The junior varsity mile relay team placed first with a time of 3:46.7. The team was Emilio Martinez, Hector Chalam-baga, Manuel Olivas, and Danny Galvan. The 440-yard relay team was also first with a time of 3.47. They were Danny, Leslie Hall, Bill Littleton, and Manuel.

In the 440-yard dash, Emilio was 3rd and Hector was 5th; in the 220-yard dash, Manuel was 3rd and Emilio was 5th.

In the 880-yard run, Oscar Villegas was 4th and Rolando Rodriguez was 5th. Leslie was 6th in the broad jump.

Antonio Cruz (Tony) Escudero died in an El Paso hospital Wednesday morning when he began to hemorrhage after undergoing open heart surgery Tuesday morning.

The eight-year old boy was born with a defective heart and looked forward to the operation in the hope that it would make it possible for him to live a normal life. Terrell County residents rallied to recent fundraising projects very generously to make it possible for his parents to go to El Paso a week early for orientation and be prepared to remain with him following the surgery. When news of his death came, the grief of the family was shared by many who also had hoped for the surgery to be successful to meet the courage and faith of the little boy.

Funeral services were held Saturday morning in St. James Catholic Church with Rev. Dan Dierschke officiating and burial was in Santa Rita Cemetery.

Tony was born in Fort Stockton on June 13, 1961, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Otilio Escudero of Sanderson. He was in the first grade at school.

Besides his parents, he is survived by six sisters and two brothers; Juanita, Rosario and Petra Sanchez, Maria, Margarita, and Patricia Escudero, Juan and Primitivo Escudero.

Snelson Offers Bill Upping Murder Penalty

AUSTIN—Senator W.E. (Pete) Snelson introduced Monday to the Texas Senate a bill to increase the penalties for murder.

The bill provides that the minimum punishment for murder with malice be raised from two to twenty years. The maximum punishment for murder without malice would be changed from five years to life.

"Present Texas laws are very inadequate in setting the range of punishment for offenses of murder with malice, murder without malice, or assault to murder," Snelson said. "Many of the murders committed are murder without malice, and juries and courts are appalled that they cannot give a higher sentence where facts warrant."

"Murder with malice carries a sentence of two years up to life in the penitentiary or death. Probation is available and sometimes is given after a jury has found the defendant guilty."

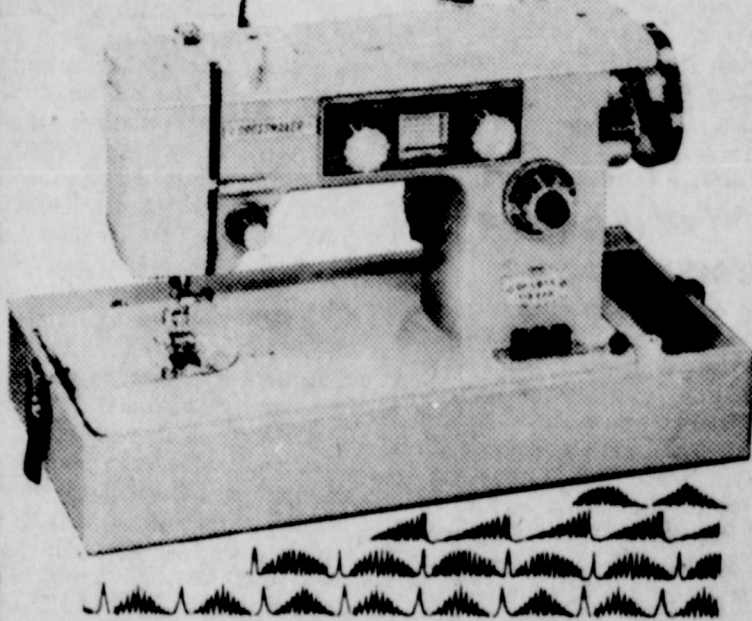

PUBLIC NOTICE OF THE REQUIREMENT FOR RECORDATION AND LIMITATION OF CERTAIN CLAIMS OF WATER RIGHTS.

Notice is here given as required by Section 4 of the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 (Article 7542a, Vernon's Civil Statutes) that all claims of riparian water rights, all claims under Article 7500a, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, to impound, divert or use public waters for other than domestic and livestock purposes for which no permit has been issued, all claims of water rights under the Irrigation Acts of 1889 and 1895 which were not filed with the State Board of Water Engineers in accordance with the Irrigation Act of 1913, as amended, and all other claims of water rights other than claims under permits and certified filings, must be recorded with the Texas Water Rights Commission. Section 4 does not apply to use of water for domestic and livestock purposes as the same is defined by Commission Rules.

On or before September 1, 1969, every person claiming any water right to which Section 4 applies shall file with the Commission a sworn statement setting forth the nature of the claim of water right. Claims to which the Section applies shall be recognized only if valid under existing law and only to the extent of actual application of water to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1967, inclusive. However, in any case where any claimant of a riparian right has prior to August 28, 1967, commenced or completed the construction of works designed to apply a greater quantity of water to beneficial use, such right shall be recognized to the extent of the maximum amount of water actually applied to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1970, inclusive; provided an additional sworn statement is filed on or before July 1, 1971. Failure to file the sworn statement or statements in substantial compliance with Section 4 shall extinguish and bar any claim of water right to which the Section applies.

Instructions and forms for recording claims may be obtained without cost from the Texas Water Rights Commission, P. O. Box 12396, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.

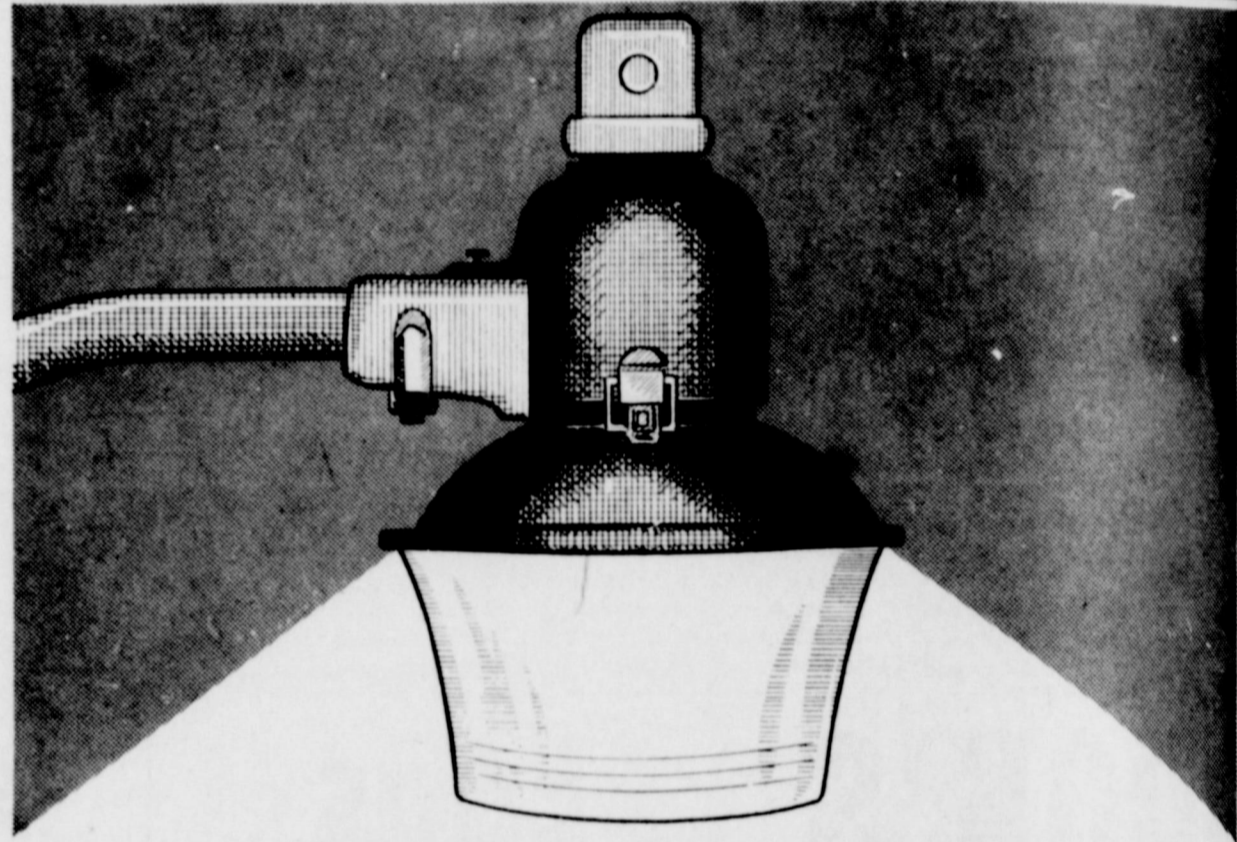

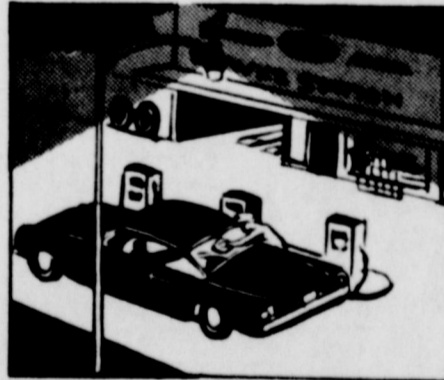

Texas Auto Visitors Spend Over \$1 Billion For 1968

AUSTIN--Expenditures by a record-breaking number of automobile-visitors to Texas last year topped \$1 billion for the first time, the Texas Highway Department reported today.

The Department's annual survey showed a record-breaking 16.6 million visitors toured the State's highways by automobiles.

Significance of the automobile to travel is underlined by U. S. Bureau of the Census figures that indicate that 86 per cent of all travel in the U.S. is by automobile.

Estimates gathered by the Texas Tourist Council, representing the private sector of the travel industry in Texas, indicate that another 5.9 million travelers arrived by commercial carriers -- planes, trains or buses -- and spent an estimated \$467.5 million in the State.

The combined \$1.5 billion impact in visitor spending marked the third straight billion-dollar-plus year for the Texas travel industry.

The Highway Department figures show an increase of 9.1 percent in the number of auto visitors over the previous year, and a gain of 25.8 per cent in the amount of money spent while in Texas.

The increase is still more significant in that the 18.2 thou-

sand visitor parties surveyed by the Highway Department during the year reported more money was spent last year for entertainment and retail sales than ever in history.

These motorists spent more than \$1 billion dollars, a whopping 25.8 per cent increase over spending last year.

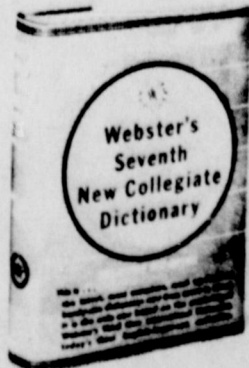

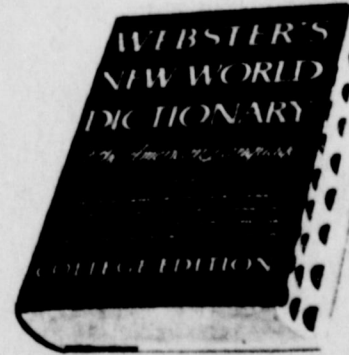

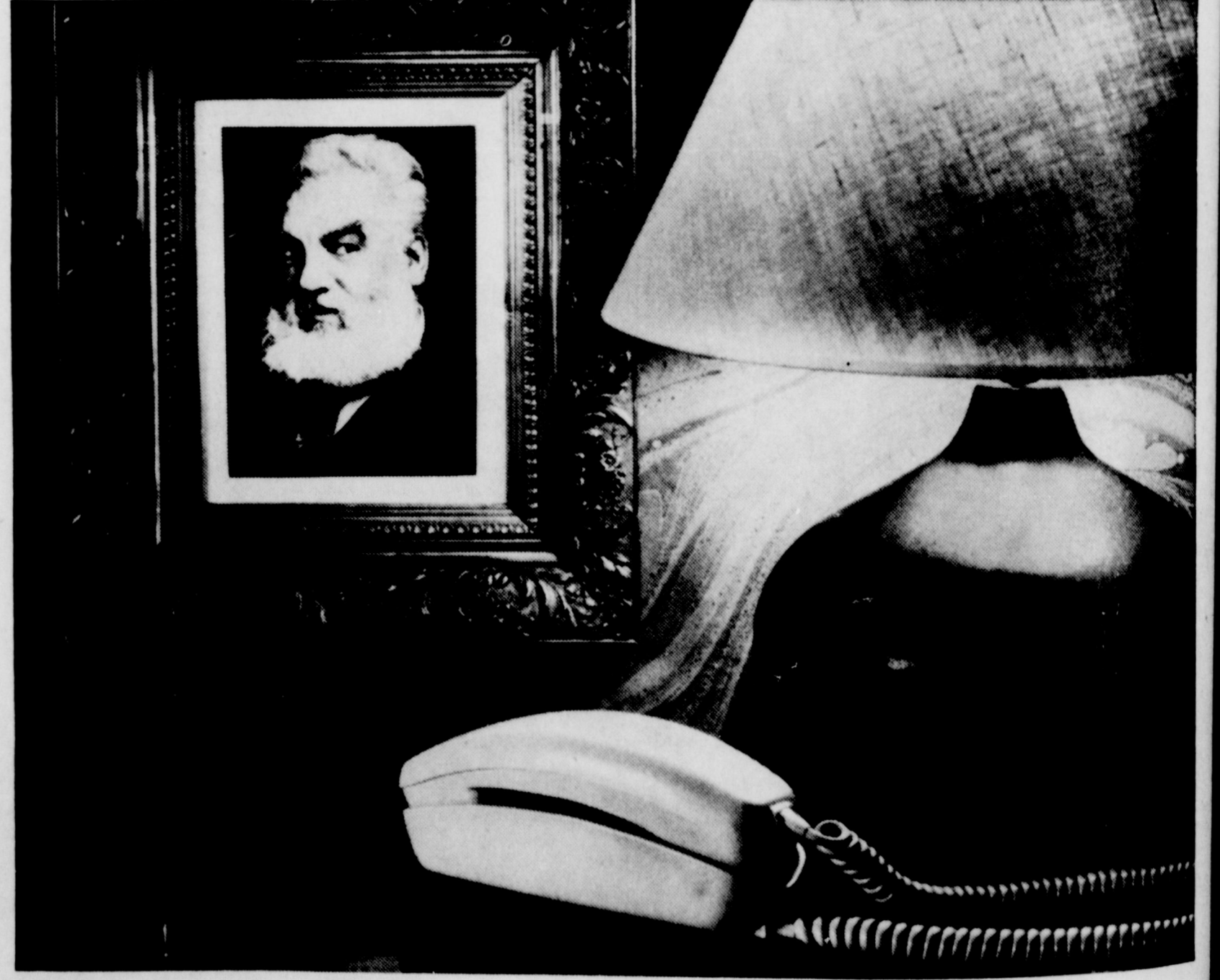
