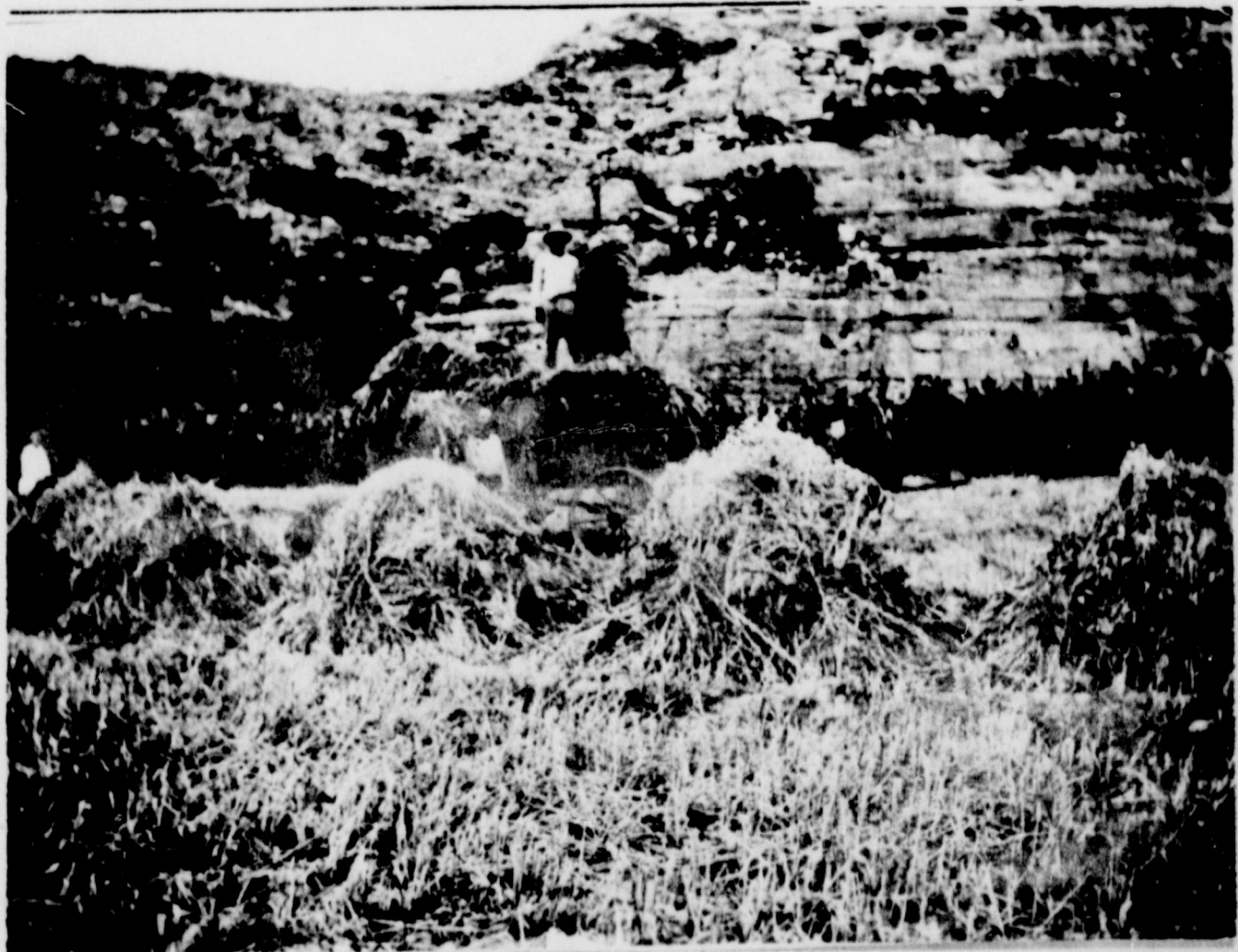
READER IN FUWAIT, ARABIA, READS 'TIMES' AD
