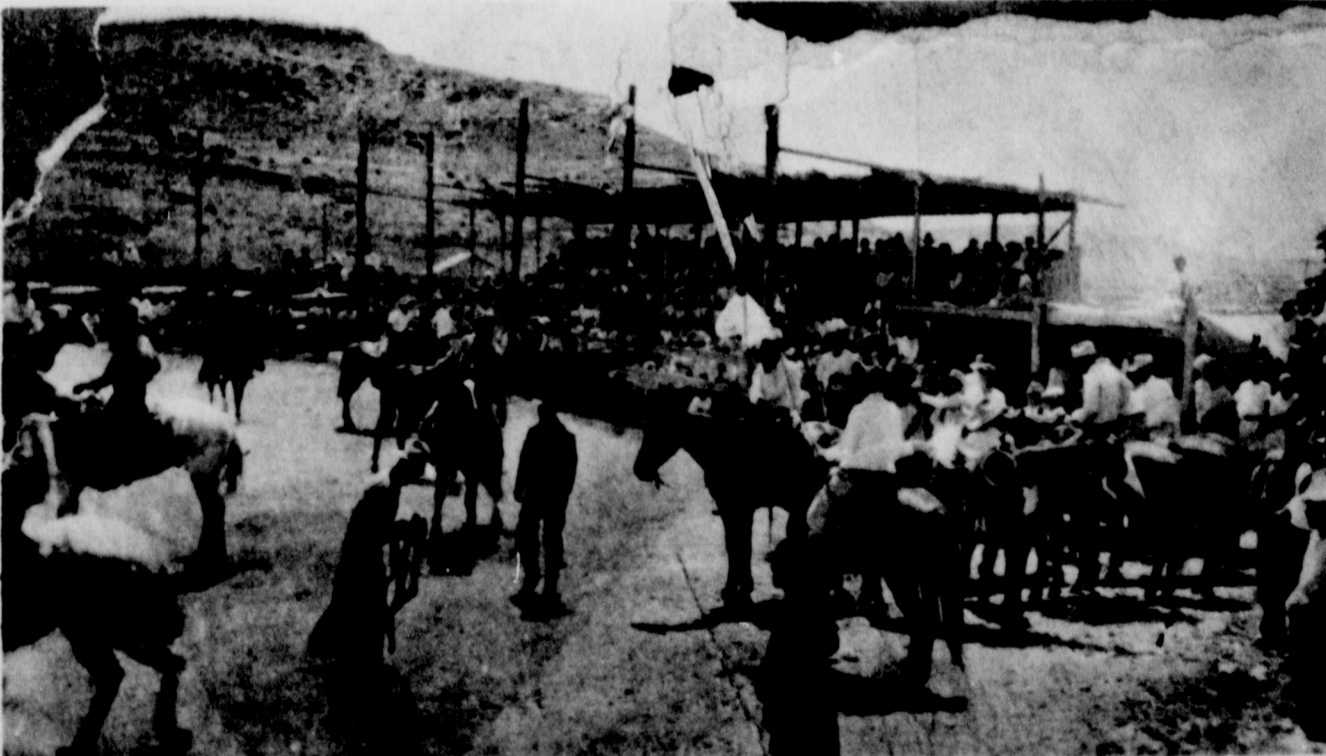
The school will continue during the following week with the closing exercises, to which parents and friends are invited, to be Friday, June 13, at 8:00 p. m.

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## Sul Ross Now University; Elevation Marks Progress

ALPINE - Elevation of Sul Ross State College to a university marks the fourth milestone in the 60-year history of the West Texas institution.

"The change of the name of our institution to Sul Ross State University is a mark of our evolution into a position of greater prestige in the academic world," said Dr. Norman L. Mc-

Neil, university president. "It will keep us on an equal basis with other institutions of higher learning in Texas who are changing their names to universities."

Sul Ross State University began in the summer of 1910 as Summer Normal Institute. The Institute continued each summer through 1916. In April 1917,

a bill established Sul Ross State Normal College and following a delay in construction, classes were begun in the summer of 1920 with seven students.

At the end of the first summer enrollment totaled 55. Enrollment in each of the two six-week summer sessions in 1968 was more than 1,000 students. Enrollment during the academic year just past totaled 2,323 in the first semester and 2,090 in the second semester. The university has conferred more than 7,700 degrees and will confer more than 300 this year.

Since graduate work was authorized in 1930, the institution has conferred more than 1,700 master's degrees.

Dr. McNeil feels that the name change will particularly enhance the institution's standing as an institution of graduate studies.

"I predict that it will help us develop new academic horizons and objectives. . . In summary, I welcome the change to university status," Dr. McNeil concluded.

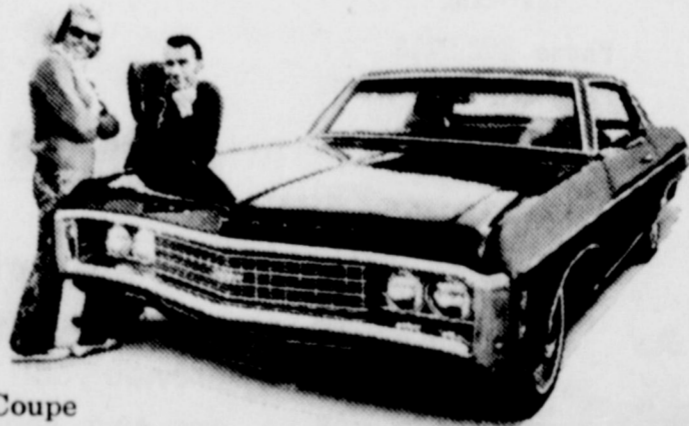
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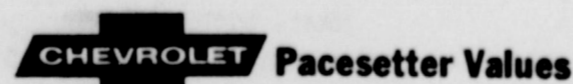
