## LISTEN TO LUKE

The rains of Wednesday night last week put lots of people on edge and there were some who took their families and their belongings and got out of their homes on the east end of town.

We do not consider that there is any undue alarm, because the situation was precarious. And it still is!

The water running eastward toward town in Sanderson Canyon jumped out of the creek bed at the railroad bridge just west of the local gasoline bulk plants on Downie St.

This is the same place that water came out of the creek in 1965 and caused so much damage and the loss of 27 lives.

There are those who believe that the lay of the bridge in relation to the run of the canyon and the absence of a retaining wall on the northeast corner of the bridge to try to effect the water's staying in the canyon is a definite hazard.

They are not voicing this as a matter of engineering or hydraulic knowledge, but from watching water come out of the creek at that point and seeing what happens after the water begins flowing down Downie St.

These neither are qualified as bridge builders, but after the creek runs down it is possible to see the brush and debris collected at the bridge.

And a slow and purposeful move west of Sanderson will reveal the fact that the creek bed in many locations lacks almost completely a channelway due to gravel fill, and this is true of the creek in its traverse of the town.

It is a definite fact that all these hazards will be eliminated when the flood prevention plans are completed. They will be eliminated either as a result of the dams' construction or in connection with their construction.

But in the meantime --- There is going to be some anxiety when the water in the canyon begins jumping out of the creekbed at the railroad bridge near the bulk plants.

And the hazard of this water undermining the foundations of the gasoline storage tanks and shifting them and their contents toward is something that should concern someone.

It's enough to cause one to place certain stipulations in any plan for rain! Our pictures of the conditions and things concerning floods are only to point out what actually is - after all that's what most pictures are really for.

And speaking of pictures, we had lots of derision about the quality of the football teams' pictures two weeks ago, but after running them again very clearly, and the other pictures of the pep squad leaders and drum major and twirlers that I printed so clearly - not one word about that!

Which all goes to show that people had rather gripe.

In the picture above the railroad bridge just west of the local gas bulk plants on the west side of Sanderson is shown as it appeared Friday morning following a heavy rain and run-off Wednesday night. The channel of the creek is almost at right angles to the openings under the bridge. A rise in the creek following the collection of brush as shown in the picture might have caused a serious result in forcing the water on to the left which is an extension of Downie St. and parallels the railroad and Oak St.



At the top right is a picture taken from where the water came out of Sanderson Canyon showing the beginning of the roadway in the creekbed maintained and used mainly by railroad vehicles. The roadway was cleared for a distance of about 150 yards in the bed of the creek. The pile of dirt and gravel in the center was the result of re-sloping the bank out of the creek.

The picture at the right shows how some of the water came down Downie St. Wednesday night following the rains west and north. Persons who saw the water jump out of the creek channel feared another slight rise and the recurrence of the conditions of June of 1965. This view is looking west toward the extension of Sanderson Canyon channel and is the path taken by the devastating water four years ago.



## Marfa Trounces Sanderson Friday 35-6; Eagles To Host Grandfalls This Week

The Marfa Shorthorns trounced the Sanderson Eagles in their non-district game Friday night in that city. The final score was 35-6.

Leslie Hall scored the lone Eagle tally early in the first period from the 1-yard line, but the try for the extra point failed.

Marfa scored 29 points in the first half with one of the TDs coming on a 65-yard punt return and three tallies from the line of scrimmage.

The fifth and final tally of Marfa was in the third period.

Sanderson had a more effective passing game than their opener, completing seven for a gain of 54 yards and losing only one of the tosses by interception.

The Eagles had a chance to show their punting coverage nine times during the game.

One 15-yard penalty and two for five yards each for Sanderson compared favorably with seven for Marfa for 80 yards.

Marfa led in first downs 15-7 and yards rushing 306-135.

The Eagles recovered two of Marfa's fumbles while not losing the ball to the Shorthorns in a fumble.

Sanderson will host the Cowboys from the Grandfalls-Royalty School Friday night with the kick-off at 8:00 p. m.

Grandfalls is a Class B school.

## Rains Continue Over This Area

Rains continued to fall over the area as of the time of this writing Saturday afternoon.

The heaviest rains of the season were Wednesday night of last week when up to 3 inches was reported to the west of Sanderson. There was also some heavy rains on the 3-Mile watershed north of Sanderson and both Sanderson Canyon and 3-Mile Draw ran heavily Wednesday night.

Sanderson Canyon, below the confluence with 3-Mile Draw ran bank full and jumped out of the banks at places, but there was no damage locally.

At Emerson, some 7 miles west of Sanderson, there was damage reported to both the highway and railroad bridges.

Cloudy weather has continued

and some rain has fallen over some part of the county every day since the first of last week.

Locally, rain gauges showed about 1.2 inches of rainfall on Wednesday night. There were slight showers again Friday night and Saturday afternoon in Sanderson.

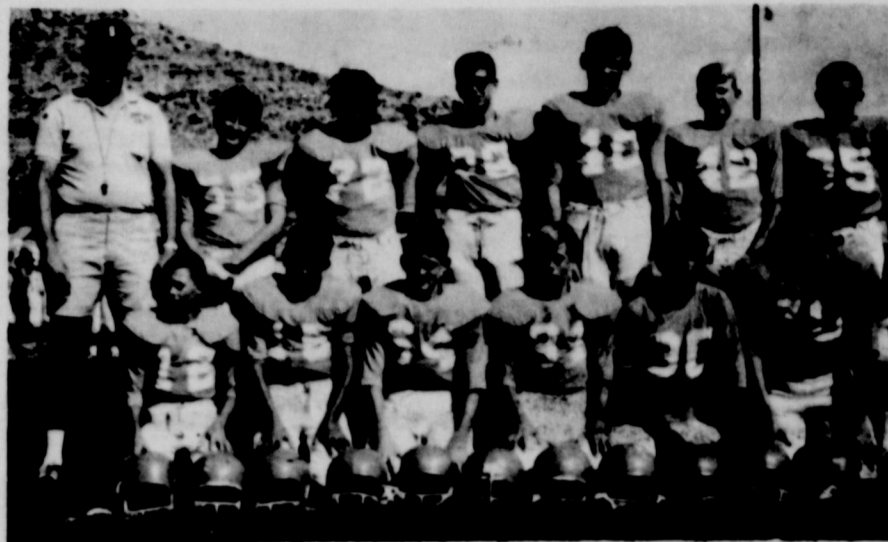
**John Watts, 73, Area Ranchman, Interred in Del Rio**

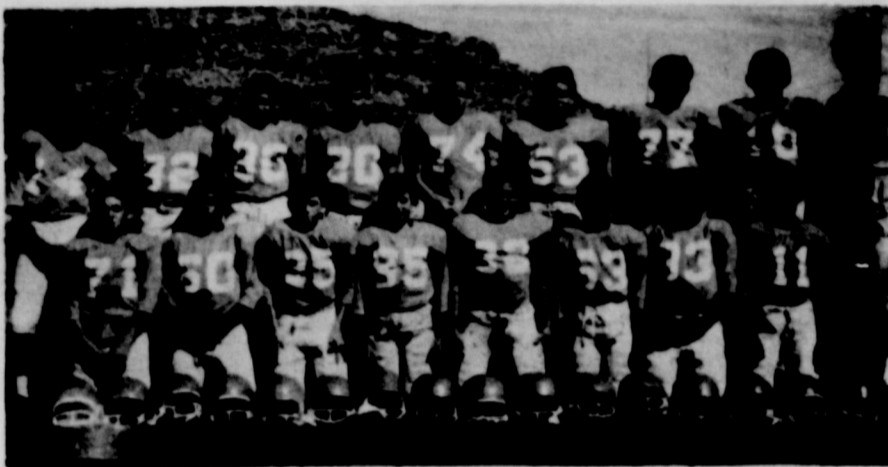

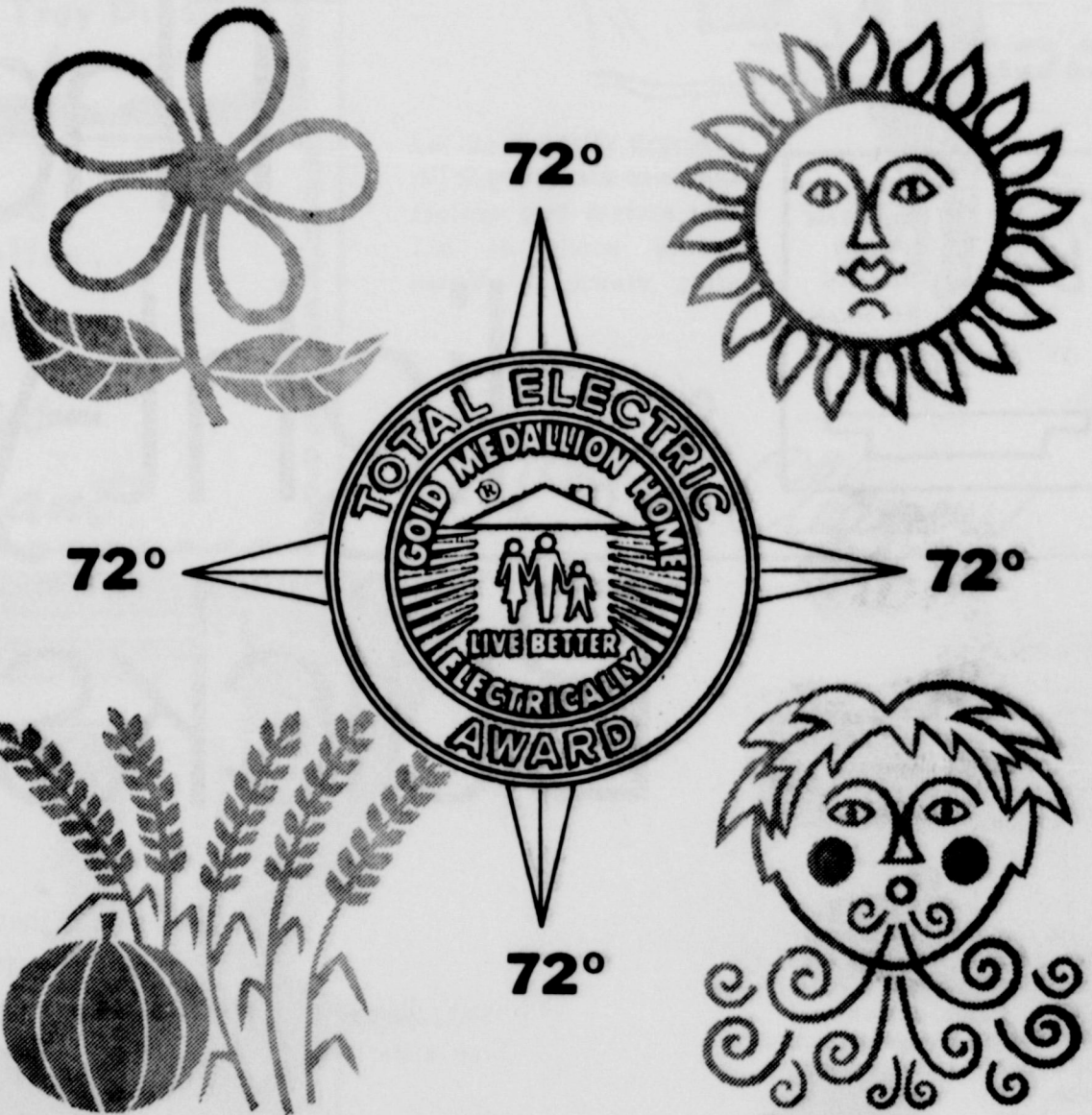

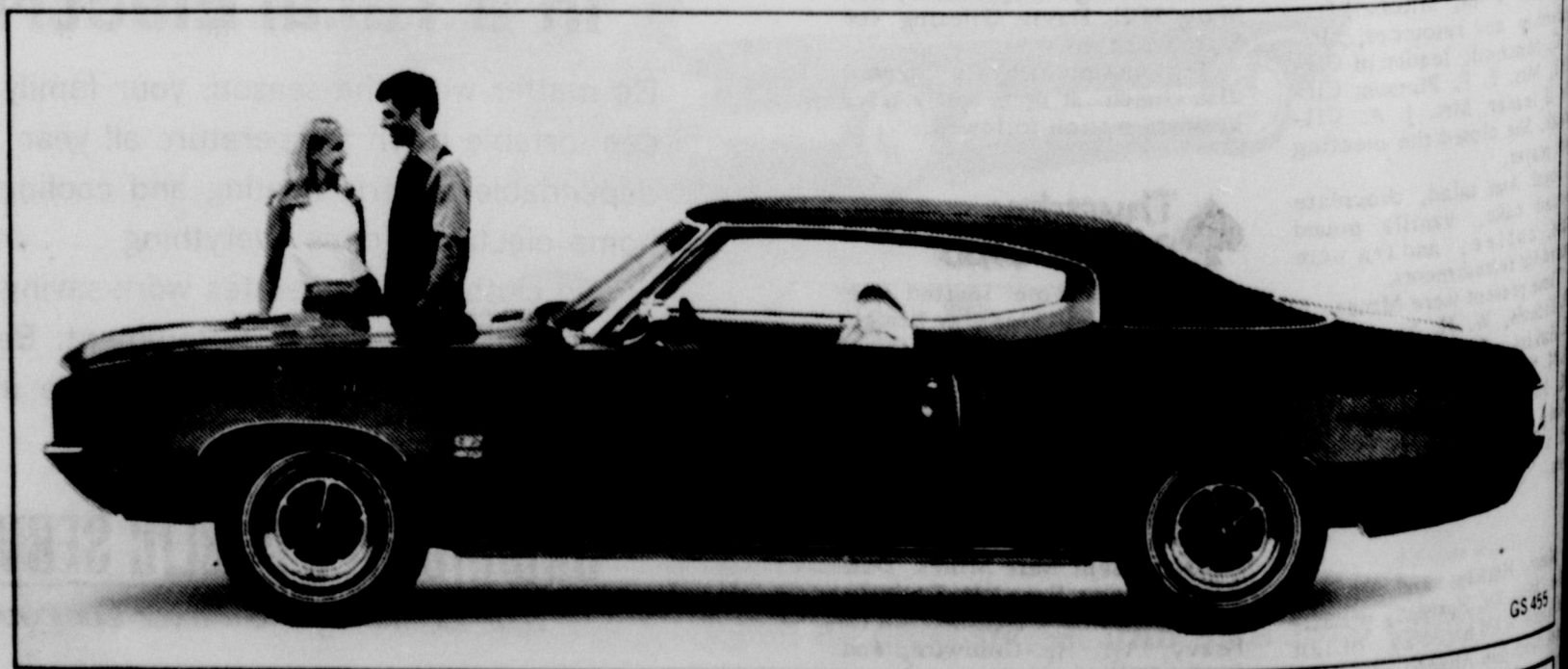

## Bill To Curb National Park Misuse

A bill co-sponsored by Congressman Richard C. White to prevent misuse of National Park properties passed the House of Representatives today. The House took the action in response to the building of the so-called "Resurrection City" near the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, in 1968.

The bill prevents camping or overnight occupancy or the erection of structures in areas regularly designated for such use, or except for use for national security, official uses, or in case of emergencies arising out of natural disaster.

"This bill will insure that National Park Service properties be used for the purposes for which they were intended," Congressman White said. "It

cost the government a half million dollars to restore the Lincoln Memorial area to its normal purposes following the Resurrection City episode. Of this, the government has recovered only \$20,000.

"There are ample National Park areas designated for public camping. These are not affected by the bill. The bill provides ample exceptions to cover emergencies, but I think it is most important that, as far as possible, those areas set aside for the preservation of natural beauty and the memorializing of our national ideals should be preserved for that purpose."
