In case some rancher has been toying with the idea of leasing some or more of his land for hunting, there is a list of names available to you for contacts.

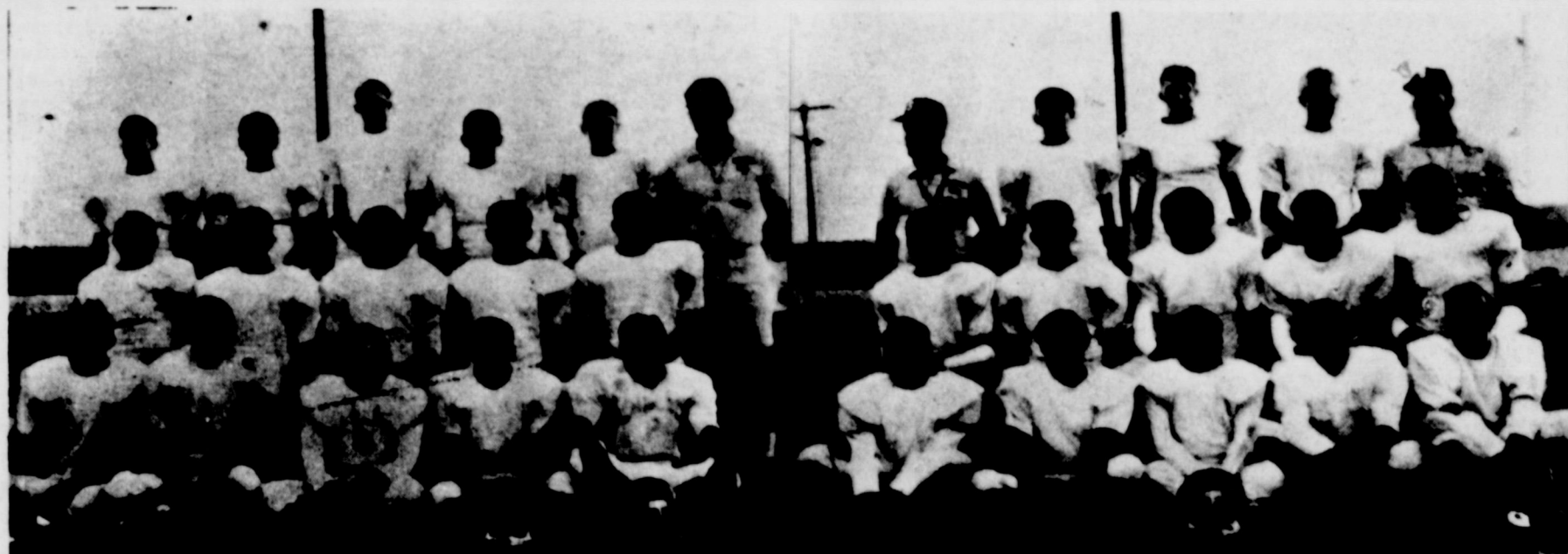
It's always amusing to us to read the letters that are written by would-be deer hunters. Invariably they are on tablet or book paper, and if on regular business stationery they are cut off the heading.

The invocation was given by Rev. Raymond Sanders.

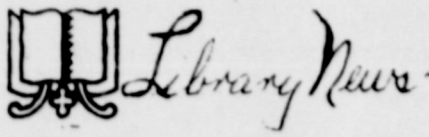
FIRST-AID TREATMENT TALK OPEN TO PUBLIC

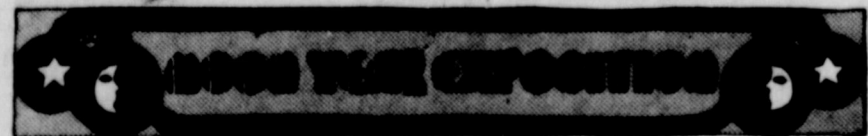
