Wilson Banner Killed In Accident On Ranch Friday

Cyrus Wilson Banner, Terrell County rancher, was killed Friday when his pickup went off the road into a canyon on his ranch in the eastern part of the county.

Banner had left home to go to the El Paso Natural Gas camp and his pickup ran off the road on what is referred to as Pistol Canyon Hill. He was thrown from the pickup and killed instantly.

When he did not return at the expected time, a search was initiated and the site of the accident and the body were not discovered until Friday night.

Funeral services were in the First United Methodist Church, of which he was a member, at 2:00 o'clock Sunday afternoon, Rev. Albert Peak, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Cedar Grove Cemetery with the Janes Funeral Home of Ozona in charge of arrangements.

The pallbearers were M. C. Cravens and Ted Wright of Midland, Jake Hoover of McCamey, R. S. Wilkinson, J. T. Williams, Herbert Brown, Bill Turner, and Gene McSparran.

Mr. Banner was born December 14, 1903, in Sanderson, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Banner, and had lived in Terrell County all of his life. He was married to Jewel Goode in 1928 at the First Presbyterian Church in Sanderson.

Besides his widow, he is survived by a son, Cy Banner, three grandchildren; two brothers, Willie Banner of Sanderson and Gene Banner of El Paso; a sister, Mrs. Jerry Bell of San Antonio.

Open Heart Surgery Due For Local Lad

Tony Escudero, the 8-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Otilio Escudero, has been scheduled for open-heart surgery on March 4 at 7:30 a. m. in Providence Memorial Hospital in El Paso.

Tony was a "blue baby" and had heart surgery previously, but it was not within the heart.

During his first year in school Tony had some difficulty due to his ailment and missed quite a bit, but has been absent only three days this year.

Mrs. Escudero stated that every effort has been made to prepare Tony mentally and emotionally for the ordeal of the surgery, and they plan to take him to El Paso February 25 for pre-surgical tests and preparation. One thing that Tony is looking forward to, according to his mother, is a tour of the hospital and being explained the process - to his satisfaction and his capability of understanding - of the machinery and equipment used for the surgery. And the doctor will be the guide for the tour, Tony has been promised.

"Tony knows - as best an 8-year-old can know - that the surgery is absolutely necessary, and with the anticipation of a "normal" life following the surgery, he is willing and anxious for the surgery", his mother explained. "We earnestly solicit your prayers for the skill and knowledge of the surgeon for the recovery of our boy, and for strength for us during the anxious days ahead," Mrs. Escudero stated.

SS Benefits Rules Stated

Retrospective benefits under social security are limited to twelve months. Since the new benefits to young disabled workers, disabled widows age 50-62, and children of women workers who were fully but not currently insured, were first payable for February 1968 - the deadling to receive full back payments is February 28, 1969. A person who might have received benefits back to February 1968, will lose one month's back payment if he waits until March to file; two if he waits until April; and etc.

Those who believe they or members of their families might qualify for these social security benefits, should call the Odessa office before February 28th.

MARCH OF DIMES DRIVE NETS ONLY \$131.00

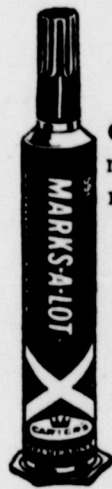
James Caroline, treasurer of the local March of Dimes unit, reported Tuesday morning that only \$131.00 had been received through solicitations by mail.
