### Amistad Dam Nears Completion

Workers are putting the final touches on the huge Amistad Dam, but the international project located 12 miles north of Del Rio is not expected to be dedicated until September.

The September date is being given primarily because that's probably the soonest President Richard Nixon and Mexico's President Gustavo Diaz Ordaz can get together for the dedication ceremony.

Officials here point out that both the U.S. and Mexican sides have completed work on the immigration offices, but immigration officers are not expected to start operation of the offices until the dedication is held.

John J. Feira, head of the Perini Corporation, one of our U.S. contractors, said work on the highway spanning the dam may be completed in two weeks.  
 No target date for completion of the whole project has been set.

Feira said workers this week installed elevators at each side of dam. Tests on the elevators, which will take workers to the inspection tunnels below, are being conducted this week.

Heavy equipment has also been moved into the site for the final clean-up and leveling chores.  
 Workers also are touching up paint about the mammoth dam.

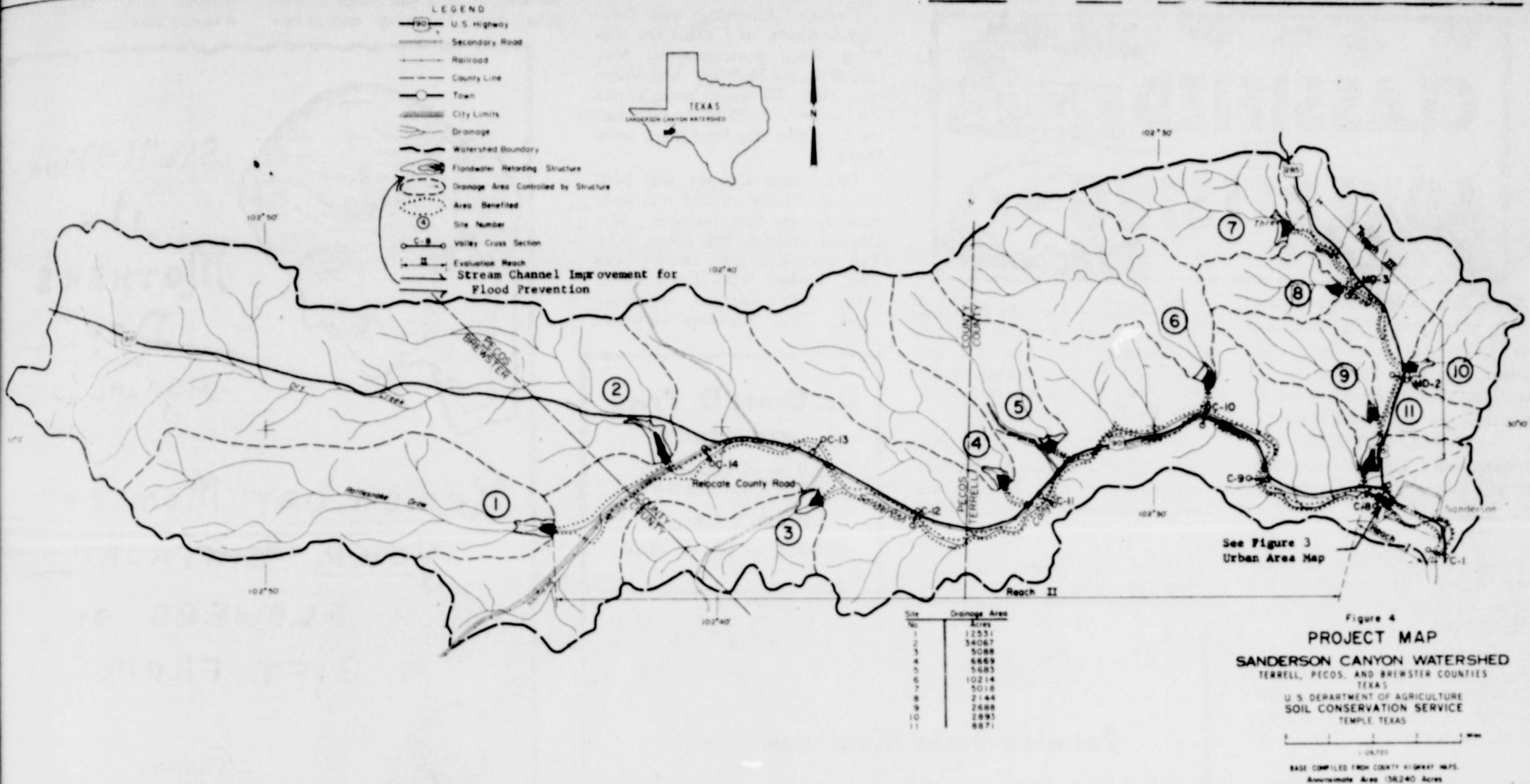

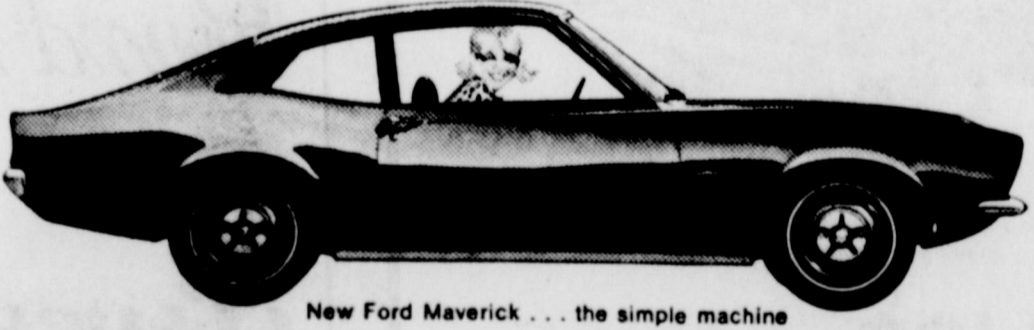
