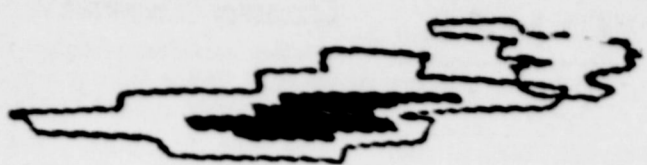

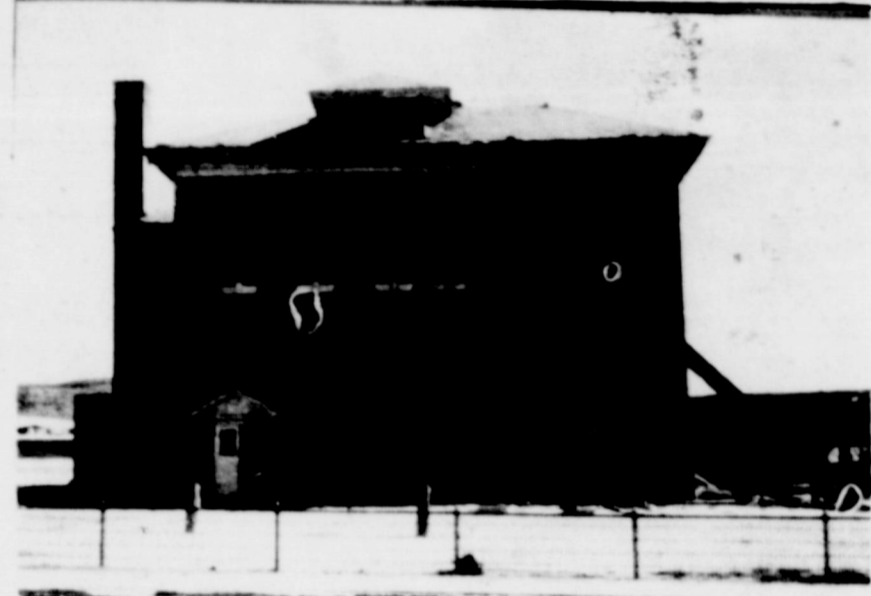

This year's plates are white with black numerals, Terrell County's allotment starting at DBJ 10-49 and DBH175-.

## Registration Ends January 31 For Local Voters

Only 339 Terrell County residents have registered to vote during 1969, according to a report Monday from Mrs. A. J. Hahn, deputy tax assessor and collector.

The registration which is free is a "must" for everyone, regardless of age, to vote in any election since the poll tax was abolished. With a deadline of January 31 when registration must be made, only a few days remain. Anyone who will be 21 this year is eligible to vote and they are urged to register now and not wait until their birthday, according to information available.

All new motion pictures are to be coded as to the type of audience the show is intended for, according to an announcement this week by O. T. Sudduth, local theatre operator.

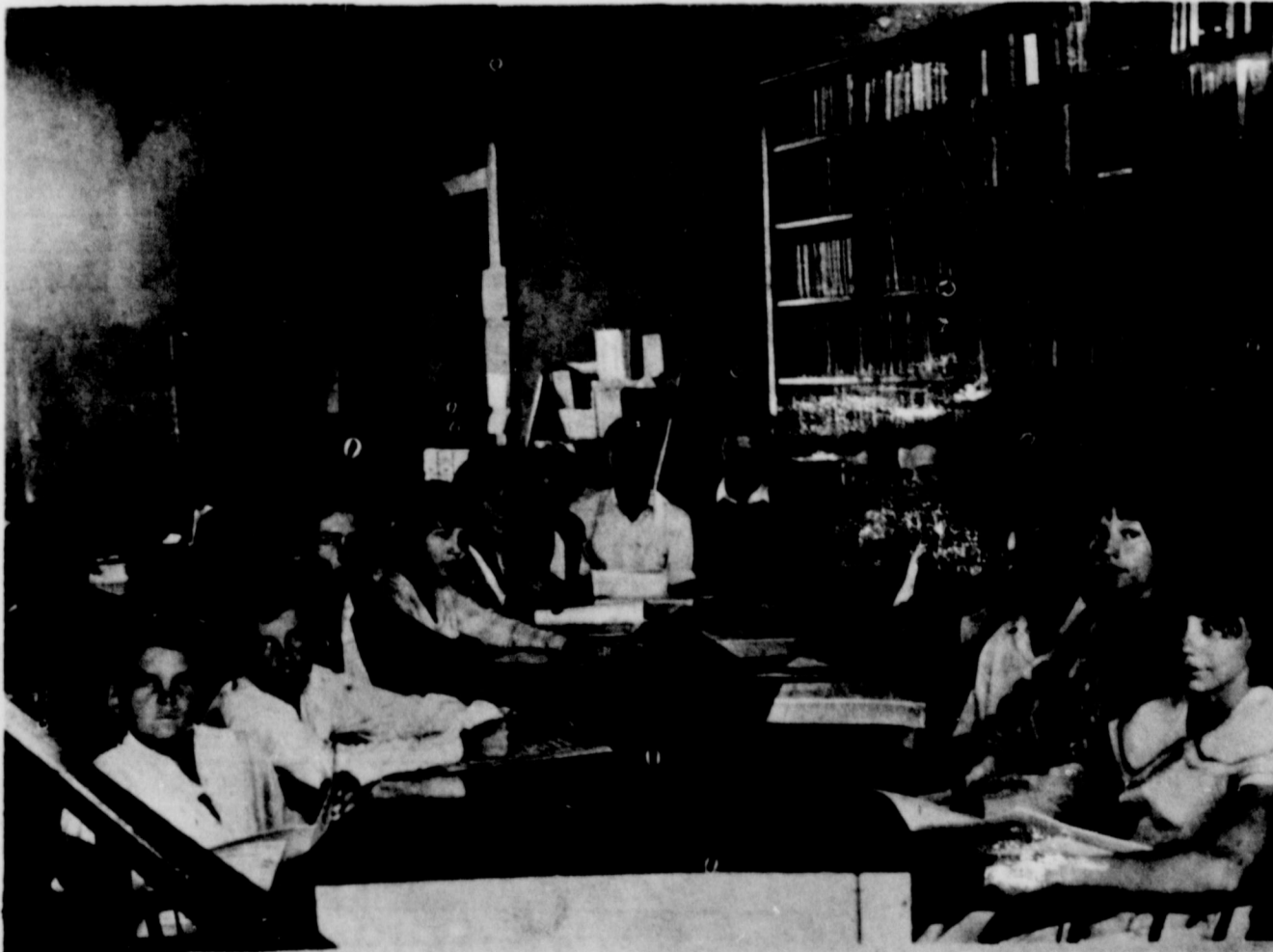
The symbols will be:

Mott again was high scorer with 12, Kline had 8, Cerda 5, and Hodgkins 2. Harrell also saw some action.

Coach Goertz stated that the Ozona coaches told him that he had one of the finest groups of boys, both 7th and 8th graders, that they had seen and they expected the local lads to give some real competition in the future.

The 8th graders won the Imperial game after two overtimes 19-17. Ray Villarreal sunk the winning basket from about 15 feet out. Chago Flores was high scorer with 8, Juan Saenz had 5 and Villarreal, Fendrick Har-

rell, and Ikey Billings each had 2 points. Skipper Harris, Jaimie Galvan, and James Cash also made the trip.

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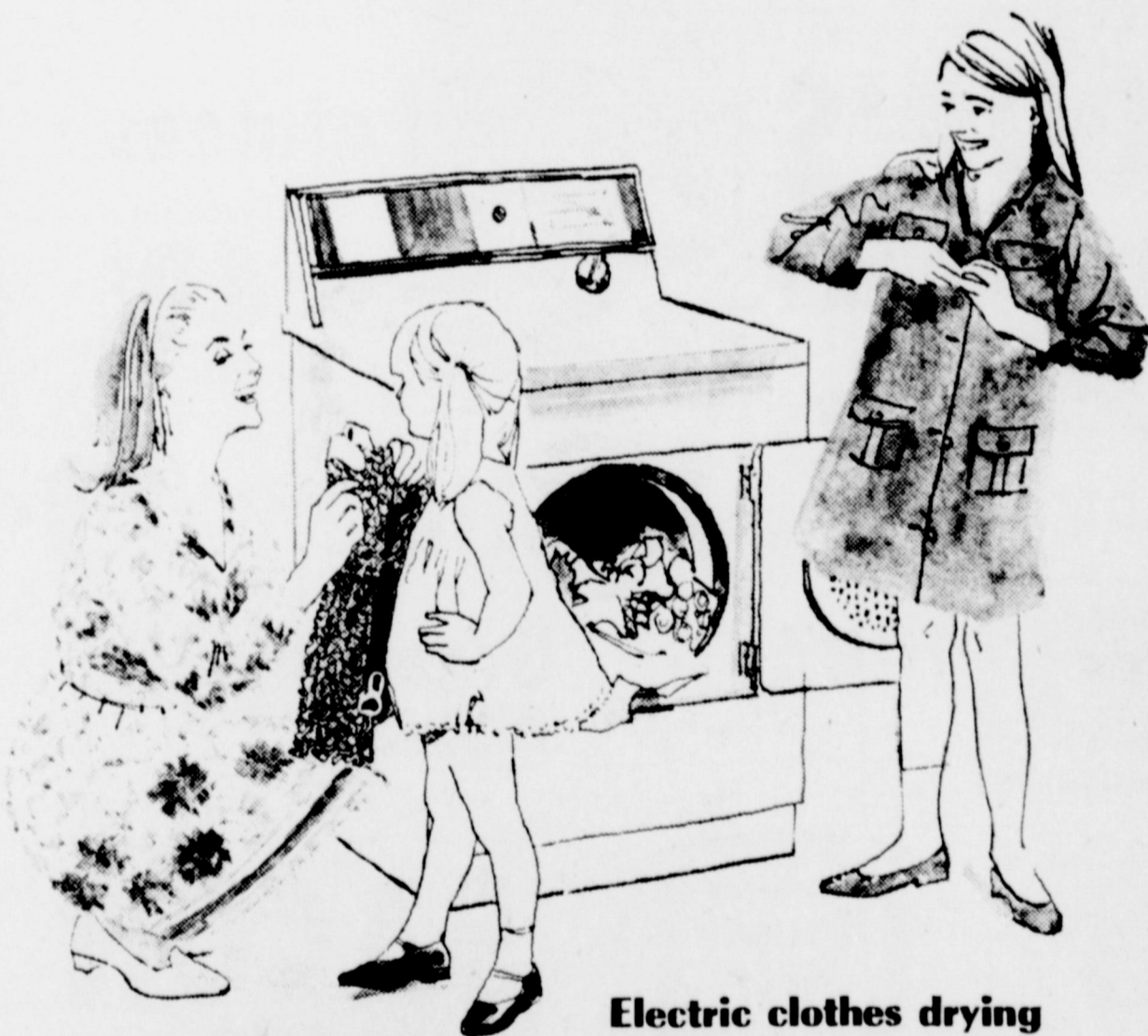



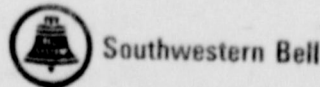
