2.70-Inches Rain Falls In Two Days

Two and .70-inches of rainfall was reported in Sanderson Thursday and Friday nights by Ervin Grigsby, official rain gauger for the county. There was 1.5 inches of rain fell on Thursday night, .42-inch Friday afternoon and 1.23 inches Friday night and Saturday morning before 8:00 a. m.

Most rain gauges in town, east of the official gauge at the Desert Air Motel, showed more than 1.5 inches Thursday night, but the variance was not due to the inaccuracy of any of the gauges, but the path of the rainfall.

Heavy thunderheads moved across the northern part of the county Thursday afternoon and there was some rain reported from most all areas in the upper half of the county. There was some heavy hail fell in Dryden Thursday afternoon damaging the homes in that area, with the heaviest damage reported being to the Vic Littleton home west of Dryden.

Some light hail accompanied the rain locally Friday afternoon.

Ranchers to the north of Sanderson reported beneficial rains on Friday night and Saturday morning early.

Following about a week of hot and humid weather locally, the high temperature reading here Thursday was 69 degrees, according to Grigsby.

OFFICERS ATTEND CRANE CONFERENCE ON TUESDAY

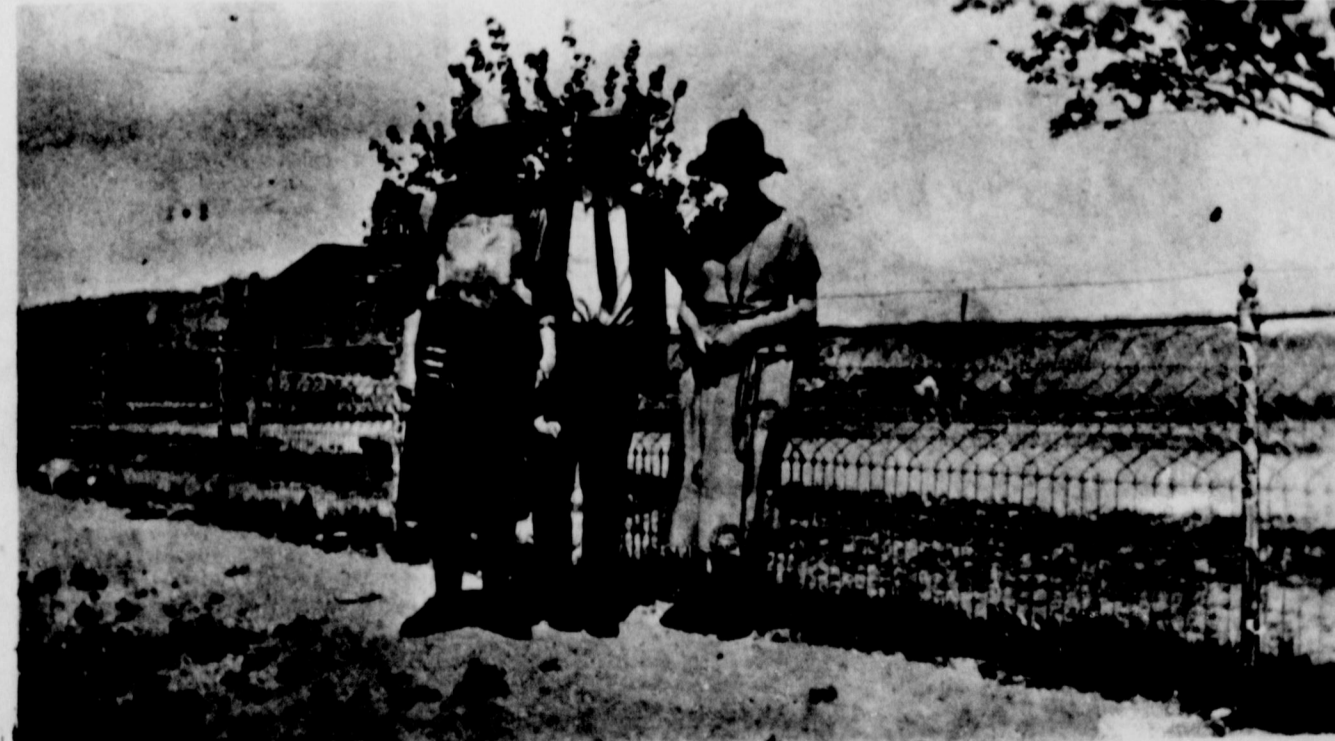

inspire us to work a little harder to put things up in shape, especially since the weeds grow the fastest after a good rain. We have trouble enough staying ahead of them without the rains.

The rangelands in this part of the county were sorely in need of quite a bit of moisture and we doubt that any that was received was not appreciated. It had gotten to a point of making some weeds or grass for the survival of the sheep without supplemental feeding, rather than just help in making a good situation better.

Various phases of ranch work are under way, some marking, some shearing, some doing both in winding up the spring work. And with the delays - if any - caused by the moisture, there was not heard any complaints.

Daylight saving time starts April 27. We don't like it a bit! What we need are some labor saving devices rather than longer hours to work. Probably we'll finish the yard sooner, but we'll be too sleepy to enjoy it!
